Also, he said that he believes the current school year will end with very little, if any, in the red—which remains with a \$36,000.00 operating deficit two years ago at this time, he continued.

A breakdown of expenditures shows \$22,070.00 for administration, this includes the tax office staff.

Instruction, \$210,025.00, this is for the teaching staff and principals.

Health service, \$500.00, this is for supplies and medical equipment for the health office.

Pupil transportation, \$30,100.00, includes the salaries of bus drivers, bus foreman's salary, and operational costs.

Operation of plant, \$29,800.00, salaries of maintenance men, utilities, and supplies.

Maintenance of plant, \$5,000.00, for outside repairs and work.

Fixed charges, \$4,700.00, includes first payment on five year insurance plan.

Capital outlay, \$17,000.00, general improvements, includes street and fence improvements now underway.

Debt service, \$43,500.00, principle and interest on bonds.

**Receipts:**

Revenue from local sources, \$132,500.00, this is based on an approximate \$7 million evaluation of property in the district at the \$2.00 rate with collections figured at 93 percent.

Revenue from state sources, \$192,500.00, this is the per capita student allowance which is down to \$75.00 per student from \$83.00 per student last year. Also, this includes some \$21,000.00 from the state for transportation, \$88,000.00 state-aid on salaries, and \$1000 for vocational work.

Revenue from county sources, \$40,000.00 from the county equalization school tax.

The superintendent announced that the annual school audit by an outside auditor would begin September 2.

later than September 4th.

Upon being notified that his lease was terminated here, Dr. Brown spent considerable money in securing blueprints and architectural drawings on the proposed clinic. He had recently said the financial backing was nearly complete when the land he had planned to build on was found to have a clouded title. It would have taken considerable time and money to secure the clear title necessary, he said.

Dr. Brown, leaving Morton, is only the latest in a long series of physicians who have moved to Morton and left after a few years, bitter and disillusioned over "situations" which, as Dr. Brown put it, "arrive so frequently." He had practiced in Morton at the Cochran County Hospital for the past six years.

In a letter to the Tribune, Dr. Brown wrote, in part:

"Although the precipitating urge to relocate was the multiple difficulties which arose in the establishment of the Medical Center in Morton (and that I had considered staying in the community only if such a Medical Center could be established) I doubt seriously if the establishment of a Medical Center would affect very much the medical practice within the community. The so frequent "situations" which arose combined with such a transient patient volume left much to be desired relative to the permanent establishment of a desirable medical practice within the community. This situation, I doubt, will ever be improved one way or the other."

Also discussed was the proposed paving of some additional blocks at the same time the school area was being paved but the price quoted was believed to be more than residence owners would be willing to pay.

The Secretary was urged to get further estimates. The City hired Grover Edgar to represent the City in a case tried Tuesday morning involving a charge of racing with a motor vehicle. They also decided to look further into the possibility of hiring Edgar as City Attorney, on a retainer basis.

**Capsule View of Amendments You'll Be Voting On Next November**

In this issue of the Morton Tribune there appears the full text of the Constitutional Amendments to be voted on at the General Election, November 4, 1958. So that you may be fully informed we urge that you read each proposed measure in its entirety, and study all of them carefully before you go to the polls to cast your vote.

A brief digest of the nine amendments follows:

**NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT (HJR 1)** — Provides for annual sessions of the legislature, changing the compensation, per diem and travel expenses of members of the legislature and authorizing temporary residence of the Lieutenant Governor and Speaker of the House in the Capitol Building.

**NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT (SJR 6)** — Authorizes each county to establish, after approval by its voters, a retirement, disability and death compensation fund covering the elective officers of the county or precinct, as well as the appointive officers and employees of the county or precinct.

**NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT (HJR 3)** — Provides that vacancies in the office of County Judge and Justices of the Peace shall be filled by the Commissioners Court only until the next General Election.

**NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT (HJR 31)** — Provides that any District, County, or Precinct official serving a four-year term must resign before announcing for a different office if there remains unserved more than one (1) year of the term for which he was elected.

**NUMBER FIVE ON THE BALLOT (HJR 48)** — Provides that a Home Rule City may provide by Charter Provision, and a City operating under the general laws may provide by majority vote, for a longer term of office than two (2) years for its officers, either elective or appointive, or both not to exceed four years.

**NUMBER SIX ON THE BALLOT (HJR 17)** — Provides for pension to retired Texas Rangers who are ineligible to participate in the Employees Retirement System of Texas, and their widows.

**NUMBER SEVEN ON THE BALLOT (SJR 4)** — Authorizes the Legislature to make appropriations and establish procedure for advertising the historical, natural, agricultural, industrial, educational, recreational and other resources of Texas.

**NUMBER EIGHT ON THE BALLOT (HJR 36)** — Gives the Legislature the power to authorize vendor payments for medical care in addition to the amount paid in the form of direct public assistance to and on behalf of needy recipients of Old Age Assistance, Aid to the Blind, Aid to Dependent Children, or Aid to the Permanently and Totally Disabled; providing for the acceptance of funds from the Federal Government for the purpose of paying such assistance.

**NUMBER NINE ON THE BALLOT (SJR 3)** — Authorizes the Legislature to create a Hospital District coextensive with the incorporated limits to the City of Amarillo, Texas, and a county wide Hospital District in Wichita County, Texas, and Hospital Districts in Jefferson County, Texas.

**Hamilton Seeking Strong Vote**

The leading candidate for the Supreme Court in the first primary has issued a statement urging all voters to take personal interest in the run-off election to be held Saturday.

Robert W. Hamilton, who led ticket by more than 160,000 votes the first primary, said: "Each candidate is best qualified, and sure to take time to vote on Saturday, remembering that the Supreme Court has a greater effect upon our rights as individuals than any other office in our state or nation. Texas is the only state which allows its voters the privilege of voting upon members of its Supreme Court and Texas voters should express their preference in this election, although in some cases this will be the only race on the ballot."

**S. Plains College Announces Date For Dev. Tests**

General Education Development tests are scheduled to be given at 8 a.m. Sept. 3 and 4 at South Plains College in Levelland, Nathan Tubb, Registrar, announced this week.

The tests are given for the following purposes:

1. To obtain a high school equivalency diploma issued by the Texas Education Agency.
2. For college entrance requirements.
3. For the employment requirements of many companies and corporations.

There are five tests covering grammar, literature, history, science, and mathematics. The average time for taking the five tests is from six to 10 hours. There is no time limit, however.

Since the tests are of high school level rather than specific knowledge, specific preparation is not advised.

Veterans over 18 years of age and non-veterans over 21 years of age may take the examinations. All persons taking the tests must have a birth certificate as proof of age before a diploma will be issued. Veterans will also be required to furnish a copy of their service record.

The cost for taking this examination is \$10.

Persons who cannot be present Sept. 3 or 4 may write or phone the registrar for an appointment.
