The date of the election has been set for the first Saturday in April, April 4th. Candidates for the Whiteface School Board should have their petitions filed with H. D. Galvin at Whiteface by tonight. At 5:00 p.m. Wednesday, no names had been filed with the County Judge, Ex-Officio Superintendent, for Morton School District or Bledsoe School District posts. Three County School trustees' terms expire, those of U. F. Wells, Pet. 4; Loyd Brown, Pet. 3; and Ralph Burt, County Trustee at Large.

CITY COMMISSION MOVES TO HALT DANGEROUS PRACTICE OF EMERGENCY VEHICLE CHASING

The City Commission of Morton, Monday night, disturbed over increasing tendency of citizens to follow and get in the way of emergency vehicles, took steps to halt it by adopting an ordinance providing fines of from \$10 to \$50 for the traffic violation. The Commission agreed there was growing concern for the safety of volunteer firemen, for pedestrians and for other motorists in the manner in which people have been racing to fires, behind the fire truck, and blocking the way of volunteer firemen.

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The Commission okayed bills, signed checks, granted two weeks severance pay to former employee Jack Burkes, discussed the paving situation and several other items of city business before adjourning. Mayor Roy Tarver, Jr. and Commissioners Armas Taylor and Roy Gentry were present, along with the City Clerk and a Tribune representative. Also discussed by the group was a proposal by a local women's organization to help in getting the city's streets marked.

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Examinations Open to Fill Position of Postmaster at Baileyboro, Texas

BAILEYBORO (Spl.) — An examination for Fourth - Class Postmaster for the post office at Baileyboro, Texas, \$2078 a year, will be open for acceptance of applications until March 24, 1959, the Commission announced today. Applicants must actually reside within the territory supplied by the above-mentioned post office and they must have reached their 18th birthday on the closing date for acceptance of applications. There is no maximum age limit. However, persons who have passed the age of 70 may be considered only for temporary renewable appointments of one year. Complete information about the examination requirements and instructions for filing applications may be obtained at the post office for which this examination is being announced. Application forms must be filed with the U. S. Civil Service Commission, Washington, 25, D. C., and must be received or postmarked not later than the closing date.

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100 COUNTIES SEND REPRESENTATIVES TO A&M MEETING

Visions of a far greater future for Texas and the South today overshadow hallowed memories of a glorious past.

A future of unlimited opportunities is unfolding for the entire region.

Tally the natural wealth. It is there to be utilized.

The South today has one-third of the good farm land of the Nation. It has two-thirds of all the land with 40 inches of rainfall or more a year. And it has a long growing season. This gives the South a natural advantage in the production of food and fiber, of livestock and feed.

Because of these things, the South is the richest region in the nation in renewable resources.

There is the potential wealth of the sea. The South faces a sea frontier on two sides. It has nearly 600 miles more seacoast than the North and West combined.

There is industry. We have it in

the paper mill at Lufkin, steel production at Daingerfield, rubber & chemicals along the Gulf Coast.

Most important, Texas and the South, are experiencing a silent revolution in technology. This based on a trilogy of natural resources. I'm speaking of the petrochemical industry.

Major industries, we're told, develop by bringing together a combination of resources. And the combination that has made this possible for Texas is oil, sulphur and water.

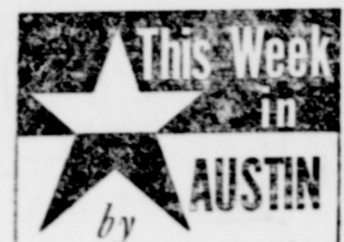
The South, including Texas, produces 45 percent of the Nation's oil, 100 per cent of the Nation's sulphur, and it has the fresh water.

Ahead for the petrochemical industry are its greatest years of growth.

Totaled, these assets add up to one thing:

Opportunity to make tomorrow for Texas and the South and the Nation a better, happier day.

That is our job. God willing, that is what I intend to do.

This session thus far has been distinguished by very few controversial issues.

Normally by this time, many issues of legislation have been actively debated by House and Senate members. Some observers here at the capital say that one reason for the sluggishness in the debating department is the absence of major pressure issues, and the atmosphere of excitement.

It has been pointed out that the 54th and 55th Legislatures had their side attractions of veteran land scandals, U S Trust and Guaranty collapse and the naturpath bribery case. All of these and the resulting "clean up" movements offered ample opportunity for Legislators to sound off in both chambers.

The nature of the most serious problems facing the 56th Legislature has been financial — headed

by the question of gathering additional revenue to balance the spending requirements of the two year appropriation period ahead. However, the mechanics of weeks of hearings on the biennial budget have not yet figured into the early stages of Legislative activity. In these hearings the budget will be tacked down to accurate requirements.

Because of the lack of debate thus far, it is difficult to appraise the temperament of the new Legislature. Not many of the new members have had a chance for some practice on the floor at what veteran observers call "the snorting pole."

Still smoldering in the background are the after-effects of the speakership race between Representatives Waggoner Carr and Joe Burgett. The announcement by Rep. Burgett that he would not campaign for speaker of the next Legislature will enable him to "shoot from the shoulder" in the pending showdown on appropriations and revenue.



TAX HEARING CONTINUES

The Taxation Committee is continuing its hearing. This week the committee spent all week on House Bill 33 by Seeligson. House Bill 33 is a tax codification bill. Texas tax laws are noted for being piecemeal and patchwork.

Although I would like to see this bill changed in some respects, I feel that in general, Texas certainly needs a tax code containing all our various tax statutes. If this is done, then we will be able to see more clearly what portion of our income and expenditures for state taxes.

JUDICIAL DISTRICT
Rep. Wesley Roberts of Lamesa and I were successful last Friday in passing House Bill 87 out of the House. This measure created a new judicial district for our area. This district, the 121st, will be composed of Cochran, Hockley, Terry, and Yoakum counties.

Lynn, Garza, Dawson, and Gaines Counties will remain in the 106th judicial district. This measure, when passed by the Senate and signed by the Governor, will give the South Plains area a new judicial district and, of course, allow a new district judge and district attorney.

SPECIAL SESSION NOW APPEARS A CERTAINTY

Earlier I had implied that a special session was probable, but it now appears certain that Governor Daniel will, of necessity, have to call a special session of the Legislature to consider money matters. Governor Daniel has not yet attempted to coordinate his program but has refused to concede many portions of his program. Unfortunately, all of his proposals, are not good. If we are to get by without a special session the Governor will have to "get off his high horse" and get down to some shirt-sleeve work with the members of the Legislature.

SENATOR Yarborough's Report

As one means of keeping our military defense strong, the Congress will soon extend the draft to June 30, 1963. Many of us wish we did not have to continue to draft our young men. But the Communist Cold War, which at times threatens to become a shooting war, leaves us no other choice.

The draft extension and the cold war will mean that nearly 4 1/2 million young Americans will serve terms in the armed forces in the next four years. The most serious result of the draft is that it causes many young men to fail to get a college education or sound technical training.

This happens because a young man getting out of high school, instead of thinking about going to college, is more concerned with the draft. By the time he completes his military service, a young man is often matured to the point he wants to take a job, get married and raise a family. The tragedy is that he has missed vital college or technical training years, those years which would equip him to earn a good living for a family.

To help correct this basic problem for present and future American families, I have introduced a Cold War Veterans Bill. It provides for extension of the G.I. Bill of Rights to all those men and women who have kept, and will keep our nation strong during the Cold War. The benefits include one and one half days of college training for each day of military service; vocational rehabilitation for disabled veterans; and home loan guarantees for veterans. These benefits would be available to all those veterans who have served since the Koran G.I. Bill ended on January 31, 1955. In addition, my bill provides \$100 mustering out pay for veterans honorably discharged after enactment of the act.

This bill would re-establish one of the greatest educational programs in American history. Under the G.I. Bill our nation was provided 450,000 engineers; 180,000 doctors and nurses; 113,000 physicists and research scientists; 238,000 teachers; 710,000 skilled mechanics and many others. Under my bill, our nation would have the benefit of several million more highly trained citizens.

Most important, this bill would allow millions of our young men who serve in the armed forces to set a goal of higher education or training. It would allow them to

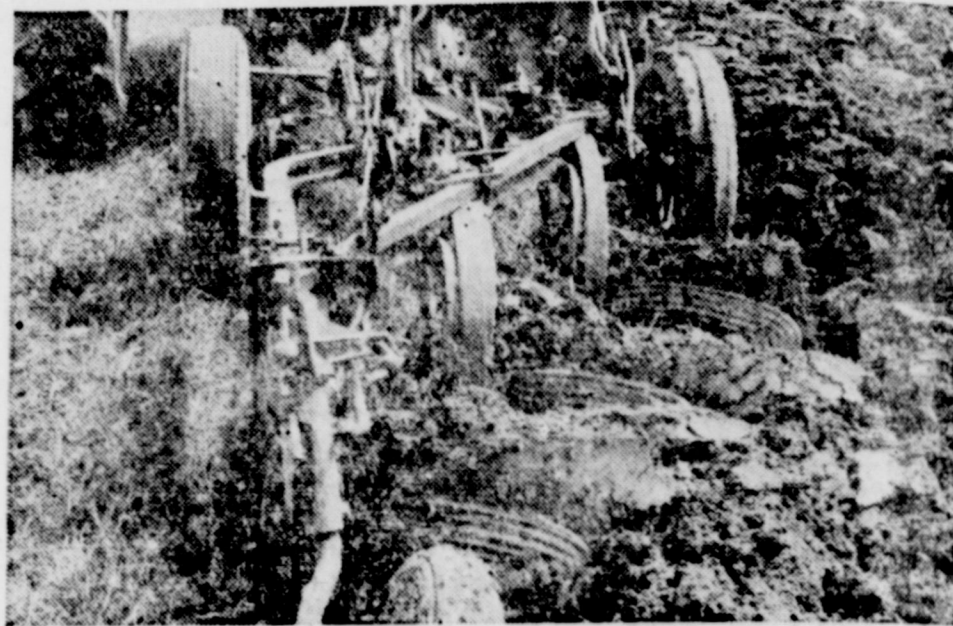

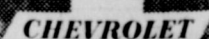

Another factor is the cost of sending for blood. Often a patient requires a lot of blood, and even though a large group of people may be willing to give blood, if the blood had been obtained from a Lubbock blood bank, it must be either paid for or returned at an additional, not necessary, inconvenience to the donors — the trip to Lubbock.

One other factor of importance is the possibility that you may have a rare type of blood. It would be to your advantage to know, and to have your family know, in advance of any emergency, just who in the area has your type blood.

The walking blood bank has the enthusiastic support of Dewitt Alsup, hospital administrator, who also urges everyone to have their blood typed. A permanent record of all persons whose blood has been typed, how often they have donated, and any reasons limiting their ability to donate blood, will be kept on file at the hospital.

And, oh yes, any of you folks who happen to come up AB positive, if the editor of the Tribune has offended you in any way, he is extremely sorry — infinitely sorer than he would be if your blood were A, B, or AB negative, or even type O.

So you can see why the editor is supporting this drive. We hafta stick together in times of emergency, there are too few of us to take any chances.

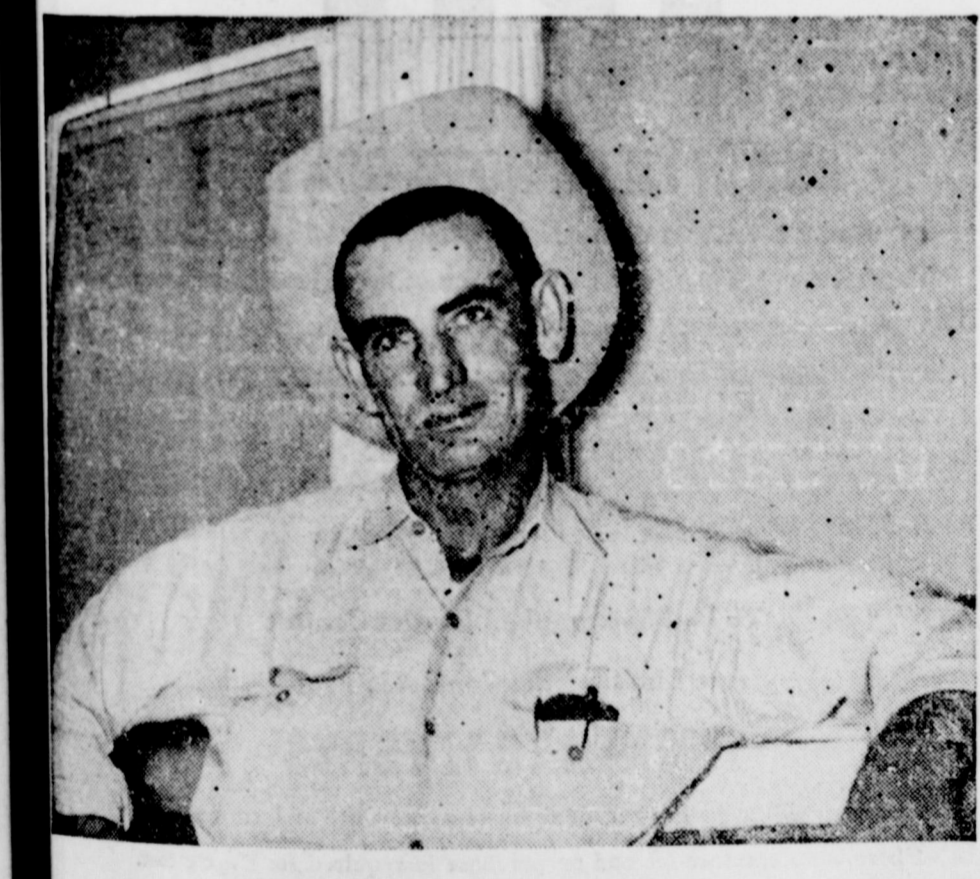

LENTEN MEALS

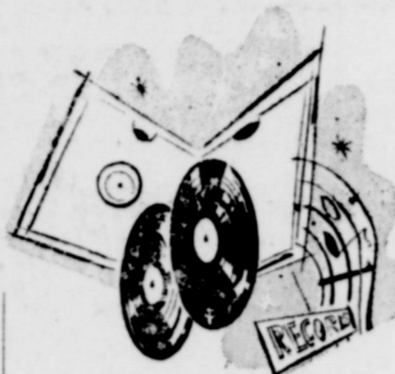
