the beauty of a homestead. Observation and experience indicates that windbreak plantings are not as successful on dryland as they are where they can be supplemented with irrigation water. Where extra water is available, however, a very effective windbreak can be grown.

For best protection around a farmstead, trees should be planted at least 100 feet and not more than 200 feet from buildings.

It is very important that trees be spread properly. Trees in a one-row windbreak should not be spaced more than 8 feet apart. Trees in a two row windbreak should not exceed 12 feet spacing in the row withn of more than 16 feet spac-ing between the two rows. The two rows should be staggered.

Trees coming out of greenhou-ses should be handled very carefully before planting. It is very easy to cause injury to a small tree such as Arizona cyprus be-fore or during the process of planting. Before trees are planted they should be kept in the shade and out of the wind. Small trees should be kept watered by sprin-kling. On hot days the trees may require 2 or 3 waterings daily while they are still in pots. After the

Production practices govern quality and yield. Do your best to see that your land preparation is adequate. Check your soil fertility needs now so that maximum production of quality cotton will not be hampered by lack of nitrogen, phosphorus, potassium or organic matter. Sub soil moisture may be adequate but check to be sure.

Planting time is almost here. Optimun planting dates on the High Plains are May 5-20. Later planting usually results in lower quality. Before planting be sure the minimum soil temperature averages 60 degrees for 10 days at an 8-inch depth from the top of the bed. Use delinted, treated seed and check for germination. A uniform stand of approximately four stalks per foot in 40inch rows is recommended. The method of harvest to be used should help determine the variety planted.
