FARM LABOR IS BEING UNIONIZED NOW

Can you stand a strike during your irrigation period and **ESPECIALLY** during harvest time? Can you meet whatever requirements for housing may be specified by the Department of Labor? These, **MR. FARMER**, are just a few of the things that you are being faced with as new Farm Labor Regulations are being forced upon you now **PROPOSED** June 1, 1959.

Fellow citizens, this meeting is of the utmost importance to you. Make every effort to attend and urge your neighbors to attend with you.

control committees are working overtime — especially on the control of bindweed. Prevention is the best control for bindweeds and other weeds. To do this, buy certified seed — then you will find your planting seed is free from noxious weeds. Last year, over 300 acres of bindweed was treated in Hale County. It is estimated that Hale County has over 3600 acres of bindweed. It costs from \$100 to \$300 an acre to treat and eliminate bindweed. Bindweed should be treated at once. If you locate it on your farm or in bar ditches, please contact your County Agent.

To further the advancement in planting of certified seed — certified seed label and seal should mean that the seed has these characteristics — produced in fields isolated from other fields of the same crop, rogued, and off-type plants removed before blooming, the seed are free from noxious weeds, have a satisfactory germination and can be traced back directly to the original seed.

TEMPORARY SUMMER PASTURES

The need for summer temporary pastures is greater now than ever, because of poor native pastures. Temporary pastures rest other pastures, besides it gives better grazing values.

Good crops recommended for temporary pastures are: pearl millet, sudan, perennial sweet sorgrass and sorghum alnum.

Sudan will likely give the best quality of grazing, pearl millet will not do too well on the more sandier lands. Where sudan yellows out, you may try pearl millet, either Common, or Georgia Hybrid No. 1 or Texas No. 7 variety.

Perennial sweet sorgrass has sweet stalk, but is coarser than sudan; it is an annual and gives more grazing in mid-summer to fall than sudan.

Sorghum alnum is non-sweet & has a larger stalk than sudan. It gives more grazing from mid-summer to fall than sudan, but may give trouble from prussic acid. When grazed heavily, it will act like an annual.

The planting rate per acre of sudan in 40 inch rows is from 7 to 10 pounds, perennial sorgrass 4 to 5 pounds, and Sorghum alnum 3 to 5 pounds. It is best to stagger the plantings at two to four weeks intervals to prevent all being re-

ady to graze at the same time. If you fertilize, put down in bands to conserve the amount of application.

To control GREEN Moss, ALGAE or CHARA in TANKS — use copper sulfate. Secure leaflet at County Agent's office. Chemicals for aquatic plant control are not harmful to fish or livestock if used properly. Treat with chemicals at about two weeks intervals covering about one third of weedy area per treatment.

TEN DAY AVERAGE SOIL TEMPERATURE

The past ten day average soil temperature 16 miles north west of Morton on the E. C. Wynn farm was 50 degrees. Last reading was taken on this average on Saturday, April 25th.

According to the Lubbock paper, the ten day average has reached 60 degrees.

April plantings of cotton at the Lubbock Experiment Station have never exceeded the May plantings in 44 years of tests.

4-H RIFLE SAFETY AND SHOOTING

During the month of April, 1959, there have been 8 rifle safety training meetings held with a total of 167 individuals attending all meetings. All meetings were held at the caliche pit rifle range except one which was held on April 6 at the County Building.

There have been 6 adults attending each meeting. Forty two 4-H boys and girls enrolled in this training.

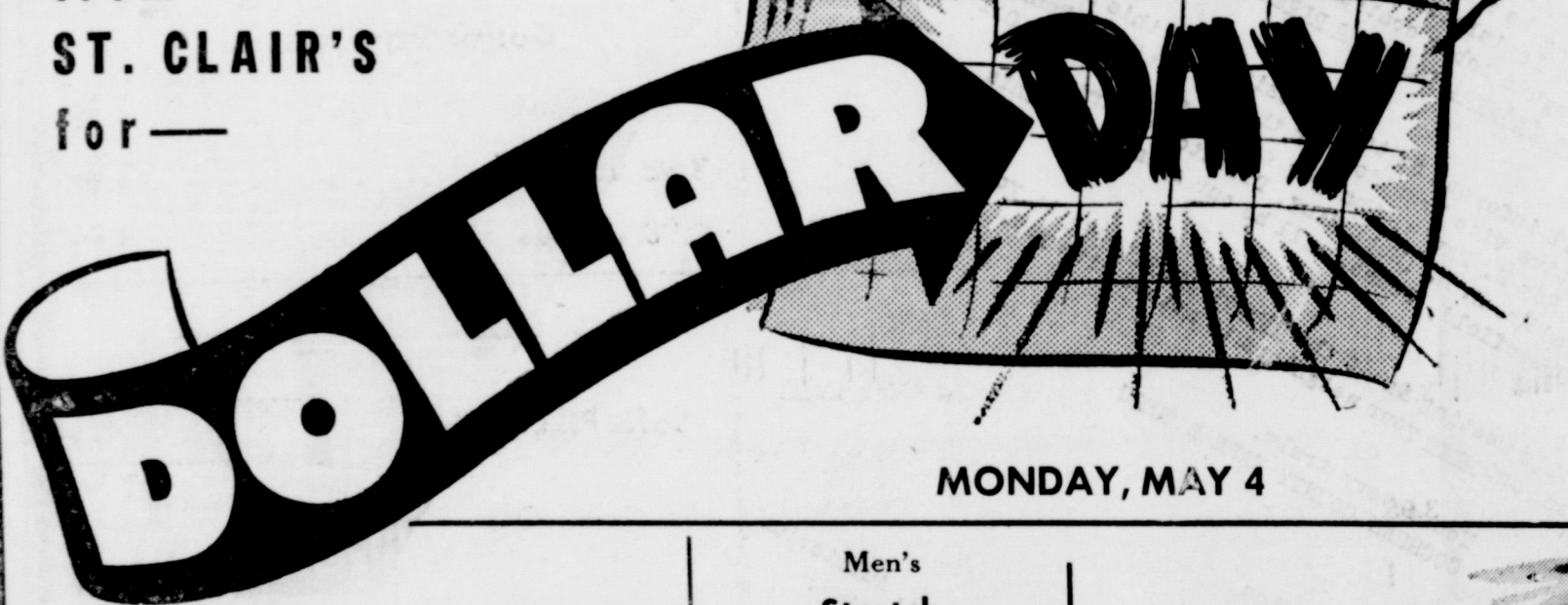

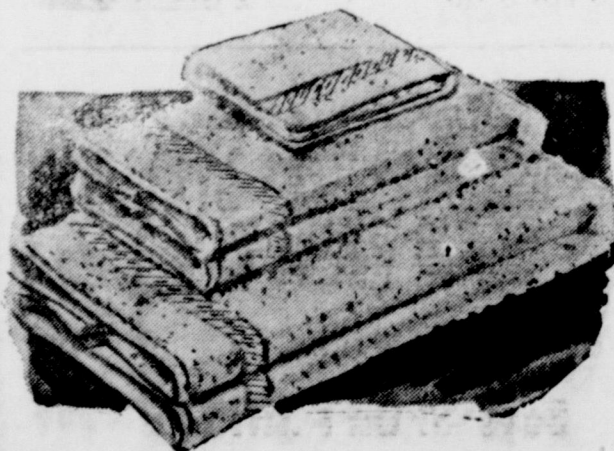

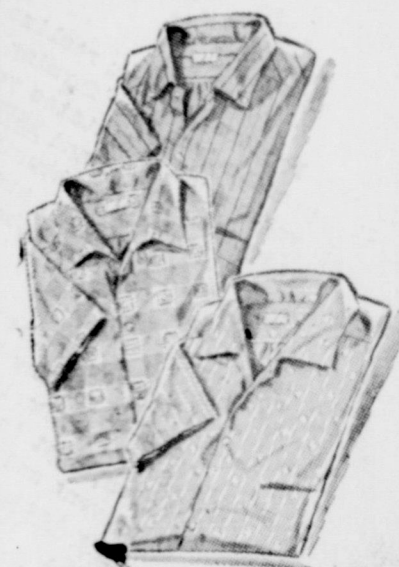

Yarborough's Report

Many people have written me about my proposal to extend the provisions of the Korean G.I. Bill to "Cold War veterans." This proposed new law would extend the educational assistance, vocational rehabilitation, home loan guaranties and mustering - out pay provisions through 1963. The main feature of the new measure is its educational provisions. The Korean G. I. Bill ended on January 31, 1955. The Yarborough Bill would provide 1 1/2 days of college training for each day of active military service for veterans, with a maximum of three years college training. The subsistence pay would be at the same rate as in the Korean G.I. Bill. This Bill would also extend vocational rehabilitation and home loan guaranties and would provide for \$100 mustering out pay for veterans honorably discharged after the bill is passed. All these benefits would be extended through 1963, when the draft law ends. The measure is now being considered by the Senate Veterans Affairs Subcommittee, of which I am chairman. I am pleased to report that in hearings held recently, the Yarborough Bill was endorsed by representatives of Universities and Colleges, state vocational training units, veterans organizations, veterans and their families and others. Testimony before the subcommittee has shown that about one out of every two men who served in World War II, or 7,800,000 veterans, received educational training under the first G. I. Bill. Another two million veterans of the Korean conflict also received this training under a similar measure. Educators tell me veterans made better grades and conducted themselves better at college than the non-veterans. When they finished, the training helped them earn higher income and pay more taxes than non-veterans, statistics show. And more than a fourth of the veterans who received this training became scientists and engineers. One witness quoted the Bradley Commission Report which said, "The veteran's educational program was a major contribution to

the national welfare, and the country would be weaker educationally, economically, and in terms of national defense, if educators, veterans organizations, the president and the congress had not seen fit to embark upon this new and momentous educational enterprise."

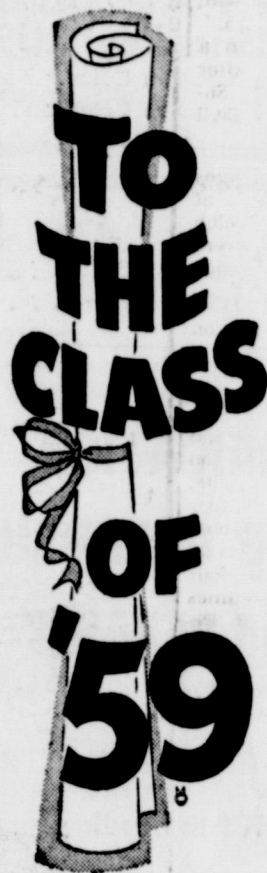

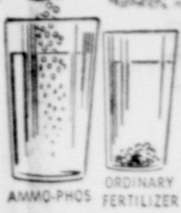

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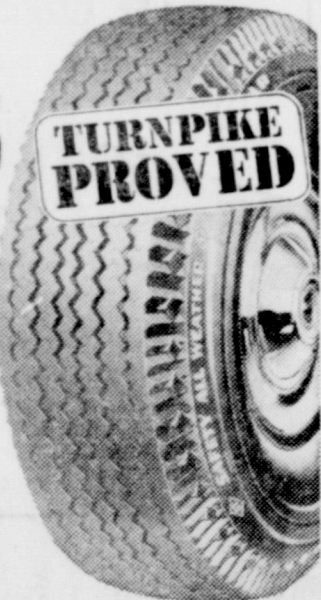

 Parents were attending at most of the meetings and their interest has increased in this training.

Bob Pierce has been a great instructor in teaching entomology to the 4-H boys. Next year we hope to improve the program by adding some 4-H girls to the training.
 In all of these programs competition makes for faster learning and more study advises the agent.
 Color slides of all 60 insects to be used in the test for identification have been shown in three meetings. Besides the identification of insects the boys should know the type of mouth parts, stages they do their damage, host plants, life

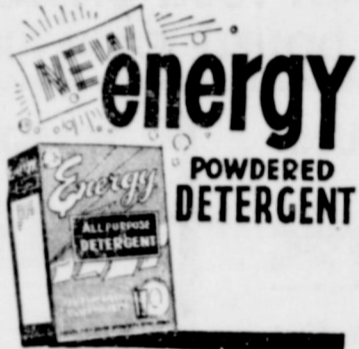

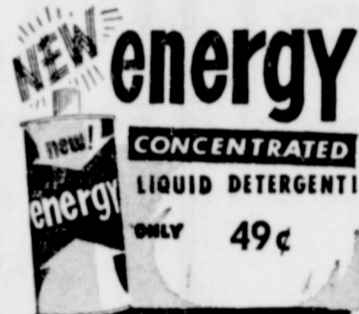
