Water, the life's blood of West Texas, is fast becoming one of the most important topics in state government.

Leading a movement to encourage state government's interest in water development and conservation is Gov. Daniel himself, who admits that problems are being met in many sections by private or regional water conservation districts.

"Years of delay," the governor pointed out, have somehow failed to generate the action to pass a "state-wide" water program. He has expressed confidence that the State of Texas will soon become a full partner in the conservation and development of its water resources.

Gov. Daniel believes the state is the only agency that can fill in "the present gap in water development."

"During the past 10 years, many groups and organizations have studied the water problem," he said.

- 3 tablespoons Worcestershire sauce

In a double boiler, melt butter or margarine; add grated cheese, stirring occasionally until melted. Beat up eggs just until blended, add milk, salt and pepper. Stir into cheese. Cook, stirring occasionally, until partially thickened. Add catsup and Worcestershire sauce. Cook until thickened and fairly smooth. Serve on toast. Makes 4 servings.

 The order of business has continued to steadily increase and to date (late last week) there have been 512 House Bills introduced.

Most of the interest this week concerned water development and school tuition.

House Joint Resolution No. 3 is a proposed Constitutional Amendment authorizing the State to issue \$200 million in bonds to create the

West Texas Water Development Fund. House Bill No. 161 is the Enabling Act to put this fund into operation when it has been passed by the voters.

This fund will be used over an extended period of time, and will "back-up" local bonds where necessary, for the purpose of conserving and reclaiming surface and ground water. These were passed by the House and sent to the Senate.

**FIELD DAY AT BALMORHEA EXPERIMENT STATION**

The Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, Sub - Station No. 9, Balmorhea, Texas, is holding its annual field day March 9, 1957. This is an educational field day program for ranchers.

Many important cattle breeding tests are being carried on at this station and all ranchers are invited to attend this field day. For example, at the end of the first 112 day tests this year, the high grazing sire group came from a bull that was the high gaining individual there in the 1951 - 52 tests. I believe that this is significant enough to say that the station has some information that is of vital importance to the cattle industry of this state.

### Knights Templar Offer Scholarships To H. S. Seniors

Any boy or girl graduating from a Texas Public High School in the May or June Class, 1957, if he or she meets requirements of having an approved character, and a minimum four year high school average of 80, is eligible for one of three scholarships offered by the Grand Commandery of the Knights Templar of Texas.

In a letter to Mrs. Pat Smith of the local Order of the Eastern Star, came the details of how this scholarship is to be awarded. During Public School Week the week of March 4 through March 9, they must submit an essay on the subject "How I May Assist in the Preservation of Our American Way of Life."

Scholarships available as to the order the essays are chosen are: (1) \$1,000; (2) \$300; and (3) \$250. Winners of the scholarship may major in any department of an ap-

proved College or University in the State of Texas. Other requirements are that they must carry 14 hours of semester work in any term; they must maintain not less than a C average, and the minimum hours must apply on a recognized degree. To enter this, contact Mrs. Pat Smith immediately who has the copy of the prescribed form that must be mailed with the entry, not before March 4th and not later than March 9th, and the form will have to be signed by the Superintendent or principal of the school.
