Muleshoe, like Morton, won their way into the Regional tourney at Lubbock last spring only they were in a higher classification than were the Indians. Next year the Mules will again be in the District with Morton after a lapse of several years as Morton will advance into Class AA with Muleshoe, Otton, Abertonia, and Lockney.

Captain Travis and Coach Mantooth will be sending nearly the same teams onto the court that met at Muleshoe last year when the Mules, a more experienced team, beat Morton.

In most games last season, all starters wound up scoring in double figures, and none would usually score over 20.

With a year of experience under their belt, the Morton team may develop into an entirely different ball club. They may turn into a team executing play patterns - a thing they avoided last year because of lack of experience. But, in whatever style of play they come out using next Tuesday, our Indians should rate the best potentially solid ball club we've had in years. A rousing start of fan support could send them on their way with a bang.

Bands Win I, II At Lubbock Meet

For the second straight year of band marching competition, the Morton and Whiteface bands, competing in different classes, went to Lubbock for the area's best band marching show.

For the second straight year the bands ran into foul weather - this year an almost unmatchable bad weather for this country, snow.

And, for the second straight year, Morton and Whiteface captured Division I honors for class B bands and Morton who last year earned a Division I rating in marching, this year slipped to Division II.

The Whiteface band, in capturing the highest rating possible in their class, was the only one of three class B bands to do that.

In Morton's class, Seagraves and Hale Center won Division I ratings and the well regarded Sundown organization had to settle for a Division II rating also. Friona, which has been impressive in two appearances with Morton, did not compete. So, if you were bothered by a big ridge of snow down the center of the road, don't be too quick to place the blame. It wouldn't have been there if everything had gone according to plans.

The five inches of snowfall measured here, just about the same all over the Plains, was one of, if not the earliest on record in this County. Soil Conservation Service personnel said it was pretty hard to accurately measure the moisture content of a snowfall but estimated it at about 32 inches.

The snow delayed harvest for a few days, caused several more carloads of braceros to decide they wanted to go back to Mexico; caused several more farmers to decide they wanted to strip the rest of their cotton; certainly had some detrimental effect on the quality of the cotton now open and cracked, and did considerable damage to the grain sorghum. However, the damage to grain sorghum wasn't nearly as great as was first figured, since a lot of the grain that was expected to be laid down, was able to weather the storm.

Winds Friday dried out a lot of

the moisture and then on Friday night the county got its first real blast of cold weather this winter.

The mercury plunged, fairly uniformly, all over the Plains to from 10 above to 5 above by 11 p.m. and the lowest reading during the night reported to the Tribune, was a 1 degree reading on Saturday morning at 7 a.m.

Truckload of cotton Is Destroyed In Wednesday Fire

A fire which raged out of control on a semi-truck loaded with cotton at about 8:30 Wednesday morning in Morton, destroyed some 40 or more bales of cotton but did not do much damage to the truck. It was announced Wednesday afternoon by a member of the Morton Volunteer Fire Department.

The fire, which could have started by either a hot bale or perhaps from a cigarette flipped from a passing vehicle, was going strong when the truck, driven by a Latin American driver for Star Route Coop Gin, arrived in Morton. A motorist called the driver's attention to it as he was on the square. For some reason, probably trying to get out of town, the driver started the truck again and drove it east to a point just east of Joe's Place. The alarm had been turned in and the fire boys caught up with it at this location. First they thought it would be possible to get it out of town, but soon decided against this. They whipped the truck around in front of Bachmans and luckily on the first try were able to ditch all but one bale. Later the bales were dragged to the city limits where some of them were still burning late in the afternoon.

The truck, belonging to Jack Taylor, was leased to the Star Route Coop Gin. All of the cotton was lost.

the way hospitals use nurses' aides to do the non-professional work. These teachers' aides help children on with snowsuits, take out examination papers, do many of the non-teaching chores which leave the teacher free to do what he does best: teach. Other communities are trying television. This way, they say, they can get one expert teacher to go before the camera and give top-flight teaching to all the students in the school district. I've seen education through public and private schools where have it, and I was pretty impressed. Many organizations are planning for training college women whose children have grown up to go into the classroom. They say these women know children and children's problems and will give some training on how to teach. They'd make excellent teachers. Maybe none of those methods is just right to help solve the teacher shortage in your town. All I'm saying is that we're going to have to experiment to find out which method—or combination of methods—will result in the best possible education for our children.
