COUNTY SET FOR NOVEMBER 4 GENERAL ELECTION

Hospital Issue May Get Out Vote Tuesday

A referendum vote, on whether or not the county should continue to operate the hospital, is expected to be largely responsible for whether turnout in Cochran County, Texas, is received in the General Election, Tuesday, November 4, as far as Cochran County is concerned.

With already elected Democratic candidates sure to defeat what few Republican candidates there are on the General Ballot, the General Election usually finds a very slim turnout of voters in Cochran County. There are no County Republican candidates. Only six absentee ballots had been cast on Wednesday, according to Mrs. Lee Taylor, County Clerk.

However, it may be somewhat different this year. Nine proposed amendments to the Texas Constitution will also have some effect in pulling out the vote, a few of them having created quite a stir, statewide, area-wide, and even locally. But, in a state where recently Constitutional amendments almost always have been passed by an overwhelming majority, it is highly unlikely any of the amendments proposed will be defeated.

But the hospital question is the big one in this county. The vote, not a mandatory one at all, simply a referendum seeking to opinion of Cochran voters, will be on a separate ballot. Either for or against the county operation of the hospital - that's the choice. There is nothing in the voting that says what would be done, but presumably, if the voters reject the thought of the County running the hospital, it would give the present Commissioner's Court, and the one taking office January 1st, the certain knowledge, that the people in the county would favor another type of operation - more than likely the leasing of the hospital.

The question has been discussed prominently in Morton and around the county, ever since it became known a petition was being presented to the Commissioner's Court asking for the vote. Actually, the Court has the right to do either - deem that the county should run the hospital - or lease it out. And, also, on record for the past several years, has been a vote of the people declaring themselves in favor of the leasing of the hospital. But, this new vote, will re-establish the position of at least those who take the trouble to vote.

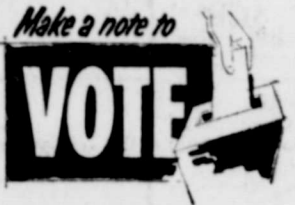

Cotton furnishes work for many thousands of people and every one of them have a vital stake in producing high quality cotton.

How do you get this quality? Cotton is graded on the basis of color, foreign matter or leaf trash content and ginning preparation.

Extra care in keeping out foreign matter will pay, too. This includes green leaves, trash and dirt from the ground, sand, dust, burrs and stems.

Another important thing is to never tramp cotton into a small trailer. When you do, you are grinding the small trash into the fiber.

On this the 13th day of October, 1958, the Commissioner's Court of Cochran County, Texas, convened in Regular session at the regular court house thereof at the Court-house in Morton, Texas, with the following members of the Court, to-wit: Fred Stockdale, County Judge, M. R. Holloman, Commissioner, Precinct No. 1, G. C. Keith, Commissioner, Precinct No. 2, Mrs. Ocia Foster, Commissioner, Precinct No. 3, R. Z. Dewbre, Commissioner, Precinct No. 4, Mrs. Lee Taylor, County Clerk, being present and amenable other proceedings had by said Court was the following: Whereas: (1) a petition was filed by Mr. Glenn W. Thompson with the Clerk of Commissioner's Court at 9:00 o'clock A. M., Monday, October 13, 1958, on behalf of the signers thereto petitioning said Court to Order an election to be held on November 4, 1958, in conjunction with the General Election for the purpose of determining the manner of operating the Cochran County Hospital.

THEREFORE, BE IT ORDERED BY THE COMMISSIONER'S COURT OF COCHRAN COUNTY, TEXAS:

That an election be held in said County on the 4 day of November, 1958, in accordance with said petition, (2) the following proposition shall be submitted to the resident property taxpaying qualified voters of said County for their action thereupon:

PROPOSITION (5) "Shall the Cochran County Hospital be leased, or shall be continued under County Operation?"

This being a referendum election to permit all qualified voters to express their opinion for the benefit of the Commissioner's Court, the Election Code cannot be followed as to the Order, Notice, etc.

Said election shall be held at the following places in said County and the following named persons are hereby appointed Presiding Judges for said election:

Pet. No. 1, County Activity Building, W. E. Angle; Pet. No. 2, Whiteface School Building, Truman Swinney; Pet. 3, Bledsoe School Building, Fred Young; Pet. No. 4, Neely Ward School Building, B. R. Stovall; Pet. No. 5, Lehman Store Building; J. W. Pond; Pet. No. 6, White's Gin, Mrs. Garland Brown; Special Canvassing Board, Court-house Building, Ed McLellan.

The ballots of said election shall have written or printed thereon the following: (4)

"FOR Leasing the Cochran County Hospital;" "AGAINST Leasing the Cochran County Hospital."

Each voter shall mark out with black ink or black pencil one of the above expressions, thus leaving the other as indicating his vote.

The manner of holding said election shall be governed as near as may be, by the General Election Laws of the State of Texas, except as modified by the provisions of Chapter 100, Title 1, (5) Vernon's Revised Civil Statutes of the State of Texas, Revision of 1925, as amended, and none but resident property taxpaying (6) qualified voters of said County and who have duly rendered the same for taxation shall be allowed to vote at said election.

Notice of said election shall be given by publication of a copy of this Order in a newspaper published in said County on the same day of each of 2 (7) successive weeks prior to said election. The date of first publication being not less than 10 (7) days prior to the date of said election. In addition thereto, a copy of this order shall be posted at each Election Precinct (7) in said County, one of which shall be at the Courthouse door, at least 2 (7) weeks prior to the date of said election.

The County Clerk is hereby authorized and directed to cause said copies to be published and posted as hereinabove directed and further orders are reserved until the returns of said election are made by the duly authorized election officials and received by this Court.

The above order being read, it was moved and seconded that same do pass. Thereupon, the question being called for, the following members of the Court voted AYE: Holloman, Keith, Foster, Dewbre, and the following members voted NO: None.

As for the vote on candidates, only one race is expected to cause any interest at all, that of Representative Candidate Roy Whittenburg and Senator Ralph Yarbrough for the U. S. Senate seat already held by the latter.

Whittenburg isn't expected to get even a handful of votes in this county, but his platform, based on state's rights and civil rights, is expected to have an interesting effect on the final state vote. The Ansonville publisher hasn't the official stamp of the National Republican Party, but he didn't expect that with his views on Civil Rights.

The Constitutional Amendments to be voted on in thumbnail sketches are as follows:

No. 1 Annual Sessions of the Legislature, and a yearly salary, plus expenses for its members.

This is the big one - the one that is most complicated, and even after careful study, it's not clear what powers the legislature would have if this amendment is passed. Basically, the arguments for the annual sessions are: that it would allow us to modernize our government whereby we wouldn't have to look two years ahead on our appropriations, something which they say is impossible to do, intelligently.

That it would provide a chance for a closer look at the actual needs, that enough money could be saved on the annual appropriations to pay for the increased cost of salaries.

The other argument is simply that when appropriating for a two year period, legislators are more careful in looking at the overall problems, rather than spending a lot of their time harranguing on a pet appropriation they may be trying to get across.

Those who favor the bill, feel the increase in salary will make it possible for many better qualified citizens to seek legislative posts, and will minimize the effect of lobbyists and the possibilities of bribery.

No. 2 Retirement Pensions for Former Texas Rangers. There is little debate on this issue, the question being simply as to just another way to spend money, or do we, as Texas citizens, owe this consideration to the earlier Rangers and their widows.

No. 3 Vacancies in the Offices of County Judges and Justices of the Peace.

A simple change is proposed. To make Commissioner's Court appointments to these posts, which at the present time are for the full duration of the term, only to last until the next General Election, is the aim of this amendment.

No. 4 Requiring Certain Officials to Resign Before Becoming a Candidate for other Elective Offices.

This amendment would affect nearly every office in Cochran County, most offices in the District, and the State. It would make resignation from one post automatic as soon as announcement of candidacy for another post is made. One side considers it a matter of honor to resign one office before seeking another. The other says the individual case must be determined by the voters, rather than by a law requiring resignation.

No. 5 Medical Care Added to Old Age Assistance, Aid to Blind, Aid to Dependent Children, and Aid to Permanently and Totally Disabled.

This would simply increase the benefits available to these needy groups.

No. 6 Longer Terms for Elective Officers of Municipalities.

If this passed it would give cities under Home Rule the right to hold an individual vote to determine whether or not the terms of Mayor, City Commissioner, etc., would be two years or more, not to exceed four years.

No. 7 The Creation of Four New Hospital Districts.

This is special legislation for the four proposed districts, none of which embraces any part of Cochran County simply an amendment making it possible for the people of these four areas to vote to create such a district. As of now, we must have an amendment before they have the right to vote on this.

No. 8 State Advertising.

This is probably the amendment that has received the second most amount of publicity. Speeches, law now forbids in Texas, the expenditure of state funds, in preparing advertising or disseminating information about the State of Texas, its advantages, its history, natural resources, etc. Now, all of this must be done by private interests. One side says that the value to the State of Texas, not only in tourist trade but in new business, makes this a needed state venture. The other side says private interests, which will benefit most by these things, should support the cost. Many states do allow such advertising, and have a state bureau set up to handle such matters.

No. 9 County Retirement Funds.

This would allow elective officials to be included under present retirement and disability plans, would include precinct employees as well as county employees, and would allow an increase in the amount of money which could be invested in these funds, to cover the increased number of persons covered. The only major objection, is it ethical or unethical to pay pensions to elective officials?

These then, in part, are the major arguments and points to consider. The No. 1 amendment is indeed complicated and should be studied carefully, before the voter casts a ballot.

Oilton Racks Up 42 - 14 Victory Over Morton Indians

The Morton Indians, without the loss of any necessary weight, size, and total momentum to play T-formation ination as the second quarter got underway, and could have gotten back into the game if they had possession of a late burst that netted the new style was foreign to the Morton Indians, as well as Oilton, and it wasn't until the score was 42-0

that quarterback Jackie Brown began to spot open receivers far down field. Brown actually completed 18 of 25 pass attempts and rung up 174 yards in this manner, but in the first ten completions, most were short passes in the flats, not gaining much yardage, and some losing yardage. The new style of play however did add color to the Morton attack

from the fan's viewpoint, and, if perfected, could enable Morton to still pull an upset or two in the final games of the season. In numbers, the Oilton Mustangs had several more men than the Indians, taking the field. But the major differences were still there. Oilton was dressing freshmen and sophomores who were playing a vital role, while Morton was dressing its freshmen for looks. Basically, Morton still had about 15 available men, and Oilton, about 26.

Mustangs scored their second TD on an explosive blast with less than a minute to play in the first quarter. Royce Bodkin, a 145-lb. scrapper, was on the tailend of a reverse play around left end that shuck him in the clear for a 69 yard scaring scamper. Hal bulldozed over the middle for the 2-points. Morton got its worst bad break of the night when J. R. Wilson was injured and taken from the field, and a few minutes later they saw what looked like a great play turned into a disaster. Brown quick-kicked from his own 28 yard line and the ball, getting a good roll, stopped inside the Oilton 10 yard line for an approximate 70 yard quick. It was called back for the Indians third penalty in four plays and Morton's repeat kick went only to the 45.

Ernest Wilson recovered a fumble to stop the Mustangs, but in turn they sifted through to block a Brown punt and took over on the 45 yard line. Bodkin got loose on another 30 yard scamper but an Oilton offside nullified this play.

Nairn intercepted a pass to stop the ensuing drive, but Morton had to punt and on the first play Bodkin raced 49 yards to the Morton 17, before Christian caught him. Hall plowed 14 yards to the three and quarterback Randoe Bucheneau sneaked over for the score. A run for the point failed and the half ended with Oilton leading 20 - 0.

On a desperation pass Brown Seaney behind the Oilton 45 a 33 yard aerial for the score. Brown failed on a keeper for the PAT.
