**COTTON IRRIGATION**

Cotton irrigation must be timed according to the rate of water use in relation to plant development. Keep these principles in mind — from the time cotton is planted to first 40 days of age it will use less than 3.0 inch of water per day. Sprouting begins about 4 days of age. From sprouting to first bloom stage or about 75 days of age cotton will use from 3.0 to 3.4 inch of water per day. Now at the peak bloom stage from 80 to 120 days of age cotton will use 3.4 to 4.0 inch of water per day. This is your peak water use period. The first crop

bell will occur at 120 days of age. When 140 to 160 days of age cotton should be harvested. From 120 to 140 days cotton will use about 1/2 the amount of water as it did in the peak bloom stages, or 80 to 120 days of age.

The critical period for water is 16 to 20 days after blooming. The fiber length is laid down first, water stress slows down the growth of the entire plant. In a 13 to 20 day period when bolls are forming the rate of fiber elongation will result in production of short fibre.

When to irrigate — Cotton should be irrigated just before the root zone of the soil no longer contains sufficient moisture to supply the need of the plant. From a practical standpoint, the irrigator can not wait until the entire field reaches this point, therefore irrigation should begin earlier, or when half the moisture in root zone has been depleted.

The high quality fiber develops from the forms which appear early in the life of the cotton plant.  
Most of these soils locally will hold from 1 to 1 1/2 inches of water per foot of soil. This means more frequent water applications. Generally speaking two good post season irrigations are required. If season planting moisture was up to full field capacity, irrationally speaking heavy irrigation is needed between July 10 and 25, as peak bloom stage, and perhaps again in August, from the 8th to the 20th. Little weels can pump regularly from July 10 to Aug. 20. Beware of late watering — that is, Aug. 25 to Sept. 5. Irrigation applied late in the season delays maturity, and encourages excessive vegetative growth and the expense of boll set, especially when fertilized at the high nitrogen level.

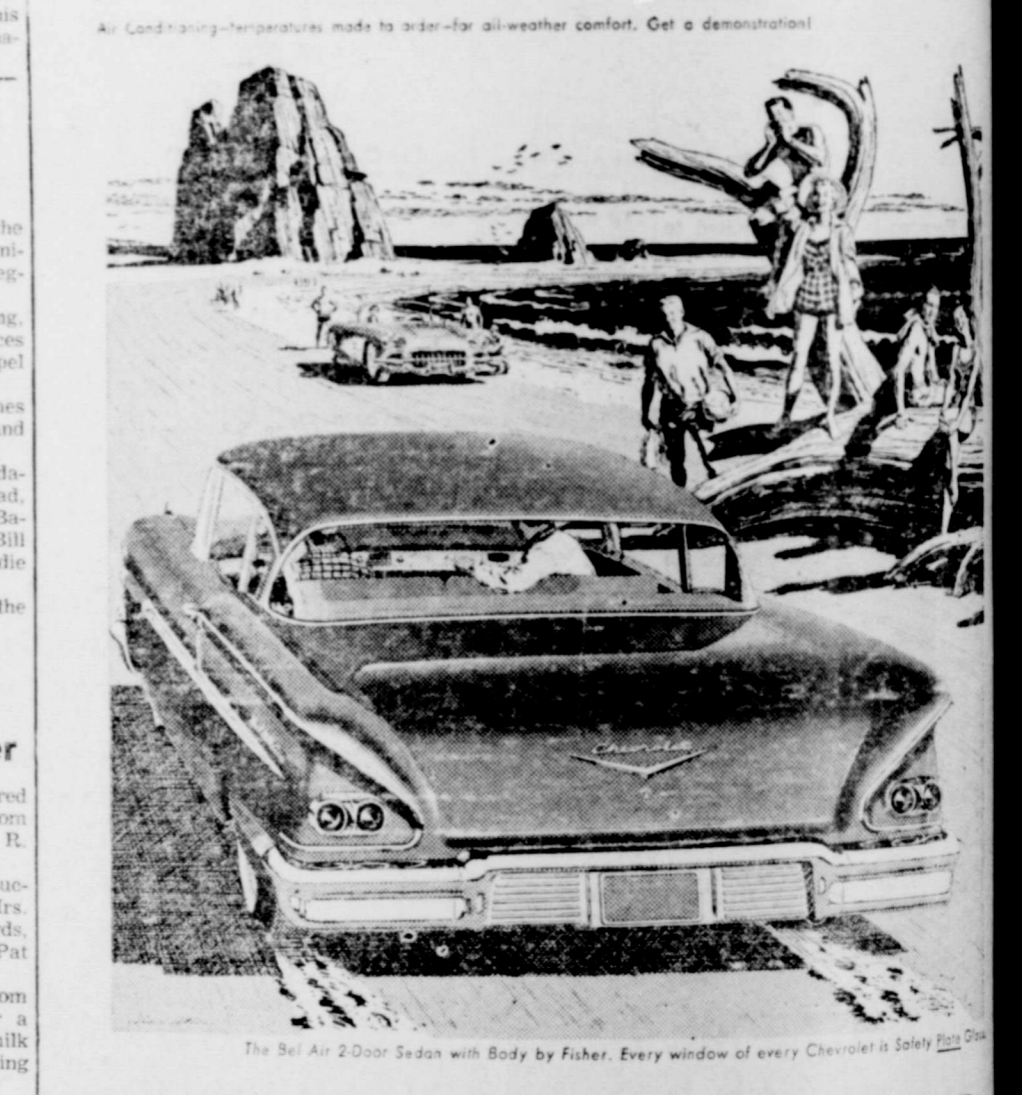

### Auto Insurance Rates Headed For Increase

Don't rush your insurance agent now — but auto insurance rates are due to go up in Texas come August 1.

The new rates will not effect policies now in force until the policies are renewed.

The new rates are not uniform throughout the state, varying according to the various counties and their accident rates, but they are uniform within the county.

Incidentally, Cochran County's rates will rise slightly less than rates in Lubbock County.

The increase on family autos here, for drivers over 25 years of age, is approximately 20 per cent, while for autos driven by persons under 25 years of age, the increase is approximately 40 per cent.

The rates are set by the State Insurance Commission following hearings.

And, why are they going up? The state board places the blame on too many accidents, increased cost of repair work, increased cost of autos, and the higher awards made by juries in actions for damages.

**National Polio Foundation Turns to Research Against Other Diseases**

Ever since victory over polio became possible through the Salk vaccine, the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis has been seeking a way to utilize its knowledge, strengths and skills in a broader health service to the American people. Charles Jones, county foundation chairman, announced this week.

Now the foundation has outlined its new program, a broadside attack against major diseases problems based on an entirely new concept of a voluntary organization as a flexible force in the field of health.

Henceforth, most big national health organizations have concentrated their efforts on single diseases. This proved to be a sound approach, as no organization knows better than "The Polio Foundation," which in 20 years produced a preventive for paralytic polio.

But, in defeating polio, the foundation has done far more than solve this one problem. For medical research is an interlocking and overlapping proposition. In solving one problem, much basic research must be done attacking a host of other problems, other ailments. Thus the foundation virus research made history not only by development of the Salk vaccine, but by illuminating the world of viruses in general — today's most challenging area for medical discovery.

It is a perfectly logical step for the organization to move ahead from polio, a virus disease of the central nervous system, to other virus diseases and central nervous system disorders as well as unsolved health problems like arthritis and congenital malformations, which cause serious crippling.
