The Investigation Committee has continued their work this week.

The work of the Committee investigating the L. C. Y. Insurance Company grows larger and larger. We should have a report from the Cox committee next week.

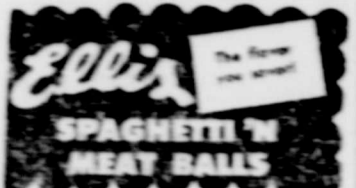
The Senate news this week is that the Senate approved a record two billion dollar major appropriation bill after fourteen hours of all-night continuous debate. This was accomplished by staying in session until ten minutes to one, Friday morning. The bill passed substantially as it came out of the com-

mittee. There were three amendments adopted which added to the two-year spending budget proposed by the House Appropriations Committee.

These amendments were \$234,487 for expanded county agricultural extension services; \$33,710 for cotton marketing research at the University of Texas; and approximately \$1 million to add 250 beds to the operation of the John Sealey Hospital at Galveston. The Comptroller estimates that there will still be approximately forty million dollars in the State Treasury.

We are looking forward to getting on to the remainder of the bills now that the Appropriation Bill has passed. Because of the long session on the Appropriation bill, the calendar is quite crowded and we are anticipating a lot of work in the next few weeks.

With three separate investigating committees functioning in Austin, more arguments appear daily in favor of Gov. Price Daniel's proposal that the state authorize a law enforcement commission for Texas.

At present, two such investigating committees, one from the House and the other from the Senate, are looking into the ICF Insurance situation while a third committee is delving into the alleged offer of Rep. Cox to commercially withdraw his own bill which threatened to outlaw the practice of natu-

There is no question of the sincerity of the fine House members who are conducting the Cox inquiry, or of the two committees they represent.

The mere mechanics of appointing a House inquiry group resulted in a wide breach in that body. Some of the stems from jealousy of the individuals who wanted, and even asked for places on the committee and were not selected. Some of it stems from sincere protests of East Texas legislators that they have no representation on the committee.

The investigating committee members themselves are in jeopardy of being criticized by the House as "wild hunters" or for attempting to advance themselves politically. This breach in the House caused by the Cox affair could very well have some effect on the legislative program.

These and other current events have influenced support for the Governor's law enforcement commission to replace many single-shot investigating groups.

#### 4-H TRAINING MEETINGS

Two training meetings have been held on entomology for 4-H Club boys of Cochran County with a total of 35 boys attending each meeting. Color slides were shown on insects and the boys were instructed in insect control. Mr. W. M. Butler is assisting in the entomology work with the teams. Several more meetings will be held within the next 45 days on Entomology and meetings will also start on 4-H Rifle Safety and Shooting soon.

One training meeting with 20 boys attending was held on fitting traps for exhibition. Color slides were shown at this meeting.

#### COTTON MEETING

On Monday evening, March 11, a joint meeting of Cochran County Farm Bureau and Cochran County Cotton Growers Association met in the County Agent's office to discuss the House Bill H. R. 5085 which Congressman Price was introducing to the House Committee on Agriculture.

The Committee met and rehashing this proposed bill and were not in accord with any of the bill concerning cotton acreage allotment. They did agree on one phase of the bill concerning cleaner light spaced cotton and establishing a separate grade for light spot as well as heavy spotted.

The action of this Committee was sent in night letter to Congressman George Mahon the same evening.

#### SORCHUM ALUMINUM

Sorchum Alumina has been a much discussed subject and every day many farmers ask me about it — questions as origin, description, establishment and management are frequently asked. E. M. Trew, Extension Agronomist of Texas A & M College has reported on sorchum alumina in a leaflet numbered 22 and dated 1957. You may get a copy of this leaflet at the County Agent's office.

#### Range Specialist To Be Here Mar. 27

Mr. G. O. Hoffman, Range Specialist Extension Service, College Station, will be in Cochran County on March 27th. He will put on a demonstration on shinnery at 9:30 a.m. on the Plains Highway, south of Lehman. It will be on the ranch Leland Schiefer manages and it will be next to the highway where ranchers and farmers can see it. Everyone is invited. More specific information will be mailed to farmers and ranchers.

The plot will be staked off and 4 lbs. CMU pellets will be used on 1/2 acre, 8 lbs. on an adjoining 1/2 acre, and 24 lbs. on an adjoining 1/2 acre. This element is non-poisonous to livestock.

If time permits we will have a mesquite spraying demonstration to be announced at the meeting. This may be an individual tree treatment demonstration using 2-4-D and diesel oil. The time & place of this will be announced at the shinnery meeting.

All farmers and ranchers who have shinnery problems are especially invited to attend this demonstration.

Mr. Hoffman will use a whirlwind distributor for spreading the pellets.

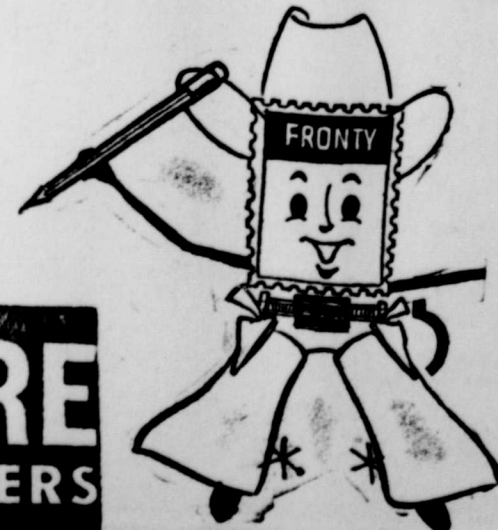
