Farmers Asked
Not to Plow Up
Right - of - Way

Farmers were asked this week
to avoid plowing within the state
highway right of way.

The request came from O. L. Crain,

Rains which reached near flood
proportions in some areas of Tex-
as' Last Frontier, brought an aver-
age of from 1.25 to 1.50 inches of
spring irrigation to fields late Mon-
day evening, and were accompan-
ied in places by sizable hail.

Stegall evidently caught the brunt

of a strong southwest wind. The
gauges at Stegall showed 5 inches

and over and one farmer reported
an empty bucket harvested a full

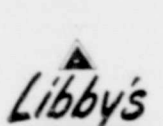

Reduction of State Expenditures Is Object of Study Now Underway

A study of ways to reduce state expenditures to meet a state government deficit rather than seek additional revenue by imposing new taxes has been recommended by the Retail Merchants Association of Texas as the best solution to the state's money ills, Mrs. Art Wall, manager of the Morton Retail Merchants Association, said recently.

She said RMA members have voted to request the Texas State Tax Study Commission and the Texas Research League to study ways of achieving economy in the state government.

The RMA is also interested in having the jurisdiction of justice courts raised to cases involving \$500. The present maximum is \$200, Mrs. Wall said. These changes are needed because the value of the dollar has greatly decreased since the limitations were set and because litigation in higher courts is too expensive and requires an excessive amount of time.

Corrective legislation involving mechanic lien laws and bonding of public construction work also has the endorsement of the RMA, she said.

The RMA is recommending to the two groups and the governor that such a study include possible consolidations of departments and agencies, the elimination of useless and unnecessary services and a closer scrutiny of all state expenses, Mr. Wall said.

The RMA has noted that the two groups have been devoting most of their attention on hearing arguments pro and con on various types of new taxes that might be imposed, including sales tax, income tax and gross receipts taxes, she said.

The tax study is being made because the state faces a possible deficit of \$50 to \$100 million. "It is the opinion of RMA members that the tax load on consumers and businessmen alike are already excessive, and what is needed now more than anything else is a reduction in taxes that will increase the purchasing power of families and thereby stimulate our economy," Mrs. Wall said.

The RMA also voted to support corrective legislation that would reduce the cost and expedite the collection of small claims and debts.

Small claims courts can take action only on cases involving \$50 or less, except wage and salary claims where the amount is \$100. The RMA will ask that the amount be made \$100 for all a-

Soil Control Earns Roger Koch Award In Canning Crops Contest



A scientifically controlled experiment in the cultivation of green lima beans earned 19-year old Roger Koch of Jefferson, Wisconsin, Central regional honors in the third annual Canning Crops Contest sponsored jointly by the National Canners Association and the National Junior Vegetable Growers Association.

Roger, now a sophomore at Marquette University, turned the trick with a 5 1/2 acre parcel of land which he divided into three separate zones in order to gauge the effect of planned application of top dressing on the growth of the delicate vegetable. With the aid of Libby, McNeill and Libby soil experts, he managed to raise more than six tons of lima beans which he subsequently sold to the cannery's Lake Mills, Wisconsin plant at a net profit of \$205.50.

No newcomer to the field of horticulture, Roger has been an active member of 4-H and FFA for the past seven years. In 1956 he was awarded the Wisconsin Farmer Degree and has maintained an active interest in the controlled cultivation of vegetable crops.

As one of three regional winners of the canning crops contest, Roger was a guest of honor at the 23rd annual Convention of the National Junior Vegetable Growers Association held in Springfield, Illinois. There, Dr. Charles H. Mahoney, (shown with young Koch) research di-

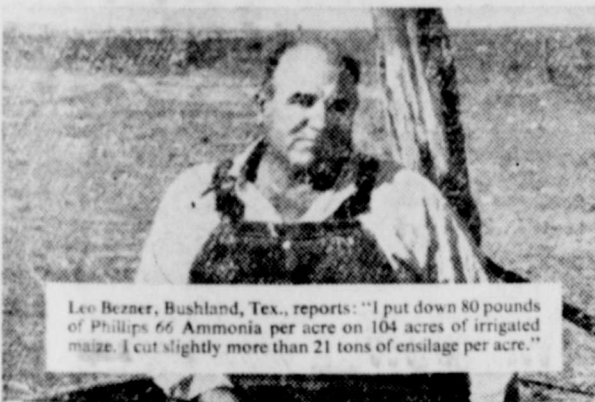

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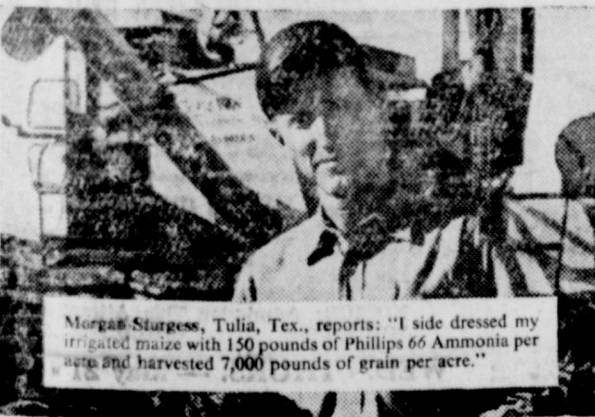

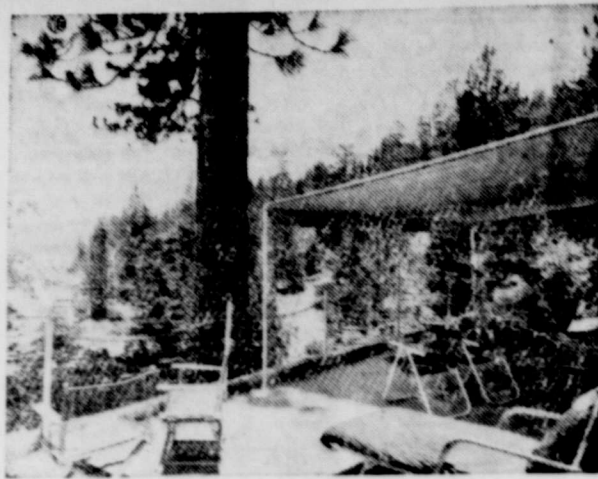

After Loveless, Tarver, Seagler, and Holloman had retired, the board approved \$3,294.62 in bills to be paid this month, retired teachers at the East Elementary School; approved a school calendar for next year, and named a Board of Equalization with three alternates.

In presenting the calendar, Superintendent John Barnes told Board members that the schedule provided for 177 school days, and that the state requirement was 175.

According to the calendar, Aug. 26 - 28 will be an inservice training program for teachers. Students will be registered Aug. 29, and classes will begin Sept. 2.

Nov. 27 - 28 will be observed as Thanksgiving with Christmas holidays starting Dec. 23 at 2 p. m.

School will take up after the holidays on Jan. 5. The end of the first semester will fall on Jan. 19. March 6 will be observed as a holiday to allow for a district teachers' conference. Easter holidays will be April 3 - 6. May 22 will end the second semester.

In explaining the unit system of equalization Loveless said the system did not include personal property, but provided an evaluation of land and improvements.

He said a card is filled out on each piece of property showing the basic features, size, and type of house.

Where rural property is considered, land is placed under three major divisions: irrigated, dry land and pasture land. A further breakdown of this is then accomplished.

In cities a footage value of property is worked out according to location.

Basic values are determined by a local land board, as in the case of school districts, a board appointed by the board of education.

Loveless said that his company, after completing their evaluation on the bases approved by the land board hold a primary hearing with members of the appointed Board of equalization, then meet with the board of equalization when it meets with the public.

He said that generally, unless values are changed, 40 per cent of the property owners are raised, 40 percent are lowered, and 20 per cent stay about the same.

When asked about his past work, Loveless said that in 1952 his company set up a unit system of tax evaluation in Bailey County, and the year before set up one working Muleshoe and the Muleshoe schools at the same time.

Other places he mentioned as having employed his firm were Friona, Grey County, Hale Center, Perryton and Brownfield.

When asked about the cost, Loveless said that it would cost the Morton School District \$10,500; in association with the City of Morton, it would cost the school district \$7,500 and the City \$3,500.

For the city, school district, and county: \$2,900 for the city; \$5,400 for the school district, and \$15,400 for the county.

If other school districts came in, he said, it would cost the County less.
