Arrangements should be made for grass seed very soon for spring planting. We will have a good acreage of different grasses including: Indian, Switch, Weeping Love, Side, Galsgramma, Sorghum Altman, Catechian Bluestem, Sandhills Bluestem, and possibly others planned for seed production pasture and for soil improvement.

Conservators who have purchased seed include: E. D. Jackson, Roy Hickson, Lemus Sedgewick, Raymond Beham, L. O. Coleman, C. C. Harvey, Truman Smith, Max Downey, Tye Williamson, Jim Greener, J. H. Becker, Charles Busby and Elwood Harris.

Max Downey has acquired some sand bluestem which is very scarce and will be used for seed production only. Most of our grasses will produce a good seed crop during the first year, if well cared for. This will call for fertilizer, early seeding date, irrigation as necessary, kept clean and free of weeds, and needs to be treated as you would treat cotton. Legume seed, along with the inoculation should be purchased this month for interplanting with grain sorghum. Our observation is that where peas are used as the soil improver interplanted with grain sorghum, that the early planting will give better results than a June 15th to June 20th planting. 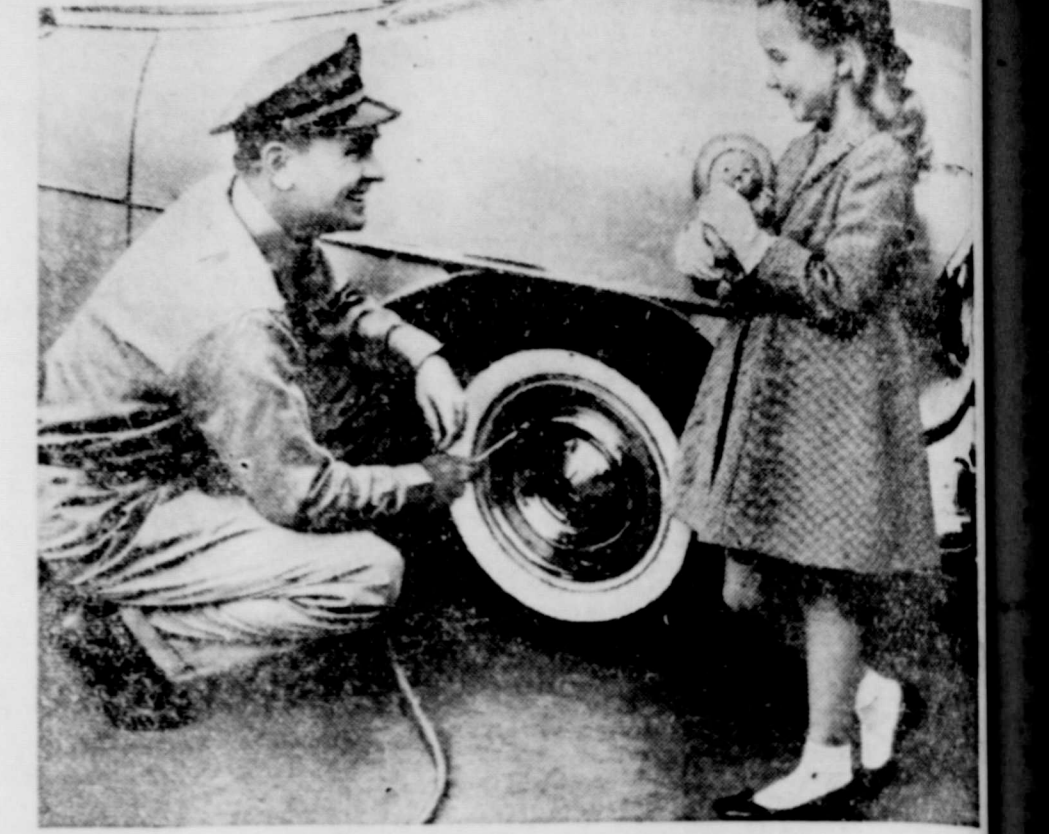

IF WE ARE to have a Babe Ruth League in Morton this coming summer, those interested had better get together and get something started on the program.

THE SOFTBALL league, at their first meeting of the year, discussed possibilities of working out a plan where the Babe Ruth League could use their diamond for play.

we find that ...

BEFORE WE OBTAIN quick to be critical over something they often know little about, and an example of this occurred Saturday as the Banks - Ross building went up in flames and smoke, while the Fire Department was unable to do a whole lot about it.

we don't lay claim ...

TO KNOWING whether or not the fire could have been stopped with as many as 13 trucks and 150 men on the scene. We also are among those including the fire department, who regret that at times our fire trucks don't operate exactly as we would like them to. But we do know, just by common sense reasoning, and by the word of the employees of Banks - Ross, that it's doubtful the building could have been saved with the equipment we have available, and the alarm turned in at the time it was sure it's awful easy ...

AFTER SOMETHING is done, to look back and say, if the truck had started a little quicker ... if the fire department had been notified a little sooner ... if the Whiteface truck had been called sooner, and a lot of other if's. But remember those if's won't prove a thing. Using the information available, that chunks of the ceiling were falling down before anyone noticed a fire; that the Banks - Ross staff first thought was to fight the fire which they thought they could get out; that the building burned down in less than an hour after the fire department was called; it's fairly obvious the fire was well along before the fire department was called.

a natural thought ...

THAT OCCURS to most people is that you just don't expect a brick or cement block building across the street from a fire station to burn down. That's true, but our contention is, if the fire has burned long enough to get a "hold", it makes no difference if it's the Fire Station itself, burning, there is only so much that can be done. We seriously doubt if many of the critics ever saw a building burn any faster — that is, a building of comparable size and structure. We all so seriously doubt if any of the critics went to the fire meeting on Monday and put in their application to serve on the Morton Volunteer Fire Department.

remember this ...

ACCURATE and successful fire fighting is like most other professions or occupations, it's a science requiring lots of training. And, with a volunteer Fire Department, the training depends on the amount of funds available; and in a city the size of Morton, the funds available are meagre, to say the very least.

GOT OFF to a pretty good start last Thursday by crushing Whitharral, 9 to 2 in a game played on the local field. Gary Middleton was the winning pitcher, after relieving Stockdale in the second inning. However, Monday, it was a different st-

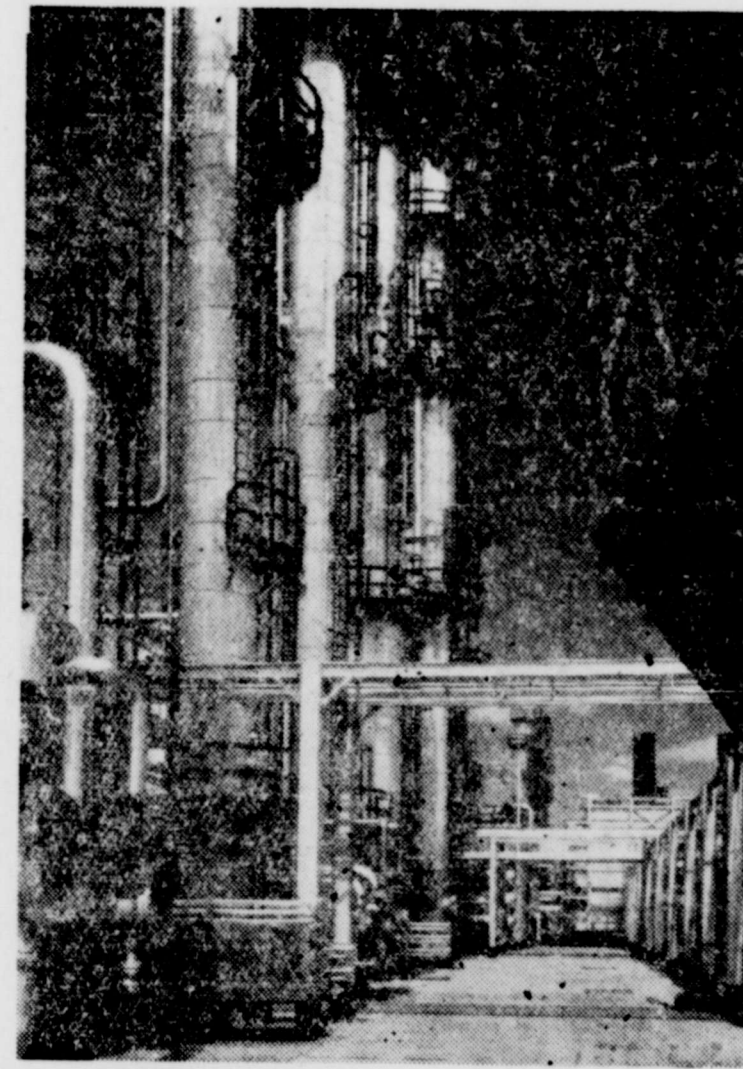
TWO NEW BUSINESSES WILL OPEN IN MORTON SOON

**Loophole Plugged
By Amendment to
'Hot Check' Law**

AUSTIN — An amendment to the Texas "hot check" law that makes employers liable for paying their employees with checks that bounce, has been signed into law by Gov. Price Daniel.

Until this amendment was signed a retail business or any other place of business that accepted worthless checks presented in good faith by workers had practically no legal recourse to recover its loss.

Now, under the new amendment, employers who give checks that prove to be "hot" are subject to criminal prosecution and may be fined up to \$2,000 and sent to jail for 30 days if the amount involved is less than \$50. If the amount of the worthless check is more than \$50, then the penalty is from two to ten years in prison and a fine up to \$10,000.

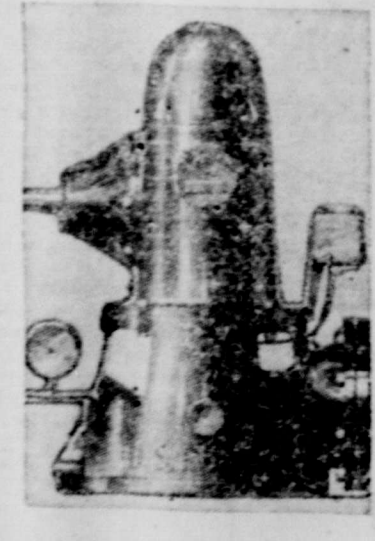

Mahon Predicts 3 Billion Dollar Cut in Eisenhower's Original Budget

WASHINGTON, April 18 (Spl.) — George Mahon of the 19th District of Texas said here this week confident Congress will cut a minimum of three billion dollars from President Eisenhower's budget if made by Congress.

The House Appropriations Committee of which Mahon is a member, has upon his motion, approved bills at this session reducing the President's overall budget in the sum of one billion dollars.

Congressman, in his capacity as chairman of the House Subcommittee on Military Appropriations, upon conducting hearings on President's request for 38 billion dollars for the Army, Navy and Air Force since late in January, Mahon said that "we will reduce the defense budget as far as this can be safely done. Of course, we proceed with caution and no reduction can be permitted to imperil the security of the United States."

Defense officials have declined to amend any cuts in the Defense Budget, but they are preparing Mahon's request a statement to show a three and a half billion dollar reduction would be applied

BAKE BUNNY ROLLS FOR EASTER MORN



Bunnies, the almost universal symbol of Easter, make an appealing yeast-raised roll for the holiday breakfast. Your youngsters will love to help you shape and decorate them. Bunnies should have pink ears so these are frosted with pink confectioners' sugar frosting.

EASTER BUNNIES

- 2 1/2 cup milk
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 1 1/4 teaspoons salt
- 6 tablespoons shortening
- 2/3 cup warm, not hot, water (lukewarm for compressed yeast)
- 3 tablespoons sugar
- 3 packages or cakes yeast, active dry or compressed
- 3 eggs, beaten
- 6 cups sifted enriched flour

Scald milk. Stir in 1/2 cup sugar, salt and shortening. Set aside to cool to lukewarm. Measure water into a large mixing bowl (warm, not hot, water for active dry yeast; lukewarm water for compressed yeast). Add 3 tablespoons sugar. Sprinkle or crumble in yeast. Stir until dissolved. Add lukewarm milk mixture and eggs. Add and stir in half the flour. Beat until smooth. Stir in remaining flour or enough to make a dough. Turn out on lightly floured board and knead 8 to 10 minutes or until the dough is smooth and satiny and does not stick to the board. Put dough into greased bowl and brush top with melted shortening. Cover with a cloth, let rise in a warm place, free from draft, until doubled in bulk, about 55 minutes. Punch down dough, pull sides into center, turn out on board. Roll small pieces of dough with palms to form ropes 1/2-inch thick and 10 to 12 inches long. To shape bunnies, tie ropes in loose knots, bringing ends up straight to form ears. Press in raisins for eyes. Brush bunnies with margarine or butter. Cover and let rise until double in bulk. Bake at 425 degrees (hot oven) 12 to 15 minutes or until brown. Frost ears with pink confectioners' sugar frosting.

REPRESENTATIVE BOB BOWERS' WEEKLY LETTER

This week in the House was the busiest we have had all session. I think the most important thing accomplished was the passage to 3rd reading of the Congressional Redistricting Bill by Cole of Houston. This bill would do away with the present Congressman - at - Large and give that seat to Houston. The Houston Congressman, at the present time, is representing the largest number of people of any man in Congress. This bill will also take away Kent, King, Haskell, Stonewall, Sourry and Mitchell Counties from Representative Mahon's present District. The last

redistricting took place in 1933, and I think it is long overdue.

Bills of this nature generally cause considerable debate on the floor, and this was no exception. The delegation from Dallas was unanimously against it because it would give two Congressmen to Houston, and they hate to admit Houston is that much bigger than Dallas. It does the representatives from rural areas good to see the big city delegations fight among themselves. The fights are usually city - country fights.

Another long debated piece of legislation that was passed out of the House this week was the House Joint Resolution 34 by McDonald of Ft. Worth. It allows that 1 percent of the permanent school funds can be invested in blue chip stocks and bonds. This may not seem like much money but when you figure the permanent school fund is now around \$350 million, it makes a sizable investment. The money made from these investments would be transferred to the available school funds. This resolution passed the House by an overwhelming majority.

Over in the Senate this week they passed a bill that I was very interested in. It was House Bill 53 by Rep. Bishon and myself. This bill provides that a farmer may use his nickel for personal use. The way the law is at present, it is unlawful for a farmer to use his nickel to go to church, or to town to buy groceries. Of course, this law hasn't been enforced very strictly, but I feel it should be amended.

It has been nice to receive so many letters from all over my district concerning the various bills that have been introduced. I hope you will keep up this good practice.

ate revenue were considered earlier this year.

These are proposals to increase state college and university tuition approximately 50 percent and to transfer for current use one percent from the current school fund. This latter proposal would provide approximately 6 1/2 million dollars during the biennium for the available school fund, thus reducing the necessity for appropriation from the general fund.

Both these very important sources of state revenue, still awaiting approval of the Legislature, are regarded as the "keys" to the question whether revenue measures will be necessary this year.

Resting in the Senate for some time is the tuition bill, sponsored in the House by Murray Watson of Mart. The bill to appropriate the money from the permanent school

fund, by Rep. Louis Dugas, Jr., of Orange, is just now coming out of the House.

The two measures account for approximately \$18 million of the revenue the appropriation drafters have considered as "anticipated income."

Another consideration is that all the state's spending is not contained in the \$2 billion appropriation bill. The state is faced with a possible \$6 1/2 million refund to gas companies that paid the unconstitutional gas gathering tax. Also, there is the \$3 1/2 million which must be expended as state assistance to disabled persons, under mandate of the constitutional amendment voted last year.

Often the question is asked, "What sort of girls play for the Hutchinson Flying Queens, that can make their Pacific hops and still play a superior game after game for 40 minutes?"

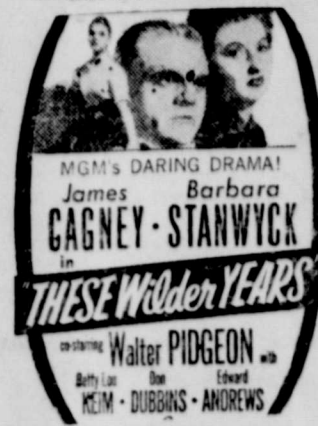
