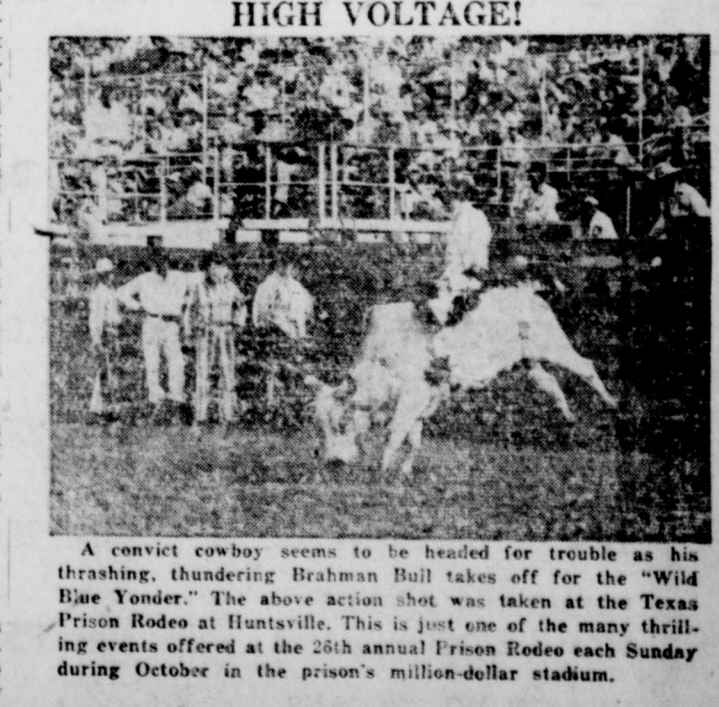

SO ELECTION COMING UP

The time has come for another election of a soil conservation district supervisor Cochran County Sub-Division No. 4.

Your present Supervisor, D. A. Ramsey, has requested me to notify all land owners and their wives (community property state) to attend an election meeting for the purpose of electing a soil conservation district supervisor. His time of office is five years.

The election meeting is called for 4:30 p.m., Tuesday, October 1, 1957, at Neely Ward old school building. This meeting should last about 45 minutes. It is an open meeting, nominations being accepted from the floor. All votes to be taken by written ballot. All landowners are requested to attend the meeting—4:30 p.m., Oct. 1, Neely Ward School Building.

PROGRAM BUILDING COMMITTEE

Cochran County Program Building Committee met Thursday evening, Sept. 19, 1957, with 50 farmers in Whiteface Community, Cochran County. The purpose of this meeting was to get a report from the Salt Water Pollution Committee on Salt Water Pollution of underground water. Many wells have gone bad the last two years in Whiteface area, due to salt water contamination, believed to come from seepage and drainage of salt water constantly being drained into the surface sump pits around oil batteries.

A county map was used to show the location of water and irrigation wells which had the chemical analysis report made of water taken from such wells. Some of the wells were found to contain salt water far too excessive for irrigation or drinking purposes. Some wells showed a fairly high salt water analysis and could be classed as dangerous for continuing irrigation. Green colored pins were placed on the map to designate the area contaminated. The picture did not look good, and also, many analysis reports were not available.

The meeting was attended by State Senator Preston Smith and State Representative R. L. Bowers, who wanted to get a first hand report.

Copies of these water analysis reports were made available in the county agent's office from a great many of the farmers. Other farmers, other farmers are requested to bring a copy of their water analysis report to the office as soon as the analysis is completed.

Mr. J. R. Kuykendall, chairman of the County Program Building Committee and several of the committee members were present to hear the report. Alvin White of the High Plains Water District attended and gave a most instructional talk on existing state laws affecting underground water, pollution of underground water, the organization and expansion of the High Plains Water Conservation District, and how the District can help the farmers on this problem of salt water. Mr. White promised that the High Plains Water District is going to have a test in this area soon.

All farmers are being asked to take samples of the water from their wells (irrigation or home supply) and send it to the State Chemist, College Station, Texas and follow up periodically at least annually or preferably every six months to determine if the water in the same well is getting more contaminated, or not.

A quart to 1/2 gallon makes a sample of water and applications for water analysis can be had with information on how to take it, at the county agent's office. You can write County Agent's office for

this application, or call in person. It was found that some wells showed high salt water contamination but you couldn't taste the salt water. It may show up on your crops after two or three years of continuous irrigation advises the county agent.

Roy Hickman had two reports on his well 2 1/2 miles southwest of Whiteface. One report in 1956 another report in 1957. The 1956 reports showed the water to be suitable for irrigation. The second report for 1957 shows the water from the same well to contain excessive salts for irrigation purposes.

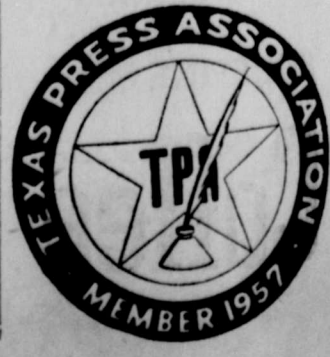

SO ELECTION COMING UP

The time has come for another election of a soil conservation district supervisor Cochran County Sub-Division No. 4.

Your present Supervisor, D. A. Ramsey, has requested me to notify all land owners and their wives (community property state) to attend an election meeting for the purpose of electing a soil conservation district supervisor. His time of office is five years.

The election meeting is called for 4:00 p.m., Tuesday, October 1, 1957, at Neely Ward old school building. This meeting should last about 45 minutes. It is an open meeting, nominations being accepted from the floor. All voters to be taken by written ballot. All landowners are requested to attend the meeting — 4:00 p.m., Oct. 1, Neely Ward School Building.

PROGRAM BUILDING COMMITTEE

Cochran County Program Building Committee met Thursday evening, Sept. 19, 1957, with 50 farmers in Whiteface Community, Cochran County. The purpose of this meeting was to get a report from the Soil Conservation District on salt water pollution of underground water. Many irrigation and drinking water wells have gone bad the last two years in Whiteface area, due to salt water contamination, believed to come from seepage and drainage of salt water constantly being drained into the surface sump pits around oil batteries.

A county map was used to show the location of water and irrigation wells which had the chemical analysis report made of water taken from such wells. Some of the wells were found to contain salt water far too excessive for irrigation or drinking purposes. Some wells showed a fairly high salt water analysis and could be classed as dangerous for continuing irrigation. Green colored pins were placed on the map to designate the area contaminated. The picture did not look good, and also, many analysis reports were not available.

The meeting was attended by State Senator Preston Smith and State Representative R. L. Bowers, who wanted to get a first hand report.

Copies of these water analysis reports were made available in the county agent's office from a great many of the farmers. Other farmers. Other farmers are requested to bring a copy of their water analysis report to the office as soon as the analysis is completed.

Mr. J. R. Kuykendall, chairman of the County Program Building Committee and several of the committee members were present to hear the report. Alvin White of the High Plains Water District attended and gave a most instructional talk on existing state laws affecting underground water, pollution of underground water, the organization and expansion of the High Plains Water Conservation District, and how the District can help the farmers on this problem of salt water.

Mr. White promised that the High Plains Water District is going to have a test in this area soon. All farmers are being asked to take samples of the water from their wells (irrigation or home supply) and send it to the State Chemist, College Station, Texas and follow up periodically at least annually or preferably every six months to determine if the water in the same well is getting more contaminated, or not.

A quart to 1/2 gallon makes a sample of water and applications for water analysis can be had with information on how to take it, at the county agent's office. You can write County Agent's office for

this application, or call in person. It was found that some wells allowed high salt water contamination but you couldn't taste the salt water. It may show up on your crops after two or three years of continuous irrigation advises the county agent.

roy Hickman had two reports on his well 2 1/2 miles southwest of Whiteface. One report in 1956 another report in 1957. The 1956 reports showed the water to be suitable for irrigation. The second report for 1957 showed the water from the same well to contain excessive salts for irrigation purposes.

A Morton fumble on their own 34 appeared to end things for Morton but the stout defensive unit held the Mules and forced them to punt. This time Black's punt was high & wobbly. It rolled dead on the Morton 44 with three minutes to play.

Thompson got to mid-field and Seaney to the 46 for a first down. Seaney got five more and Brown's pass to Collins fell short with only a minute to play. Then Eddie Thompson circled left end for 30 yards and was run out of bounds on the 10, stopping the clock with 36 seconds to play. Brown jumped to pass but found no receiver and had to run. He got three yards to the 7 and there were 23 seconds to play. Thompson then came around left

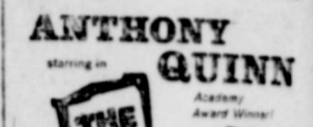

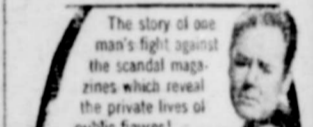

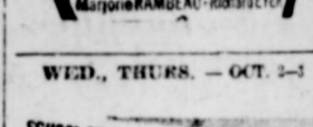
