FOUR MEN FELLED BY LIGHTNING ALL LIVE TO TELL THE STORY

Four men, Mexican Nationals working on contract on the Cliff Harvey farm, approximately 11 miles west of Morton, were struck by lightning during the storm Sunday evening around 7:30.

The men miraculously all escaped death, three of them only getting knocked down. But one of them, Trinidad Zareo, was unconscious and thought to be dead for approximately forty minutes.

Zareo's trousers were torn in to two inch shreds and nothing was left of his hat except the rim. The rubber boots he was wearing were also torn to shreds but Sheriff Hazel Hancock said this rubber boots were possibly what saved his life.

BOARD DENIES EVERY ALLEGATION

The Morton School Board, in an answer filed in Case No. 1155, 72nd District Court, to allegations of Fred Stockdale and wife, Alice, has "denied each and every, all and singular, the allegations" and demands proof.

The Board, through their attorney, Tom Clinton, filed its reply on Friday, July 19, two days prior to the deadline that had been set for filing an answer according to the plaintiff's suit.

The suit, in simple terminology asks the District Court to set aside the action of the school board in not rehiring Mrs. Fred Stockdale to a teaching contract in the Morton schools for next year.

In its reply, the Board listed 11 points of denial, quoting paragraphs in the charges. It also claims the suit was filed prematurely and the court is without jurisdiction "because the plaintiff has not exhausted her administrative remedies as provided for by revised Civil Statutes" and asks the action be abated until such time as she has done so.

Then it goes into the 11 points of denial to show the plaintiff has failed to state cause of action, attempted to establish a legal contract by estoppel, failed to name the schools where she tried to get a job, and, in the other seven points, introduced irrelevant, immaterial, evidence; has drawn unvarnished conclusions; and in one point has "misled the court."

The reply then lists three points of denial: Denying that a contract was given; denying the school policies is part of the teacher's contract; and denying that Mrs. Stockdale's services to the school were satisfactory.

It goes into the third point at length giving its reasons for saying her services were unsatisfactory, states that on or about February 12 she was advised her services were unsatisfactory; claims that on or

about April 15th she was advised her contract would not be renewed; and adds that on or about April 15, when she asked for a leave of absence, it was not granted because the contract was not to be renewed. It further states that Mrs. Stockdale had not intended to teach another year.

Finally, the Board's argument pointed out that all teacher contracts are in writing; that they are based on Superintendent's recommendations but are ratified by the Board; and that the policy manual is directory not mandatory.

Presumably the next step is up to the plaintiff, either to file another answer, or to petition the District Court to call docket and set the case. It could either do so or reject it.

In some civil cases a pre-trial hearing is called by the judge to ascertain the facts and help him determine whether or not the facts warrant setting the case for trial.
