Funeral services are to be held this morning (Thursday) at 10:30 a. m., in the First Baptist church in Corbell, Oklahoma, for Mrs. Clara Bell Kuykendall, mother of J. R. Kuykendall, of Morton.

Mrs. Kuykendall, 80 years old, died in the Cochran County Hospital at 11:50 Monday night after a three months illness.

Although her home was in Corbell, Mrs. Kuykendall had been staying with her son during this recent illness.

Services are to be held at the First Baptist church there, of which she was a member. Interment will be in the Lawnview Cemetery at Corbell.

Singleton Funeral Home of Morton prepared the body and the funeral home in Corbell is handling the services.

Born Clara Bell Graves at Harrison, Arkansas on January 19, 1877, Mrs. Kuykendall was 80 years, 7 months and 11 days old. She married Robert F. Kuykendall in 1901 at Mt. View, Oklahoma. He preceded her in death in 1943.

Survivors include J. R. of Morton and Robert L. Kuykendall of Abilene, one daughter, Mrs. J. E. Rowan of Valdosta, Georgia; and 1 sister, 3 brothers, six grandchildren and 1 great-grandchild.

One sister and two brothers preceded her in death.

Success came last week, and Morton was voted the site for the 1958 meeting. It will mark the group's first membership meeting outside of Muleshoe.

Grain Sorghum Field Day Set At Halfway Station

Agriculture's new miracle crop, grain sorghum hybrids, together with many open pollinated varieties, are marked for star roles in the High Plains Station's first annual Field Day on September 18 at Halfway in Hale County.

"More than 200 grain sorghums of both types will be available for inspection by High Plains farmers on that date," Dr. J. H. Davis, Associate Head of the Station, announced Saturday.

"And more than half of these are hybrids, grain sorghums which agronomists believe have the ability to increase per-acre yields 30 percent over those of the old, open pollinated varieties."

The High Plains Station is located at Halfway, fourteen miles west of Plainview on Highway 70. It is an independent, non-profit, agricultural experiment farm which is supported entirely by farmers, businessmen and other private individuals.

"The purpose of the station's grain sorghum tests is to find those hybrids varieties and strains that will make the most clear profit per acre for the farmers in the region," Dr. Davis explained.

The station's investigations to find these more profitable grain sorghums include five different tests plus a 90 acre production area — all of which make up the largest and most comprehensive of the projects underway at the High Plains.

A second study consists of 43 entries in 33-foot, 2-row plots, with three replications each. This test is a cooperative project with Jack King of College Station, a Texas Agricultural Experiment Station Agronomist.

Butane Tank Burns For Two Hours at Bula Schoolhouse

A flaming butane tank kept dozens of spectators wary and was carefully watched by the Morton Volunteer Fire Department, at the Bula Schoolhouse late Sunday evening as the onlookers waited for an explosion.

The tank of fuel then burned itself out a few minutes after 7 o'clock, after burning for nearly two hours, without incident.

Investigators weren't exactly positive as to how the blaze started. They were a lot more worried about how it would end up.

Firemen who arrived around six o'clock kept everyone back, and after a few futile passes with the spray of water, decided to save the water in the event of an explosion and the need for water. They moved back away from the blaze with the rest of the sightseers and waited.

The tank, one supplying fuel for the school building's heating plant, was turned on and lit Saturday.

There was no estimate of loss or damage by Supt. H. A. Reynolds.

"Eleven varieties and hybrids are being tested in our 90 acre grain sorghum production area to obtain yield, quality and harvesting information," Dr. Davis said.

"These include the six open pollinated varieties and the five hybrids which are most popular in this area."

He cited the eleven as being Cap-

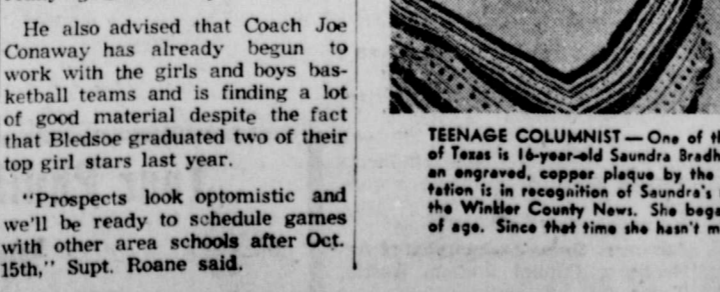
Bledsoe School Already Thinking Of Basketball

MORTON, WHITEFACE, BULA OPEN GRID SEASON FRIDAY; INDIANS AT HOME AGAINST SEAGRAVES

Morton, Whiteface and Bula put their untried teams on the home fields Friday night hoping to get off on the right foot toward a winning season.

Morton opens up by playing host to a highly regarded Seagrave Eagle eleven who have been conceding an excellent chance to win their district play.

Whiteface, with only two men returning from last year's starting eleven, expects to have a rough time this year. They open up with a game against Tatum, West Mex.

Bula, with more returning experienced men than either Morton or Whiteface, will open their six man competition before the home folks by taking on always - dangerous Eddie Thompson, Butch Nairn, a shift to fullback, Perry Souney and little Gary Williamson, who after many years without a speedy attack looks like he may bring a little swiftness into the Morton running game.

Williamham turned end in practice a couple of times, something it has been a long time since any Morton man could do.

Reserve strength seems to be the worst problem with only about six men on the bench capable of taking over a position, and none but one with any experience to speak of.

But the small Indian hand appears to have spirit and their strongest suit in pre-season practice has been their starting line.

Ed Dewbre, Carlton Peters, Max and Saron Hawthorne, Freddie Thompson, form the rest of the Indian line. The boys will and they shouldn't be underestimated, they could spring an upset, but it would be grossly unfair to tout them as possible winners Friday.

In Seagraves the Indians are up against a team loaded with husky, experienced men. They only figure to battle strong for the District 5-A title this year.

Coach A. D. Shaver has a rugged group returning. Most Morton fans will remember tackle Jesse Prestridge, a 260 pounder who ate holes in our line last year even though Morton fought gamely. And, right in the front of the attack that beat Morton 19-0 last year were Quarterback McAdoo, 175 lb. Duggan at fullback, and Jimmy Hamilton a fairly speedy halfback.

Morton may be close in weight in the starting eleven, but the Eagles are deep in reserves, though the reserves are untried. He'll have a bench full of men; four and five deep at a few positions.

But Coach Alexander, knowing a football game can wear out a man, can't look optimistic. Yet he figures, and rightly so, the Indians will give 'em a battle for most of the first half — and from there on only time will tell.

Report from . . .
YOUR COUNTY AGENT

The following are questions and answers on the Texas Egg Law. The first 13 questions are how the law affects the producer and the last 13 are questions regarding retailers.

Next week, I will complete the series, with questions and answers concerning dealers, wholesalers, & processors.

PRODUCERS
1. Under what conditions will I as a producer have to have a license?
Answer: If you claim a grade.

2. If I need a license, where do I apply?
Answer: Texas Department of Agriculture, Capitol Station, Austin, Texas.

3. As a producer do I have to sell my eggs on grade?
Answer: No.

4. As a producer, selling directly to consumers, can I label my eggs "fresh" jumbo eggs, new laid, fresh henery, or other words of such import, regardless of their grade?
Answer: Yes you are exempt from this provision of the law.

5. Can I sell to retail stores cartoned eggs labeled fresh jumbo eggs, new laid, and other words of such import, without regard to grade?
Answer: Yes, however, the retailer is not exempt from this provision and would be in violation if he offered for sale eggs labeled fresh jumbo, etc., below the grade of A.
6. As a producer, is it necessary for me to remove all inedible eggs when selling direct to consumers?
Answer: No. If you are selling only the production of your own flock and not claiming a grade you are exempt from all provisions of this law.

7. Does the law require a producer to have an egg cooler and maintain a certain temperature and humidity?
Answer: No.

8. As an egg producer, in what way is it possible for me to violate the law in selling or handling my eggs?
Answer: (1) If you claim a grade and sell eggs without first obtaining a license. (2) If the grade claimed does not meet USDA Standards.

9. Will the license fee be the same for a producer if he sells his eggs direct to consumers, assuming they are given a grade?
Answer: Yes.

10. I once attended an egg grading school. Can I sell my eggs at my place as graded?
Answer: Yes, as long as you are licensed and your eggs are properly graded according to USDA standards.

11. May I sell eggs on a retail route in cartons on which there is a picture of a hen in a cage and labeled as fresh or as just-laid? May such eggs be of Grade B or C quality?
Answer: Yes, you as a producer selling only the production of your own flock are exempt from Sec. 6. However if these eggs are offered for re-sale and are below the grade of A, the person offering them for re-sale is in violation of the law 13. Does Sec. 6 exempt the producer from the portion of the Act that Sec. 11 does not?

Answer: A producer is exempt from the provisions of Sec. 6 if he claims a grade he must comply with all other sections of the law.
14. In what ways does the law place a limit on methods or places that a producer can sell eggs without a license.

Answer: When a producer sells to persons other than consumers, he is dealing with parties who are regulated by law, and even though the producer himself is exempt from certain provisions, the retailer, dealer, wholesaler and processor are not exempt from any provisions of the law.

RETAILER
How does this law affect me as a retailer of eggs?
1. Do I need a license and if so, what are the costs?
Answer: Yes, however, if you meet the definition of a retailer as defined in Sec. 15, no fee is required.

2. Where do I get a license.
Answer: Texas Department of Agriculture, Capitol Station, Austin, Texas.

3. When must I have a license?

Highlights and Sidelights FROM YOUR State CAPITOL

Things are a bit different here and there, beginning last week, the effective date for most of the hundreds of new laws passed by the 1937 Legislature.

Scores of new laws will affect what you can and can't do from now on. Examples:

1. Manufacture, sale or use of dangerous fireworks are prohibited.
2. News reporters cannot be barred from precinct, county or state "bullet" conventions.
3. Parents will be liable for property destruction by their minor children.
4. Garage must report cars over 30 days.
5. Dangerous substances such as poisons must be labeled.
6. Tuition fees at state colleges, beginning this fall, will be doubled.
7. Voters will have to return to the "scratch" method of marking ballots. No more putting an "X" before the name of the person to be voted for.
8. In future special elections for U. S. Senate or Congressman - at large posts, runoff will have to be held unless one man gets a majority vote in the first primary.
9. No more combination bank and insurance companies, such as the late U. S. Trust and Guaranty, can be organized.
10. License plates will cost 10 per cent more from now on to provide more money to buy right of way for roads.

NEW AGENCIES TOO - Five new state agencies also enter the scene. Foremost is the new independent securities commission which will supervise both insurance and general securities issues. It combines functions formerly between the Secretary of State's office and Insurance Commission. Another is an adult parole division under the Pardons and Paroles board will set up the state's first paid staff to keep tabs on adults paroled from the penitentiary. It has long sought as a means of deterring more prisoners to useful employment.

A Tax Study Commission will oversee an analysis of the state's entire tax structure by the Texas Research League. Could eventually lead to a shifting of tax burdens - no taxes for some, less for others.

Other new agencies are the Texas Council on Migrant Labor and the Texas Historical Survey Commission.

JURY PAGES CAGE - Two Texas Grand Jurors, two legislative committees, and lots of just plain Texans are anxious to see how Bernack Cage plans to "blow the lid off" in the ICT probe.

That's what Cage has said he would do when he testifies in the upcoming investigations.

Ed Note: - Cage was to testify on Sept. 3rd, so all should know what he had to say by the time this gets in print.

He is set to appear before the Dallas Co. Grand Jury on Sept. 3. In a surprise move the Travis Co. Grand Jury sent Cage a subpoena to appear on Aug. 20. But Cage wasn't there. His attorney, M. R. Iron, said he didn't know where he was, but presumed he was visiting his mother in Los Angeles, and indicated he would not return to Texas until Sept. 3.

Travis and Dallas County Grand Juries both face an Oct. 1 adjournment. District Attorney Les Proctor of Austin said Travis County had no desire to be "first" in questioning Cage, but that they were merely working against a shortage of time. Dallas District Attorney Henry Wade said he preferred to have Cage testify there first, but that his appearance in Austin would neither help nor hurt the Dallas County investigation.

Also summoning Cage is the new House general investigating committee which has sent out a subpoena for Aug. 26, and directed Texas Rangers and the Depart-

ment of Public Safety to search for him. Chairman of the committee, appointed recently by Speaker of the House, Warren Carr, is Reagan Huffman of Marshall. Members are Reps. H. J. Bancard, Lubbock; Carl C. Conley, Faymondville; William L. Elliott, Pasadena; and Joe N. Chapman, Sulphur Springs.

Sen. Charles Herring of Austin has been named by Lt. Gov. Ben Ramsey as chairman of the Senate's new investigating group which also is interested in what Cage has to say about ICT affairs. Herring said, however, that there was no use in the House and Senate committees "pleading the same old." Since the House already has summoned Cage, it's a question whether he will be asked to appear also before the Senate group.

Serving with Herring on the Senate committee are: Sens. Culp Kruger, El Campo; Jarrard Seest, Temple; Grady Hazlewood, Amarillo; and Frank Owen III, El Paso.

Cyrus K. Holliday Recalls Pioneer Days of Railroad

Famous Antique Train To Be Shown In Dallas At State Fair of Texas

An antique train reminiscent of the pioneering days of railroading will be exhibited by the Santa Fe Railway at the 1937 State Fair of Texas, Oct. 5-20.

The famous old Cyrus K. Holliday locomotive, a replica of the original engine which hauled the first freight and passengers over the Santa Fe line in Kansas in 1869, will be brought to Dallas along with its two ancient wooden coaches.

The diminutive locomotive has the famous "diamond stack" with a brass eagle figurehead gracing the engine head, a big oil-burning headlight, brass fittings and other paraphernalia of the early days of railroading.

Although the locomotive is but a replica of the original, the present Cyrus K. Holliday ranks as a museum piece in its own right. Built in 1880, the old engine was subsequently downgraded to a switch locomotive and finally withdrawn after 60 years of active service.

Restored to its original appearance, the train has been used many times in movies of the old West. The engine still operates under its own power.

With the Cyrus K. Holliday, the State Fair will have on exhibition trains spanning nearly 90 years of rail progress. The Texas & Pacific Railway Company will exhibit its old retired steam locomotive No. 909 and one of its crack modern Texas Eagle streamliners. In addition, the Fair's Monorail line, only such system operating in the U. S., offers a sample of yet another type of rail transportation said to hold great promise for the future.

Answer: Texas Department of Agriculture, Capitol Station, Austin, Texas.

5. Will eggs be inspected for meeting the provisions of this act in my place of business?

Answer: Yes.

6. Do I have to label or identify all eggs handled as to grade?

Answer: Yes.

7. Do all eggs in my place have to be identified either as to grade or not graded?

Answer: Yes.

8. When does a retailer also become a dealer?

Answer: When he sells to others than consumers.

9. In case of eggs shipped from from other states, how does this practice affect my license, and cost to me?

Answer: If eggs are shipped to you as a retailer from other states the shipper of these eggs must be licensed as provided for in Sec. 18.

IN CASE YOU don't know it, a lot of things that were legal, aren't, and vice-versa, this week.

last week, to be exact . . .

AUGUST 22, was the effective date for hundreds of new laws added to the books by our recent legislature, and many of them are extremely interesting and are important enough that the public certainly should know about them. Other ranges from foolish non penalty legislation, to legislation that was enacted for a special situation in a legislator's district.

we've mentioned . . .

SOME, in recent weeks, such as the special legislation that is allowing Three Way Schools to have the same amount of teachers this year with a drop in enrollment. Made possible, as we stated before, by a special act declaring Three Way in a sparsely settled area.

we also . . .

MENTIONED another, the law to make juvenile drivers more responsible, but we didn't go into much detail — which we now will do.

our judges . . .

CITY JUDGE J. R. Ward, and Pat. One J. P. Forshand have a way now to throw the book at juvenile offenders who were previously almost impossible to get at even in many of their most flagrant violations.

prior to . . .

THE NEW LAW courts couldn't touch boys under 17 and girls under 18 on traffic misdemeanors, even though they had licenses. The kids were smart enough to know that a city court, for instance had no jurisdiction over them as juveniles, and would appeal to the county juvenile judge. Just about the only thing he could do was to send 'em to a state school or turn them loose. No judge was about to send a juvenile to a state school for a mere traffic offense. Usually they got a talking to — that's all.

most judges felt . . .

THE AGE of the driving permit should coincide with the age of jurisdiction in their court.

now they can . . .

FINE all boys 14 to 17 and all girls, 14 to 18, up to \$100 on any traffic offense. Though they can't be sent to jail for non-payment, the judge can suspend drivers licenses until they pay, and, subject to the two year statute of limitations, the judge can issue a warrant for the arrest of those who become of age during the period.

what is perhaps . . .

EVEN MORE important is the law that a 14 year old now must go through a Department of Public Safety screening board to get a driver's license now, instead of being able to get it from the county judge.

it all points to . . .

THE FACT THAT junior had better ease off the gas pedal and become a little more responsible for his driving.

we can't say . . .

MUCH THIS week about the need for more athletic boosters at the Baxter meetings because we didn't make it ourselves Monday, but we intended to right on up to the last minute and then got mired in a bunch of details on job work. But the fact remains our boys and the coaches could use a little support. The fact that we don't have many boys out for football won't make them try any less — but lack of support often does cause a let-down. We hope you'll turn out for the game Friday — a home game, and also next week, and every week you can make it for the booster meetings.

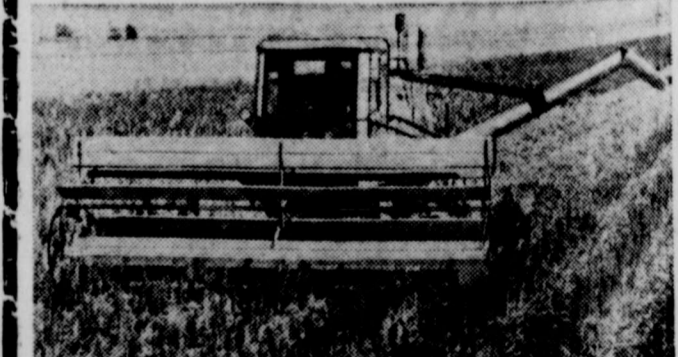
