Some American publishers have discontinued their Canadian editions, some continue.

The interesting fact about all this is that Canada is not only a small nation, in the sense of population, but it most export for a healthy economy. Canada is also fiercely anti-communist. and in wars for freedom has done more than its share in expenditures of both money and lives. Despite the richness of their land, the Canadians have never embarked on any foreign giveaway schemes, and do not hesi-tate, as illustrated by the magazine incident, to protect home industry.

In addition, Canada shortly after the war made huge reductions in income taxes, has a booming economy, and discounts American money when exchanged for Canadian money.

In other words, Canada does very nicely by following the old American customs and methods that prevailed before the inter-So the Canadian government acted, with a law providing for the banks of the Potomac.



The First Lady of Lebanon



Mrs. Camille Chamoun, wife of the popular president of the Republic of Lebanon, is a gracious, beautiful woman whose slender figure is a familiar sight at charitable and cultural functions throughout the nation.

"There are so many demands for so many worthwhile and urgent causes that I sometimes feel I am the biggest beggar in Lebanon, seeking money for non-governmental projects," says the first lady of Lebanon.

Although she generally shuns the political limelight, Mn. Chamoun has taken a courageous stand on past occasions when Lebanon's independence was threatened by repressive foreign

After Mr. Chamoun became President of Lebanon on September 23, 1952, one of the first reforms he instituted was granting women the right to vote. Mrs. Chamoun disclaims all credit for this act, stating that "what the President did in extending the franchise to women was a natural thing." She is of the opinion that "women can do a great deal for the common goed by influencing their husbands and brothers to support leaders er projects depending upon intrinsic qualities involved. Women are sincerely concerned about the basic welfare of human being and thus, in exercising their voting rights, their first consideration is not politics but the welfare of their fellowmen." In addition to her great concern with welfare activities, the

President's wife also is dedicated to encouraging various forms of authentic Lebanese art. When the National Conservators of Music was on the point of being abandoned several years ap, she rallied patrons of art to its cause and within two years' time the Conservatory was not only revitalized but became Belrut's leading institution of music. And in the field of drace, Mrs. Chamoun has helped to preserve native folk dances which were dying out as members of the older generation passed on



TIPS FOR SURVIVAL

FCDA Offers Practical **Defense Against Fallout**

In a split second during the pre-dawn hours of a morning in November 1952, radioactive fallout came of age as a potential haz-ard to every living thing. Since then, millions of words have been written and spoken

Since then, millions of words have been written and spoken about it. We are told that it cannot be detected by any of the human senses, only by radiation detection devices. It can hitch a ride on the wind for hundreds of miles from a nuclear blast, settle to earth even in remote places and make entire areas temporarily BUT WHAT, ACTUALLY, is fallout? Can its movement be pre-

dicted? And what can people do to protect against it?

Fallout is nothing more than tiny dust particles blasted into the air when a nuclear weapon's fireball intersects the earth's surface. This material is then made radioactive by the fireball, and thus carries dangerous radiation to wherever the dust falls. By plotting high-altitude winds, weather men can pre-dict the area of fallout, and teil approximately where it

will land. Radiological mon-itoring would then establish specific fallout patterns. People can protect themselves mainly by staying under cover. and tuning a battery-operated radio to emergency civil defense frequencies for expert instructions. A basement makes a fair shelter, an old-fashioned root cellar an excellent one. This is because only 1/5,000th of the radiation that would hit a person in the open will penetrate three feet of earth.

MOST IMPORTANT, remember that fallout leaves no margin for errors, or amateurs. For example, just because the surface wind is blowing from a "safe" direction doesn't mean that the winds above 10,000 feet—which would usually dominate the direction of fallout—weren't blowing some other way. Only blowing some other way. Only the experts have the equipment to predict fallout areas.
