Morton's two Babe Ruth League teams — the Indians and the Tigers — will have their first regular season meeting tonight as the nines square off on the local field.

The game will also be the first of the season for the Indians who have been "sanded out" and "rained out" in two scheduled games.

Quota Set On "Nationals" for S. Plains Area

The Frontier Farm Labor Association has received 24 Mexican National Laborers under contract on Monday of this week and was expecting 25 more to arrive Wednesday night.

L. F. Russell, manager of the local group said that a load of 13 to arrive this weekend would complete the quota allowed for this county, according to the TEC.

Russell said he did not look for a lack of cotton choppers. He said that there probably would be plenty of choppers available. But, he added, the shortage, will probably be on regular farmhands. Local farmers are wanting approximately 50 more Nationals to do regular farm chores, such as changing irrigation pipe, etc. This, Russell, said, is where farmers are having a difficult time securing hands.

Russell said he was advised that the shipments this week would be as many as the Texas Employment Commission would certify for Cochran County.

McDermott Named Dealer for Hahn Sprayer & Duster

The Hi-Boy has a 150-gallon aluminumized steel tank and is capable of handling eight rows at a time, and with small size stalks at about nine miles per hour. McDermott invites area farmers to drop by and see the new Hi-Boy now on display at the firm's headquarters.

Four days of rainfall — some only bringing showers — and some bringing welcome crop moisture came to the Texas' Last Frontier area, late last week and early this week and sent crop hopes soaring as high as they have been in many a year.

In fact, about all the skeptics are saying is: "now if only we don't get a hail."

Some areas got rain last Thursday night, a few felt a smattering of moisture, Friday. But the real crop drinking moisture came Sunday night, Monday afternoon, and Monday night. All told, most of the area reported at least an inch and a quarter of moisture and the general average was from an inch and a half to two inches. Baileyboro and Stegall, which got the real soaker a few weeks ago, recorded another three inch fall and some few places were bordering on too much moisture — though they were in the minority.

The moisture also acted as an immediate, temporary, deterrent to the insects, but plenty of early season control was expected to be needed very soon.

4-H RIFLE SAFETY TEAM
 The Cochran County 4-H Rifle Safety and shooting team won the district title again in 1958. The team members were the same boys competing in the State Contest at College Station, on June 11, 1958, or the 2nd year in a row. They are Sharon Don Hawthorne, Gary Colman, Bill Ed Thompson and Layton Flanagan. The County Agent accompanied the boys to the annual round-up contests. The instructors, Ken Coffman & Ralph Cadlow were unable to go this year due to what harvest and seeds in present crops. All 4-H boys should be most proud of the boys as a team. Their conduct was well above reproach and they represented Cochran County and District Two of the Extension Service in a most pleasing fashion. The boys exemplified their training by leaders named above in both safety and shooting, in a manner that all could be proud of.

The contest began at 7:00 a.m. June 11, under the Kyle Field Football stadium. There were 22 teams present for the contest. Our boys took sixth place. The team contest was based on firing 10 rounds into 50 foot targets with 30 bulls. One target for each position, prone, sitting, kneeling and standing. The boys did a splendid job in prone, sitting, and kneeling positions but fell down somewhat in the more difficult standing shooting. Gary Coffman was high point man shooting 316 out of a possible 400. He shot a 96 prone out of a possible 100. I'd say this was expert shooting. The boys used the new 4-H rifles, and needed, perhaps a little more time to practice with them before the contest. Anyway, the boys did a superior job and we are most proud of them. Their conduct, attitude and obedience is something we should be proud of.

This year, there were 78 4-H boys and girls taking the County 4-H rifle safety course under Ken Coffman and Ralph Cadlow and the County Agent. The training received by these members who did not make the team is the training that is most important. The safety training and the safety training these members have learned will stay with them all through life. This program builds a stronger and safer community and county.

No one can see into the future, but if one life is saved, the cost of this program is the best investment we can make. My congratulations to the 4-H members, leaders and parents who participated in this program, said the Agent.

Thus, the earliest control of insects is the cheapest control — 50 cents to 60 cents per acre for the insecticide. The highest priced cotton is the first cotton — the bolls which come at the bottom of the stalk. This is also the crop the thrips and fleahoppers get. The bottom crop is the crop that makes the most money in grade, staple and yield. If you save the bottom crop, you always beat the frost as frost never comes early enough to get the bottom crop. The question is, why should we take chances by not applying the early insect control measure, when this is the cheapest control to insure the production of the highest price and earliest cotton — the bottom crop. Frost usually will get the top cotton crop, sometimes the middle crop, but never the bottom crop.

These four insects usually get the bottom crop, if permitted: Fleahoppers, Thrips, Aphids or Lygus bugs, sometimes Cut Worms. The four insects are easily controlled if insecticides recommended are applied properly. These are: aldrin, heptachlor, and dieldrin, one pint per acre.

Remember the differential in poor and good quality cotton is a great deal. You can go broke producing 10 cent cotton, usually harvested from the top crop. But 30 cent cotton, harvested from the bottom crop can make you money. Two dollars per acre for early season insect control can make you as much as \$100 per bale more for quality cotton, or the difference between 10 cents per pound and 30 cents per pound in a short growing season for cotton. Think it over. It's your cotton crop and your money.

The fleahopper has not been too prominent this year. The cotton buds forming now at the base of the leaf on the stalk are the fruit the thrips, lygus bugs and fleahoppers get, and there, buds make the planting cotton 2 to 3 weeks later.

COTTON INSECTS

Grasshoppers are working in a two fields. Most damage is being done by the Jump's, especially on or bordering pasture land. Baits are effective, but not as effective as spray or dust. Where pasture land is near cotton, it is a good idea to get an airplane to spray out in the pasture area about 200 yards. Airplanes can do a quick, excellent job in the pasture area where mesquite prevail.

The sprays recommended for grasshoppers are:
 Aldrin — 1 qt. per acre
 Toxaphene — 2 qts. per acre
 Heptachlor and dieldrin are also recommended at the same rate as aldrin.

It is too early to say what the rains will do to the thrips and lygus bugs. There were a little less thrips in cotton this week than a week ago. Some of the older cotton was set back 2 to 3 weeks due to thrip damage. Every farmer wants early cotton indicated by early plantings, even in soil too wet to plow. Not all seem to want to stop the thrips by early season control, so thrips have already set cotton back in many fields, more than planting cotton 2 to 3 weeks later.

A labor bill designed to drive
 racketeers and crooked officials
 out of the union movement and to
 protect the rights of workers,
 movement and the people gen-
 erally has been reported to the
 Senate by the Labor Committee.
 The bill has the support of Sen-
 ator John McClellan, the Arkan-
 sas Senator who has led the Senate
 investigation into labor racketeer-
 ing. Senator McClellan is proba-
 bly better informed about the evils
 besetting out of dishonest labor
 leadership than any other man in
 the country. He has given close
 study to proposed several strong-
 arming amendments to the bill.
 An analysis of the bill as re-
 ported by the Committee, shows
 that it would have the following
 important effects:
 —The right of secret ballot would
 be guaranteed union members
 in selecting their officials.
 —Federal or state elections
 would be conducted in Federal
 courts under a system provided by
 the bill.
 —High standards to govern un-
 ion trusteeships would be estab-
 lished and a time limit would be
 placed on them so that no union
 would be under trusteeship for an
 indefinite period.
 —The spotlight of publicity would
 be focused on "middlemen"
 deals that are against the best in-

terest of the working man.
 —Effective reporting of union
 operations would be required.
 —Union leaders and officials
 would be required to reveal any
 personal financial transactions hav-
 ing a bearing on the manner in
 which they conduct their respon-
 sibilities in order to disclose any
 conflict of interest.
 —Needed barriers against the
 control of unions by crooks—by
 reformed, convicted thieves,
 mobsters and extortionists—would
 be erected.
 —Union treasuries and trust
 funds would be protected against
 misappropriation and embezzle-
 ment.
 —Criminal penalties would be
 imposed against men who give
 bribes and men who take bribes in
 labor-management relations.
 —Important financial records
 and election ballots would be re-
 quired to be preserved.
 —It would make ineligible for
 office convicted criminals and un-
 ion officials who willfully falsify
 or destroy records.
 —These are worthy objectives.
 The bill does not, of course, cover
 all areas in which legislation is
 needed. But its enactment would
 represent some long steps in the
 right direction.
 In the opinion of men who have
 thoroughly explored the problem,
 it is a bill that, if enacted and pro-
 perly administered and enforced,
 will drive many unsavory charac-
 ters out of the union movement
 and strengthen the position of hon-
 est, decent unionism and its lead-
 ers.
 That is an objective on which
 the great majority of Americans
 are united.

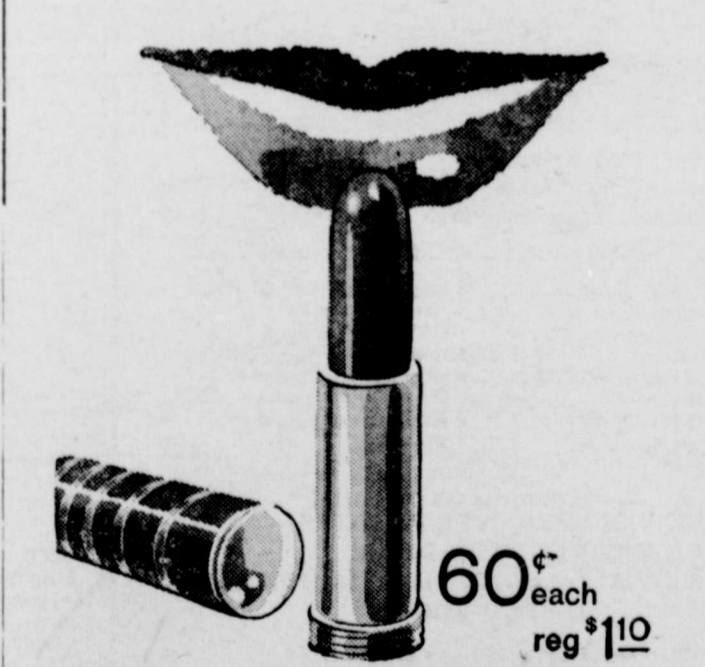

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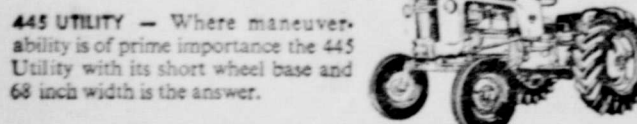

Early Fruiting of Cotton Can Be Highly Important

Early fruiting of the cotton plant may be more important to South Plains cotton farmers this year than increased yields, some cotton authorities believe.

And to obtain early fruiting, they're recommending early season insect control. Dr. H. G. Johnson, former head of the Texas A & M College Entomology Department and now with the National Cotton Council, said recently that increased yield should not be the only factor for evaluating early season insect control.

With the campaign now under way by cotton leaders on the Plains for production of high quality cotton, farmers are being urged to set an early crop since early cotton generally is of a better grade than cotton produced later in the season.

Thrips and fleahoppers are the insects which usually damage the South Plains cotton crop early in the season and research at the Lubbock Experiment Station shows that they can be controlled in a manner that should help the cotton farmer increase his profits.

Growers who have been successful in setting an early crop of fruit have been applying an application when the cotton reaches the two to four leaf stage and then following through with two others at weekly intervals. Usually this will take care of these two early-season pests.

Stress on early production this year results from last year's late harvest and severe damage to the crop by an early freeze which costs farmers as a result of a drop in yield and also a drop in grade.

Bracero Law Will Probably Be Extended

The law governing the use of Mexican Bracero Labor (Public Law 78) will probably be extended another two years, according to representatives of the Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., Bracero Labor Committee.

The committee is in Washington this week to testify at Hearings on Public Law 78.

W. T. Miller, Muleshoe, Chairman of the PCG Committee, said sentiment among Labor Department officials seems to have changed and the officials now recognize the seriousness of the agricultural labor picture.

Two-year extension of the present law, slated to expire June 30, 1959, was suggested by Labor and State Department spokesmen in hearings that began Monday. They also were quoted as testifying that despite the number of unemployed persons in this country, there is continuing need to bring in Mexicans to help harvest cotton and truck crops.

Purpose of the PCG group journeying to Washington was to focus attention on the difficulties the farmers here were having in obtaining adequate labor with which to produce the 1958 cotton crop.

Others in the PCG group in Washington include W. G. White, Lamesa; Otto Smith, Littlefield; Paul Nafziger, Littlefield; and Joe Sotter, Muleshoe.

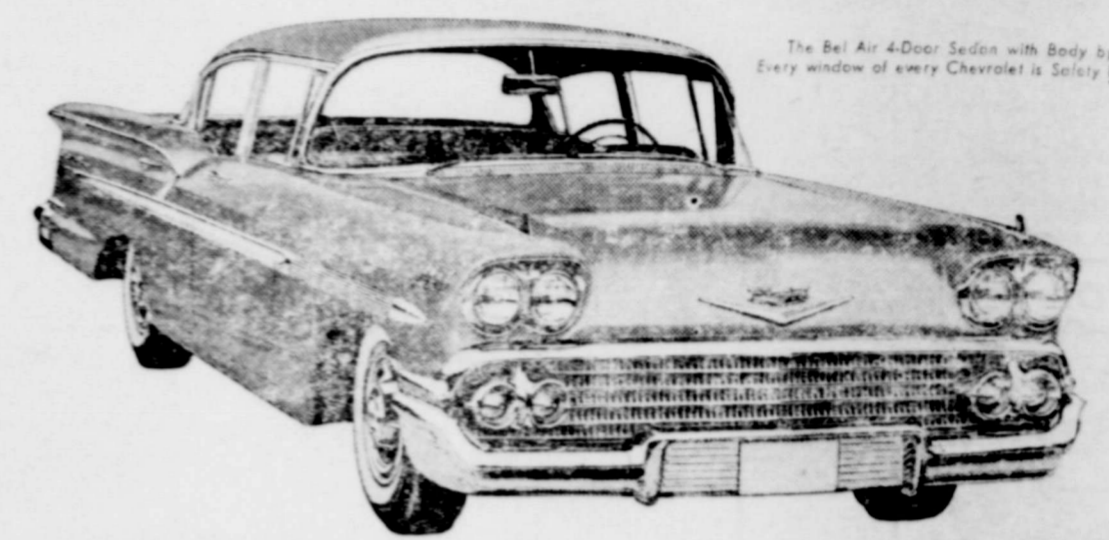

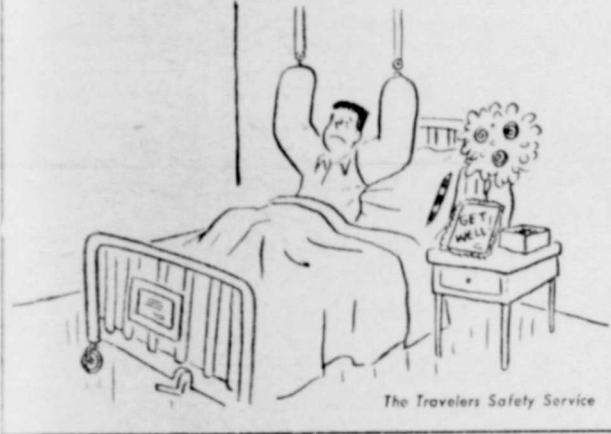

McDermott employed Phillips 66 Agricultural Ammonia, the 82 per cent nitrogen fertilizer.

While making this application, he purposely skipped a small acreage in order to get a comparison on yields.

The fertilizer was chiseled in on 20-inch centers at about a depth of 6 inches.

Then in February of this year, McDermott seeded the total acreage at the rate of about 100 pounds of barley to the acre.

The area had been watered twice.

No bushel-per-acre yield is available yet but a check Tuesday showed the land not fertilized with anhydrous ammonia producing stalks slightly more than half the height of the fertilized area. A casual glance is all that is necessary to see the difference.

And, after the barley is harvested, McDermott plans to run the land to small grain, fertilized with nitrogen, and hopes to harvest the small grain and have the acreage back in barley by next February.

Two crops per year normal yield. And what does all this offer in the way of information to South Plains farmers — the experiment proves the necessity of adding nitrogen to soil that has had humus applied.

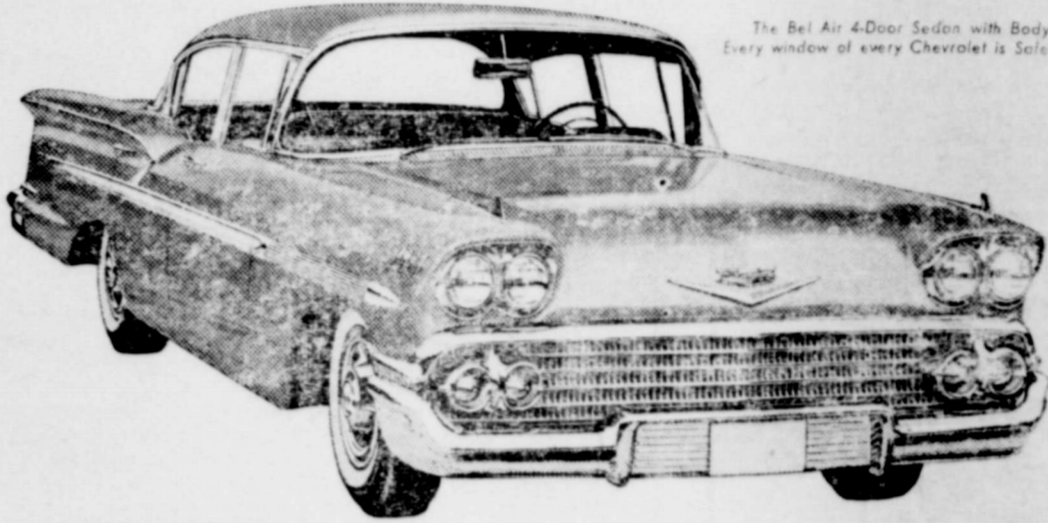

The committee is in Washington this week to testify at Hearings on Public Law 78. W. T. Millen, Muleshoe, Chairman of the PCG Committee, said sentiment among Labor Department officials seems to have changed and the officials now recognize the seriousness of the agricultural labor picture. 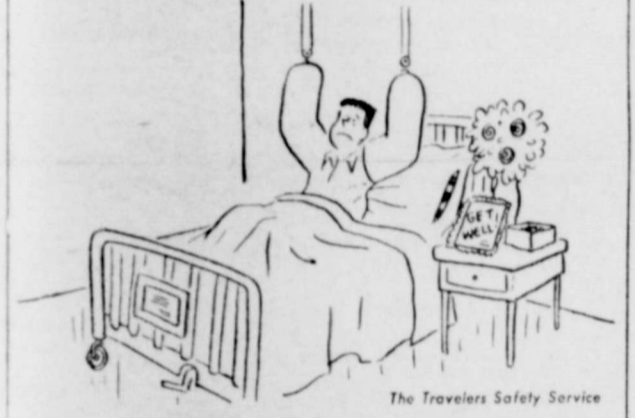

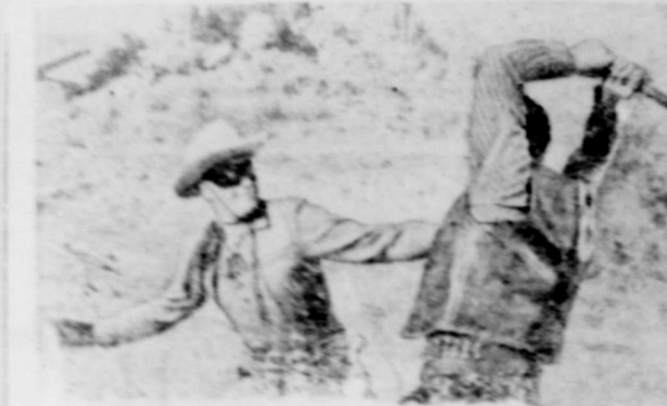
