



Coca-Cola Enters New Phase of Colorful History

Morton is now helping launch a new bottler that may well go round the world eventually.

The King size Coca-Cola bottle, now on sale here, is the "big brother" to the present 6 1/2 oz. bottle, which is known from Boston to Bangkok and back again.

Its fame is such that, during World War II, a German prisoner, slipping off the gangplank at an American port, spotted a familiar red sign and, turning to an MP, said: "I see you have Coca-Cola here, too."

The soft drink is sold in over 90 countries and territories, according to John Alford, manager of the Coca-Cola Bottling Co., of Littlefield. "Just about everywhere," he added, "except behind the Iron Curtain."

But in at least one instance the curtain was pierced, Alford points out. That was when Gen. Eisenhower sent Marshall Zhukov a case of Coca-Cola after the Soviet military leader enjoyed a bottle at the Potsdam Conference.

Alford said definitely the "big brother" would not replace the standard size bottle, designed in 1915 at the recommendation of a bottling official who urged: "We need a Coca-Cola bottle which a person will recognize even if he sees it in the dark. It should be so shaped that, even if broken, a person could tell at a glance what it was."

Although about 80 per cent of all the Coca-Cola sold is in bottles, the man who invented the drink never intended it to be more than a soda fountain beverage. In 1886 John S. Pemberton, a druggist, prepared a soft drink syrup in his back yard in Atlanta, Ga., using a three legged iron pot heated by a wood fire.

He took a jug of the syrup to Jacob's Pharmacy at the historic Five Points, where soda water was added and the new drink was put on sale.

The first year only 25 gallons were sold, bringing in \$50.00. Of this, Pemberton spent \$47 on advertising. Most of it consisted of oilcloth signs pinned to drugstore awnings.

When Pemberton died two years later, rights to Coca-Cola were bought by a 37-year-old wholesale drug salesman, Asa Candler.

"Back in Candler's day the Coca-Cola Company changed offices several times," Alford said. "One time when it moved a one-horse wagon carried all the firm's equipment & furniture."

Candler was a keen merchandiser. He originated the Coca-Cola poster and calendar, using Lillian Russell's picture on one of them. He was the first to use the slogan, "Delicious and Refreshing," which appeared in 1889. And to get the public acquainted with the new drink, he gave away millions of tickets for free Cokes.

"They tell me in Atlanta," Alford said, "that even today someone comes across one of the tickets in an attic. If they send it in, they get a free case of Coca-Cola."

It was 13 years after Pemberton invented Coca-Cola before the drink was bottled. A young Chattanooga lawyer, Ben Thompson, who had come across a locally bottled soft drink in Cuba during the Spanish American War, hit upon the idea. He and another lawyer, Joseph Whitehead, went to Atlanta & asked Candler if they could bottle Coca-Cola.

Candler, busy with his soda fountain sales, gave them the bottling rights to practically the entire country. This was one of the most amazing contracts in history — Thomas and Whitehead didn't pay a cent. And the man who had given them a letter of introduction to Candler, didn't think enough of the product to ask for even a single share of it for himself.

Alford pointed out the early bottling equipment was far different from today's. "Bottles were washed by dropping buckshot in them

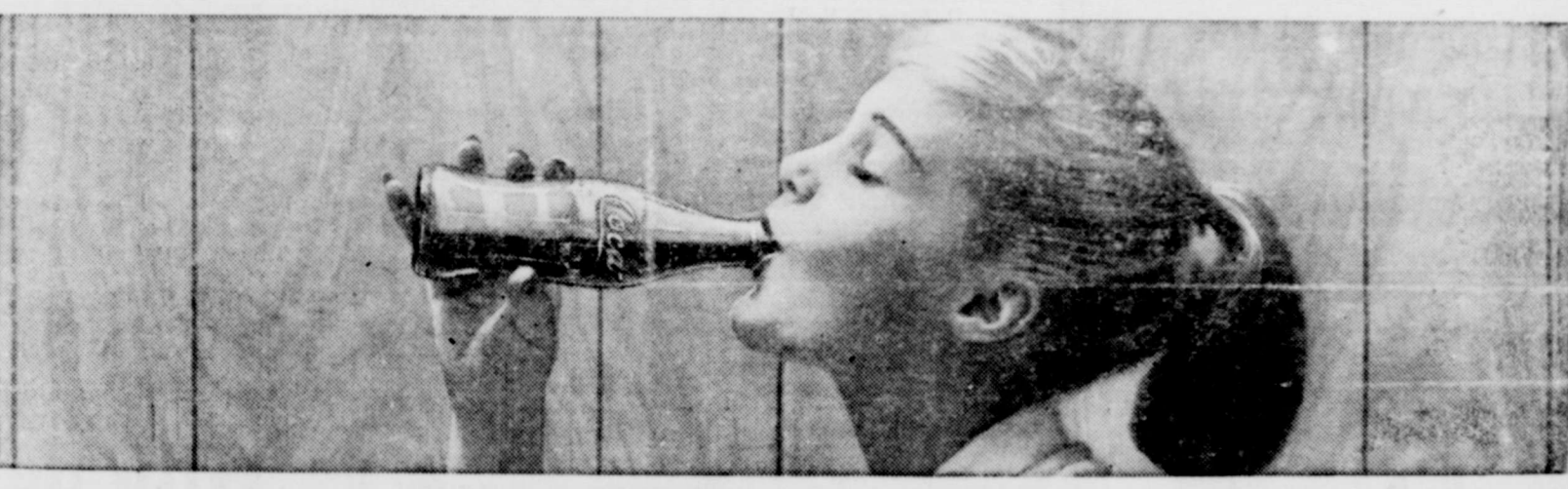

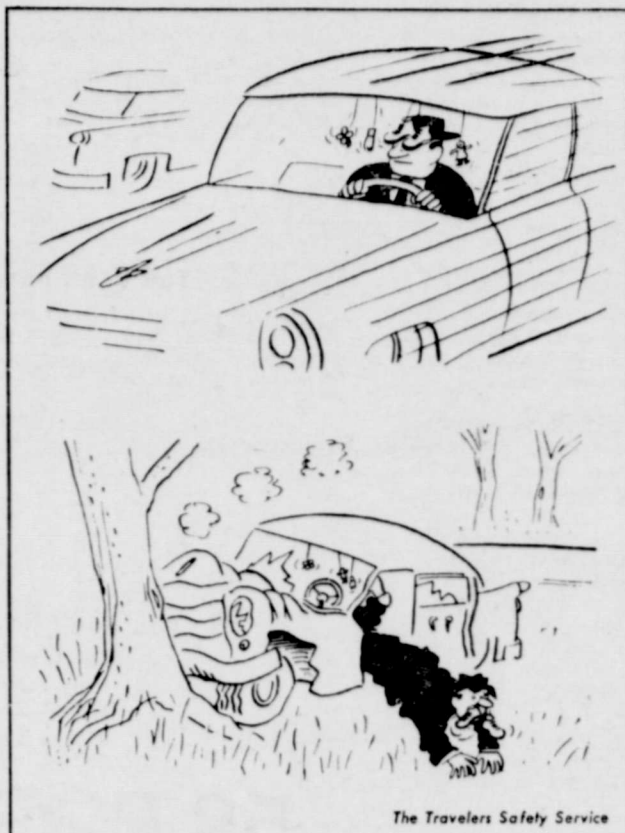

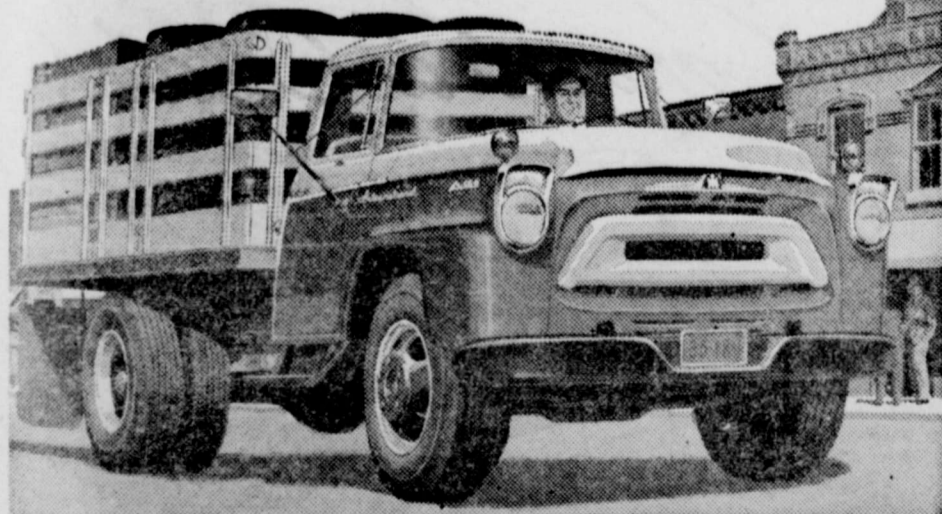

All this form shows your name, address, number of gallons used times 3 cents which will give your total claim and you sign it. This is all that you need to send to the revenue department. Be sure to keep your receipt for your file in the event the director calls on you to substantiate this claim.

By HOMER E. THOMPSON CATTLE BREEDERS

The beef cattle short course is scheduled for August 11, 12, and 13, 1958, College Station, Texas. In general there is explained carcass composition, demonstrations on fertility testing of bulls, pregnancy checking of cows and discussion on how these are used.

Other discussions will include artificial insemination in beef cattle, diseases affecting reproductive performance of cattle, use of records in selecting breeding cattle, marketing feeder and stocker cattle, contract feeding in beef cattle, a new method of supplemental feeding for range cattle, and systematic insecticides for parasite control.

There is to be a selected bull feeding test at Aledo Feed Lots, Inc., Aledo, Texas. If any of you want to test your bulls that you want tested contact W. A. King, Sec. - Mgr., 114 East 8th Street, Ft. Worth, Texas. There are two beginning dates — first test, July 1, 1958 and 2nd test, August 18, 1958. Birth dates for calves to be eligible are between Sept. 1, 1957 and Dec. 31, 1957. The delivery date for bulls to Aledo Feed Lots, First test, July 1, 1958, and Second test, August 22, 1958.

QUALITY COTTON

This is to stress quality cotton. The South Plains farmers can grow quality cotton. We must watch our planting dates, varieties, insect control, not irrigating too late, and harvesting when ready, not too wet, or tramping in track or if you will stop to look back in the past at what happened you remember we get in too big a hurry — plant while the ground is cold, plant when the soil is too wet to plow — sounds odd, but it did happen this year. These conditions and things have set back other cotton, this seedling diseases over pressure in cold, damp ground, from 2 to 4 weeks. To gain time we must stop this sort of thing from happening. The human element can be more serious than any insect.

Extra rewards are awaiting the good quality cotton producer this year, while the discounts are going to be stiff for the poor quality cotton producer.

The quantity of low grade cotton set over from the 1957 crop will continue to depress the market price for lower grades produced this year. The present outlook for 1958 crop indicates a continued shortage for high grade fibre. Careful management and harvest practices can improve your quality and quality — it must be to make money this year.

Quality can be maintained if these practices are included in the management. These are — weed control, disease and insect control, fertilization at rates based on Extension Service recommendations, irrigation for good maturity with reference to cut-off dates, careful
