New Whiteface Superintendent Has 20 Years of Teaching Experience

Weldon A. Skinner, former superintendent of Schools at O'Donnell, for the past four years, has accepted a contract with the Whiteface Independent Schools at Whiteface, on Monday, July 1st. He will be Superintendent of Schools at Whiteface, replacing Nathan Tubbs, who recently resigned to accept a position as Registrar of South Plains College, Levelland.

Skinner started his teaching career in 1938 at Post where he served until 1946 as teacher, elementary principal and high school principal. During the tenure at Post, Mr. Skinner served four years in the U. S. Army Air Force.

In 1946 he moved to Abilene as a Training Specialist for the Veterans' Administration where he worked for 5 years on the campuses of the three colleges in Abilene.

In 1951, Mr. Skinner returned to the public school field as high school principal at Spur. He served in that capacity 3 years, coming to O'Donnell in 1954 as Superintendent of Schools.

Moving to Whiteface with him will be his wife and two sons, David, 14, and Daniel, 6.

Three Way School Appoints Custodian For Coming Year

Floyd Richardson is to be the custodian for the coming year at Three Way Schools, Superintendent Archie Sims announced this week.

Richardson was hired after a regular meeting of the School Board, June 30th. The board also selected the firm of Williams and Merriman of Mulhouse to make the school audit for Three Way District this year.

An annual audit of the school funds is required by Texas Education Agency. Mr. Williams, who will be in charge of the audit, is a certified public accountant.

At a previous meeting the board elected one teacher and set Sept. 8, as the official date for the opening of school for the 1958-59 school year. The board also voted to have one week for Christmas holidays.

Three Morton Men In Advance Group As Summer Encampment Opens

St. Richard D. Key, Spl. Wilson E. Hodge, and Sp2 Wiley C. Hodge, all of Morton, are among the members of an advance detail group from Lubbock to Ft. Bliss near El Paso. They left Lubbock July 3, two days ahead of the rest of their unit.

They are all members of the 413th Civil Affairs Military Government Company who will begin two weeks' annual training at Ft. Bliss July 5.

Lt. Colonel Homer E. Thompson, of Morton, the unit's commander, stated, "This is the time when we find out whether we have been conducting training correctly on Tuesday nights at the armory. It's the final examination following a year's study of military tactics and governmental functions."

A review of basic army subjects — carbine and pistol firing, compass, guerrilla tactics, motor march, chemical - bacteriological warfare, proficiency tests, and the like will consume most of the first part of the week.

All of this training will be put to use the second week when the company, along with the 221st CAMG Group of Albuquerque and the 490th CAMG Company of Abilene, moves out of the post area to undergo a Field Training Exercise, "Assault II."

The reservists will be in the field most of that week conducting a simulated occupation of a foreign country, under post - combat conditions.

Eugene Bragg Will Obtain Divinity Degree

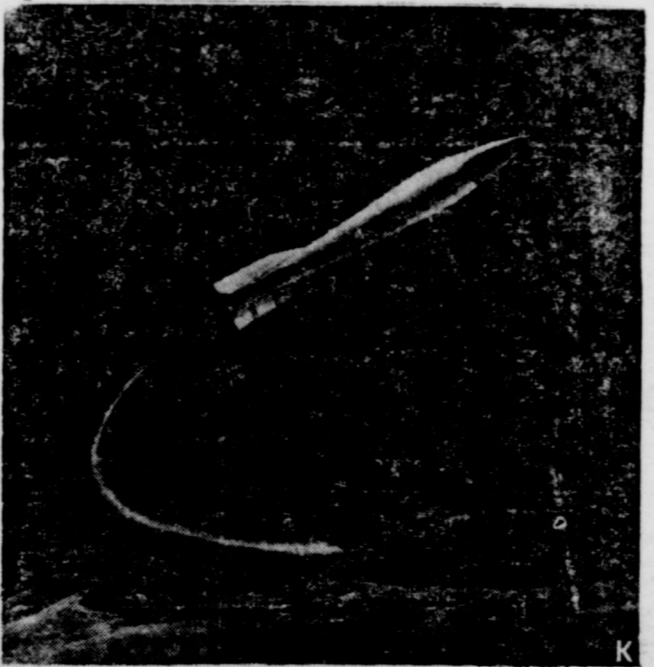

Nitrogen Is One of Three Primary Plant Foods; Without it, They Die

Nitrogen is one of the three primary plant foods. Without it plants will not grow and produce little or no fruit. A prolonged deficiency may even cause death.

Plants take up nitrogen through their roots in the form of ammonia nitrate. However, not many plants use the ammonia form.

Nitrogen is oxidized first to nitrite by the rhizobium bacteria clover, which is poisonous to plants. Rhizobium, another species of bacteria, oxidize nitrate to the form which the plants use.

Some algae, particularly the blue-green species, can cause nitrogen deficiency through this same reaction. The requirement is that the soil be moist and at a warm temperature. For this reason it matters little what form of nitrogen is applied to the soil, except that the soluble forms can be more readily leached out in a sandy soil. This is only true if the soil receives an over supply of water.

The fertilizer industry utilizes several compounds containing nitrogen. Of these compounds ammonia, urea, sewage sludge, garbage, and fish scrap are most commonly used. All of these compounds must be converted to the nitrate form so the only important factor to be considered is the price per pound of nitrogen.

A combination of a fast oxidizing compound and a slow oxidizing compound would be more efficient. A fast oxidizing compound for immediate utilization and the slow

oxidizing compound to retain the nitrogen level required.

Research at Texas A & M has shown that cotton requires approximately 43 pounds of actual nitrogen to produce a bale of cotton per acre. This does not include the requirement for the growth of the stalk.

Most soils of Texas are deficient of nitrogen. The only way soils can obtain nitrogen is from the air, which is approximately 80 percent nitrogen, and from decayed animal and vegetable matter. The amount of nitrate formed from these two sources is far too small for profitable yields. Therefore our soils must be supplemented with any inexpensive source of nitrogen fertilizers.

Attempt to Get Fast Freight Service From Dallas Area

Two Morton businessmen appeared before representatives of the Texas Railroad Commission last week in Dallas seeking to secure for this area overnight freight service from the Dallas-Ft. Worth area and all points in-between.

The men were H. S. Hawkins of Hawkins Oldsmobile Company, and Don Allsup of Allsup Chevrolet Company. Allsup pointed out here this week that if the service was secured, firms in Morton could call Dallas late in the afternoon of one day, placing an order, and secure the order by early the next morning. The shipments, providing a fast express service on emergency and hurry-up shipments, would be carried by the O. and A. Film Lines which now serve the Morton area with daily newspapers, motion picture films, and theatre supplies.

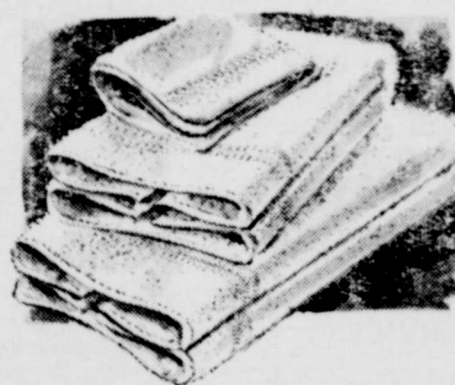
