**TWO DEATHS ON COUNTY ROADS, IN 1958**

The Highway Patrol investigated 22 rural traffic accidents that occurred in Cochran County during 1958. Sergeant D. L. Lawson, Patrol Supervisor of this area, announced this week.

Property damage accidents accounted for 9 of the total; personal injury for 11; and 1 of them were fatal accidents.

These accidents cost a total property damage of \$16,275 with 24 persons injured in addition to the two lives lost.

"In 1958 Texas recorded 1,869 fatal motor vehicle traffic accidents which resulted in 2,311 deaths," said Sergeant Lawson. He said, "53 of those deaths were in cities over 2,500 population while the remaining 1,812 were rural traffic deaths."

The Sergeant further pointed out that those figures were not complete and an accurate account will not be known until mid March. He estimated that when the final reports are received the 1958 death figure should be approximately 8 percent less than 1957.

Sergeant Lawson advised the Highway Patrol had investigated 3 rural accidents in Cochran County during January 1959 with the following breakdown: Property damage, 1; Personal Injury, 2; and fatal accidents, none. This is an increase of two accidents for the same period of 1958.

The Sergeant pointed out that speed continues to be the number one killer in traffic accidents throughout the State and called on all motorists to voluntarily observe the speed limits in an effort to prevent further carnage on our streets and highways.

**Camera Donated To Hospital Here By Dr. Lee, Wife**

The Cochran County Hospital staff was the recipient recently of a 35 mm Kodak camera, carrying case, flash attachment and viewfinder, compliments of Dr. & Mrs. B. H. Lee. It was announced this week by Hospital Superintendent, Dewitt Allsup.

Allsup said the staff is planning to work out some method of renting the camera to mothers of new born babies, or taking pictures of the infants and selling them to the parents. Only charge would be for keeping the supply of film.

## LATEST SURPLUS COMMODITIES ROLL CHECK REVEALS 104 FAMILIES ARE RECEIVING AID; TOTAL OF 509 PERSONS

Latest information on the Surplus Commodity Distribution program in Cochran County shows a total of 104 families on the roll, including 509 persons.

The program, which has been under discussion around the county, for the past several years, is one in which the county receives surplus commodities from the Federal Government, and sets up a distribution point for these supplies

to needy families that make proper application for aid.

At present the division of those families on the rolls is approximately 50 percent Spanish; 40 percent white and 10 percent Negro. Fifty of the families are Spanish, 43 are white and 11 are Negro. Included in the group are 100 women, 24 of whom are widows, and 12 of whom are receiving old age assistance; 80 men, 30 of whom

are under 45 years of age and 15 of whom are receiving old age assistance; and 329 children, 17 years of age or younger and 20 children over 17 years of age.

Of the total, 12 are handicapped and 28 are receiving children's welfare checks.

The breakdown was supplied by the County Judge's office this week in the interest of making available the information to the public.

### NEW DEVELOPMENTS IN WASH AND WEAR

Recently, two types of "no-iron" sheets and pillow cases have been introduced on the market. One type has a resin finish, while the other has a non-resin finish. The following are claims for both: the resin and the non-resin finishes; non-chlorine retentive; odor, mildew, and soil resistant; can withstand same water temperatures as regular cottons; and can be washed by hand, machine, or commercial laundry. It should be noted that the drying methods for the two types of sheets differ. The resin-finish sheet should be tumble dried or drip dried for best appearance. Spinning or wringing out followed by line drying, is best for the non-resin-finish sheet.

Both types of sheets and pillow cases are priced moderately higher than regular sheets. However, when the laundry is done at home, the consumer will note a saving in time and energy, since the sheets do not require ironing. They also remain neater for a longer period of time than regular sheets. If a commercial laundry is used for the resin-finish sheets, the homemaker will enjoy a dollar and cents saving, since she has to pay for "fluff" drying only and will not incur the additional cost for ironing.

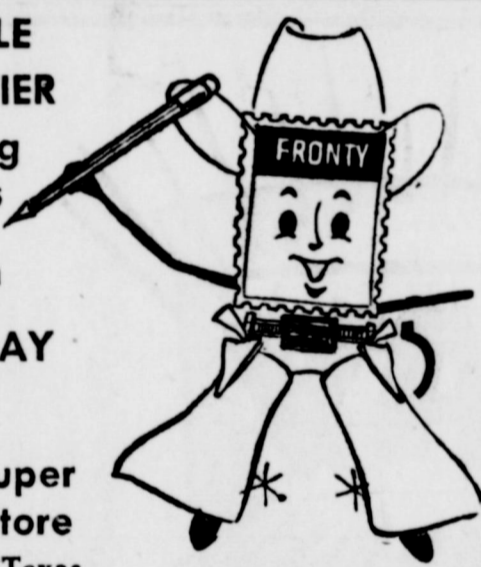

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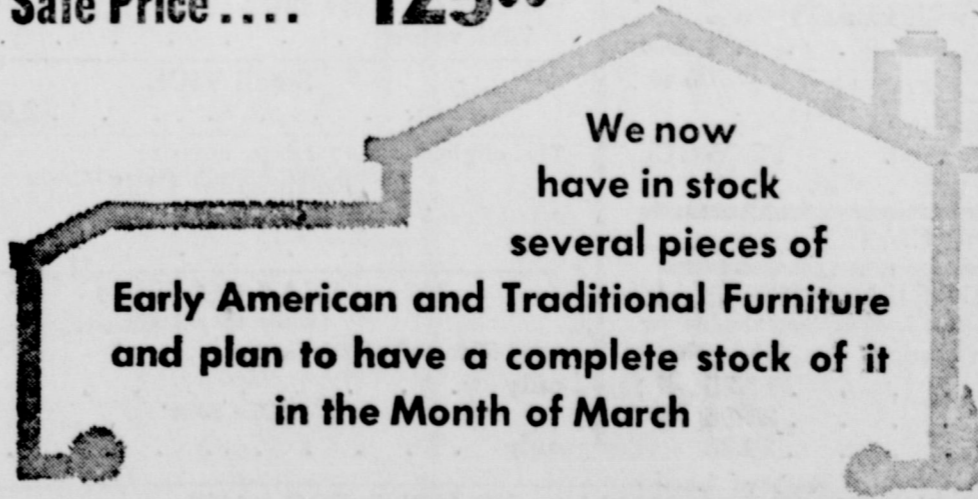

### DEADLINE NEARS FOR FARMERS TO CHOOSE WHICH COTTON PLAN FOR 1959 CROP YEAR

The next important date for cotton producers is the March 16, 1959 deadline for making a choice between the (A) allotment and the (B) allotment for their farms, according to Ruth McGee, Office Manager of the County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee. All farm operators have been

it a notice of the price support levels and a reminder of the (A) and (B) allotments for their farms. Only farm operators received the notices, since the operator is the person who elects a choice for the farm and his choice is binding on all other producers on the farm. His choice is also binding on all other farms on which he is the operator — that is, he must make the same choice for all his farms. Choice (A) farm allotments are the regular allotments. Choice (B) farm cotton allotments are 40 percent larger than the Choice (A) allotments. You may sell Choice (A) cotton on the open market or to the Commodity Credit Corporation, whichever is to your advantage. You may sell Choice (B) cotton on the open market or obtain a Commodity Credit loan, whichever is to your advantage. The local prices for Cochran County will be 24 points less than that shown on the Forms you have

received; that is, Plan (A) support price will be 30.16 and Plan (B) will be 24.46.

You may not change your election of Choice (A) or Choice (B) after March 16, 1959, except that the operator of a farm for which Choice (B) is elected may file an application to change to Choice (A) in extreme hardship cases. Specifically, you must have been prevented from planting or replanting or from having any cotton on for harvest in excess of the Choice (A) allotment. Such conditions are limited to excessive rain, flood, hail or drought. You may not change because of wind or sand storm. You may not destroy any cotton by mechanical means to come within the Choice (A) allotment. Drought on an irrigated farm is not an acceptable reason for changing from Plan (B) to Plan (A). It is important to every farmer to select plan (A) or plan (B), and return the Form MQ-24 CN (A) to the county office as soon as they decide — NOT LATER THAN MARCH 16, 1959. ### With Your ... COUNTY AGENT

**SOIL CONSERVATION**  
Is conservation being left out of your farm plans because of the cost involved? Would you include it in your plans if you could receive financial assistance and procedural advice?

If you answer "yes" to both of these questions you may be interested in some programs that can help make this increasingly important practice a part of your operations, suggests Lynn Pittard, Extension Asst. Soil and Water Conservation Specialist.

The Farmers Home Administration has money available to lend for soil and water conservation work, Pittard explains. As much as \$25,000 may be borrowed and paid back in 20 years or less.

The Agricultural Conservation Program is a cost share program which provides up to 80 percent assistance for conservation practices.

The Great Plains Conservation program, another cost share program, provides assistance to 76 counties in the Great Plains area of Texas. It is administered by the Soil Conservation Service.

**FUMIGATE GARDEN SOIL TO CONTROL ROOT KNOT DISEASE**  
Root knot disease can be controlled in garden soils by fumigation. An excellent way to cut down on soil-borne garden plant diseases is this fumigation.

Remember, the fumigant should be applied at least two weeks before planting. The soil moisture at time of application should be adequate for germinating seed. Before fumigating, remove from the area to be treated all plant trash and roots. Prepare a good seed bed as if for planting. Use a hoe or a plow to open holes 6 to 8 inches deep and 12 inches apart. Apply the fumigant from a fruit jar. Two holes should be punched in the jar lid, one to let the air in and one for distributing the fumigant into the bottom of the furrow. Cover the furrow immediately to prevent loss of fumigant gases.

Use a pint of the following materials to cover about 150 feet of row space — Garden Dowfume D D Soil fume 60 - 40, Isobromene 40 and Bromofume 40 are all effective garden fumigants. First test with water in jar to determine how fast to walk and pour to get proper distribution.

Severe injury may result if fumigant is applied closer than 2 feet of growing plants. Keep material out of eyes or mouth. If accidentally spilled on hands or clothing, remove at once with soap and water or kerosene.

#### INFORMATION FOR AREA COTTON FARMERS

The law under which cotton farmers are operating contains a provision for the voluntary release & realignment of 1959 cotton allotments — when the release is made, the releasing farm retains the acreage as part of its history and is used in figuring future allotments.

The full cotton acreage should be planted on every farm or that released acreage allotment be reapportioned and planted on other farms in order to hold county and state planting history. In 1958 Cochran County measured out over 600 acres short of the allotment plantings. This means that over 600 acres of cotton history was lost to that farm and the county. Add this yearly loss to the cotton acres history and you can see another reason why the county and farm will take a cotton acreage reduction. Example, if 600 farms in the county fail to plant their full cotton acreage by one acre, results in 600 acres lost to the county history. The loss of cotton income can

adversely affect everyone. For that reason we can look upon unused cotton allotments as a matter of community and county concern. Last year over the state — about one acre out of each 20 allotted acres was neither planted nor put into the Soil Bank. Soil Bank farms of course keep their history under the law.

Released allotments may be re-allocated to any old or new cotton farm on which additional acres are needed and will be planted. Again, it is very important that released allotments be reapportioned and planted on other farms in order to hold county and state planting history.

#### FARM INCOME TAX MANAGEMENT

You don't have to be a tax expert to save money when you pay your income tax. It is the right of every tax payer to use every legal means to reduce his income tax.

As an example of good tax management, you might consider paying wages to your children for work done around the farm. Such payments for bona fide services count as farm labor expenses even though you list these children as dependents.

You might also remember that when board is furnished to hired help, the portion of food which is purchased is deductible as a business expense. Many of you may have been overlooking such items. Remember as in any business, adequate records are necessary to substantiate tax reports.

Items of taxable income and business deductions must be accurately shown. Start your planning and accurate record keeping of your operations now.



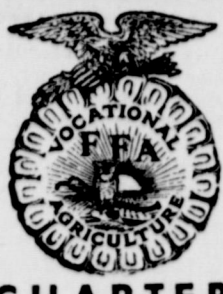

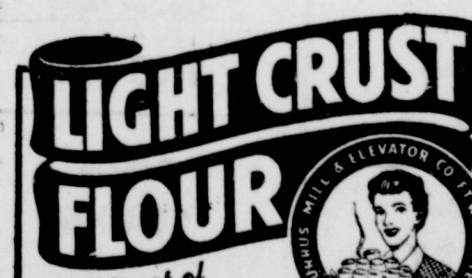
