Discussion of lobby registration problems during this special session prompted one Senator to make some actual tests to determine just what the average Texan knows about a "lobbyist."

"What do you think a lobbyist is?" he asked the first few people he saw in his home town.

Their answers invariably painted a picture of a sinister figure, complete with black cloak and villainous mustache, busily engaged in trying to "buy" lawmakers' votes with steak dinners and Stetson hats.

Lobbying, according to all the comments he got from his hometown friends, seemed a particularly unholistic practice.

This is certainly not the true picture of lobbying. If it were, the problem facing the Legislature at this time would be easily solved by just passing a bill outlawing all lobbyists.

The practice of lobbying is as much a part of democracy as the free elections. We here in the Capitol are only the representatives of our respective areas. We are here to do the wishes of the people we represent. The methods they use to let us know how the hometown folks feel about certain measures follow the exact definitions of lobbying. Anytime a Senator or Representative gets a letter from the folks back home the communication is as healthy and as American as it can be, and yet it is considered a part of the lobbying process.

Therein lies the difficulty in composing a lobby registration bill. We certainly don't want to discourage hearing the wishes of the people we represent, but neither can we afford to allow some of the lobby process to lower morals, to corrupt or to lead to bribery and dishonesty on the part of government officials.

Somewhere between the two extremes of wholesome lobbying and downright bribery there is a happy medium that would be desirable.

However, neither house has yet such a happy medium down on paper.

 Or, they are invited to be on hand Monday, at 7:30 p.m., at the High School gym, for the first workout of the team.

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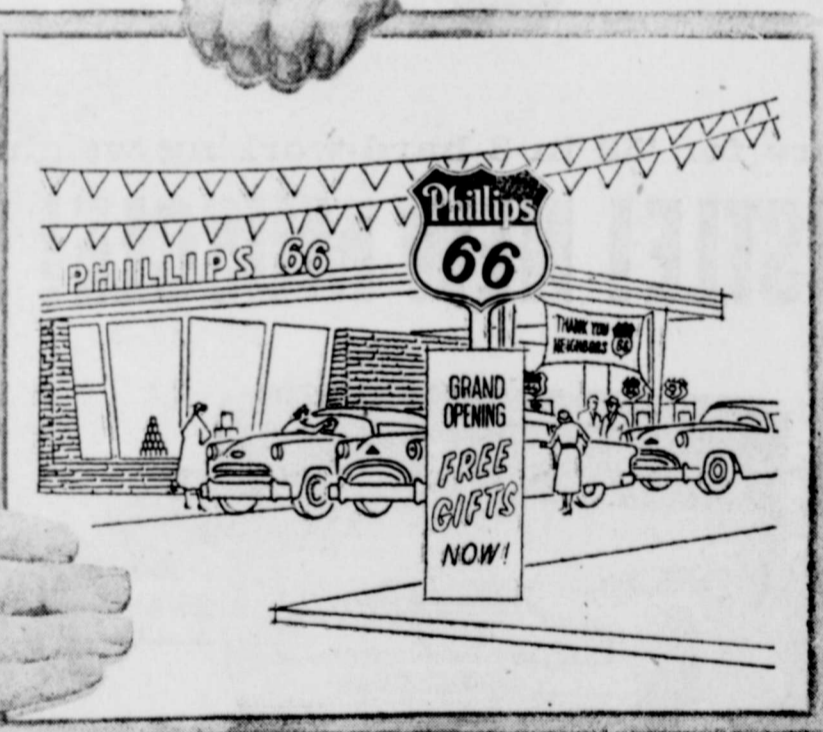

home from school? Do you notify the teacher immediately of any changes of address or telephone number? Do you let him do things for himself? Do you encourage friendships with other children in the class? Do you check the weather and dress him accordingly?

MORTON SHUTS OUT PRICE COLLEGE GRIDDERS 26-0 HERE FOR EIGHTH FOOTBALL VICTORY

The Morton Indians ran into the toughest defense to crack from the line of scrimmage and the toughest offense to contain that they have seen all season long Friday afternoon — but they rode the crest of Price College mistakes to a 26-0 victory that looked far better on paper than it really was.

It must be said that Morton had not scouted the Cardinals, and had even toyed with the idea, earlier, of cancelling the game. The Indians & their coaches had most of their attention focused on Frisco's game at Springlake. This undoubtedly had something to do with the sometimes ragged appearance Morton had Friday afternoon. But on the other side of the ledger it must be accorded Coach Hodnik's crew the praise that belongs to them. With a varied offense, featuring lots of passing, and seven running backs; plus a good defensive line led by hard charging Gary Keller, the Cardinals outshined Morton by some 76 yards and did them in the First Down department by 7. The Indians only accounted for six first downs all afternoon — by far their weakest performance.

But Price College made far too many mistakes to win the game. A

fumble set up Morton's only first half score; an 82 yd pass interception play counted the second tally; and another pass interception set up the final score. Morton stole five Price College passes and covered three Cardinal fumbles. The other tally came on a scamper on the first play after another pass interception.

If there was anything really rosy about the Morton performance, it was the standout play of the defensive line on three occasions when Price College threatened to score. Freddie Thompson played his usual great game, several times suddenly shooting the gap unexpectedly and nailing a Cardinal back for a substantial loss. Sharon Hawthorne, always a defensive standout swiped two of the passes and with brother Max, was in on at least 12 of the tackles.

Jimmy Cunningham and even Gary Williamson, each turned in a pair of real good, singular tackles and Nairn and Seaney in the backfield showed up on defense.

In the second quarter the Cards, trailing 7 to 0, ground out four 1st downs in rolling from their own 17 to the Morton 2 yard line. But on the fourth down, with two to go from the two, it was Freddie Thompson who crashed through to nail Gibson and keep him from scoring.

On another occasion, after Tony Priolo had intercepted a Brown pass on the 40 yard line and raced with it to the 25, the Cards had a great scoring chance. But the hard luck of a perfectly timed play that is perfectly timed for Morton, cost them a possible TD drive here.

Pete Ruff faded and threw a real fine short flat pass to O'Malley. The speedster reached up and took it over his shoulder and when he turned to face the direction he was going, he brought the ball down in front of him, still cradled in his arms. Now there is no telltale if the ball was starting to roll off his fingers or if Butch Nairn took the ball from him, but the fact remains that Nairn was right there as the speedster turned and it looked like he was holding the ball out to Nairn. Butch obliged by taking the pigskin and scampered 82 yards to a score with several men pursuing him but none able to catch up.

Had O'Malley caught that ball a second sooner or a second later he probably would have had the ball around the Morton 15 yard line.

Morton's first score came as somewhat of a break. Unable to get but one first down in the entire first quarter, Morton's Jackie Brown had punted to the Cardinal 10 yard line. Morton defenders were down under the 27 yard kick in a hurry and when it was touched by a Cardinal first, Eddie Thompson pounced on it on the 10 yard line and it was Morton's ball with 47 seconds to play in the first quarter.

On the first play Butch Nairn swept left end for 10 yards and the score — the only gain of 10 yards made by Morton in the whole first half.

Dewbre booted the point and it was 7 to 0. That was also the half-time score though it took a desper-

ation tackle by Nairn after a 34 yd pass Ruff to Moore, almost shook loose a PC score.

Business increased with suddenness in the third came. Nairn got off his 82 yard swipe and run play in the first three minutes and a kick attempt by Seaney was blocked so the score stood 13 to 0.

A few minutes later Sharon Hawthorne stole his first pass and the ball was on the 46 yard line. On the first play from scrimmage, for the second time this year, Seaney got the ball on a short jaunt over guard, cut across to the outside, & ran all the way — 54 yards — for a touchdown. It was almost a carbon copy of his run against Farwell on the first play Morton had the ball, except he was running toward the other end of the field. On both occasions the blocking was almost fantastic, it was so thorough.

This time it was Freddie Thompson who booted the point for a 20 to 0 score.

Then, early in the fourth quarter, Seaney went on a 24 yard end sweep and left all the PC boys behind. Thompson's kick hit the middle of the crossbar and bounced in to the ground.

Morton got only 32 yards passing, completing only two of eight tosses, an underpar performance. They did gain 152 yards on the ground, 32 more than the Cardinals. But the PC crew completed 8 of 17 passes for 119 yards and a sizable yardage advantage.

Both teams punted poorly, but most of that scant yardage on the Indians part was because they were kicking from Cardinal territory and trying to kick out of bounds.

Price College drew 55 yards in penalties and the only penalties on Morton were two pass interference rulings.

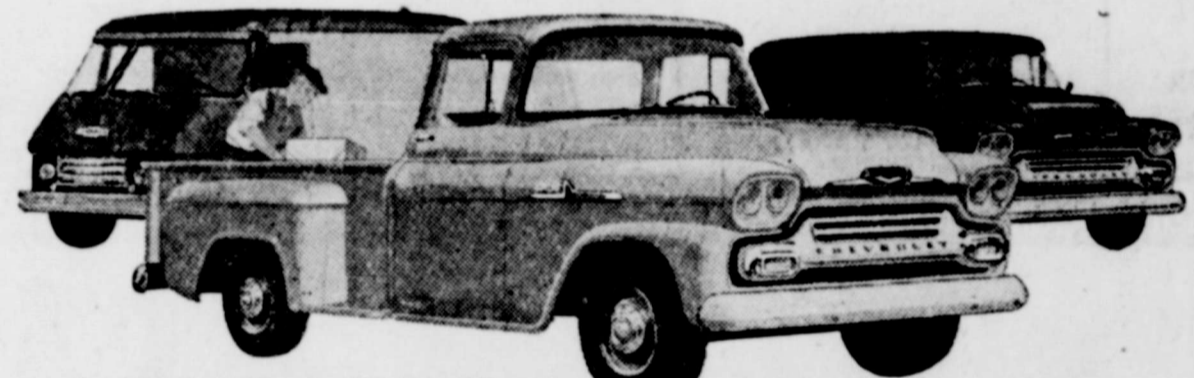

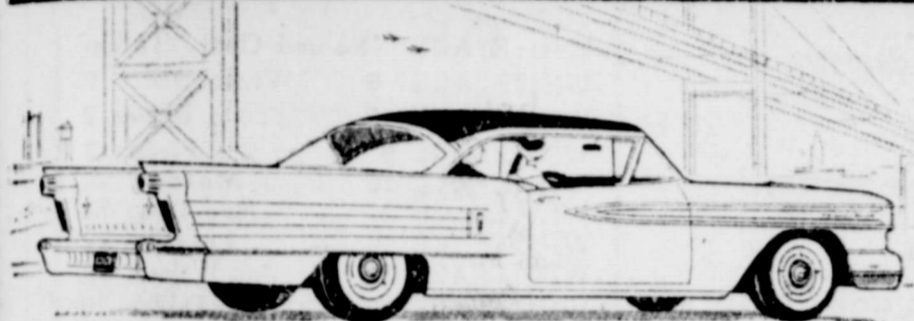

Deadline Near On Christmas Mail Overseas
 Persons with mail scheduled for regular mailing overseas to Armed Forces personnel with APO addresses, should have packages, letters, etc. in the mail not later than Nov. 20, Murray Crone, Morton postmaster, pointed out this week.
 Nov. 1 to Nov. 20 has been designated as the period for shipment overseas of surface mail to members of the Armed Services.
 Designated time for airmail is from Dec. 1 to Dec. 10.
 Regarding size of surface mail, 70 lbs. is the limit, with some addresses limited to not more than 50 pounds, and the overall girth and length total not to exceed 100 inches.
 For airmail the weight is two pounds and the overall girth and length not to exceed 30 inches.
 All mail must be carefully packed. Details may be obtained from the bulletin board at the post office.
