INSURANCE STUDY ON — An annual survey of the Texas Insurance Board was to request a Texas Research League study of the department. Actually the league already has begun the task after requests last spring by then Comm. Comm. John Davis and by a House investigating committee.

Reorganized board took the reins after expiring in of new member David B. Irons and Joe P. Gibbs, who had served "temporarily" for the past few months. Former Dist. Judge Paul Jackson was installed as director.

Governor Daniel expressed confidence the board would soon get rid of the "rotten apples" still remaining in the insurance industry. None of the men sought the jobs, said the governor, they were "dropped."

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ROAD PLAN LAUNCHED — A new plan to Texas highway building opened when the state awarded its last contracts to help counties with state-of-way costs.

Gov. Daniel has required local governments to pay the land and the State Highway Department to pay construction costs. A new law passed last spring allows the state to share \$2.50 in land costs.

Highway Engineer D. C. Greer says that the highway department is working ahead of the effective date of the bill (Act. 25) "in order to get the program underway."

Counties with which contracts were negotiated are Jefferson, Falls, Cherokee, Wood and Hill.

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SCHOOL STANDARDS (Upper) — More money and more study are in prospect for Texas public schools, it is believed.

State Board of Education voted to hike state aid to schools by \$1 per pupil. It means \$2 per pupil for roughly two million pupils in the 1957-58 year.

Board also gave final confirmation to a plan to raise accreditation requirements for high schools. Future graduates will have to have 18 units of study, one more than before. Health and physical education won't count but credits must include two in English, two in math, two in laboratory science.

Beginning in 1959 accredited high schools must have four instead of three full-time teachers.

UT SALARIES RAISED — Teachers in the University of Texas system can look forward to raises averaging \$800 a year for the coming school year.

Due to higher Legislative appropriations, new budget adopted by UT means the year's Faculty members will get \$900 to \$2,500 raises, depending on rank. For the average need it means a jump from \$6,000 to \$6,915 per year.

RAIN NEEDED AGAIN — Almost a month of dry sunny weather has many Texas farmers returning to an old refrain — "more rain."

U. S. Department of Agriculture reports that most of the state, except that touched by the hurricane, needs showers.

Rainy growth has slowed said USDA and cotton is running very late. But it predicted good feed crops, possibly one of the largest sorghum harvests on record.

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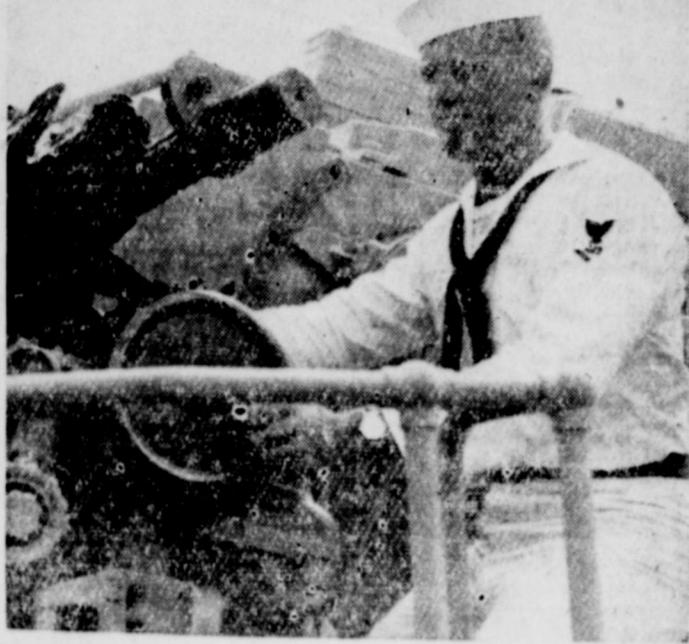

M. in the Caprock Hotel, Lubbock, to hear a legislative report on cotton bills now before Congress & to consider possible changes in the 1958 cotton allotments. W. O. Fortenberry, of Lubbock, President of the PCG, said additional details of the PCG supported cotton bill introduced in the U. S. House by Cong. Paul Jones of Missouri will be explained by George W. Pfeifferberger, Executive Vice-President. W. L. Edelman of Friona and Dan Davis, Lubbock, who attended hearings of the bill recently in Washington. Also the Texas Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee are reported now hard at work drafting policies concerning the 1958 cotton allotments. PCG Directors will hear proposed plans on freezing Texas cotton allotments at the 1957 level and other policies affecting acreage. D. E. Benham and J. R. Kuykendall are the Cochran County Directors of the Plains Cotton Growers.

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FOOD ADVICE FOR TRAVELERS

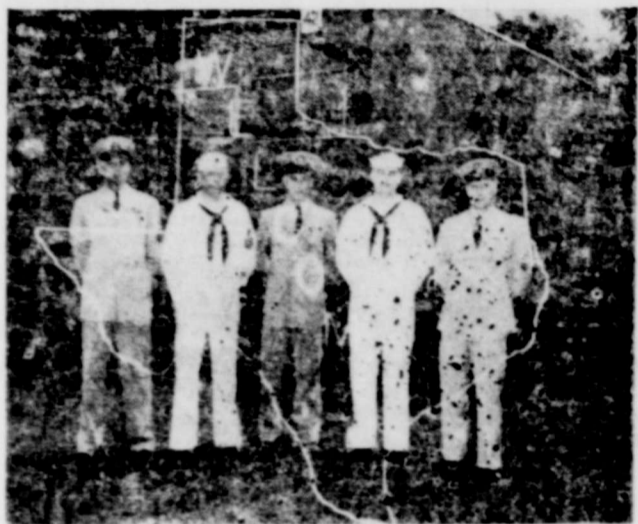
Keeping your family well-fed may be your biggest vacation problem. Here's some food advice for travelers from extension food and nutrition specialists.

Include lots of fruit, vegetables, meat, eggs and milk in your diet. Try to avoid fat or fried foods and sweets such as too many soft drinks, too much candy, cookies and ice cream. These foods may not be harmful at home in moderation, but it's easy to eat too much of this type of food on a trip. They may cause you to omit other necessary

foods. Eating well - balanced meals will do more than anything else to prevent car sickness and constipation - two common problems of travelers.

To select a safe, sanitary restaurant, it is suggested you watch where local people eat or follow the recommendation of travel authorities. Eating places within a large city usually are under more strict, sanitary control than those outside city limits.

Other important suggestions: Drink only pasteurized milk. Refuse any other. Avoid creamed foods such as potato salads, custard or cream pie desserts. Dangers of food poisoning are greatest in these foods.

WASHINGTON AND SMALL BUSINESS

There is an old Arabian proverb to the effect that once a camel has its nose in the tent, he will take over the entire tent.

And that is why the nation's independent retailers, voting through the National Federation of Independent Retailers, are opposing further expansion of the military and exchange of goods in this country.

FX's which sell a wide variety of merchandise at cut-price prices including such items as golf clubs, movie cameras and gasolines, now seek authority to sell tires and batteries.

The FX service is now an \$800,000 business, of which almost half is done inside the U. S. FX's last year reached 145 outlets as compared to only 84 last year by the Woolworth company on a slightly lower volume.

FX officials claim the service without cost to the taxpayer. Yet, they also say the operation shows a 4% profit as compared to 2.5% profit experienced by private enterprise, while at the same time operating on an average mark-up of 10% compared to a 20% mark-up by private enterprise.

Expanded in this vast merchandising activity in the U. S. alone are 17,000 civilian employees supervised by 300 army people.

It is to be said the least such commercial overhead items as rent, insurance, administrative overhead, undoubtedly many other items are borne by taxpayer.

Before Korea there were 1500 such establishments in the U. S. This slipped to 2,307 during Korea.

SOIL CONSERVATION DISTRICT NEWS

Several cooperators with the Cochrane Soil Conservation district are using Coopers or Mung beans as a soil improving crop. Coopers and with grain sorghum, Coopers and Mung beans are both annual summer legumes. When planted they should be intercultured with the corn or other crop.

A few of the cooperators who have planted peas are O. K. Hardin, A. V. Walker, W. W. Smith, Dub Henry, Pat Smith, J. W. Cunningham, Jim Hill and Clayton Stokes.

For those with land in the Acreage Reserve part of the soil bank, Cochrane might be given to plant and legumes on the land while it is idle. It is possible to get cost share assistance through the Acreage Reserve program.

About 20 acres of Blue Panic was seeded on Leon Langrell's place. D. W. Davis also planted 15 acres and H. H. Rowden drilled in about four acres which he will water to get up and use for grazing.

L. E. Scoggin planted 30 acres of Sorghum Autumn, Max Bowen has put in some additional acres of grass. He has seeded Sidecots and the Mike Walton and Lee Stearns families.

There's nothing like a shower for cooling you off in hot weather. And that's true for pigs as well, suggests E. M. Regenbrecht, extension swine husbandman.

A fine mist spray, using a very small amount of water per pig, is enough to keep pigs comfortable and gaining even on the hottest days.

Research in recent years has demonstrated that livestock are more productive and gain weight more quickly if they are kept comfortable in hot weather.

**TIME TO ASK FOR REFUND
ON FEDERAL GASOLINE TAX**

Farmers are reminded by C. H. Bates, extension specialist, that they may now apply for a refund on the 3 cent federal tax on gasoline used for farming. The amount claimed must be based on the quantity of fuel used for farming purposes on individual farms and ranches during the period from July 1, 1956 to

June 30, 1957. Bates says all claims must be submitted to the District Director, Internal Revenue Service, and claims for the past year must be in by September 30, 1957. Only one claim per farm operator will be permitted and each tax claimant is cautioned to make certain that his request includes all eligible fuel used.

Each farm or ranch operator who applied for tax refunds in 1956 will be mailed form 2240 for filing the 1957 claim. An instruction sheet for preparing the application will also be provided. For new fuel users or those who failed to file last year, copies of the filing form may be obtained from the office of the county agent.

Too, Bates suggests that a copy of Publication 308, Farmers Gas Tax Refund, prepared by the government, be obtained from the county agent's office or from the nearest Revenue

office. The specialist advises agricultural producers who used an appreciable amount of gasoline last year in their farming or ranching operations to check in to their eligibility for a refund.

Salsar, who graduated from Whiteface High School last year, was a star gridder at Whiteface. His father was grid coach and now is athletic director and teacher.

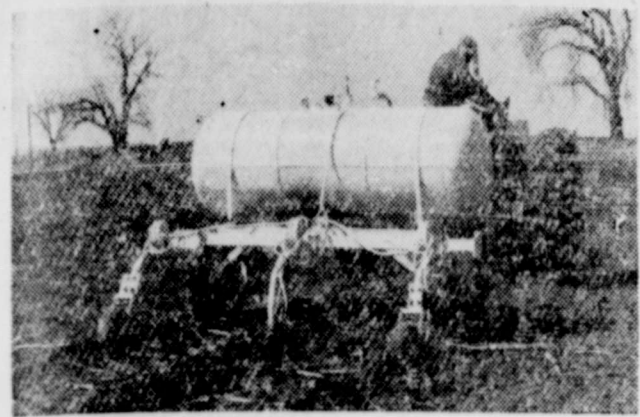

A SHOWER FOR THE HOGS WILL PAY — KEEP HOGS GAINING

There's nothing like a shower for cooling you off in hot weather. And that's true for pigs as well, suggests E. M. Regenbrecht, extension swine husbandman.

A fine mist spray, using a very small amount of water per pig, is enough to keep pigs comfortable and gaining even on the hottest days.

Research in recent years has demonstrated that livestock are more productive and gain weight more quickly if they are kept comfortable in hot weather.

(Details may be secured at the County Agent's office.)

TIME TO ASK FOR REFUND ON FEDERAL GASOLINE TAX

Farmers are reminded by C. H. Bates, extension specialist, that they may now apply for a refund on the 3 cent federal tax on gasoline used for farming. The amount claimed must be based on the quantity of fuel used for farming purposes on individual farms and ranches during the period from July 1, 1956 to

June 30, 1957. Bates says all claims must be submitted to the District Director, Internal Revenue Service, and claims for the past year must be in by September 30, 1957. Only one claim per farm operator will be permitted and each tax claimant is cautioned to make certain that his request includes all eligible fuel used.

Each farm or ranch operator who applied for tax refunds in 1956 will be mailed form 2240 for filing the 1957 claim. An instruction sheet for preparing the application will also be provided. For new fuel users or those who failed to file last year, copies of the filing form may be obtained from the office of the county agent.

Too, Bates suggests that a copy of Publication 308, Farmers Gas Tax Refund, prepared by the government, be obtained from the county agent's office or from the nearest Revenue



office. The specialist advises agricultural producers who used an appreciable amount of gasoline last year in their farming or ranching operations to check in to their eligibility for a refund.

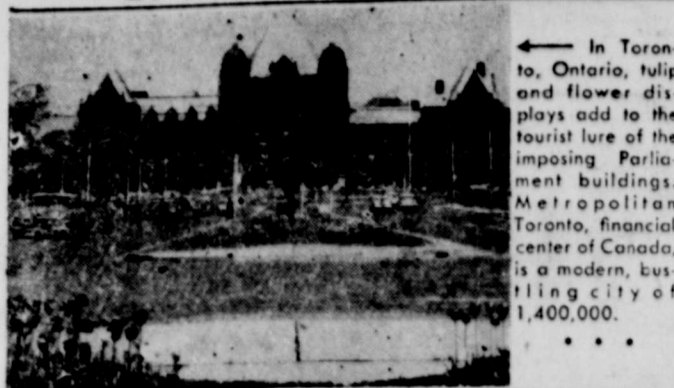

RUMBLE ON THE DOCKS

By Eddie Irwin A REMINDER from the Civil Defense office recently we think is a good one to pass on. "Quote:" "If you're afraid of being killed by a tornado, then you had better stay off the highways," warns James H. Garner, Deputy coordinator Division of Defense and Disaster Relief. Statistics prove that the automobile is 187 times more dangerous than a tornado. Five times as many people were killed by automobiles last year than have been killed in the entire 41 years of tornadoes recorded by the weather bureau.

when you think . . . ABOUT IT, this isn't an astounding statement. Nearly everyone could have figured it was close to right, if they wanted to. Truth is, a lot of folks, probably the majority, want to forget about the tragic number of highway deaths. This group thinks of it as one of those necessary evils in America, like alcoholism; the huge divorce rate; corruption in government, etc.

it is said . . . A FARMER IN Pakistan would have to spend his entire earnings for six months to buy the modern plow Americans provide with a contribution of just \$11 to the CARE Self-Help Program.

If things keep going . . . LIKE THEY ARE more and farmers in the South Plains will be in that same shape. There's a good many in the past five years who haven't made enough in a given six months to buy a plow.

the X-Ray unit . . . WAS A SUCCESS from most angles. In that 424 persons did file through and take advantage of the Free Chest X-Ray offered. The operators were sorry that the unit was not in a better location so that more persons would have noticed it and decided to get an X-ray.

they prefer to . . . HAVE THE UNIT located downtown, that would mean, on the square in Morton. But, at the time the thing was booked in, there were no locations available. The Activitis building was booked up and the old Ramby Drug building and the old bank building were occupied. No one thought about the bank building to be available.

still . . . WE THINK 224 is a pretty good total for Morton. After all, the machine was only in operation two half days, one afternoon and one morning. The last time it was here, Dec. 9 and 10, 1955, not only was it a better season of the year, but the unit was here for two full days. Approximately 700 were X-rayed, a little less than 100 fewer than had been X-rayed the previous time.

but they had . . . SO MANY requests for the machine, they cut down the appearance time in the smaller towns.

'w did notice . . . A LOT OF elderly persons getting X-rays and this was the group they emphasized needed most to come. The group of 40 years and over has the highest incidence rate of TB and other lung diseases.

we don't know . . . HOW MANY were in the same group but we talked with one person who never heard from his last X-ray, and evidently he decided it was pretty useless if you don't ever find out. Hope there weren't many in that group.

one man . . . AS HE entered Wednesday said the last time he got an X-Ray it showed a trace of TB. He was able to get early treatments and got over it quickly. He was glad to have the opportunity to check again. He was one who had confidence in the worth of the program.
