**EXHIBITION OF FINE PAINTINGS SET NOV. 13TH;
 SPONSORED BY MORTON PARENT TEACHERS**

A fine arts exhibition, featuring prints of some of the finest works of the great masters and "living pictures," will be presented Thursday, Nov. 13, in the Morton Elementary School Auditorium and the Morton Elementary gym.

A continuous showing of the art pictures will be in the elementary or old gym, where 150 art prints will be hung.

The "living pictures" portion of the exhibit will be shown first at 12:30 p.m. in the elementary auditorium, and will be shown each hour thereafter until 3:30 p.m. when the final performance will get underway. The original announcement carried a different time and place for the show.

Musical interpretations for the various "living picture" poses will be arranged by Mrs. W. H. Mahan, elementary music department teacher, and Henry C. Hornsby, MHS choral director.

Mrs. Joe Seagler, Mrs. J. A. Gowdy and Hornsby will supervise the posing of "the living pictures."

"We think parents will enjoy seeing their children dressed to bring 'to life' subjects created by great artists like Rembrandt, Lawrence Lambach, Hencke Reynolds, Glickleik, and many others," Mrs. Seagler pointed out.

Mrs. John Barnes, high school English teacher, will be in charge of the fifteen guides who will conduct tours of the pictures and discuss the paintings, techniques, and lives of the painters.

They will also aid in the presentation of the "living pictures."

The school is to receive 20 per cent of the proceeds from the sale of the pictures and the "living pictures."

Tickets will sell for 15c and 25c. These will enable the purchaser to see the exhibition and the "living pictures."

J. C. Shelton, local artist, will be in charge of the display of prints. Ticket sales are under the supervision of Lloyd Miller. Bill Glassford has been named publicity chairman.
