As for the hail, Eastern New Mexico took the brunt of it and among those who were the hardest hit, according to the few reports that reached into the Tribune office were Slick Nichols of Bledsoe, on his place across the line and C. G. Harvey, farming almost due west of Morton.

VI. It states Mrs. Stockdale is willing and able to assume her duties for another school year.

VII. It asks for a specific salary which "she would have been entitled to" of \$4,029.00.

VIII. It states a hearing was held with the Board and reinstatement was not effected.

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And, secondly, can a contract be assumed, or must it be a matter of written or oral record?

X-Ray Machine Coming Next Tuesday, Wednesday; Ask Persons Over 40 to Be Sure to Obtain Free X-Ray

Morton Jaycees made further plans for the appearance of the state Chest X-Ray Unit in Morton next Tuesday and Wednesday, and emphasized they will need the help of every organization in town if the machines will be of maximum effectiveness to Mortonites.

Primary purpose of the machine is to detect Tuberculosis, however, health authorities have emphasized a number of lung disorders may be detected by the machine.

The X-Ray is free to all persons 15 years of age or older. But the

concentration is on the 40 years and older group. Jaycees are hoping everyone will cooperate to see that elderly persons are contacted, told of the importance of the project, and helped to the Veteran's Hall where the X-Rays will be taken.

It was emphasized there is no disrobing necessary. All the prospective individual will have to do is step up to the machine and pause for about two or three seconds.

The negatives are numbered and developed later. In about a week or so everyone whose X-Ray shows

ed no disorder, will be notified by postal card. Others will be notified in more detail.

The Jaycees will have a group to be ready to help unload and set up the heavy equipment as it arrives from Levelland next Tuesday morning. X-rays will begin at 1:00 p.m., and continue until 5 o'clock on Tuesday, July 9th. Again on Wednesday morning the machine will be in operation until 1:00 when they will close down and prepare to move to another city.

This will be the first appearance of the X-Ray unit in over two years.

All adults are urged to be on hand for an X-Ray and are especially urged to see that their friends, especially elderly ones, also come in for an X-Ray.

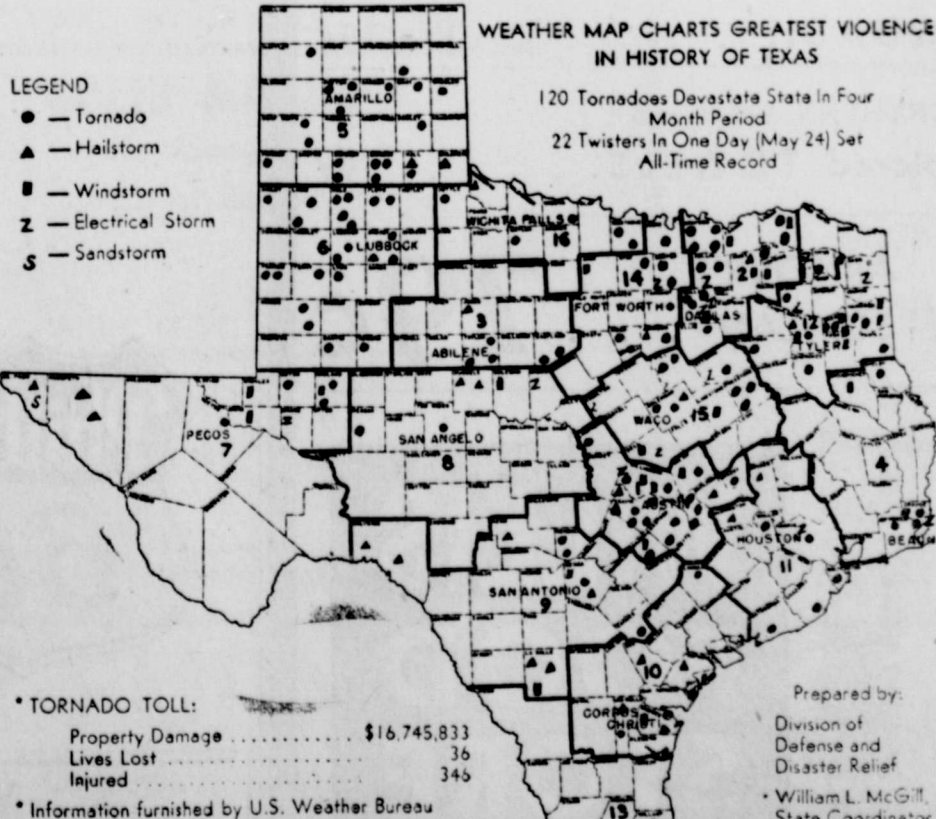

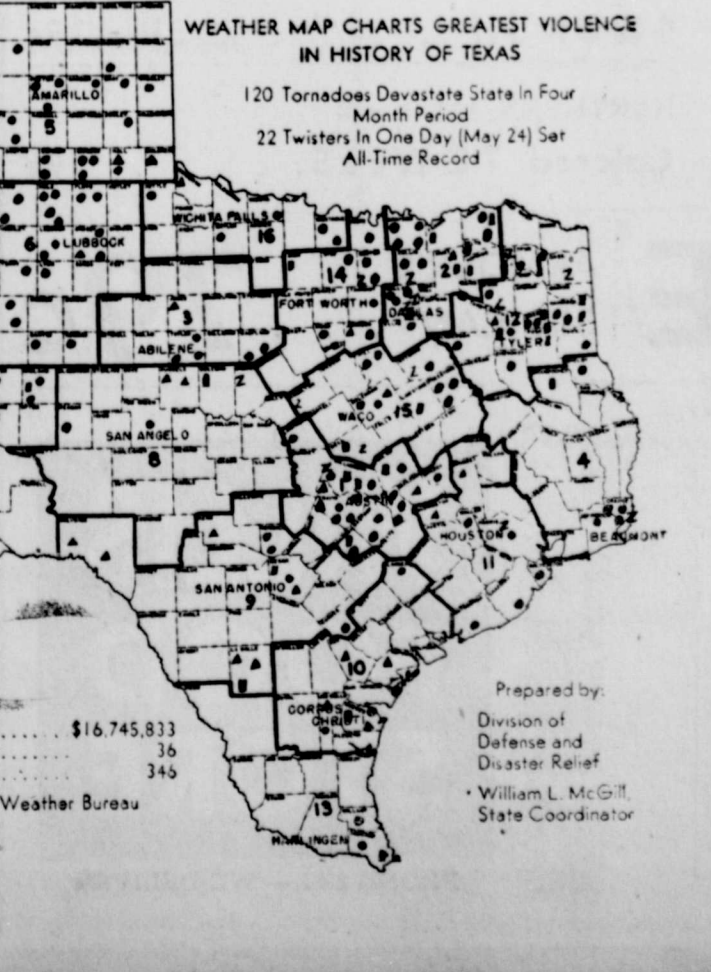

FREEZING DEMONSTRATION

A demonstration on freezing fruits and vegetables was given in the Banquet Room of the County Building last Friday. The Agent was assisted by Mrs. A. E. Sanders, Morton Homemaking Teacher, in giving the demonstrations.

The five points to success in freezing foods were used as an outline in giving the demonstration. They are: Use good quality products, careful preparation, proper packaging, loading the freezer, and length of storage. A number of different kinds of freezer containers and freezer wrappings were shown and three brands of anti-oxidants for fruits, besides lemon juice, were shown. Besides showing recommended methods for freezing fruits and vegetables, some uncooked jelly was made. This jelly must be kept in the refrigerator but not frozen. Everyone had a taste of jelly that had been made previously.

Slide films on "Freezing Corn on the Cob" and a movie on "Freezing Fruits and Vegetables" concluded the meeting.

There were 18 adults and five children present.

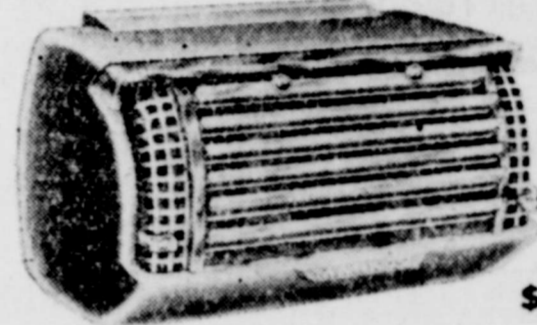

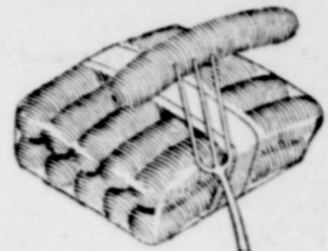

Texas Leads In Construction of Super Highways

Senator Lyndon B. Johnson said Sunday that one year after passage by Congress of the Federal Aid Highway Act, Texas is leading every other State in building highways under the program established by the law.

"Work is going on now or will soon be started on 267 miles of superhighways," Senator Johnson told a statewide radio audience. "Bids are now being asked for 270 miles more."

"Texas has 2,965 miles of the interstate highway system. During the next three years we will get about \$270 million for this system. In addition during this three year period Texas will get about \$122 million for our primary, secondary and urban road systems."

Senator Johnson paid a tribute to the Texas Highway Department for its farm-to-market road program. Nearly 30,000 miles of farm roads are included in the State system, he said, and plans call for about 2,000 miles of new construction annually.

The Senator said the Federal Highway Act, which was passed by the 84th Congress and signed by the President in June 1936, is one of the most progressive legislative measures ever enacted.

"I have always been a strong believer in all the good roads we can build," Senator Johnson stated. "Texas is a big State and we need a road-building program fitting our size. That is what we have."

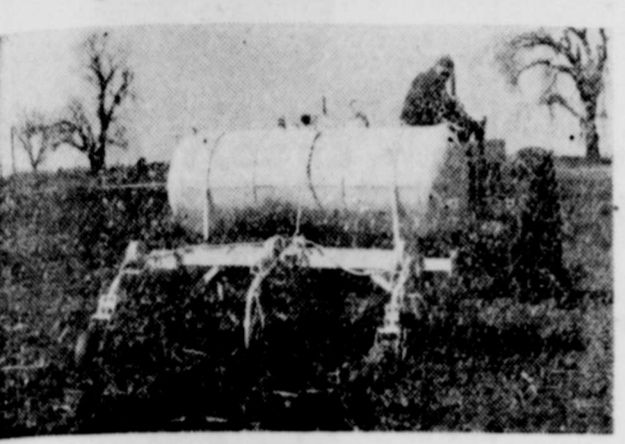

Folks out Maple way did report some hail.

in the absence of . . .
OFFICIAL WEATHER data out of the past we can't be sure, but veteran Mortonites who have followed the weather through the years report the past week has been one of, if not the hottest in history.

speaking of weather . . .

REV. CURTIS CARROLL, former pastor of the Morton Missionary Baptist Church, was home for the weekend and said, its one of the few times he could remember when it was actually hotter out here than it is in usually summer — hot Dallas. With Your... COUNTY AGENT

The "old summertime" is here and with it comes higher temperatures and bright sunlight. The Texas Farm and Ranch Safety Council warns that too much sunlight and over-exposure to high temperatures can cause trouble unless precautions are taken.

They point out that heat sickness will occur when the body's heat regulating system collapses during prolonged heat or over-exposure to the sun. In sun-stroke, body temperature rises, the skin becomes hot and dry, the face reddens and a shooting headache develops. Heat exhaustion is an entirely different thing. Its symptoms are below normal body temperature, cold clammy skin, palor, dizziness and a dull headache.

The Council offers this simple rule if first aid treatment is given to a person suffering from heat sickness. If the patient is cold, make him warm. If he is hot, make him cool.

ing suggestions for prevention of summertime troubles caused by heat. Avoid over-exposure to direct sunlight and wear a light-colored, long-sleeved shirt and over-exertion, wear light, loose fitting clothing, use salt tablets or salt in drinking water; drink plenty of water during the day but avoid water and alcohol; eat nutritious foods but don't over-drink fruit juices or eat too much fruit for a plentiful supply of vitamin C and get plenty of rest plus a bath regularly.

Seek Marine Officer Candidates

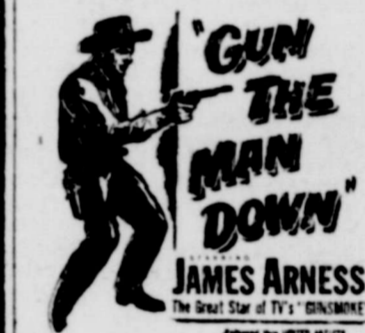

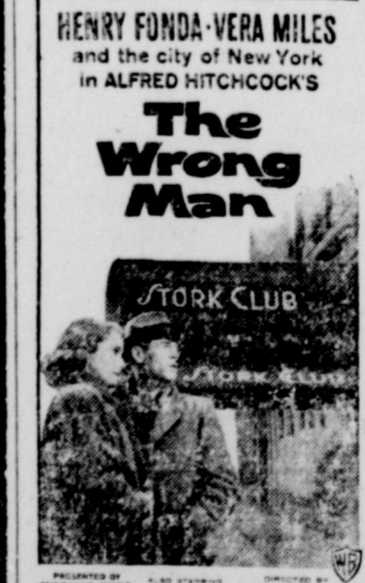
