## Brother-in-law Is Injured In Accident

J. T. Renfro of Brownfield, brother-in-law of Mrs. R. D. Willingham of Morton, was injured in an automobile accident, July 11.

William Ellis Heathcoat, who was in the car with Renfro, was dead on arrival at Treadaway - Daniel hospital in Brownfield. Renfro suffered possible back injuries and lacerations of his left leg. They were taken to the hospital by Brownfield Funeral Home Ambulance.

Their car overturned at about 7:25 p.m. about six and one-half miles north of Brownfield on Farm Road 2066. Both men were thrown from the vehicle.

It was the 34th traffic fatality on the South Plains this year and the third of the month.

Renfro is a mechanic for the Decker Garage in Brownfield. He has lived in Brownfield since 1946, owned the Brownfield Radiator Shop.

## Four Pay Fines On Transportation of Alcohol

**FARM SAFETY WEEK**

The death toll from farm-work accidents last year in the nation was higher than in any other major industry. "Farm accidents," said Gov. Pritch Daniel on June 13 when he issued his farm safety week proclamation, "have become a serious problem which not only causes untold suffering among our rural population, but which affects the economy of the entire nation."

In proclaiming the week of July 21 - 27 as Farm Safety Week, Governor Daniel pointed out that the Texas Safety Association, the Texas Farm and Ranch Safety Council and the Texas Agricultural Extension Service would be cooperating with the National Safety Council and the U. S. Department of Agriculture in carrying out a farm accident prevention educational program. This campaign is in keeping with a proclamation issued earlier by President Eisenhower on a national basis.

Governor Daniel said, "The effect of accident prevention programs has indicated that our rural residents, through attention to safety education, can greatly reduce accidents, and the resulting loss and suffering. Therefore, as Governor, I urge all farm families to join in a continuing campaign against needless accidents."

The Texas Farm and Ranch Safety Council strongly believes that farm accident prevention efforts should be a part of every farm-

ily's plan for improving their farm and home. Until farm families become conscious of the multitude of accident hazards which surround them, little progress can be made in removing the hazards, says the Council. "We would like to see the farmer and members of his family become as safety conscious as the people who work in industries where the accident rates have been reduced almost to the zero point. We think it can be done, if, as Gov. Daniel says, everyone will participate in a continuing educational campaign to wipe out farm accidents."

"Appoint yourself a committee of one to start the ball rolling on your farm," urges the Council. The medical science has decreased the national death rates, but accidental deaths and injuries continue on the increase. Accidental deaths and injuries on farms and ranches place farming the THIRD most dangerous, most hazardous, occupation in our country today.

We spend much time on improving production practices, yet we all admit that people are the most important crop on any farm. I feel sure you would agree that if we saved one farm resident from even a minor injury for each farm safety meeting held, we would all be having night and day meetings until every farm resident had been reached.

Safety isn't just another "word to the wise," it's a way of life. Safety practices must become habit forming in order to be effective. Farm Safety week is a good time to start such habits.

Remember, there is no one alive today who doesn't have some interest in safety.

**TAKE A "BREAK" - IT COULD SAVE A LIFE**

A "break" in morning and afternoon hours is as important to farmers as it is to city workers, according to the Texas Farm and Ranch Safety Council. In fact, these "breaks" in work routine can prove especially important, for they reduce the possibility of accidental deaths and injuries as well as improve on work efficiency.

The farmer who just can't spare the 10 or 15 minutes required to get off the tractor, walk around or maybe have a snack or something to drink, should be reminded that recent accident studies indicate that the highest percentage of farm work accidents occur during the late morning and mid-afternoon hours.

Farm wives can serve as break reminders to their husbands by packing a mid-morning and mid-afternoon snack and taking it to the field.

This break can also provide mothers an excellent opportunity to take children to the field to watch father operate the dangerous machines that they sometimes find such fascinating "play-pretties." This may satisfy the children's curiosity and make a much anticipated event in the daily life of the youngsters.

So why not follow the advice of the Texas Farm and Ranch Safety Council and take time out for a mid morning and mid afternoon break? It can pay off in safety, pleasure and efficiency.

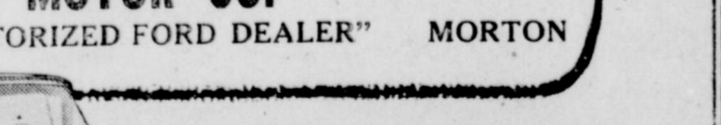

**Hockley County Approves Bonds For Jr. College**

A junior college for Hockley county is assured it was reported early this week.

County residents voted Saturday, 856 to 414 for the \$300,000 bond issue which would provide college buildings and 840 to 428 for a 25 cent maintenance tax to keep the college open once it is constructed.

The margin of victory on the bond issue was better than 2 to 1. On the maintenance tax it was slightly under two to one.

"We are pleased with the outcome," said Lamar G. West, chairman of trustees. "I feel this is a good, solid vote of confidence for the people who have worked so hard the past several years to bring the college program to this point."

Trustees will canvass election returns at a special meeting Monday, and West said he thought it quite likely that a president for the college would be elected Monday night.

so went against the college. Pep, Pettit, Whitharral, Lovelland, and the absentee box went for it.

After the first election Surdow had an extra issue thrown in. His school board offered its senior high school building there for use by the college. The offer was unanimously rejected by the college trustees on the recommendation of every college authority whose advice was sought.

One trustee Saturday night, after hearing the Surdow election returns, termed the offer "unfortunate."

**Curry County, N. M. May Hold Local Option Election**

Curry county's county-wide local option election is to be Aug. 20, if it is determined there are as many as 2084 valid signatures on

petitions presented week before last to the Curry County Commissioners.

A total of 2,500 names were presented on the petitions calling for the vote by the "wet" organization.

"Dry" forces, meanwhile, are organizing to maintain the prohibition against the sale of alcoholic beverages. Chairmen of the United Drys, are H. H. Delozier and Dr. George Prothro. The first effort of the organization will be to publish the names of those who signed the petition calling for the election.

This is the first election that the issue has been made county-wide since 1944. Curry county voted dry then. It is the first time the vote has been for the repeal of the state's dry laws altogether. The question on the last two local option elections was upon legalizing package sales. The drvs won by a 75 vote margin in 1953 and by a 200 vote edge in 1955.
