asked if the names were checked to ascertain if there were indeed 10 per cent of the qualified voters' names on the petitions.

Mayor Tarver was asked certain questions about persons circulating the petitions and was also asked if it were true that special water rates were promised to elderly persons.

Councilman Gentry asked why the mayor did not wait until Monday (the meeting date) to call the election, and discuss the proposition with the Commissioners.

Rose asked how come he hadn't seen the petitions and none of those in the room had seen them. Two of the guests said they had seen one.

However, it was not ascertained at the meeting, whether the original petitioning group had asked for a certain proposed election date.

Mayor Tarver also told the group, in answer to questions that the petitions came up after the last regular meeting of the council, and that he had attempted to contact other members of the commission about the matter.

The mayor was asked by Russell if he had signed the petition calling the election before the ten per cent of the qualified voters had signed them.

out that the petitions did not call the election that papers prepared by an attorney were presented to him, which he signed, after the ten per cent had signed the petitions.

The group was advised that the Tribune was interested in publishing the opposition reasons concerning the election.

Mayor Tarver, on request, explained the procedure of the election, the number of proposed aldermen, the subsequent election to name alderman and the future elections.

In a heated discussion the mayor told the group they had every right to disagree, to campaign against the change in city government, and assured them he would be happy whatever the voters decided.

In other matters handled by the Commission the minutes of the last previous meeting were read. The Council agreed to erect a stop sign at the north and south corners of the intersection of the streets at the corner of the Veteran's Hall in an attempt to ease a traffic hazard and slowdown at the corner north which makes it difficult for church traffic going east and west to get through on Wednesday and Sunday nights.

The Council approved payment of \$150 per month salary to the caretaker of the Little League

AFTER INCOME TAX RETURNS

Now that the tax returns are in, most of us have a better picture of last year's family living expenses. Extension home management specialists say it's an ideal time to analyze the overall financial situation, and perhaps make some changes in the personal or family savings plan.

Speaking of savings and investment - were you able to hold your own or make progress in that respect? And, did fixed expenses for items such as food, clothing and living costs leave you with a safe margin for operating and meeting possible emergencies?

If you are not happy about the way your money is going, have you found the reason? Try listing the expenses that are fixed for every month in the year - the insurance premiums, your housing mortgage orrent, debts or installment payments. Your property taxes may be relatively fixed. So are food costs, if you buy from a well-made plan according to a food standard. Your utility bills are likely to follow a pattern through the seasons.

Analyze your records with the family, so you can plan what to do with what is left after the fixed expenses. Get the members to agree on one or two areas of living that can be managed on less money. It could be that a saving can be made by watching the use of utilities or the family car. Perhaps it means using less credit, planning more family fun at home, to cut recreation costs, or dropping certain magazines and taking others.

Whatever the decision, make a workable plan to carry it out, and take stock occasionally to see how the plan is working.

"Money - Family Style," an extension bulletin, gives some ideas for making a money management plan. You can get copies from your county home demonstration agent's office.

EGGS FOR NOW

Eggs deserve top billing on every shopping list these days. They are always a good buy, but are especially so in view of their low price levels.

Eggs are rich in protein, iron and vitamin A. One egg contains 75 calories.

Zippy Hot Egg Salad Can be served as a main dish where meat is not on the menu. 5 hot hard-cooked eggs, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1/4 teaspoon pepper, 3 tablespoons chopped green onions, 3 tablespoons snipped parsley, 1/2 cup mayonnaise, 2 tablespoons catsup or chili sauce, 1 teaspoon prepared mustard. Into warm bowl slice hard-cooked eggs. Add salt, pepper, onions and parsley, tossing lightly. Combine mayonnaise, catsup and mustard. Mix lightly with egg mixture. Serve in lettuce cups or hot buttered toast or rolls.
