THREE LOCAL MEN ARE APPOINTED TO COCHRAN COUNTY FARM LABOR COMMITTEE BY TEC

Three Cochran County citizens, J. D. Niewarner, Albert Morrow, and Rev. J. S. Encinas, will serve as a County Farm Labor Committee and meet with B. T. O'Connell, Manager of the Texas Employment

Commission office, to review the total seasonal employment needs developed by the TEC.

The Committee was presented with the figures of the TEC that Cochran County will be short 4063 cotton pullers during the peak period of the cotton harvest. This is broken down into 2 groups, 2488 migrants and 1575 Mexican Nationals.

The Committee will function under Public Law 78, obtaining facts relevant to the supply of domestic farm workers existing in Cochran County and the shortage of workers, if any, which must be met by importing Mexican Nationals to harvest the cotton crop. Under Public Law 78 the TEC must supply this information to the Secretary

Henrietta Bedwell Is Named Beauty Queen; Idalou Cops Riding Award — As Rodeo Opens Friday Night

Ten bathing beauties, eleven Sheriff Poses and Riding Clubs, five floats, the local High School Band, and numerous merchants trucks, etc., spiced what may have been the largest rodeo parade ever held here, Friday, opening the 7th Annual Texas Last Frontier Rodeo.

It was, in fact, one of the biggest and best Rodeo Parades Morton has ever had, most folks said.

Leading the parade, which lasted for approximately 25 minutes, was Bill Burkett, City Patrolman and in the honor position were the Parade Marshalls, Jake Wylie and John Freed, of the Cochran Posse.

Ronald Lindsey, drum major, led the Morton band and then followed the assortment of posses and beauty queens, each riding in a convertible.

Bringing up the rear, some five minutes behind the rest of the parade was the City Fire truck in which a group of Shriners were knee deep in candy bars and ice cream, flossing the favors out to the youngsters. The reason they lingered so far behind was the carefulness they were exerting to see that no youngster was missed.

Winners in the Posse competition, revealed after the grand entry at the rodeo, Friday night, were the Idalou Roping Club, first, the Hockley County Sheriff Posse, second;

and the Slaton Rangers, third. Other riding groups that showed up included the Abernathy Riding Club; the Earth Riding Club; the Roosevelt County Mounted Patrol; the Dawson County Sheriff Posse; the Gaines County Sheriff Posse; the Sundown Riding Club; the Lynn County Sheriff's Posse and 29 total riders from the Cochran County Sheriff's Posse.

There were three entrants in the float competition; but one, the L'Allegro Study Club had three pickup trucks in their theme as Mrs. J. C. Reynolds; Mrs. Tommie Hans and Mrs. E. O. Willingham staged an old fashioned bathing beauty contest of their own. The winner wasn't determined. The Morton FFA float featured domestic scenes of yesteryear and today; and the Garden Club float showed an old-fashioned home scene.

In the Morton Jaycees Bathing Beauty Contest that followed the parade, a nearly jam packed house at the Activity Building watched the ten entries parade across the stage. At the rodeo, Friday night, it was announced that Henrietta Bedwell, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Henry Bedwell, and sponsored by Willis Food Store was the winner.

Second was Betty Waller, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. R. M. Waller, sponsored by Aero Spraying and

Fertilizing Co.; and third was Sue Cooper, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. G. O. Cooper, and sponsored by Cobb's Department Store.

Other contestants included Mary Sue Seibold, sponsored by Morton Mall Shop; Christine Gray, sponsored by Window Oil Co.; Glenda Cole, sponsored by Allsup Chevrolet; Sherry Grantham, sponsored by Forrest Lumber Co.; Cindy Zielski, sponsored by the Morton Tribune; Velda Ruth Baldrige sponsored by Williamson Insurance Agency and the First State Bank; & Denise Rose, sponsored by Tarver Furniture Co.

The rodeo itself was a good show, though rather slow moving the first night. An estimated crowd of 1,500 said their way in and the concessionaires reported a land office business.

Only the timed events in the actual show were available as the Tribune went to press. Two local men, Bob Polvado of Morton and Raymond Hall of Enochs were the big money winners. Hall taking a best show time in both the tie down calf roping and the double mugging event. He had a 14.1 in the tie down, and 14.4 in the mugging.

Polvado was third in the tie down with 18.9 and second in the mugging with 17.2. Jerry Dean of Lovington won the other tie down top place and Floyd Lemond of Lovington was the other top muggin.

Jerry Christmas of Clovis was winner of the Cutting Horse Contest with Tom Standefer of Bledsoe, second.

In the special event hackney Paso Wagon Race Sundown had the best time, 24 seconds but was disqualified for dragging their feet. Winner was the Roosevelt County Mounted Patrol in 25.5 and second was Dawson County Sheriff Posse, with 25.5.

A ten second penalty kept Melinda Bartlett of Anson from posting the award winning time in the barrel race. She had an 18.5 without the penalty. Co-winners were Judy Kaye Holloman of Morton with a 19.3 and Jerry Ann Shirley of Rochester, also 19.3.

As usual these were so many entries in the rodeo, a large group had to ride and rope after the show. But the stockman, Tom Harlon, brought a real good group of animals to town and more than satisfied the desperate directors.

Following discussion by TEC, Department of Labor, and area labor center operators, the group elected to have the Cochran County Farm Bureau sponsor the organization of the labor center here.

LeRoy Johnson, president of the local Farm Bureau, was named to work in cooperation with a committee named earlier to complete plans for application of a charter.

Membership must be determined prior to application of a charter.

Unless an organization is set up here, it was said, area farmers must go to Lubbock to secure Nationals.

Cochran County farmers are not eligible to get Nationals from the Muleshoe or Littlefield centers since the counties are in different districts. Levelland can't supply Hockley County's own needs, it was said.

Little information was yet available, but with the land purchase okayed, local lumbermen were being asked to work with the Board in helping plan the new school.

It is not known at this time just how quickly the new building can be erected.

Softball Playoff Remains Same

Folks who were asking the past week just how the playoffs of the Morton Softball League will be conducted, later this month, were this week reminded by the Commissioners that there has been no change in the original plans for the playoff.

The season was divided into 2 halves, simply to give the Muleshoe team, which had won no games the first half, a little added incentive to stay in participation. Plaques will be awarded the winners of each half, in addition to the final league trophies to the first and second placed teams.

The usual Shaughnessy playoff will ensue at the end of the regulation season — about the middle of this month. The first and fourth placed teams, counting all games, will play and the second and third placed teams will play a series of games.

Winners of the series between these teams will meet for the final championship series. This playoff set-up was voted by the competing teams at the onset of the season.

His efforts resulted in the formation of the Band Parents club, one of the strongest supporting groups of any school activities. Bealmear built an award winning band and his bands have repeatedly been invited to participate in area parades and among their more recent honors were two Division I placings in District Competition, and two trips to San Antonio en route to the Fiesta Flambeau parade.

Bealmear's bands have also been recognized for their colorful and snappy marching halftime programs at Morton Football games.
