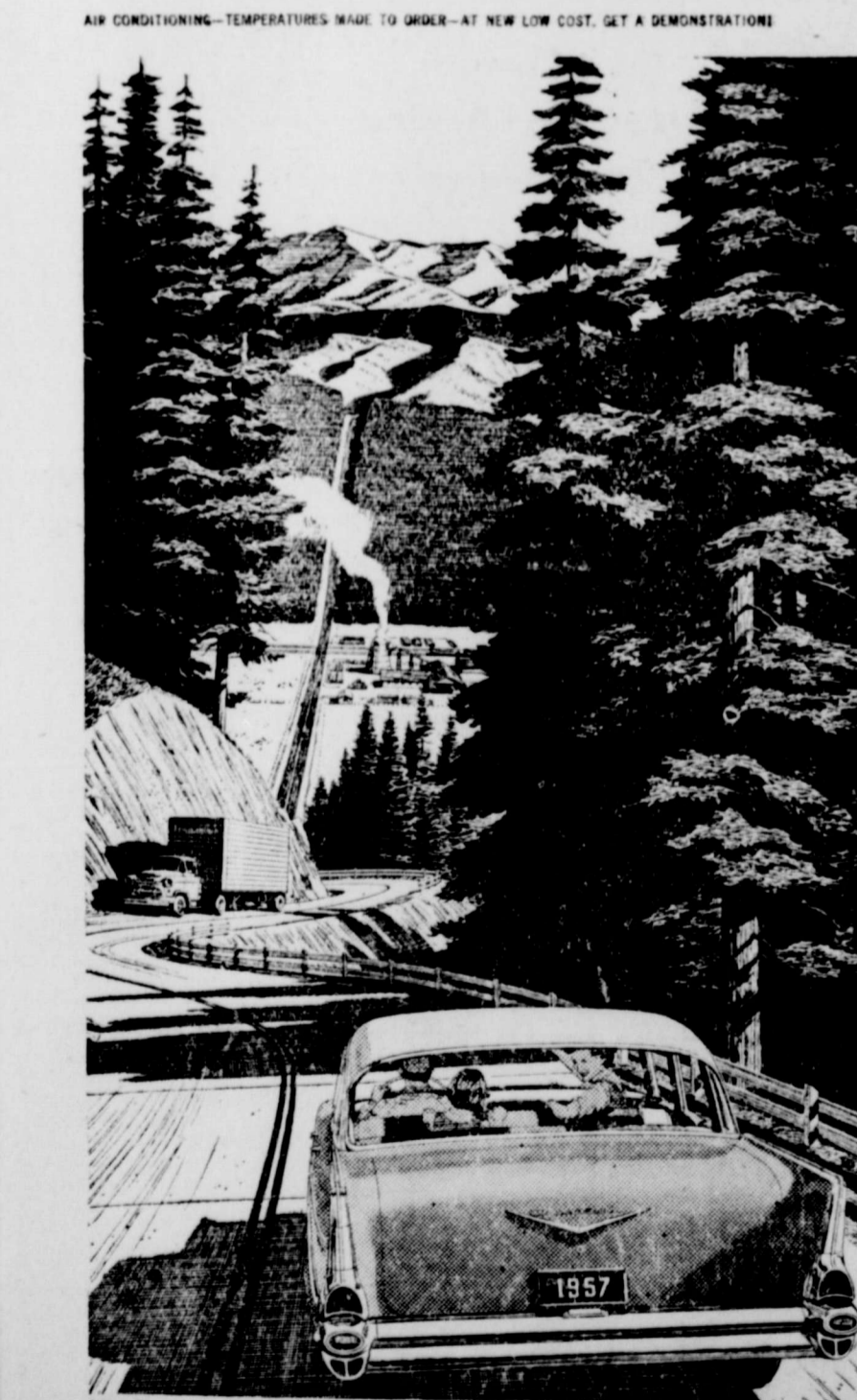

**20th Store Of Cobb's Chain Being Planned**

Construction of the 20th department store in Cobb's chain will be underway soon.

The store is to be located in the southwestern part of Amarillo at Woolfin and Georgia streets, across from Woolfin Village shopping center.

Tom Cobb, president of the chain, said he hoped the 21,450 sq. foot store would be completed by January 1.

Two more Cobb's stores are under construction in Odessa. The buildings, both 20,000 square feet, are expected to be finished Sept. 1 and next spring. They are located at 27th St. and Grandview and at the 9th St. and Maple shopping center.

Lubbock's fifth Cobb's store is also to be completed Sept. 1. It is

**Postmaster General's Goals: Postal Rate Increase; Improved Facilities**

(Editor's Note: This is the first in a series of articles on your Post Office Department as told by the Postmaster General.)

In an exclusive interview in the May 24 U. S. News and World Report, Postmaster General Arthur E. Summerfield says "You can have good mail service, if..."

And, as for the "if" generally, this is what he says:

"At 4 cents for a letter (first class mail) we would just about break even — we should have five cents."

"Modernized post offices and equipment would speed mail 30 to 50 per cent faster."

"Good" next-day delivery of a letter between any two cities in the U. S."

It should be noted that second class mail includes regularly published matter such as newspapers, magazines, etc. Third class matter includes direct mail advertising — which, mailed for 15 cents, in the form of an advertising circular, often is misleading telling of a red hot priced item of appliance, wear, food, or even an insurance policy — but often this inflated charge on the item to be sent is not mentioned and the specifications of the item are either forgotten or in small, unreadable print.

In presenting the Post Office case, Postmaster Summerfield points out that the deficit in the Post Office Department has been dropping since 1952. In fact, he said, it has dropped from a loss of 720 million dollars in 1952 to 222 million in 1956. And, he expects even less loss in 1957.

It should also be pointed out that Postmaster General Summerfield had proven his ability as a businessman prior to his appointment as the 54th Postmaster General of the U. S. in 1953.

Entering the auto business at the age of 13, Postmaster Summerfield who is now 58, was one of the largest auto dealers in the U. S. at

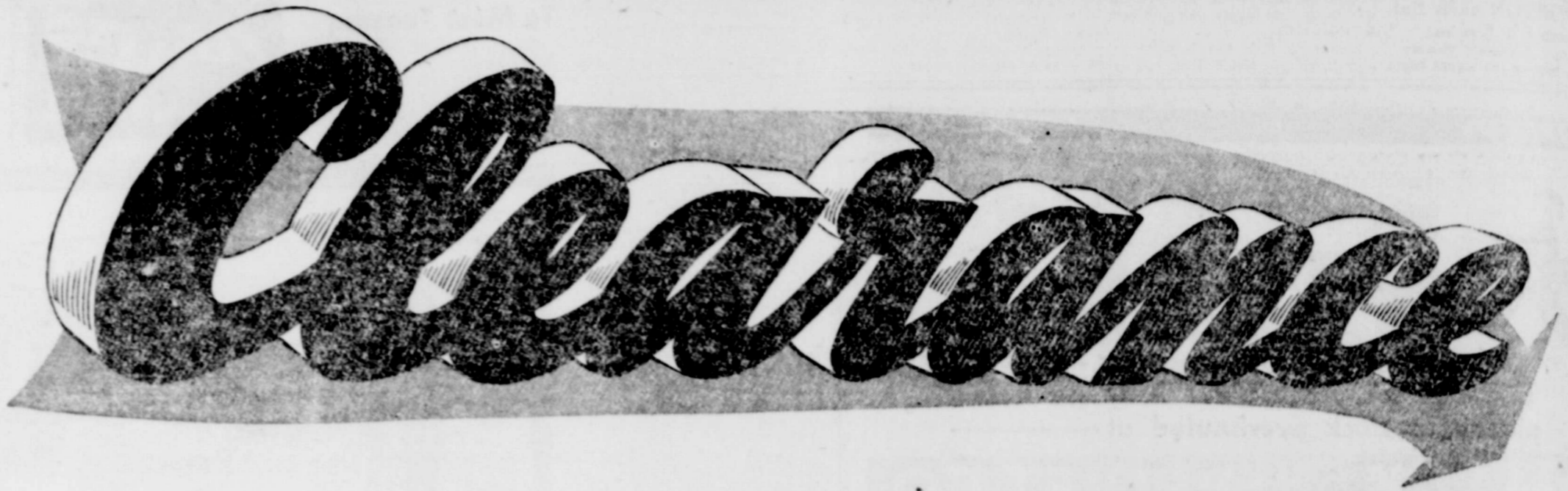

# Highlights and Sidelights FROM Your State CAPITOL

Austin, Tex. (Spl.) — It's vacation time in Texas. During the next three months millions of people will stream to every corner of the state in search of relaxation.

But a lot of home folks will stay home. They make a living catering to the tourists. Vacationing is big business in Texas and it promises to get bigger.

Last year nearly 8 1/2 million out-of-staters visited Texas — only 12 per cent on business. They spent \$200,000,000 for food, lodging, gasoline and entertainment.

Next year voters will decide whether to try to hasten in even more business and money through national advertising. A proposed constitutional amendment to remove the ban on spending state funds for advertising was passed by the last legislature. It will come to a vote the November, 1958, general election.

Meanwhile, several state agencies and a host of municipal and private organizations give out information on how to have fun in Texas.

State Highway Department has just issued a brand new map telling how to find your way over the state's 100,000 miles of roads. It includes 20 full color pictures and a warm welcome to the "land of hospitality." Available free from the department.

State Parks Board, housekeeper for 49 state parks, plans many new camping, swimming and picnicking facilities. It got a "generous appropriation" from the legislature, said the Board.

Texas Game and Fish Commission has help and advice for the one in every four Texans who hunt or fishes. Its numerous publications give guidance ranging from

where the fish are biting to what to do for snake bite.

— o o o —

**YEAR'S WATER SUPPLY** — Without another drop of rain, Texas' 35 major reservoirs now have enough water stored to last a year. Heavy spring rains poured 6 million acre feet of water into the reservoirs filling them to 92 per cent capacity, reports the State Board of Water Engineers.

Storage is about twice that of a year ago.

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**FLOOD SURVEY SOUGHT** — But the unprecedented rains brought problems. State Water Board wants money to make an emergency survey of what the floods did with a view to learning how to prevent future destruction.

Both the Board and Gov. Price Daniel requested an appropriation for this from the last legislature. But it didn't go through, so now the Board has asked donations from the state's five water districts and river authorities.

It wants several thousand dollars from each, totaling \$17,000.

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**NEW INSURANCE COMMISSION** — A district judge, a federal Justice Department attorney and a former commissioner member will take over reins of the reorganized Board of Insurance July 1.

As chairman for the new board Gov. Price Daniel appointed Dist. Judge Penn J. Jackson of Cleburne. Serving on the bench since 1944, Judge Jackson is former president of the State Bar of Texas judicial section.

Other new member will be David B. Irons of Fort Worth, former assistant attorney general under Daniel, now with the Justice Department in Washington. Joe P. Gibbs of Seagin, retired board member who returned last spring at the governor's request, fills out the new board.

An acting commissioner of insurance is to be named by the board to serve until Sept. 1 when legislation for a permanent commissioner takes effect. He will receive \$20,000 a year, and be charged with administration of the department.

Present Board members, John Oringo and Mark Wentz will continue to serve until the new appointees take office.

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**GOODBYE TO CHIPS** — Texas gambling has got to go, says Atty. Gen. Will Wilson. An all-out effort to shut down the multi-million-dollar empire in Galveston was called just the beginning.

Wilson and Department of Public Safety Director Homer Garrison, Jr., cooperated in planning a massive raid on Galveston's illegal establishments. But the gamblers got word, closed up and cleared out ahead of the raid. (Ed. Note: After this news article was released, the raids did produce some \$250,000 worth of slot machines found in a couple of Galveston warehouses which were destroyed.)

Wilson's staff followed up by filing padlock suits — boxes full of them — to try to prevent the places

from re-opening.

Wilson and Garrison said they would follow the same pattern in other areas. First, local officials will be called on to suppress gambling and state cooperation offered. But, said Wilson, "if local officials fail to do this job, we will do it from the state level."

Gov. Daniel gave his full backing to the crackdown, hailed it as the "beginning of a new era in law enforcement."

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**MORE SCIENCE FOR TEENS** — More study with emphasis on science, will be required of future high school graduates.

New standards set up by the State Board of Education direct that:

1. Graduates complete 16 units of study, rather than present 15, including two years of laboratory science.
2. Physical education cannot be counted in compiling the units.
3. Not more than one class period of the day may be used for competitive athletics.

New rules will take effect during the 1958-59 school year, but are to be applied to ninth graders next fall.

— o o o —

**SHORT SNORTS** — No one person has a right to all the water in the river, ruled the Third Court of Civil Appeals. Its decision favored the great American Development Co. which sued a Comal County landowner, Clayton N. Smith, after his irrigation pump dried up Rebecca Creek.

Gov. Price Daniel has asked the Army Corps of Engineers to remove the silt and sand blocking the mouth of the Brazos where it enters the Gulf. Recent floods have shown the need for an adequate discharge channel, he said.

State Supreme Court upheld an order of the Industrial Accident Board preventing two Waco attorneys from practicing before it. While the Board does not have the authority to disbar attorneys ruled the court, it does have right to require ethical practice from those appearing before it.

At the end of the first five months of 1957, Texas farm products were

commanding the highest prices since February, 1955. Prices of hogs, beef, lambs, chickens, eggs, and wool were up substantially over the previous months. Overall increase was 1 1/2 pct.

Number of polio cases in Texas has hit a 10-year low, reports the State Health Department. Up to mid-June the state had had 142 paralytic cases, 82 non-paralytic. Five months total for 1957 was 172 cases, compared to 375 in 1954; 548 in 1952 and 505 in 1950.

**Posse Accepts Invitation to Ride at Levelland Rodeo**

The Cochran County Sheriff's Posse has accepted an invitation to ride in the parade which launches the Levelland Sheriff's Posse Rodeo, June 27.

Riders are expected for the event from Amarillo, Gaines County, Earth, Petersburg, Abernathy, O'Donnell, Idalou among other places.

**Pets Disappear; Lad Suspects Foxes "Not that Foxy"**

Terry Pace has lost two gray foxes.

The young Morton 4th grader is almost sure the foxes were turned out of their cage since there is no evidence of their having broken. He first noticed them missing as he went to feed them Saturday morning.

Terry is hoping it was all a prank. He thinks few people would want his pets and hope whoever has them will bring them home. Or if anyone sees any tame foxes he hopes they'll return 'em.

For these are pets — and pets mean an awful lot to a little boy.

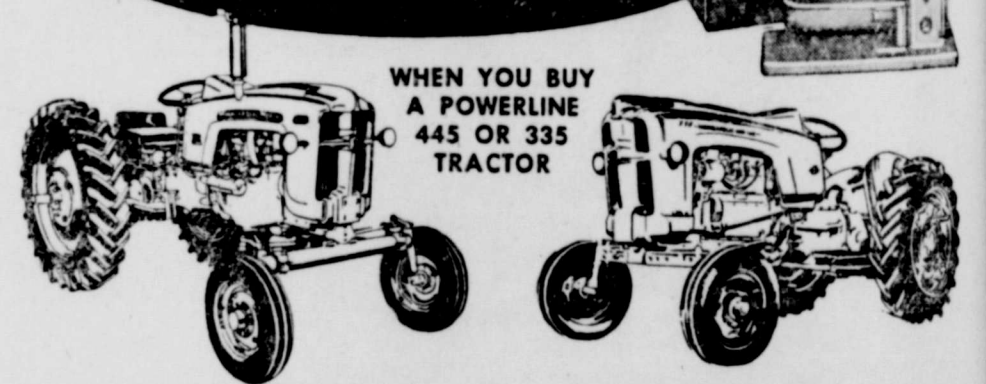
