## ANNEXATION ELECTION CALLED

A petition in behalf of L. E. McDonald and 48 others in the Whiteface School District asking for a vote of annexation of the Cochran County portion of the Whiteface School District into the South Plains Junior College district, reached the office of Ex-Officio Superintendent and County Judge Fred Stockdale, Saturday and has been acted upon.

Judge Fred Stockdale, in an order to be dated February 22, has called for an election in the Cochran County portion of the Whiteface School district to determine if the people of that area want to be annexed to the South Plains College district. The election had to be by law called not more than 30 days nor less than 20 days after the petition was presented to him, the judge said.

Judge Stockdale said Tuesday the election would be held on March 22nd in the lobby of the gym at Whiteface and Hugh Knox and Jess Burns have been designated as the election judges.

Only those persons living in the Cochran area of the Whiteface School District, and qualified voters in that area, are eligible to vote. The Heedley portion of the Whiteface School district, extending to the Coble Switch road, is already in the College district.

Judge Stockdale said the voting would be as per all other election laws in regards to the opening and closing of polls, etc. He said he did not know if absentee balloting would be used but said that is in the hands of the college regents.

# INDIANS WIN DISTRICT TITLE; BEAT FARWELL IN TITLE GAME, 42 - 38 FOR SECOND STRAIGHT CROWN

Coach Bobby Travis' Morton Indians won their 20th game of the season, their third from Farwell, in the process claimed their second straight district 3-A basketball championship. Friday night but once again they had to stave off a bad case of the 4th period to do it.

The Indians took an early lead in the game and seemed to be sailing along easily going into the final canto with a 32 to 23 lead. At here the Steers stole a page from Sudan's book and almost made it pay off. They threw a full court press at the Indians and threw them into a slight case of the jitters. With 4:55 to go the Indians had a 38 to 27 lead and in the space of two minutes and ten seconds they had cut it to 38 to 34.

A basket by Ed Gattis with 2:10 to go proved the clincher and Eddie Thompson got loose for a crisp shot in the final minute to stave off a closing pair of free throws and a field goal for Farwell.

The Steers built a wall around Gattis the first three periods and held him to just four points as they managed to stay in the game. But in their fourth period desperation, they let him loose for jump shots from the corner and the Indian's top goal getter responded with 8 of Morton's 10 fourth quarter points and that won the game.

Farwell's Johnny Lovelace bucketed 15 points to lead the game's scoring but in the end it was shooting percentages that paid off. It was Lovelace, playing under the boards that gave Farwell a first quarter rebound advantage, but in 18 shots they hit only one fielder

while Morton was potting 5 of 13 on Middleton and Brownlow's long one handers. Farwell met the challenge by pulling out from under to did Clayton Flanagan and Bill Woods began to garner the rebounds, Morton finally pulled out with a nice 44 to 30 badge in 20 minutes. Lovelace, who couldn't hit under the basket, began to hit his long shots and kept the hustling Steers in the game to the end.

Farwell got 63 shots to Morton's 50 but the Indians shoved in 18 for a nifty .360 shooting mark and the Steers bucketed only 15 for a less than .250 mark.

The game was clean, Morton getting only 8 fouls and Farwell 12.

The victory gave Morton the title and the right to advance into bi-district play against Hale Center Tuesday — which story will be found elsewhere in the paper.

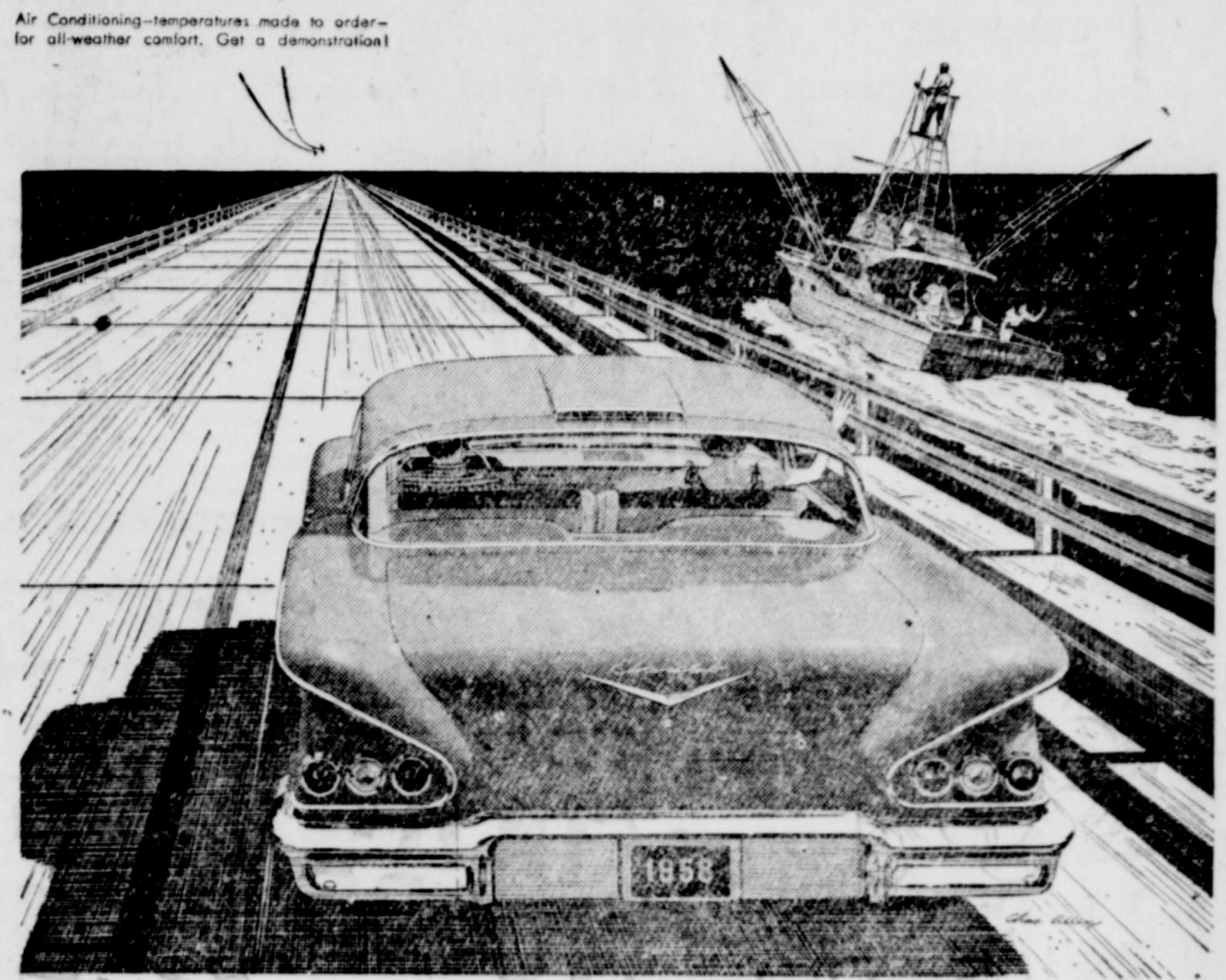

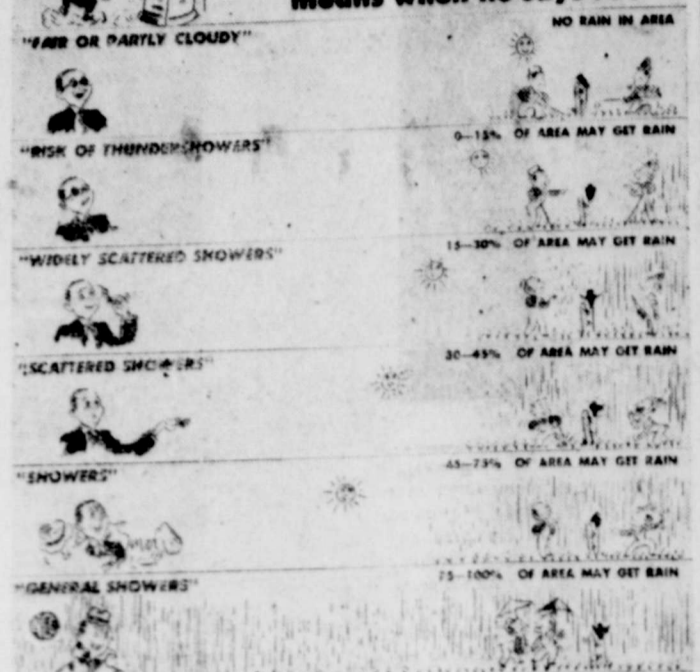

### Cotton Acreage Increase Bill Is Introduced

In an effort to bolster the farm economy of Texas and the nation, I have filed a bill to increase cotton acreage allotments and authorize loans to help cotton farmers plant their land.

Purpose of the bill is "to provide an emergency relief program for the 1936 production of cotton." The program is needed because thousands of cotton farmers are in bad shape financially and several million bales of high quality cotton are needed to meet the current shortage.

The bill I have filed provides that the acreage allotment for the 1936 crop of cotton for each farm be increased by one acre or 10 per cent of the total of such allotment for 1935, whichever is greater. It also provides that those farmers who need money to operate their farms may secure loans from the FHA in the amount they would be able to qualify for under Soil Bank payments if they had banked their land.

My bill gives the farmer an option: he may bank his land or get more acreage. He cannot do both. The loan provision applies to both those who have signed up for the Soil Bank, and those who did not.

With a short supply of good quality cotton, the cotton farmer of Texas, particularly the small farm owner or tenant farmer, does not need to be paid under the Soil Bank not to farm. What he really needs is a program that will help him get credit to plant his land and live until he makes a crop. He also needs a high enough acreage allotment where he can raise enough to give his family a decent living.
