## School Budget Ready, Hearing Set; New Board Member Is Appointed

A proposed new budget, the setting of a public hearing on the proposed budget, the naming of a new board member, the abolishment of school-sponsored senior trips, and an in-service program for teachers were the highlights of Monday night's regular monthly meeting of the Morton Independent School Board of Education.

In-between-times members enjoyed home-made icecream and cake.

Attending the meeting were Peggy Houston, president of the board; Roy Brown, secretary; Jack Wallace, Raymond Ross, O. B. Hackett, Babe Vanlandingham, and Superintendent John Brown.

The proposed budget for the 1958-59 school year is some \$362,000, slightly under last year, the superintendent explained.

A public hearing on the proposed budget has been scheduled for a call meeting of the board next Monday night, August 18, at 8 p.m. in the board room at the Junior High building.

Lloyd Miller, top runner-up in the last school board election here, was named to fill the post vacated recently by the resignation of Gene Thompson. The motion to name the top runner-up to the post, a solution which has been employed by other boards, was made by Hackett and second by Vanlandingham. It carried unanimously.

Regarding the senior trips, the board approved a motion that the senior class trip, under sponsorship of the school, be abolished, and all funds raised as a school function by the senior class—including such projects as the concession stand and senior play—be deposited in the High School activity fund and shall be under the direction of the board.

The board took into consideration that any outside activities by members of the class could or would be parent sponsored, and carried on apart from the school.

The board also asked for bids on a small house located on the east half of block 19, Morton. The building has served as a home for teachers of the East Elementary.

The superintendent announced plans for an in-service program for teachers Aug. 25-26-27. Registration for students will be Friday.

## Auto Crashes at Enochs Writes Tragic Note for One Family Reunion; Interrupts Plans for Another One

Two carloads of persons bound for Sunday family reunions, were sidetracked in two separate auto accidents at Enochs Sunday morning, three hours apart, and tragedy was read into one of the mishaps when a 73 year old Anton woman was killed.

Both accidents occurred at the intersection of State Highway 214 and Farm - to - Market Road 54, and both involved the running of a stop sign.

Mrs. Annie Lee Shepperd, 73, of Anton, a passenger in a car driven by her son-in-law, Alvin Alec Duncan, 51, of Farmington N. M., died enroute to the Cochran County Hospital, Duncan, his wife Ruby, Edith Shepperd, 44 years old, and the Duncan's son, Terry, 6, were only slightly injured. They were taken to a Lubbock Hospital. The body of Mrs. Shepperd was embalmed at Morton and then taken to Lubbock where services were held Tuesday.

Duncan was driving a 1954 Ford which was traveling west on the Farm Road at 6:35 a.m. and ran the stop sign. It skidded approximately 14 steps before smashing into a car driven by James William Otte, 60, a Muleshoe area carpenter. Otte, his wife, & a daughter were also injured, the wife seriously, and were taken to a Muleshoe Hospital. His 1954 Mercury and the Ford were both demolished.

Three hours later, at 10:30 a.m., a Lincoln driven by Willard Cox of Morton, traveling north on Highway 214, taking a brother of Mr. Cox' to catch a train at Clovis, was smashed into by a car driven by Herman A. Diricksen, 37, a 1st Lt. at Clovis Air Force Base, who was headed toward Littlefield for another family reunion.

No one was hurt in this mishap but investigating Highway Patrolman, T. A. Rowland, estimated the damage at \$350 to \$400.

A short time after the first mishap occurred, other relatives from Levelland, heading for the same reunion, came through Morton and noticed some of Duncan's folks as they were placing long distance phone calls from the booth on the square, and there learned about the death of Mrs. Shepperd. Other members of Duncan's family were in another car following behind, and this may have narrowly escaped death.

Services begin each morning at 10 and evening services at 8, preceded by a prayer meeting at 7:30. The revival will continue through August 17.

The men have talked but have

refused to sign a statement.

Gurley and Jarvis have recently lived in Wichita Falls. Sheriff Hazel Hancock said, but Tuesday, he had received no replies in his attempts to find if the men were wanted anywhere else.

## Bula Farmer Harvests Maize

The first load of 1958 maize, believed to be one of the earliest in history to be reported on the South Plains, was brought to a Littlefield Grain elevator on August 8th by Jim Pat Claunch of Bula.

The maize was harvested on young Claunch's parent's dry land farm near Bula. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Jim Claunch.

It was a top yield—2,000 pounds per acre—for a dryland crop.

Doyle Dean, owner of the elevator, said it was about two weeks earlier than last year's load, and the earliest he could remember.

The early load brought \$1.75, or 15 cents above market price. Dean also gave a \$100 bonus.

Dean said the moisture in the grain wasn't bad for an early haul, only 15 per cent.

Claunch, who has about 600 acres in grain, planted DeKalb hybrid seed, C-44-A, April 28. The first load came off seven acres in a 53-acre patch.

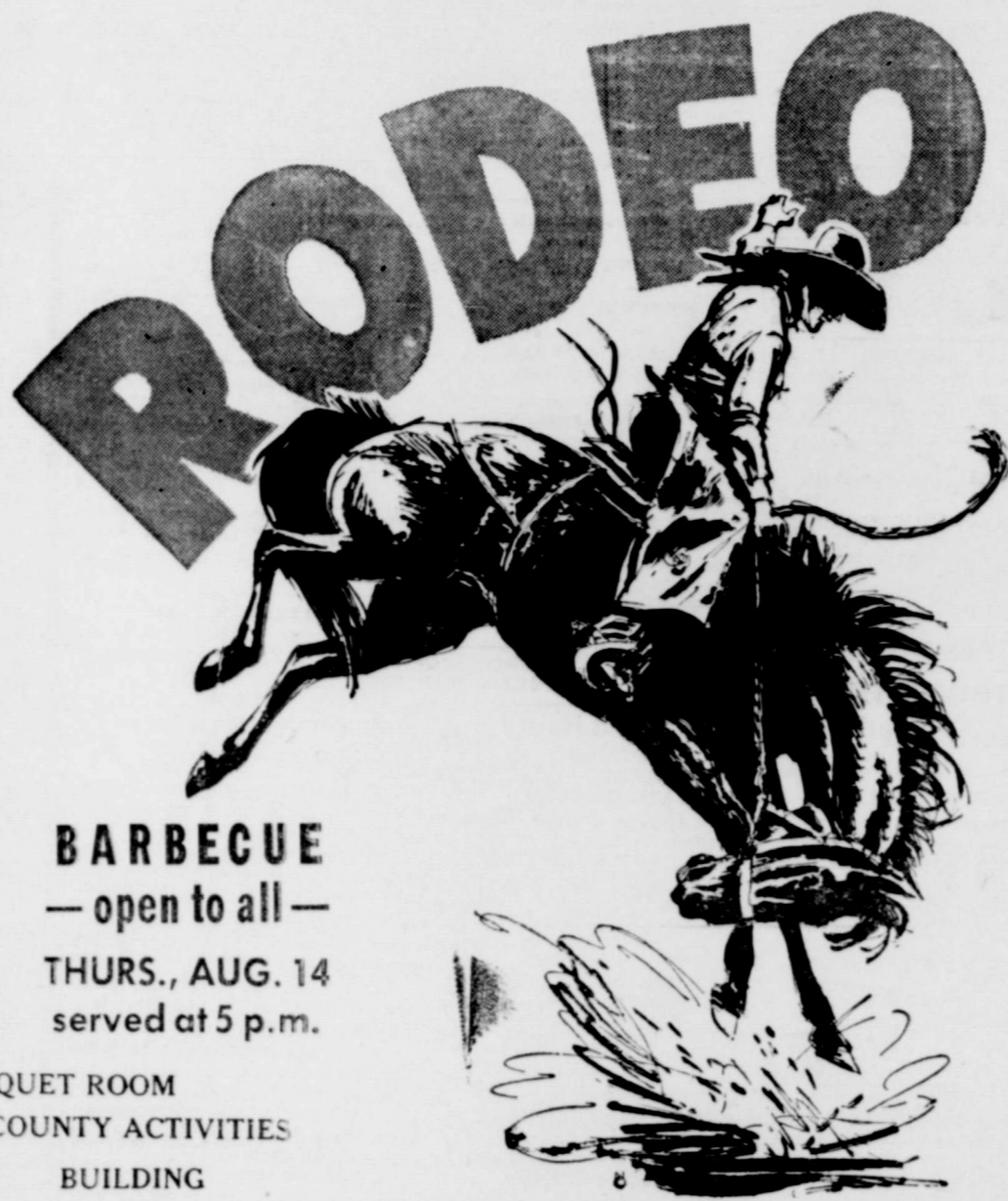

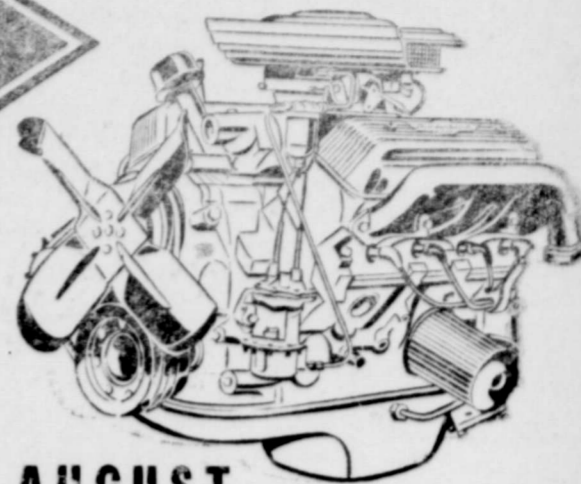

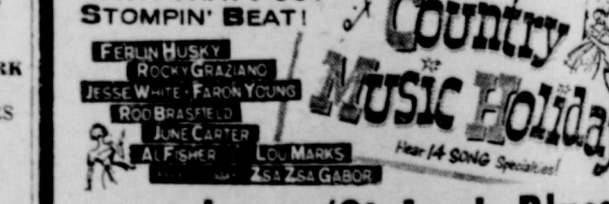
