



Research: A Key to Medical Progress

The next time you are in a drug store, take note of the hundreds of drug preparations lining the shelves. These are only a fraction of the great number of medicines available to you through the doctor and pharmagist

and pharmacist.

The United States enjoys the best medical care in the world, and much of the credit for this belongs to our pharmaceutical com-panies, large and small, who

panies, large and small, who research, develop and produce the life-saving medicines.

Seventy per cent of the prescriptions written today are for products which didn't even exist less than a decade ago. Without research, we would still be using herbs, nostrums and potions of yesteryear.

yesteryear.

A very large part of all medical research is carried on by the pharmaceutical companies. It is estimated that the pharmaceutical industry spends upwards of \$197 million annually searching. \$127 million annually searching for newer and better medicines. Pharmaceutical manufacturers spend about 21.3 per cent of their net profit before taxes on research, compared with 15.3 per cent for the chemical industry as whole

What does this money go for? One item: it costs about \$75,000 a year to equip and maintain a research scientist. Several large drug makers maintain as many as several hundred research

as several hundred research scientists.

After a product is developed and is on the market, efforts to improve it continue. So do efforts to find methods for less expensive production, which will help bring the price down. An example of this is penicillin. Soon after this product went into production in the early '40s, it was duction in the early '40s, it was very expensive and world pro-duction made enough to treat only 400 patients. Before the decade ended, the American pharmaceutical industry was producing enough penicillin each year to treat 570,000,000 patients, and the price had declined



Unknown to most people, millions are spent every year by the pharmaceutical companies just to insure high quality, purity of materials and accuracy of dosage, among other things. Nothing is ever left to chance.

What are the chances of finding a new drug? From the hundreds of thousands of compounds screened and tested last year, only 400 new products were placed on the market. In the case of a broad-spectrum antibiotic, 55 scientists screened 100,000 soil samples, taking two and a half years and \$4 million, before finding one that was good enough to market. Of the 5,000 analgesics discovered, only eight are in common use.

Probably nothing in current policy confuses the average citizen more than the fact that the United States is engaged in trad-United Statesia.

The Department of Commerce licenses exports to nations behind the Iron Cur-tain. But while trade with Rus-sia is fine, it is tabu with Red China, which seems quite a paradox.

merce Secretary Sinclair Weeks reported that export licenses to the Iron Curtain totalled \$5.6 mil-

lion, up slightly from the first quarter total of \$5.2 million. Most of the exports in the field of machinery, chemicals, tobacco and soy bean oil. While Poland, East Germany and others were recipients, 25% or more went directly into Russia.

But in addition, Russia probably gained a much more valu-

ably gained a much more valuable commodity...good old American dollars.

Because the report continues, in the first two months of 1958 American imports from the Iron Curtain nations totalled \$9.4 million as against export licenses granted to ship into these countries of slightly over \$5 million for a three month period.

Thus, Communist imports to this nation are running almost

this nation are running almost twice as much as they are im-porting. This may explain how Communism acquires dollars to carry on worldwide propaganda.

A large part of the exports are in the form of canned cooked hams and shoulders from Po-land. Probably if there is any-thing not needed for the welfare of American farmer right now, it is foreign pork products.

Cameras from East Germany are another item, plus furs from Russia.

... Yet for some reason, perhaps only known to Dulles and The Almighty, trade with Red China is absolutely verboten. But trade with Russia flourishes.

And thus is posed a pretty question. In a China where hunger is not unknown, would there be a ready market for U. S. farm surplus?

Of course, there still remains the question of the propriety of trading with any communists. but it seems that trade with European communists is fine; but forbidden with Oriental com-

Of course, according to all re-ports, the British Crown Colony at Hong Kong does a nice busi-ness trading with Red China.

But one thing should bring joy to Midwest corn and hog farmers.

They should be very pleased to learn that while they are taxed to defend against communism, their American market is getting plenty of canned pork from the communists.


