A - PLAN, or B - PLAN ?

## DEADLINE NEARS FOR FARMERS TO CHOOSE WHICH COTTON PLAN FOR 1959 CROP YEAR

The next important date for cotton producers is the March 16, 1959 deadline for making a choice between the (A) allotment and the (B) allotment for their farms, according to Ruth McGee, Office Manager of the County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee.

All farm operators have been sent a notice of the price support levels and a reminder of the (A) and (B) allotments received these days. Only farm operators who are the person who elects a choice for the farm and his choice is binding on all other producers on the farm. All other farms on which he is the operator—that is, he must make the same choice for all his farms.

Choice (A) farm allotments are the regular allotments. Choice (B) farm allotments are 40 per cent larger than the Choice (A) allotments.

You may sell Choice (A) cotton on the open market or to the Commodity Credit Corporation, whichever is to your advantage.

You may sell Choice (B) cotton on the open market or obtain a Commodity Credit loan, whichever is to your advantage.

The bond prices for Cochran County will be 24 points less than that shown on the Forms you have received; that is, Plan (A) support price will be 50.16 and Plan (B) will be 51.46.

You may not change your election of Choice (A) or Choice (B) after March 16, 1959, except that the operator of a farm for which Choice (B) is elected may file an application to change to Choice (A) in extreme hardship cases. Specifically, you must have been prevented from planting or replanting or from having any cotton for harvest in excess of the Choice (A) allotment. Such conditions are limited to excessive rain, flood, hail or drought.

You may not change because of wind or sand storm. You may not destroy any cotton by mechanical means to come within the Choice (A) allotment.

Drought on an irrigated farm is not an acceptable reason for changing from Plan (B) to Plan (A).

It is important to every farmer to select plan (A) or plan (B), and return the Form MQ-24 CN (A) to the county office as soon as they decide — NOT LATER THAN MARCH 16, 1959.

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### \$20,000 Loss in Pettit Blaze Tues.

Blazing mid afternoon flames destroyed the farm home of Elmer J. Johnson of Pettit, Tuesday, as a trio of fire departments did everything they could, but were too late to douse the costly blaze.

The stucco home, valued at an estimated \$20,000, was located 1/4 mile north of Pettit, on the corner of the road that comes from the Countyline gin where it joins the Farm to Market Road connecting Pettit and Pettit.

The alarm, which came to the Morton Volunteer Fire Department at 2:50 p.m., came too late for any of the units to do any good, other than to sprinkle the premises good in order to prevent spreading.

SENATOR YARBROUGH'S REPORT

When Communist jet fighter pilots mercilessly shot down an unarmed U. S. Air Force plane and its 17-man crew recently, they involved the entire world in a controversy. And they involved 17 families - two of them from Texas - in the deepest of all tragedies. Our aircraft have paid the price of thousands of our heroes and we have paid them honor and respect. But I feel we must go much further than this. Aside from praise, let's see what concrete actions a grateful government and people can take. Right now, all the families of these men will receive, other than this country's condolences and gratitude, is a small Social Security allotment and a little money to pay for the flier's burial. I think this nation can and should do much more.

February 11, 1959 Dear Friends: America must be strengthened from within if it is to continue its leadership of the free world. New economic muscles must be developed. And this must be done within the spirit and the framework of the free enterprise system. Thinking of America, I see not 48 states. Instead, I see three great natural regions. I see three clusters of states confronted with common problems and united by similar opportunities. Two of these regions - the North and the South - are old. The other - the West - is young. Each has special problems. And, I believe these special problems require special treatment. This calls for attack starting from the local level. For instance: - The people of the North understand best the problems of industrialization and urbanization. - The people of the South know agriculture. They understand the economy of land. - The people of the West are bound by common interests relating to mining, ranching, and the problems of scarcity of water. There is a growing need of a study on the Economic Development of the American Regions. There would be three studies - a study for the North, one for the South and one for the West. Each study would seek out the cracks in the region's economic wall. It would inventory the resources and suggest the best way of utilizing them. This is apparent: If the Nation is to grow and prosper, the economy of each region must be strengthened. This work won't wait. Tomorrow, a new era for all mankind, is almost here. If this Nation is to be ready, we need start the job today.

Farm Bureau Favors Natural Gas Tax

WACO (Sp.) - Governor Daniel's proposal to tax natural gas as a means of raising needed revenue has been strongly endorsed by the Texas Farm Bureau.

J. H. West, president of the state's largest farm organization, declared recently that the tax is fair and equitable because it does not place an undue burden on Texans, while at the same time, gives the people of Texas an opportunity to benefit from the "unexploitable" natural resources now being shipped out of state.

The revenue-raising proposal, HB 47, has been introduced in the House of Representatives in Austin by Rep. George Hinson of Minnieka. The proposed tax is a "severance beneficiary" tax on natural gas at the rate of 3 per cent of value, which would raise \$40 million over the next biennium. It would be paid by the producer only if there is no severance beneficiary to pay for it.

West lauded both Governor Daniel and Rep. Hinson for their efforts to secure needed state revenues from such a source. He contended that even with passage of the Governor's proposal, Texas would still be paying natural gas at less than half the rate of some surrounding gas-producing states.

At present some 50 percent of Texas' natural gas production is consumed out of state, with many of the consuming states deriving considerable revenue from taxing it. For example, the states of New York, Michigan, Indiana, Ohio and Illinois collect from two to nine times as much in taxes per thousand cubic feet on Texas gas than Texas itself collects.

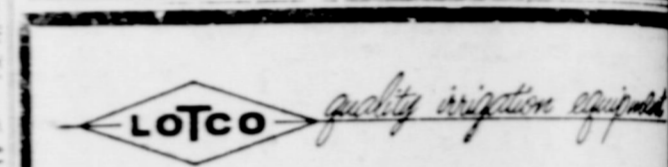

Why then can't we take our 1.60 milo, and feed it right here at home and then pay about 35 cents per hundred freight to get it into Northern Feedlots.

On the basis of \$1.60 per cwt, this raises their milo cost to them to about \$1.95 per hundred. Due to a cold climate they must invest a tremendous amount of capital in buildings to house their livestock. Even after all this they have consistently showed a good net income.

me. Our mild climate does not require great capital expenditures for housing and certainly the North has no monopoly on the livestock industry.

Northern farmers are 5 - 10 years ahead of the South in knowledge on care of livestock.

If the youngsters of today are to compete as farmers and livestock farmers of tomorrow — then we must start now to train these boys and girls in the livestock industry, and that's where a Fat Stock Show comes in. This show is not intended for the grown men of today. It's for the sons and daughters who will carry on tomorrow. By attending one show, a boy or girl is not going to make a tremendous success, but they do get a slight feel of competition, they see different types of animals, they compare the different results from feeding, and they get a little better picture of what they need to produce to fit the livestock industry.

We spend a great deal of money each year on our gymnasiums, football fields, rodeo grounds, golf courses, and other events. These are all worthwhile projects but such things as the Fat Stock Show go back to the basic industry: agriculture. It's part of the training of a youngster for a vocation, a way to make a living, a means of being financially independent.

So let's face the facts. These youngsters need a good fat stock show. They are entitled to one. If we hold up our part as good citizens, we can put them on a good one.

The Morton Jaycees have undertaken the tremendous task of raising funds to produce this show. It's a big job and a hard one, so, Mr. Farmer, Businessman, when these men contact you, stop and think it's not something that is wasted or soon forgotten. You will have had a part in molding the future vocation of some youngster, maybe your own son.

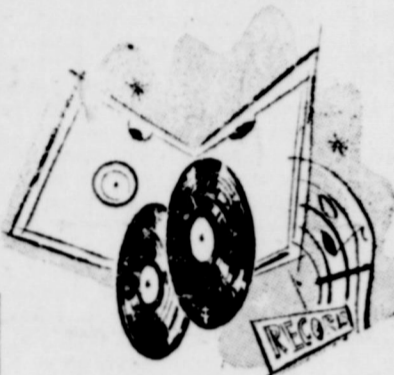

The County Judge pointed out that the cost of operating the County had increased \$50,000 annually in the past ten years, and the value of other than oil properties had remained about the same. Although road bonds were retired this past year, relieving the county of a \$50,000 obligation, the amount of money that will be collected of which to operate the county will be down from \$347,000 to \$292,000, leaving a net loss of \$45,000. The money, if the values of other than oil properties were to rise, would be available for the county. All this is to be done by the county will be considerably "in the hole" this year, and it is easy to see the county is in severe financial shape.

Here, specifically, is what the oil companies are going to ask of the County, when they come to tender on tax figures this summer: They would recommend the county adopt a policy of valuing the equipment on flowing wells at \$1,500 each and of pumping wells at \$2,000 each, a reduction from \$1,750 and \$2,750, respectively. They ask consideration of adjustment, including equipment, in a schedule to reflect 30 percent assessment, and do what you can to adjust local property, they will see what happens.

"We're making no agreements," a spokesman said, "simply seeking a starting point to look at, to get this situation back in adjustment." The oil company men then revealed that figures they had, on about one third of the county farmland, in a survey made for their last year, showed that irrigated land was being taxed on a value of about 5 percent and dry land on a value of about 11 percent.

LOOK FOR ENRICHED MEAL

Not all corn meal on the market is enriched. Enriched corn meal has more health giving nutrients than non-enriched meal.

When you buy corn meal check the label for contents. If the enrichment ingredients have been added it will be marked clearly, enriched.

Corn meal is enriched with B vitamins and iron. These ingredients make whole grain corn meal more nutritious and help to restore minerals and vitamins lost in the refinement of bolted and/or degummed corn meal.

These added nutrients are important for good nerves, good appetite, proper heart beat, rich red blood, and general well-being.

Home Demonstration Clubs all over the state are studying the reasons for having a law for the enrichment of corn meal and grits. To add interest to this study, several of the clubs in Cochran County served Corn Meal Gingerbread for the refreshment at their meetings. This recipe is in the bulletin No. MP-260, Corn Meal and Grits, which is available from the Extension office.

Another interesting recipe from the bulletin is Banana Corn Meal Loaf. The recipe is as follows:

- 1 cup corn meal
- 1 cup flour
- 3 teaspoons baking powder
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 2 eggs
- 2/3 cup sugar
- 1/2 cup melted shortening
- 1 cup mashed, ripe bananas
- 1 cup chopped nuts

Sift dry ingredients on waxed paper. Beat eggs well; add mashed bananas and melted shortening. Add dry mixture. Stir until well blended. Add chopped nuts. Stir lightly. Grease bottom only of a loaf pan. Sprinkle bottom of pan lightly with corn meal. Pour batter into pan. Bake at 350 degrees F., 60 to 70 minutes, until bread is done. Let bread partially cool in pan 20 to 30 minutes before turning out on rack. Cool thoroughly before wrapping for storage. Delicious with fruit salads when spread with butter or cottage cheese seasoned with grated orange rind and juice.

## PLAN FOR BETTER FAMILY HEALTH THIS YEAR . . .

What's the status of health in your family? Could it be improved in 1959? Mrs. Eloise Johnson, our Extension Family Life Specialist, suggests a check that is certain to add to better family health.

Here are seven important factors: good nutrition, sanitation, regular health examinations, immunization, exercise, rest and recreation, an adequate home health center and a means of achieving the state of radiant health which is the result of complete physical, social and mental well being.

An accepted guide for good nutrition is the Texas Food Standard. Mrs. Johnson points out that family attitudes toward food and the enjoyment of meal time are just as important as the kind and amount of food eaten.

Sanitation includes a healthful water supply, safe sewage and garbage disposal, cleanliness around the barn and home, as well as clean milk free from bacteria.

Regular health examinations for mother and father as well as the children are one of the most important steps in improving family health. Your family physician can advise about immunization against contagious and infectious diseases.

Exercise, rest and recreation is a fifth step. The important thing, Mrs. Johnson says, is to build toward a family attitude which considers rest and recreation as essential to good health and not a waste of time or evidence of laziness.

The sixth step is the maintenance of an adequate health center at home. Every family should have supplies, equipment and medicine for the minor illnesses and emergencies that must be cared for at home.

Many physical and mental ailments are rooted in worry, fear and concern. The seventh step toward achieving a state of radiant health involves "talking out" problems as a family to give assurance and a sense of security to each family member.

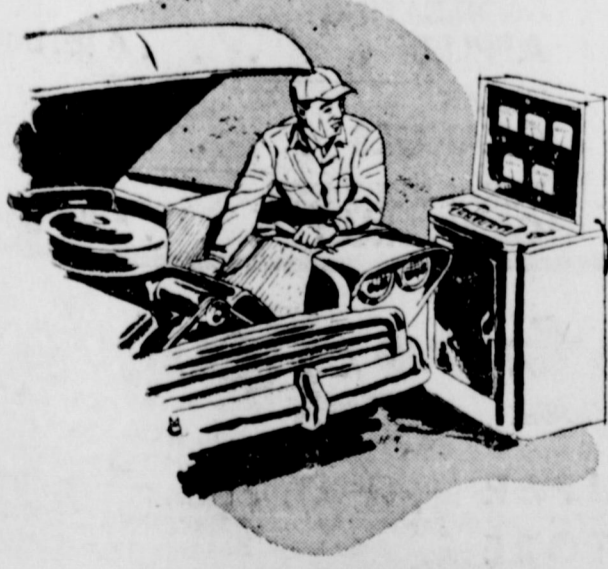
