# Deadline Near On Christmas Mail Overseas

Persons with mail scheduled for regular mailing overseas to Armed Forces personnel with APO addresses, should have packages, letters, etc. in the mail not later than Nov. 20, Murray Crone, Morton postmas-ter, pointed out this week. Nov. 1 to Nov. 20 has been des-

ignated as the period for shipment overseas of surface mail to mem-bers of the Armed Services. Designated time for airmail is from Dec. 1 to Dec. 10.

Regarding size of surface mail. 70 lbs. is the limit, with some addresses limited to not more than 50 pounds, and the overall girth and length total not to exceed 100

For airmail the weight is two ounds and the overall girth and length not to exceed 30 inches.

All mail must be carefully packed. Details may be obtained from the bulletin board at the post of-




