





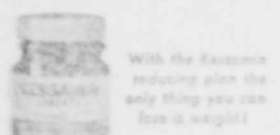

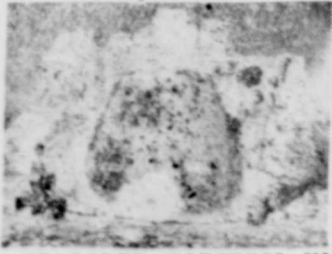
Mrs. J. W. Jeffcoat gave a talk on "Practical Helps in the Sick-room."

## Home Demonstration Agent

### FUMIGATE GARDEN SOIL TO CONTROL ROOT KNOT DISEASE

Root knot disease can be controlled in garden soils by fumigation. Extension plant pathologist Dr. Harlan E. Smith says the fumigant should be applied from 10 days to 2 weeks before planting and soil moisture should be adequate for germinating seed. More moisture is required in sandy soils.

Before fumigating, remove from the area to be treated all plant trash and infected roots. Prepare a good seed bed as if for planting. Use a hoe or plow to open furrows 6 to 8 inches deep and 12 inches apart. Apply the fumigant from a fruit jar. Two holes should be punched in the jar lid. One is to let in air and the other to distribute fumigant. Make application by walking along the open furrow and dribbling the fumigant into the bottom of the furrow. Dr. Smith advises covering the furrow immediately to prevent loss of the fumigant gases.

He says a pint of the material should cover about 150 feet of row space. It is a good idea, he adds, to test first with water in the jar to determine how fast to walk in order to make the proper distribu-

tion. He says Garden Dowfume, D-D, Soilfume 60-40, Isobromo 40 and Bromofume 40 are all effective as garden fumigants.

Severe injury may result if the fumigant application is made closer than two feet to growing plant roots. Keep the material out of the eyes and mouth and should it be accidentally spilled on hands or clothing, remove it immediately with soap and water or kerosene, cautions Smith.

Since such warm weather crops as tomatoes, peas, cucumbers, and okra are susceptible to root knot damage, Dr. Smith suggests fumigating the rows where they will be planted. Finally, don't mix treated and untreated soil & use disease-free transplants.

### Great Plains Conservation Program To Be Explained in Meeting Tonight

A reminder to you that would like an explanation and discussion of the Great Plains Conservation program, Thursday (today), Feb. 21, at 8 p.m., at the auditorium of the Activities Building in Morton, these things will be discussed.

We will go into the law (1921) thoroughly. This will be first on the agenda and will be followed by practices applicable. Then, a question and answer portion. Come prepared to ask questions about the program that have been puzzling you.

Another item that might be of interest to you as a farmer, is a simple contraption designed by Claude Drennan, a farmer who is living 10 miles south and four mi. west of Morton. It is actually a double furrow guide operating from a power lift. Claude is using it to good advantage in listing in that rows are very uniform even though the soil is dry and hard. Two guides are actually on the front of the tractor with only one in use at a time. The one in use fits in the last furrow listed and as a turn is made the other drops in to furrow thus guiding the tractor back.

If interested go by and see same. I can see uniform rows and a lot less work through the use of it.

Planting time is not too far in the future. If you have in mind planting grass seed or legume this spring our advise is to buy planting seed now.

Indian grass seed can be bought from Max Bowers at a good price. Local seed of good quality and germination are much better than the seed imported from distant sources. If you want Indian grass, contact Bowers as they will be gone in a short time, seed supplies are still limited.

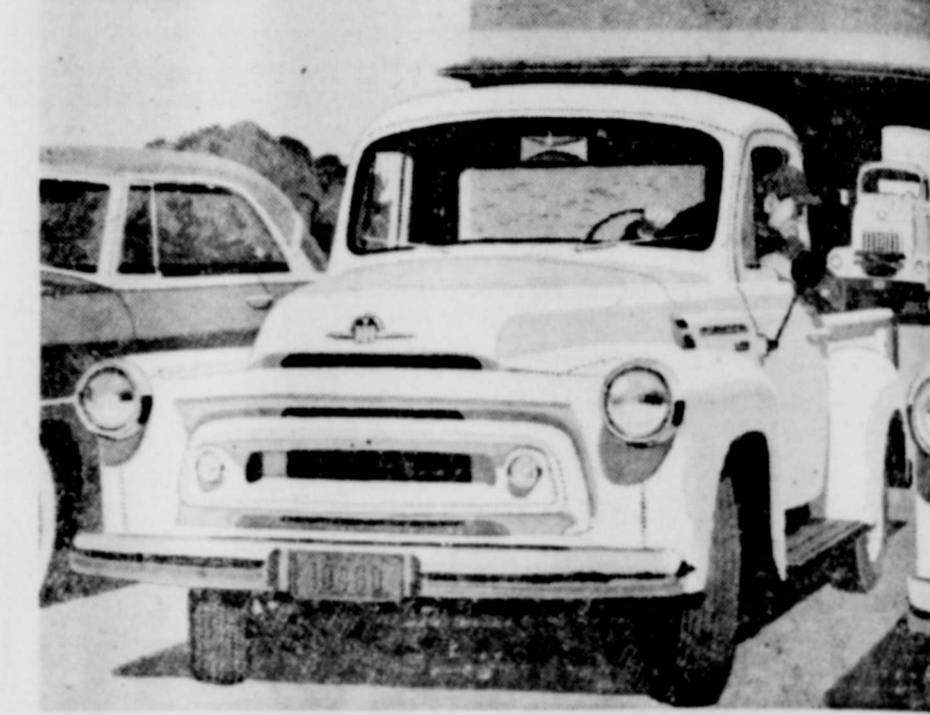

WEEKLY LETTER

The activity in the House picked up last week and there were up to that time, a total of 449 bills introduced.



There must be some behind-the-scenes activity going on in both legislative chambers these past few weeks concerning former Gov. Shivers' "last minute" appointments.

Just what started the general talk is not known, but unofficial sources indicate that opposition centered on the appointment of Austin Attorney John Osorio as a member of the Board of Insurance Commissioners. Osorio was not named as one of the term offices starting between Jan. 1 and the time Gov. Shivers went out of office, but to a vacancy that took effect Jan. 1.

Gov. Daniel said he thinks "an incoming governor should have at least some representation on the boards and commissions functioning in his administration."

The Senate nominations committee is holding hearings on all recess appointments made by Shivers.

There are several intricacies in the process of Senate confirmation of public officials. The Constitution requires all appointees of the governor to be confirmed by the Senate, and various other appointees by other officials must also be confirmed.

When a recess appointment is made — at times the Legislature is not in session — the appointee can take office at once. But when an appointment is made during a session, the appointee cannot qualify until the Senate has confirmed him.

If the Senate rejects a recess appointee, he is automatically out of office when the vote is taken. If the Senate fails to act on the nomination at adjournment, he then goes out of office.

If a nomination made during a session is not acted on before adjournment, the appointment dies. So, everything considered, there may even be some name changing on office doors here and there before we reach the halfway mark of the 55th Legislature.

Tuesday the House and Senate met in a joint session to hear addresses delivered by Olympic Track star Bobby Morrow and Dr. William Menninger, nationally famous psychiatrist.

Most of the debate in the House this week centered around House Joint Resolution No. 1, which is a proposed Constitutional Amendment that provides for annual sessions of the Legislature. The resolution passed the House and has been sent to the Senate.

Also, this week, the House passed Senate Bill No. 18. This is the Texas Commercial Feed Control Act, which has now passed both Houses and will be sent to the Gov. for signature.

House Bill No. 173 passed the House and has been sent to the Senate. This is the "Egg Bill" regulating the handling and sale of chicken eggs in Texas, and providing for grading, labeling, etc.

There has been little or no activity concerning the various water bills this week; however, the news about the West Texas rains has been most welcome. I hope that everyone received their share of the rain even though I know we need more.

Monday (this week) the House will vote on the Enabling Act creating the Texas Water Development Board. I hope to be able to tell you more about this in my next release.

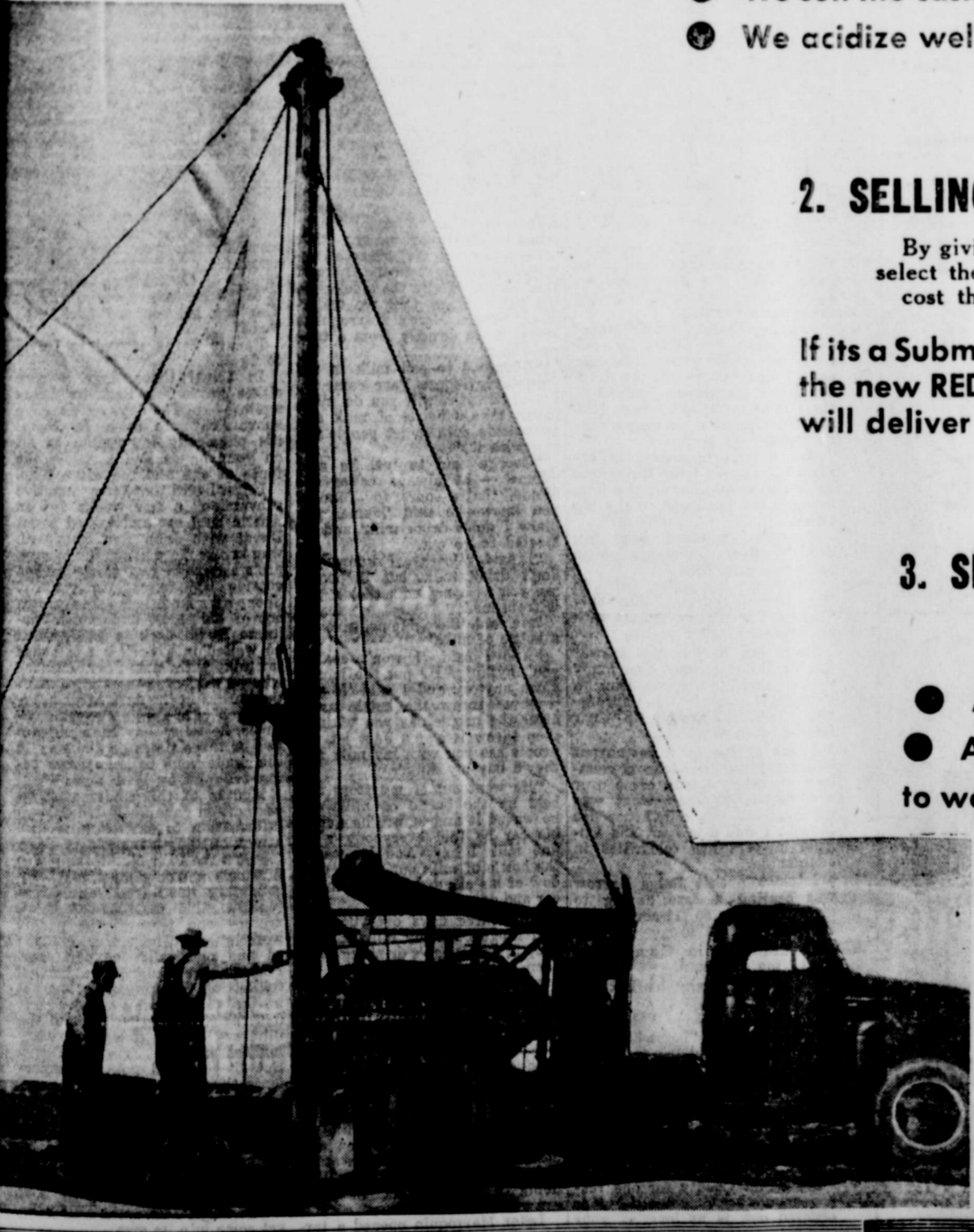

### World's Largest Oil Reservoir



UPON DISCOVERY THAT THE CLAY at Amuay, Venezuela, was impermeable enough to hold oil without any appreciable loss from seepage, the U. S. owned Croole Petroleum Corporation, with the help of experts from Massachusetts Institute of Technology, has drastically cut storage costs in the construction of this 8,500,000 barrel earthen storage reservoir—the largest in the world. Covering nearly 29 acres, it is 60 feet deep and has an earthen dam 275 feet wide at base around two sides. This type of storage, built at a cost of \$2,800,000, cuts cost to about 35 cents a barrel compared with \$1.65 to \$2.00 for conventional tank storage.

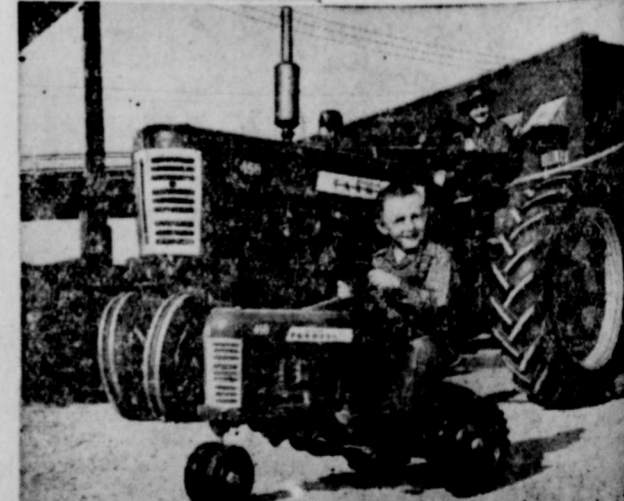
