ANSWERS COMPLETED ON TEXAS' NEW EGG LAW
 The following set of question & answers, the fourth in the series, completes the entire set concerning the new egg law in Texas. Those who refer to Dealer, Wholesaler, Processor, and Broker, DEALER.

1. When must I have a license?
 2. Where do I get a license?
 3. To whom do I apply for a license?
 4. Will eggs be inspected for meet-

ing the provisions of this act in my place of business?
 Answer: Yes.
 5. What assurance do I have as a dealer that eggs will be handled to maintain their grade after leaving my place of business?
 Answer: None, except Sect. 7 provides that eggs shall be properly handled to prevent undue deterioration.
 6. Do I have to label or identify all eggs handled as to grade?
 Answer: Yes, or label ungraded.
 7. Do all eggs in my place have to be identified either as to grade or not graded?
 Answer: Yes.
 8. In case of eggs shipped in from other states, how does this practice affect my license and cost to me?
 Answer: The law places no barrier on eggs shipped into Texas if they are shipped to licensed deal-

ers, wholesalers, or processors. The cost of licensing is based on the total volume of eggs handled regardless of the source.
 9. Can eggs of higher grade be packaged and labeled a lower grade?
 Answer: Yes.
 10. What records will I have to keep to comply with provisions of the egg law?
 Answer: You must keep and maintain a true and complete record of all eggs purchased and sold. This record shall show the name and address of the person from whom the eggs were purchased and to whom sold, and also the number of dozens or cases included in each transaction and the date thereof.
 For each entry in the aforesaid records of eggs sold, a signed invoice stating the date, quantity, grade and size of eggs must be kept on file. The invoices must be cross referenced to insure easy reference from the summary record to the invoice and from the invoice to the summary record.
 These records and invoices shall be kept on file, within this State, for a period of not less than two years.
 11. May I, as a handler, sell case eggs unlabeled, just as they are bo-

ught from producers?
 Answer: No. They must be labeled, "ungraded."

 Answer: Prior to October 20, 1957.
 2. Where do I get a license?
 Answer: Texas Department of Agriculture, Capitol Station, Austin, Texas.

Ramona, the only daughter, had lived in Levelland after her marriage, soon after her father's death came to Morton for a few weeks, and since has moved her family to Floydada.

The Harris' had only a few months prior to Mr. Harris' death, completed a new home. This week they announced the sale of the home to Bob Cook.

The youngest son will enroll in College and Mrs. Harris will work in the school's lunch room and will serve as dormitory mother in the boy's dormitory.

The Harris' have long been active in the Church of Christ and Mr. Harris was at work on the Eastside Church of Christ building as he suffered a light heart attack & later that night died after another attack.

Mrs. Harris worked in the Morton School Cafeteria; and in three different Morton School stores for nearly 20 years. The last two of the stores she owned and operated and she became the friend of hun-

drads of Morton School children in that time. Her husband was with the Highway Department for 17 years.

MAKES TRIP REPORT
Mrs. Horace Hutton reported on her recent trip to Houston to the State Home Demonstration meeting. Her daughter Betty, accompanied her on the trip. After registration at the State Fair of Texas in Dallas, October 5-20. For the State Fair, to live up to its name, must represent all Texas, and that means every one of the state's 254 counties.

That's a pretty large order, even for an exposition as big as the State Fair. To fill it properly, the State Fair would have to give all its 187 acres to the Agriculture Show alone. So the Fair has settled for mass displays of the major crops of the state's twelve Agricultural Extension Service Districts, those departments under which the county farm and home demonstration agents serve. In this way, every Texas county will be represented.

And the cotton, grain, vegetable and fruit will be there in abundance, just as if the Fair had tilted Nature's cornucopia and let the green and golden harvests pour into the exhibits. The exhibits will reveal the amazing bounty of Texas' good earth.

Shown from the Panhandle will be wheat, grain sorghums, cotton, sugar beets, alfalfa, Irish potatoes, fruits and vegetables; from the South Plains, cotton, grain sorghums, alfalfa and commercial vegetables; from the Rolling Plains, cotton, beef cattle, wheat and grain sorghums; and from North Texas, dairy products, swine, cotton, small grain, grain sorghums, corn and peanuts.

Major crops of Northeast Texas on display will be livestock, fruits and vegetables; of the Big Bend, cattle, sheep and wool, goats and mohair, alfalfa, vegetables and long staple cotton; of the Edwards Plateau, goats and mohair, sheep, beef cattle, grain sorghums, small grains and poultry; and of the Heart of Texas, cotton, cattle, peanuts, corn, grain sorghums, vegetables, peaches and pecans.

Other districts will include the Piney Woods with its forest products, broilers, beef and dairy cattle, vegetables and swine; South Texas with its flax, brown corn, poultry and beef cattle; the Gulf Coast with its rice, cattle, fruits and vegetables; and the Rio Grande Plains with their citrus fruit, vegetables, grain sorghums and cotton.

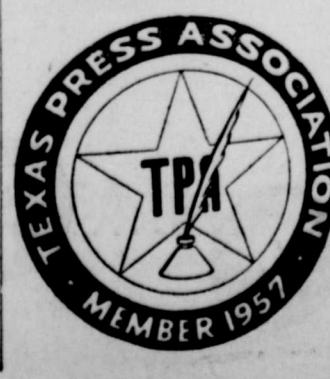

County Agent Cites Most Important Changes In the Soil Bank Program

ACREAGE RESERVE FOR 1938
The following provisions will apply to all Acreage Reserve programs for 1938. Only important changes are listed.

SOIL BANK BASE

Perhaps the most important change in the Acreage Reserve program for 1938 is the establishment of a farm Soil Bank base. This will work in effect for the Conservation Reserve. It is designed to make the program more effective in reducing production.

The Soil Bank base for a farm will be the average acreage on the farm devoted to "Soil Bank base crops" during the years 1936 and 1937, subject to County Committee adjustment for abnormal weather conditions and for new lands brought into production of Soil Bank base crops in 1937. Provision is made for establishing different farm Soil Bank bases for alternate years when necessary to reflect & establish summer fallow rotation system.

If a Soil Bank base has already been established and approved by the County Committee, for a farm owned by an existing Conservation Reserve contract, this established base will also be the farm Soil Bank base for acreage reserve purposes.

The following list may be used as a guide in distinguishing between crops that are Soil Bank base crops and those that are not.

SOIL BANK BASE CROPS

Corn, cotton, wheat, small grains, sorghums and sweet sorghums (harvested for hay or ensilage), field and cutting peas, soy beans harvested for seed, hay or ensilage, vegetables and truck crops, sudan mill and rye, harvested for seed or grain, brown corn, castor beans, and sesame.

NON SOIL BANK BASE CROPS

Small grains, used for cover crop or green manure not harvested or grazed; annual grasses used as nurse crops; annual grasses pastured or cut for hay or ensilage but no seed or grain crop harvested; biennial legumes such as sweet clover; perennial grasses and legumes; land used for garden for home consumption; annual legumes other than soy beans; cowpeas, peanuts and field and cutting peas and beans; grasses and legumes generally used for pastures such as clovers, bromes, red top and orchard grass; guar and orchards.

PERMITTED ACREAGE

In signing an Acreage Reserve Agreement, farmers will agree to limit their harvest of Soil Bank base crops. This limit, called the PERMITTED ACREAGE, will be determined by subtracting the number of acres in the Acreage Reserve from the total Soil Bank base.

CHANGE OF OWNERSHIP

In the case of a change of ownership of a farm, if the land was previously operated by a tenant, an agreement will not be approved for the new owner for at least one year of ownership, unless the land is continued to be operated by a tenant, or the county committee determines that the new owner would normally operate the land without a tenant.

Noxious weeds must be controlled on all Soil Bank Land, consisting of Russian Thistle, Cockleburs, and rag weed.

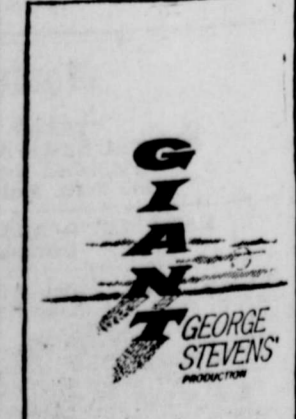

WASHINGTON AND SMALL BUSINESS

Quality southerners often mislead people. Contrasted to the more abrupt speaking northerners, the innate desire of southern gentlemen to at all times show the greatest courtesy leads them into some very involved forms of speech which sometimes appear to be all flowers, and not thorns.

Senator George Smathers of Florida gave a perfect demonstration of this the other day before the Senate Finance Committee summing up his examination of Treasury Secretary George Humphrey.

In this session of Congress, there has been some very extensive inquiry into the problems of small business, especially in regards to putting on a permanent basis the Small Business Administration, or SBA, with continuation of powers to make loans to small business deprived by taxes of the opportunity to lay aside expansion funds from profits; handicapped in borrowing funds by current fiscal and credit policies of government.

Or as George Burger, vice president of the National Federation of Independent Business put it when testifying before the House Banking and Currency Committee, "we do not believe the Treasury Dept. has a full understanding of the problems of small business and we hold the same view as it relates to Commerce Dept. Both of these departments have a rightful place in our government, but they do not belong in any direct action that will be helpful to small business."

On the Senate side, Senator Smathers decided to ascertain just how aware the Treasury Department was of the problems of small business.

retary was of the problem. And after a long and courteous discussion with Secretary Humphrey, Sen. Smathers made the following statements:

"I thoroughly agree with the Secretary," the Senator stated, "when he stated that 'upon the success of small business firms to prosper and grow depends much of our production and our survival as a free competitive society.' But then he wondered, in view of this official pronouncement, why in the past few years have these things happened."

The Senator wanted to know why small business which in 1954 was awarded 25.1% of government prime contracts, is now being awarded at the rate of 16.9%, a drop of 33%.

He also wanted to know how come that while in 1953 53% of firms with a net worth between \$5,000 and \$25,000 had credit lines with banks, a year later only 18% had such credit lines, while firms with net worths of \$500,000 or more suffered no diminishment of bank credit.

Senator Smathers related many other statistical facts about small business conditions, of a similar nature.

And with the true courtesy of the Southern gentleman, the Senator did not in the least attempt to discredit any testimony by Treasury Secretary that present governmental policies have built a fine climate for free enterprise.

He merely said in effect "I present herewith the facts as they appear today."

And, on the reverse side of the coin, he continued, he failed to find where the Secretary supported his claims with a like set of facts. The Senator was not mad at anybody; just surprised responsible government officials are so shy of facts.
