## Three Way Okays School Budget; Sets Same Tax Rate; Personal Property Valuation Is Dropped Slightly

The Three Way School Board met in regular session, Thursday night, August 14th, and okayed a budget of \$106,084.00.

The board set the tax rate the same as last year — 1.05 for maintenance and .40 for sinking fund. Mr. Sims will collect the taxes but plans of the board at the present time are to hire a tax assessor-collector for the 1959 school year.

Mrs. C. H. Silvers captured the County and District Clerk Post in Saturday's Second Democratic Primary by polling 657 votes to her opponent, Mrs. Pat Smith's, 564.

The vote, 1161, following the trend of absentee votes, was unusually heavy for a second primary — attributable to the fact that four important County races were to be decided. In fact the Morton vote was proportionately small compared to the votes in the other three voting precincts, & the other five voting boxes, each of which had a Commissioner's Race to decide in addition to their vote in the Clerk's race. Morton had only the one local post to vote on.

Cochran County supported Robert W. Hamilton in the race for Associate Justice, Place One, giving him 809 votes, 92 less than in the First Primary and giving J. Edwin Smith 209, an increase of 11.

High interest was noted in the Commissioner races but only one was close. R. Z. (Sonny) Dewbre, incumbent from Precinct Four, will remain in office on the strength of a 98 to 85 vote margin over B. R. (Brad) Stovall. Stovall gained 40 votes in the Second Primary, but Dewbre also managed to gain 24, and herein lay his margin of victory.

In Precinct Two, Leland Scifres outpolled Commissioner G. C. Keith by a 185 to 102 margin for an

**RAT CONTROL**

With fall and winter approaching, here come the rats heading for the barns and granaries. You have a choice, contribute about \$20 a rat, if you can afford to give them such charity, which they will collect with no effort on your part; or take a little time to give them a good rat bait. For rat control measures, see your dealer or County Agent.

**BRUCELLLOSIS (Bang's Disease)**

Information recently released by the U.S.D.A. reveals that the states of Michigan and New Mexico have been declared modified certified Bruceellosis free states. Thirteen other states have already been so declared.

For a state to qualify for certification, not more than one per cent of all cattle and not more than 5 percent of all herds can be infected with the disease.

Milk production in a badly infected herd often drops as much as twenty per cent, and calf production may drop as much as forty percent in either beef or dairy herds.

Texas is of the remaining 34 states yet to be certified and is one of 7 states that does not have one or more certified counties within the state.

**GRAIN SORGHUM STORAGE**

Grain sorghum storage almost pays for itself in two years.

G. D. Lewis, a farmer in the Lehman Community (Scrape-Out) built grain storage in 1952. Grain sorghum is good home and farm improvement investment. In 1953 Mr. Lewis constructed two large bins parallel to each other. Each bin was a 12 foot x 24 foot structure. These bins were 24 feet apart, and being parallel, Lewis decided to construct a tall sloping roof between the two bins, thus forming a hallway. This was used for his implement shed and other storage.

The cost of the entire material was \$750. He did all the work by himself. The two bins held 2,000,000 pounds of grain. The first year he filled the bins with grain sorghum. He put the grain in the OCC loan and received 20 cents per hundred for storage of his own grain. This paid \$400 for storage the first year. The second year the stored grain was retained in storage. He was given 10 cents per hundred for the second year's storage or \$200. The \$600 for storage the first two years lacked only \$150 paying for the permanent buildings which were also being used at the same time as an implement shed and farm shop. Lewis said this structure has paid for itself several times since then. If and when more storage is needed, he can box in the hallway and store as much grain at the two outside bins will hold.

This is a tip in financing. Get a government facility loan. Go to the ASC office locally and ask for Commodity Stabilization Service loan, which provides loan on approved structures. These loans include up to 80 percent of the cost of the structure including the cost of conditioning equipment. These loans are for a period of 4 years with repayment arranged so that you can actually have 5 years including the first crop year. The CSS insures the loan made by a local lending agency, or makes the loan directly through the County ASC Office. This building cost can be written off as a farm expense in four years time, too.

A successful storage operation requires:

1. A strong, tight building.  
 2. Storage of clean, dry grain.
