



Last week we published the financial highlights from the first full year of business by Missouri Beef Packers at their Rock Port plant.

While you may have passed hurriedly over the figures without much thought, we hope you caught the net sales total. If not, we'll remind you of what it was -- \$100,419,414.

In other words, Missouri Beef Packers, in their first full fiscal year, topped the 100 million dollar mark. And this is an achievement which you can't afford to pass off lightly.

By amassing sales in excess of \$100,000,000 in a calendar year, the young giant of the meat-packing world achieved something of a rarity while still in its infant stages.

This is a world record, according to company officials. No other company has achieved this peak in its first full year of production.

In hitting the \$100,000,000 sales mark, MBP joined such giants of the industrial world as Scott Paper Co., Polaroid, American Tel & Tel, Zenith, Bell & Howell, Mobil Oil, Standard Oil, Burroughs, Magnavox, MGM, and a few others.

But the story lies in the fact that membership in the exclusive "club" came in the company's first full fiscal year -- something none of the above-mentioned companies can boast of doing.

Announcement of the record-breaking achievement was made in the company's annual report, which carried the notation "100 Million" in gold on the front, plus the MBP emblem with a blue ribbon marked "Champion."

In his annual report to the stockholders, Robert E. (Gene) Frye, president, states "We take pride in this earnings record."

"These favorable results were achieved by an aggressive management team, modern and efficient facilities and a productive labor force," Frye said.

"We enjoyed a record of \$365,182 in sales for each employee . . . Last year we reported to you that the industry was in the process of a major evolution. This adjustment continues today as it becomes ever more apparent that cattle must be processed at the source by modern efficient methods, as distinguished from the previous method of operation where the cattle were transported many miles to cities and slaughtered in plants which do not fully utilize automation processes," Frye continued.

Frye pointed out that during the fiscal year ending last October 28, a total of 348,000 cattle were slaughtered at the Missouri plant, with a record kill of 1,601 cattle on a single shift operation.

"The expansion program mentioned in our 1966 Annual Report is now underway. We are building a modern plant at Friona, Texas, with a production capacity of 10,000 cattle per week. This single story plant has 126,000 square feet of floor space. The site is on a 200-acre tract of land adjacent to the main line of the Santa Fe Railroad," Frye told the stockholders.

"Machinery is currently being installed and without unforeseen delays, the plant should be completed in April, 1968. The Texas site was chosen after a careful study and the recognition of your management of the factors now affecting the Texas Panhandle area of the beef packing industry.

"There has been a remarkable increase in cattle feeding in the area to consume the grain from the high-yielding crops. These factors when considered with the excellent transportation facilities and the available western market for beef were primary considerations which led to the selection of the Friona site," Frye's report continued.

Included in the printed brochure containing the annual report are five full-color pictures showing construction progress at the Friona plant.

It's quite an annual report, we think, especially when you consider that the company had only been in operation a total of 88 weeks at the time of the report.

Friona Will Host Area Conference

Friona High School will be host on February 14 to students and school counselors from 13 area schools who are interested in attending vocational and technical schools and ways of securing financing to attend such schools.

The conference is one of a series of 11 being conducted on the High Plains during the month of February. Sponsoring organization is The Opportunity Plan, Inc., in cooperation with the U.S. Office of Education and West Texas State University.

Eight colleges and institutions will be represented at the conference, which is open to students and ex-students from Friona. Anyone wishing to attend should contact school officials. High school

graduates are given a special invitation.

Purpose of the conference is to give ideas as to what the participating institutions have to offer, as well as means of obtaining financial assistance for those who need the aid to pursue their education or training beyond the high school, as well as to stress the importance of acquiring education or skill training beyond high school.

High school students, ex-students, parents, school officials, church and civic leaders and other interested persons are eligible to attend.

Participating colleges and institutions include Oklahoma State, Okmulgee; Tech, Lubbock; James Connally Technical Institute; Waco; South Plains

College, Levelland; Amarillo College; Lubbock Christian College; Clarendon College; West Texas State University; and the Texas Hospital Association.

Representatives from Adrian, Bovina, Canyon, Dimmitt, Farwell, Happy, Hart, Hereford, Kress, Lazbuddie, Olton, Springlake-Earth and Vega will attend the conference. Baker Duggins, Friona counselor, is conference chairman.

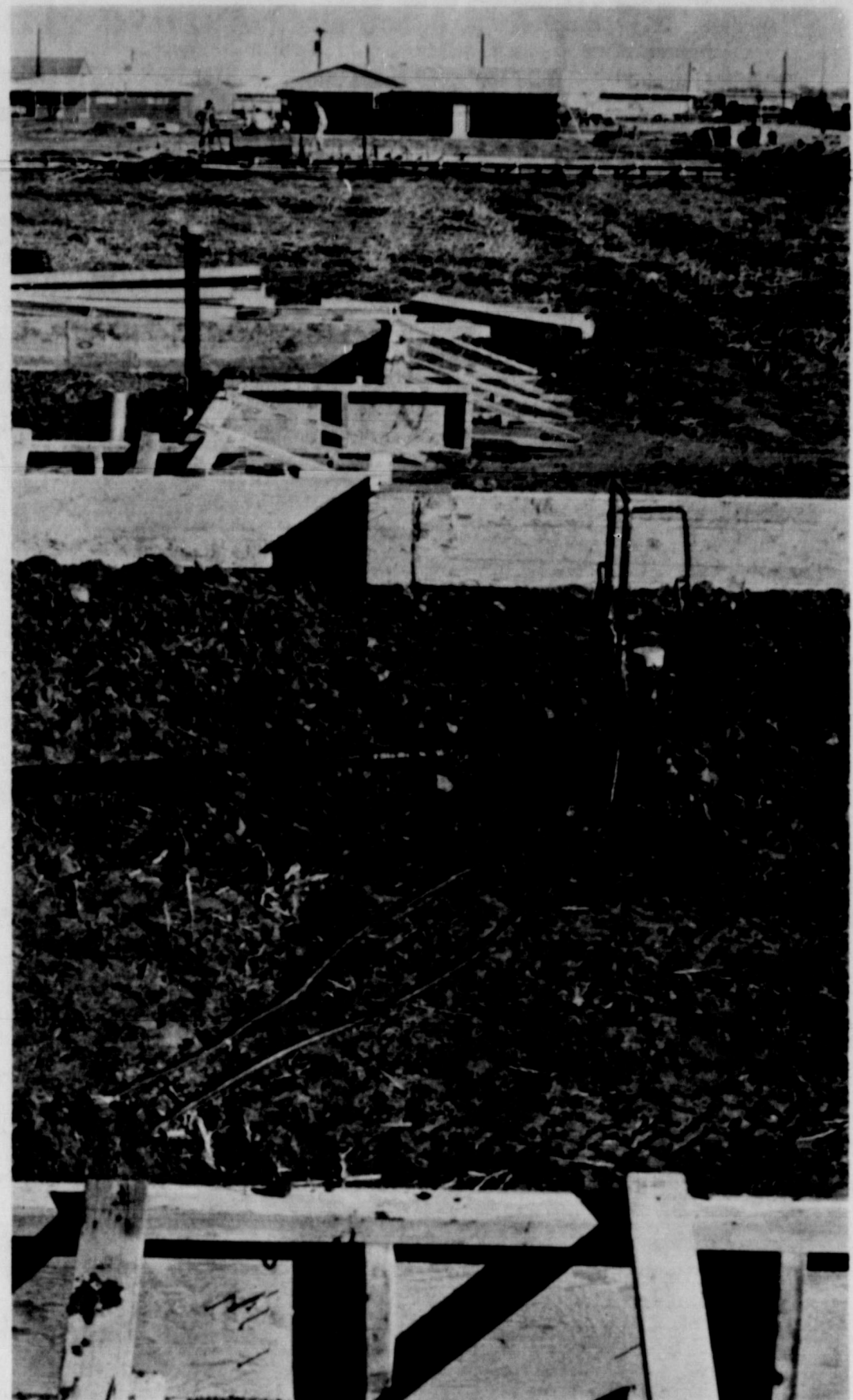

Missouri Beef Offers 150,000 Stock Shares

Missouri Beef Packers, Inc. announced today it has filed with the Securities and Exchange Commission a registration statement covering the proposed public offering of 150,000 shares of common stock, offering effect to the recent 21/2 for 1 stock split.

Francis L. duPont, A.C. Allyn Inc. has been named as manager of the underwriting group which will market the shares to the public.

Net proceeds from the proposed financing, together with other funds, will be used by the company to reimburse its working capital for the cost of construction of a beef packing plant in Friona, Texas and to repay in full all secured notes outstanding.

Missouri Beef Packers, Inc., with its existing plant and office facilities in Rock Port, Mo. in the northwest corner of Missouri, close to the Nebraska line, operates a modern automated high volume beef packing plant in cattle-feeding country

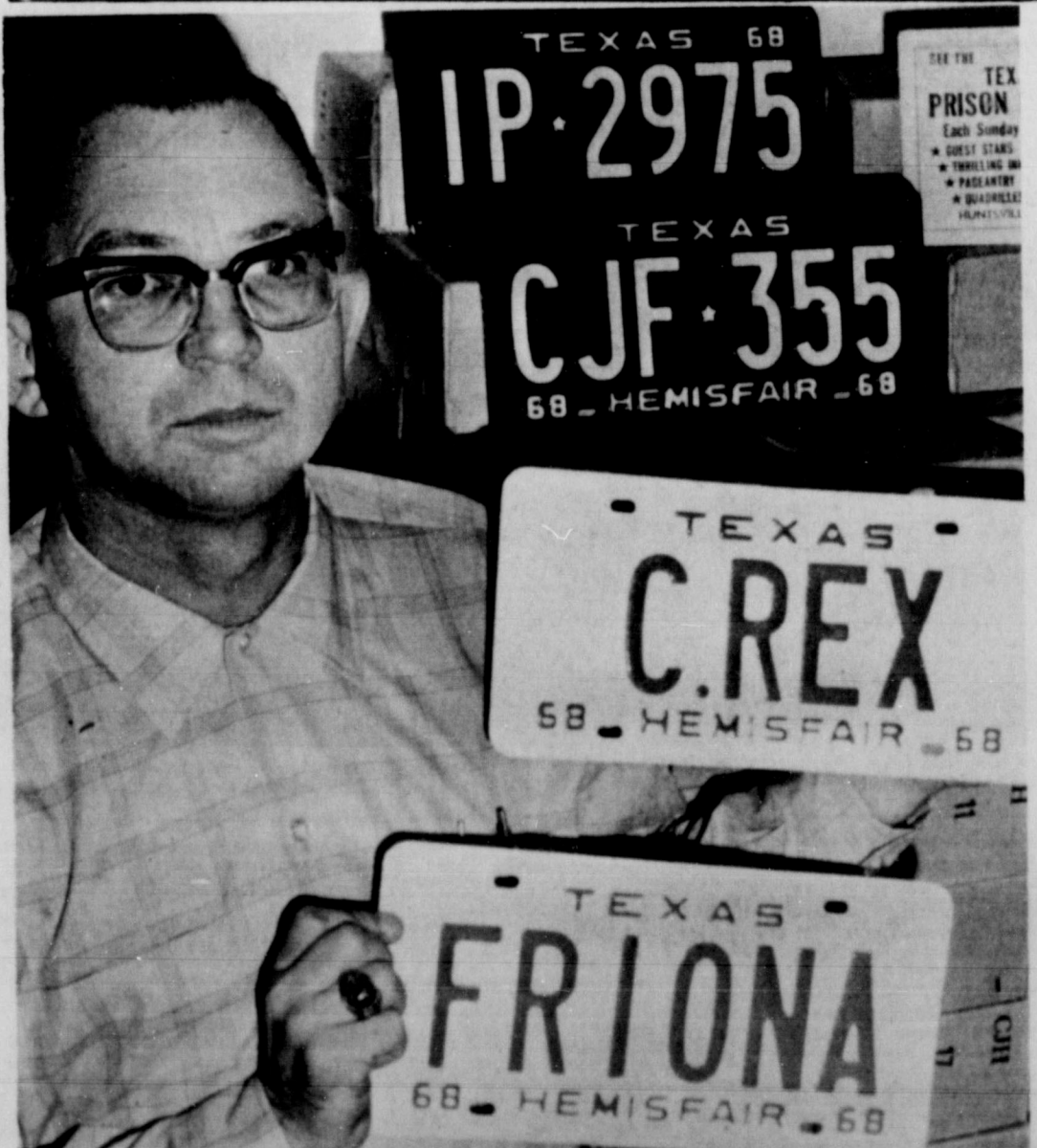
FCU Elects Five To Board Of Directors

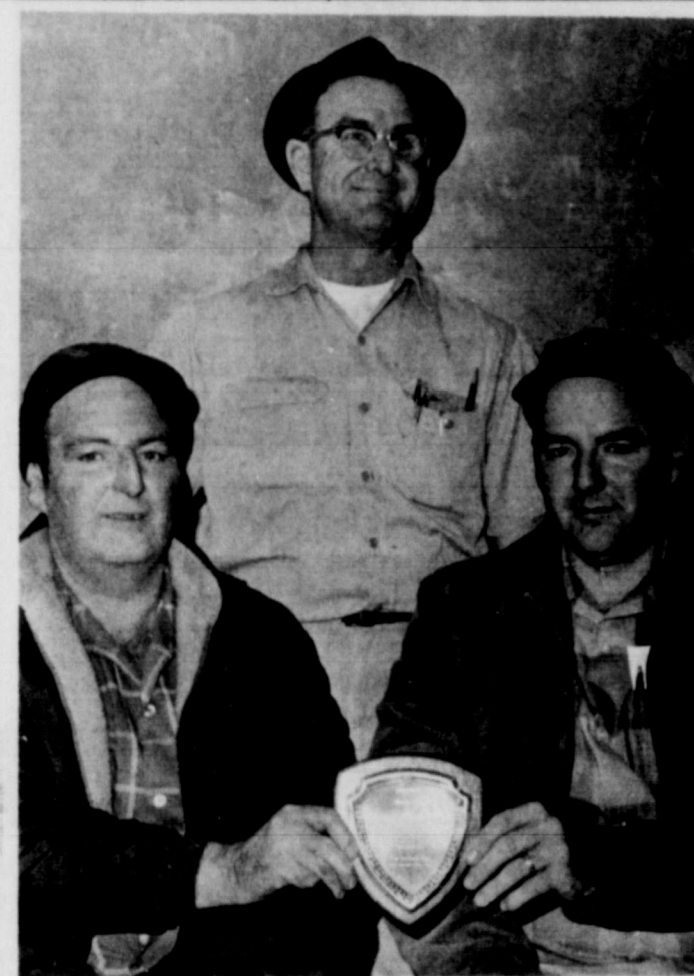
The lieutenant, a graduate of Friona High School, received his B.B.A. degree in 1967 from the University of Texas.

Garner Brothers Top Friona Beet Growers

Keith and Wendell Garner are the beet-raising champs for the Friona substation for the second straight year.

Based on pounds of sugar per acre for total acreage, the Garner brothers won out with an average of 10,819 pounds per acre on 81 acres of beets. Among the top ten growers, they also had the best ton-per-acre yield figure at 35.8 tons.

The Garners were presented with a plaque proclaiming their accomplishments at the annual banquet of the Texas-New Mexico Sugar Beet Growers Association last Saturday at Hereford.

Second behind the Garners at the Friona sub-station was Dwain Menefee, who averaged 10,069 pounds of sugar per acre.

The Garner brothers had the third-best average in the entire association, as G.E. Bailey of the Clovis sub-station averaged 11,063 pounds, and Grady Sorley of Bovina had a 10,942 average.

Elmer Margheim, agriculturist for the Friona sub-station, explained that the average were based on a man's complete acreage, in the event that he had more than one beet-growing contract.

In the past, in the case of multiple contracts, a grower's best average was used in compiling the list.

Steve Struve, whose beets were grown north of Black, was the champion among growers delivering beets to the Holly Sugar Crop factory in Hereford, with a 9,179-pound average.

A FEW POINTERS FOR CLOTHING

Resins in some garments can cause itching. When chemicals are added at the mill to make fabrics wrinkle-resistant, excess chemicals are sometimes not properly cured and not washed out before the fabric goes to the garment manufacturer.

This excess chemical, which is a formaldehyde, causes the itching. The resin itself, if properly cured and applied, causes no problem.

Drycleaners advise washing the garment or have your dry-cleaner wetclean it if it's wet-cleanable. When shopping, sniff the garment to check for tell-tale formaldehyde odor.

Dimmitt Co-op Gives Revised Plant Plans

DIMMITT (Special) -- Wheat Growers, Inc., a Dimmitt cooperative, voted Saturday to increase capitalization by \$3 million in order to build a wet-milling corn plant here.

Meeting at Dimmitt High School to vote on the issue and hear a prospectus on the plant, cooperative members approved increasing capitalization to \$8,015,000.

Present capitalization is \$5,015,000.

Contracts With Farmers
Aaron Isaacs, cooperative general manager, said only 16 negative votes were cast. Approximately 300 members attended the meeting.

Isaacs said Houston Bank for Cooperatives has already signed a contract to furnish a major portion of money to finance the mill.

Dimmitt Wheat Growers Cooperative will raise its shares by requiring producers to buy new first preferred stock issues when they contract to supply the mill with corn.

Construction Begins Soon

A producer will be required to invest \$7,000 in stock in order to supply 1 million bushels of corn per year to the mill.

The producer will be paid the market price for the corn at harvest time and will receive

further dividends from the sale of products processed by the mill.

The mill will produce corn syrup, starches, oil and high protein cattle feed.

Directors of the cooperative said construction will begin soon with a completion date set for January, 1970, so that the mill can process the 1969 crop.

One of Kind
The mill, designed by Proesa Engineers, will be a two-story structure located on 3.6 acres in East Dimmitt. The plant will be automated with a capacity of 10,000 bushels per day requiring 70 employes during the milling period.

James Harsh of Dimmitt, project coordinator, said the plant will be the most modern in the corn milling industry and will be the first cooperative plant of its kind.

There are 14 corn wet-milling plants in the nation, he said. The Dimmitt plant will concentrate on southern and southwestern markets.

FED CATTLE UP... Cattle being fed for slaughter in Texas totaled 810,000 head on Jan. 1, 1968. The Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service said this is 20 percent more than a year ago, 2 percent above the number on feed Dec. 1 and 26 percent above the 644,000 head on feed last Oct. 1. Steers accounted for 415,000 of the cattle; heifers numbered 391,000 and cows and others 4,000 head.

No packages will be left when the resident is not at home, instead a card will be placed in the mailbox, notifying the person that there is a package for them at the post office," Williams said.

Williams predicted 65 per cent of the post office boxes now in use will be given up if the carrier system goes into effect. It is expected that two carriers can cover the city each day.

The work day at the local post office begins at 6:30 a.m. when two employees arrive to sort mail and handle the newspapers that have come in. At 7:30 a.m. the train brings 90 per cent of the day's mail, which has to be sorted and placed in the right box or sack. The window opens at 8:30 a.m. for general business, and closes at 5 p.m.

But the day is not yet over for the local postal employees, who have to sort any remaining mail, getting it ready for the mail truck that comes at 5:30 p.m.

The mail has got to be in Amarillo at 7:30 p.m. to make connections and we just don't miss our deadline," said Williams.

Post Office History Reflects City's Growth

One facet of the everyday life of Friona residents has become so matter-of-fact as to almost be taken for granted -- the local post office. However, upon closer examination, one finds that there is a lot of local history tied in with the local office -- reflecting upon the growth of the city.

The postal system had its beginning in Friona in 1909, when the original post office was located near the present Reeve Chevrolet building. Later, it was moved across the street, next to the Crawford Corner grocery store. In 1956, the post office was relocated in its present site, at the corner of Seventh St. and Euclid Ave.

A pioneer in Friona, Mrs. L.F. Lillard, noted that ever since 1909, when she first came to the city, she had enjoyed the work of the postal service. The present post office now includes four full time employees and one part time employee.

One of these workers, Mrs. Orma Flippin has been with the department for 29 years, and is presently working as a Regular Clerk. Laverne Burrow, a career clerk, has been with the local office for the past 22 years. Another employee, Buford Hartwick, has been with the office for 3 1/2 years, working as a substitute clerk. Mrs. Martha Clements, also a substitute clerk on a part-time basis, has been employed for 9 years.

Wright Williams, looking back over the past four years that he has been postmaster in Friona, noted that postal receipts had increased from \$45,555,000. Receipts for the past year totaled \$55,875,000. "The increase" said Williams, "was the result of more volume, and a postal rate increase in 1967, on the parcel post packages. In 1963, first class rates were raised from 4-5¢. The increase does not include the newest rate increase, from 5-6¢ for first class mail, which didn't come

into effect soon enough to influence the 1967 postal receipts total."

"It's still one of the best bargains in the world," said Williams commenting on the postal service.

Even though the five-cent letter rate has suffered the same fate as the nickel or cigar, first class postage is cheaper today than it was in many bygone eras when a few pennies meant much more than they do today," Postmaster Williams said.

"In 1816, for instance, a single sheet letter cost six cents for delivery up to 30 miles. More sheets and more miles cost more money. A letter going 400 miles cost 25 cents per sheet."

"In those days the recipient had to pay the postage, not the sender, and if the letter was actually delivered to the recipient, rather than picked up at the Post Office, there was an extra charge that was kept by the carrier," Williams continued.

Postmaster Williams estimated that the increase in postal charges that went into effect January 7 will add only \$2.25 a year to the \$16.00 average household spent on postal services under the old rates.

Despite the great distances many letters must travel in the United States, postal rates are lower than in most other major countries, particularly when based on ability to pay. Williams said the average American worker earns the price of a six-cent stamp in 1.3 minutes. It takes that average British worker 2.5 minutes to earn letter postage, the West German worker 2.7 minutes and the French worker 5.6 minutes. Williams also noted that the higher postal rates mean that a greater share of the cost of running the Postal Service will be borne by the users of the mails rather than the tax payer.

"The cost of running the Postal Service must be paid," he said. "What isn't paid by

the mail users in postage is paid from general tax revenues.

The approximately \$900 million in additional revenue the new rates will bring in will shift that much of the burden of paying for the Postal Service from the taxpayer to the mail user," added the local postmaster.

"Certainly it's only fair that the people who use the Postal Service pay the lion's share of its operating costs."

Postmaster Williams delved into history for one more comment on the new postal rates. "Actually," he said, "with the six-cent stamp we are returning to the postal rate charged when New York was called New Amsterdam and was a Dutch colony. Then the postage rate was 'three stivers of wampum' -- the equivalent of about 6 cents."

With the increase of postal

volume in the local area, the number of post office boxes also had to increase. The original building had 670 boxes. By 1963, this number had become inadequate and 90 new boxes were added. Another 90 boxes were added in 1960, making a total of 865 boxes, the present number at the local office.

Friona's post office serves Lazbuddie, Summerfield and Black, and is classed as a second class office. Three rural route carriers, Laura Hart, Lewis Gore and N.E. Wood, cover a total of 319 miles a day.

For the past month, the local office has been adjusting to the new rate change in first class mail. According to Williams, the new rolls and books of 6 cent stamps are now available, and only the pre-stamped 6 cent envelopes have not arrived for sale. "People have been real patient and we have tried

to be patient also," said Williams speaking of the rate change and stamp shortage that followed.

One of the latest activities of the local post office is the planning of carrier service in the city. Questionnaires were sent out to citizens, inquiring about acceptance of the system. These questionnaires are now in Dallas, where Post Office officials are deciding if the new system will work in Friona.

Postmaster Williams said he expected some 600 forms to be returned from area residents. He also noted that there had been some question from those returning the forms, concerning the delivery of mail in the resident is on vacation or out of town.

"If the resident plans to be out of town, he should notify the office, and we will hold his mail for him until he returns.

Three members of the Friona Senior 4-H Club have completed a course in Money Management. They are Gary Phipps, Troy White, and Jan Jameson.

The course, "The cost of Owning and Operating an Automobile," consisted of a study of fixed and variable costs such as purchase price, operating and maintenance costs, financing, insurance, taxes, license, and registration fees and depreciation. The study also covered the effect of automobile ownership on grades at school.

Other courses available in this series are "Cost and Value of a College Education," "What will it Cost to Live?" "Your First Home."
