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Farwell Gains Revenge; Steers Swamp Indians, 49 to 0

Caught in the throes of an obvious mental letdown, the Morton Indians suffered their worst beating on the gridiron in many a year to a fine Farwell Steer eleven last Friday.

Big quarterback Johnny Lovelace paced the Steer attack though a quarter of running backs got into the act and moved almost at will through the Morton team. The half-time score was 35 to 0 and Farwell, after adding two more scores in the second half, inserted their second team which failed to score. The injury riddled Indians moved toward a score against the Forwell second team but, as they got a first down inside the 20, Coach J. E. Atwell quickly rushed his regular break into play to keep intact the whitewash.

The Indians got two breaks in the early minutes of the game and looked as though they might make them important ones in what for them had to be a defensive battle. Several of the regulars on this already shorthanded team were injured.

A 15 yard penalty set Farwell back on the fourth play but Phillip Berry raced 15 yards on the next play to gain it back. Then Farwell tried to gamble on a 4th down with two yards to go on the Morton 45 and Indian defenders rose up to halt the Steers inches shy and took possession. They racked up one first down and had six yards on another when a pass went awry and forced Brown to kick. The ball went over the goal and Farwell took over on their own 20. On the third play it was Lovelace on a keeper who went wide to the left and turned the corner on the Morton 4 defense. From there on it was Katy-bar-the-doo. No one could catch Johnny as he hoisted it 73 yds. to the score and Berry was stopped shy of the point try.

On the ensuing kickoff, a high, low kick, Morton's would be receiver let the ball bounce and the Steer recovered it for a first down on the Morton 24 yard line. It took him 48 yards to score with Carroll Thomas leading the last 10 yards and this time a bad center kept Lovelace from kicking the point after.

Morton had the ball four plays & scored a first down before a Willingham fumble was recovered by the Steers on the next to the last play of the quarter, on the Morton 31.

The second quarter was a hideous affair for Morton. Farwell had the ball nine plays, fumbled twice and recovered both fumbles, one for a lucky 7 yard gain, and even had two penalties, but still managed to win the score to 18 to 0. Here a dispirited point after was scored — not disputed by Morton, but disputed by some of the fans who thought the kick was ruled no good. Actually the kick was good and a penalty on the play was on Morton. Thus the point after counted and Farwell kicked off from their 45 instead of the 40 because of the penalty on the preceding play.

Three followed two plays that proved tough on Morton though to be sure they were already a beaten team. On the kickoff, which went over the goal, Morton drew a penalty after the ball was whistled dead. The dead ball foul made it first and 25 to 0 on the Indians 5 yard line and Brown did to punt out of a deep hole, the ball going only 19 yards to the Morton 28. It took Farwell just two plays to get their fourth TD. Huggins scampered around end 26 yds. to the 2, and Larry McDorman carried over for the score. Lovelace's kick was good and it was 25 to 0, with the period only half over.

Willingham took the kickoff behind the goal and got it out to the 10 but Morton couldn't move on a pair of runs and Brown dropped back to punt. The center went past him and hit the goalpost for an automatic safety, two more points for Farwell and Morton had the

free kick from the 20 yard line. On the kickoff, Berry got the ball on his 34 and raced up the right sideline for 66 yards for the touchdown. Lovelace tried to hand off to McDorman for the PAT but the play was halted. On the first play after the kickoff Morton was penalized back to the 2 yard line for holding and two plays later Willingham was thrown for a safety, making the score 35 to 0, just before the half ended.

Morton received the second half kickoff, couldn't move, and on the attempted punt another center got away from Brown and Farwell got the ball on the Morton 14. In two plays Lovelace passed to Huggins for the score and kicked the point to make it 42 to 0.

Morton moved to one first down in the next series of downs, and finally after forcing Morton to kick, Farwell put its second team on its field. The rest of the third period was evenly played. When the period ended the ball was on the Indian 38, with second string quarterback Benny Dial handling the ball well for Farwell.

Morton mounted one drive before Farwell's first string came back in Senior back Gerald Christian intercepted a Brown pass on the 39 and raced to the 14 yard line. Lovelace, Huggins and Berry moved it over in three plays with Berry scoring the TD and Lovelace booting the point after to make it 49 to 0.

Morton's only real spark of the night came in the next series of downs as Tommy Morrison raked up a first down on a 10 yard drive and Brown completed a 49 yard pass to end Ernest Wilson which put the Indians on the Steer 32. They got as far as the 25 when the game ended.

Statistics of the game were in favor of Farwell tremendously. The first downs were even at 5 each, but Farwell outgained the Indians 289 to 102. Morton got 71 of these in the fourth quarter and 64 by completing 4 of nine passes. They had 257 and completed only one pass, a 12 yarder, in three tries. Each team lost the ball twice on fumbles, but Farwell fumbled six times to 3 for Morton. Morton got four penalties for 50 yards while the Steers were penalized 8 times for 50 yards lost. Farwell scored on a kickoff and got big yardage on a pass interception, which could not be counted in yardage gained and twice scored without the aid of a first down in addition to scoring four points on two safeties.

Morton mistakes, two costly fumbles, a pass interception, two bad centers, and two 15 yard penalties deep in their own territory did more to make the game a rout than any one thing. Nairn, Clark and St. Clair were out with injuries and Seaney and Duke were also injured and saw limited service. Inexperience of the

substitutes also played a big part for Morton. It was mostly a case of Morton didn't appear to hit as hard as the game and everything they seemed to do backfired in Farwell's favor. 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"Most Outstanding Oldsmobile" Will Make Debut In Hawkins Oldsmobile Showrooms Friday, October 4

Full details of the totally new 1959 Oldsmobile with brilliant, distinctive exterior and interior styling and two new family-sized body styles, were announced this week by Jack P. Wolfram, general manager of Oldsmobile and a vice president of General Motors. Wolfram stated that the 1959 Oldsmobile will feature increased passenger and luggage space, two completely new and more efficient Rocket engines, more responsive power steering, new Air-Scoop brakes on all four wheels and a host of other engineering and accessory advancements.

"Oldsmobile for 1959 represents the most outstanding product in Oldsmobile's history in styling, quality and value," Wolfram stated. "And our two new Holiday hard-tops introduce an entirely different trend in passenger car design," he added.

The Holiday Sport Sedan is a sporty four-door family-sized car. The two Holiday Sport Coupes has an entirely new silhouette—a sleek appearance and exceptional visibility in all directions. The two new styles will be available throughout the Oldsmobile line.

An extra large, heat-resistant rear window on the Holiday Sport Coupe curves high into the roofline to give unobstructed visibility with the rear window glass on this model measuring a big 179.5 square inches. On the Holiday Sport Sedan the rear window wraps around beneath the extended rear side of the roof.

Total glass area in all models has been increased up to 24 percent to give increased visibility in all directions. The new Vista-Panoramic windshield has up to 370 square inches more glass area and contours deep into the roofline of-

fering an unobstructed view of over-hanging traffic signals. Electric windshield wipers, with a wider cleaning area, are standard equipment.

For 1959 Oldsmobile is offering 15 body styles in its Dynamic "F", Super "88" and "98" series. In each series are the Holiday Sport Coupe and Holiday Sport Sedan, a four-door sedan and a convertible. Smart, new interiors including upholstery and appointments will complement Oldsmobile's new exterior styling which, as Wolfram said, "is entirely different than anything we've done in the past, with clean lines, yet still exciting, brilliant and distinctively Olds."

Included among the many new functional but smart styling touches are the new rear deck handle and the "platform" top of the rear bumper in the center of which the hinged, fuel-filler door is located. The optional recessed, circular backup lights are located in the re-entrant bumper ends. The tail-lights are individually styled in the "88" series, with the Super "88" and Dynamic "88" models sharing their own distinctive design.

The cool air intake grille is located on the hood and the new ducts and outlets passage ventilation air flow up to 75 per cent. Incoming air now travels directly to cooling fresh air outlets in the inner shield panels on each side of the front passenger compartment. Covered outlets permit even distribution of cooling air throughout the interior.

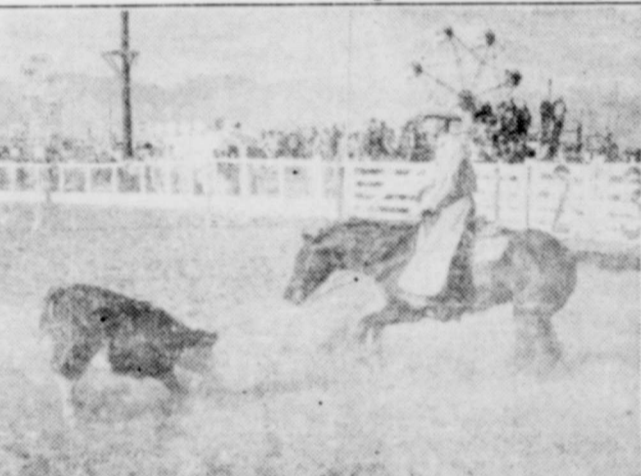

first time, they will know what the general public sentiment is toward the running of the hospital — whether they would rather see it leased or County run. He said he will endeavor to see that it is run the way the people want it run, and not according to his own preference.

He admitted that since it is common that people are now being asked if they would like to express their preference in a vote in November that it presents an almost impossibility of asking a doctor to commit himself at this time to come to Morton and set up an office outside the hospital. The incoming doctor could have no assurance the people would not decide they wanted the hospital leased out and they could be left in a town without an open staff hospital.

However, the Board, which has been holding it could not more doctors in Morton by having all doctors set up offices outside the hospital, received assurance that he (Thomson) would work with them in any way possible.

Nevertheless a number of doctors are scheduled to look the situation over within the next couple of weeks.

The Board took no action on appointment of a manager except to discuss the problem, and also to take note of the fact that Soala, with nursing, laboratory, and x-ray experience, has been doing considerable work in these fields at the hospital and that they are not best faced with the problem of finding a manager but also must find another combination man, or hire other help to do the rest of the lab work, semibursing, etc.

They adjourned with the assurance that he will try to find interested prospective managers by the next regular board meeting, the second Monday of this month.

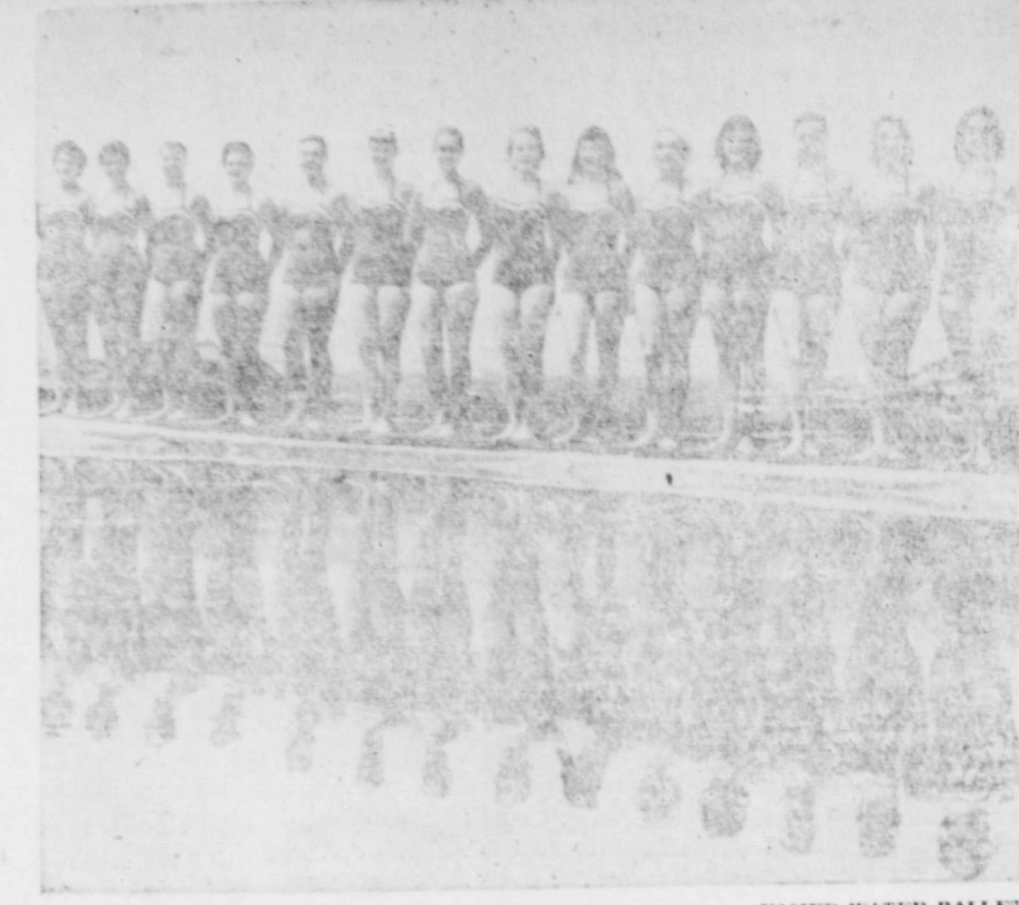


