

tions back to earth. Because copper is an excellent conductor of electricity, it plays a vital role in guidance systems and radio transmitters. In the missile and on the ground, copper will be involved in the origination, transmission and re-

ception of radio communication. The red metal has been identified with communications from the most distant recorded days of antiquity. It was copper from which Egyptians made "pencils" with which to write on clay tablets. Copper was the chief ingredient in the brass horns used to summon his army from miles around by Alexander the Great. Churches, of course, have since the ninth century made bells of copper and bronze.




