Dear Friend:  
Let's talk some facts of public office and private life. Specifically as it concerns spending. No political party has a copyright on Henry Fielding's good advice: "A penny saved is a penny got." The rules of prudence and thrift apply equally well in public office and private life. We all know that. It's common sense. And, as my Daddy used to tell me, "There's only one kind of sense — that's common sense."

Those same good rules apply today to the budget recommendations which come to the Congress from the President.

These recommendations go to a committee... then to a subcommittee. They are studied and reviewed line by line and item by item. They are gone over dollar by dollar. Then the Congress determines what it will do with the President's budget recommendations.

Let's take a look at what Congress has done in the past. It shows what we might expect in the future. Here is the record of the last five fiscal years. It shows more than \$10 billion were whittled by Congress from the budget recommendations.

83rd Congress, 2nd, 1955, budget estimate was \$60,770,315,686; final appropriation was \$58,160,445,563; the decrease by Congress was \$2,609,870,123.

**Yarborough's Report**

More than 127,000 Texans residing in 64 counties are receiving surplus food commodity rations, according to information supplied me by the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

Needy Texans, many of them elderly persons no longer able to work, have received a total of 12,290,000 pounds of government surplus wheat flour, rice, cornmeal, dry milk, butter and cheese during the last six months.

This food is helping a great deal, but it is not nearly enough. It is a diet that amounts to slow starvation for it provides only about half the needed protein and calcium required for good health.

To help see that needy Texans and other Americans can have food meeting minimum health requirements in this land which has more food than it knows what to do with, I am co-sponsoring a so-called balanced diet bill.

It simply authorizes and directs the Secretary of Agriculture to make available supplemental food to those needy Americans under the surplus commodity program. Our need for this program in Texas is small compared to some other states. For example, in West Virginia a total of 306,000 people, over 15 percent of the state's population, are receiving surplus commodities due to heavy unemployment in the coal mines.

But the situation in Texas is bad enough that it should not be ignored. In Harris County, nearly 19,000 persons are under this program, and in San Antonio there are 17,654 requiring this food.



**400 NEW LAWS INTRODUCED**

Over 400 bills providing for new or changed laws for Texas have already been introduced in the House. This means that there are already approximately 2000 pages of proposed statutes which we, as members, must try to read in order to keep abreast of the legislative matters. And probably, there will be at least another 400 bills introduced before the session is over. This doesn't count the Senate bills which have been introduced.

**LEGISLATURE IS TIME CONSUMING**

Thus, when you read in the newspapers that we were only in session for one hour on a given day, remember this is only the open session. Many lawmakers spend 4 to 6 hours a day studying and reading these bills; another 2 to 4 hours in the Committee hearings, and perhaps 2 hours per day answering correspondence, etc.

**MANY 10-HOUR DAYS**

Many times I have spent 10 full hours per day inside the Capitol building, and this is not an uncommon experience with other members also.

**TEXAS GOVERNMENT BIG!**

Texas government (like our size) is big, and it takes many, many man-hours to keep it running. So, if I am a little slow in answering your letter, or perhaps have to say that I have not read the particular bill to which you refer, I will do my best, but realize the big job we, as lawmakers face during the session. Back to my reading!
