A LETTER TO THE PUBLIC

This letter is an attempt to clarify the position of the Board of Education and the Administration of the Morton Schools on some points that are being discussed at the present time-

1. The present system of bookkeeping on the activity funds in the school, is one used by thirty of thirty-three schools in this area. These figures were compiled as the result of a survey run by the school last year.

2. Classes and other organi-

zations deposit the money they earn into the Activity Fund and are given a receipt for their records of their de posit, They are issued a check on their request, on this account without question as to its use. The check must be requested by class or or-ganization officials on a form that is provided and must be signed by the proper student official. The only control the school requires is a record for audit purposes. Students are free to spend the money they earn as their organization votes without any dictation from the Board or the school. 3. The Senior Class of this year is free to do with its money what it choses out any dictation from the Board or School. They are planning to go to Washington after school is out. The trip is to be sponsored by a gr oup of the parents and is not as of April 2, 1958, has de posited in the school account the amount of \$1306.55 and they have about \$1.500 in a separate Senior Class Fund at the bank, that has not been deposited under the school's Activity Fund. The Senior class is free to spend this mo ney in anyway the majority of the class votes to spend it. There has not been, nor will there be any suggestion on the part of the school officials or the board, as an organization, as to how the class is to spend its money. 4. The reason for the after school trip is because it takes too long to make this trip during the regular school year. The school receives its foundation funds from the state on an average daily attendance of students in school. If the students were absent an excessive number of days, the school would lose its fudays the students were gone This is the reason the board did not authiroze the trip during the school term.
