

STAR Lites

Workmen in Topeka, Kansas, railroad yard are busy these days hammering out re-creation of one of the most storied portions of the Texas heritage -- a visual portrayal of the Chisholm Trail -- which, during 1967 celebrates the centennial of its founding.

Plans for a mobile history of the Chisholm Trail, over which ten million cattle started their way from Texas to northern markets, have been announced by the Texas Chisholm Trail Centennial Commission, named last year by Governor John Connally with Roger Conger of Waco, chairman. In conjunction with similar commissions from Oklahoma and Kansas, the Texas commission is outfitting a museum on rails, donated and refitted by the Santa Fe Railroad.

The Chisholm Trail exhibit car will visit as many towns as possible along the historic trail during the period from June to October. Precise schedules will be announced later, a commission spokesman in Austin announced. Between ten and fifteen stops in Texas are anticipated, including some areas that were not precisely on the trail but which fed cattle into it.

In Topeka the 60-foot museum car is presently in the Santa Fe yards being outfitted with display cases, special lighting and sound, and being air-conditioned. Included in the blueprint for renovation is a small counter for selling Chisholm Trail souvenirs, special publications, and the like to the public.

The front part of the car will be used to tell the story each state played in the cattle drives.

The first display cases will be devoted to Texas, where the Trail began and the drives originated. The exhibits will show the different types of cattle and tell the generalized story of the round-ups, the cattle drovers, their horses, and the development of the highly specialized equipment used by man to drive the large herds of wild, almost unmanageable cattle up the Chisholm Trail.

The Oklahoma display cases will tell the story of the actual drives, the river crossings, and the Indian encounters.

Kansas' display cases will finish the monumental story with the railroads and the cow-towns that grew up around them, the loading of cattle for eastern markets, and the peace officers enforcing law and order among the unruly and fun-seeking cowboys after the long drive.

The second half of the rail car will have three large exhibit areas. The first will depict a cowboy and his horse in full working regalia.

The second area will be devoted to the camp cook and his chuck wagon. This exhibit will contain the working end of a full-sized chuck wagon.

The third area will contain art work by Charles Russell and Frederic Remington, the artists who romanticized the west in paintings and sculpture.

Other displays on barbed wire, spurs, guns, branding irons, etc., will be included throughout the car.

The Centennial celebration commemorates the largest movement of animals by man in the history of the world -- in the years 1866 through 1884 more than a half million cattle were driven each year from Texas to the loading pens in Kansas for shipment to eastern meat markets.

The idea of a Chisholm Trail was conceived by a young Illinois cattle trader, Joseph G. McCoy, who was concerned over the fact that Texas had four million cattle and the North was going meat hungry because there were no rail connections to the markets. In 1867, he persuaded Texas cattlemen to trail their cattle to a small hamlet at the end of a railroad -- Abilene, Kansas -- and at the same time he persuaded the railroads to build cattle cars, loading pens, a cowboy's hotel, stock tanks, corrals, and all the other necessary items for a complete cattle town. He brought the two -- the cattle and the buyers, together the first trail was a huge success, and one of the epic stories in Texas and American history was begun.

Springs Tell About Vacation To Europe

"It's hard to tell what we liked the best, but it was everything we expected it to be," is the way Mr. and Mrs. Frank Spring explain their month-long tour of Europe from which they returned recently.

Frye Inspects MBP Location

Gene Frye, president of the Missouri Beef Packers, Inc., board of directors, flew to Friona last weekend and took care of a few business matters preparatory to setting up a construction office for the future Friona plant of MBP.

While in Friona, Frye inspected the construction site, double-checking it against a survey of the land which he previously obtained. He had drawn plans for the Friona plant, and was checking them against the site itself, according to attorney Doyle Elliott, who visited with him.

The MBP official indicated that he would return to Friona as soon as possible following Memorial Day, locate his trailer house at the plant site and set up construction headquarters.

The Springs toured 10 European countries, and were accompanied on part of the trip by their son Frank Lewis, who has been a speech student in Germany.

The local couple left April 12 and returned home May 18. They spent eight days in Spain on the first leg of their journey, and then spent a few days in each of the other places. "We came back in good physical condition. They make you walk a good deal over there," quipped Spring. He pointed out that most Europeans either walk or ride bicycles to and from work.

The Springs saw Switzerland from a tourist train, which had the "bubble" top and long glass panels for walls. "Their trains over there are powered by electricity. They are so much faster than ours," Spring said.

Mrs. Spring, an artist in her own right, had a lot to say for the artwork, she saw, especially of the "old masters" in Italy. "There were numerous statues for sale -- most of which were copies of famous statues. I'd like to have brought one home," she said.

The people of Europe all seem happy, the Springs said. They emphasized that everywhere they went, they were made to feel welcome, and people showed them the utmost courtesy. They saw or felt absolutely no anti-American feeling whatsoever.

Among the pretty sights they saw were Holland (Netherlands) where it was the time of year that the tulips were in full bloom. "You see enormous patches of various colors," the Springs said.

Frank, who is an agriculturalist at heart, observed that animals are still used to a large extent in farming operations. Progress is especially lagging in this respect. "The people really take care of their little farms, though. They keep every acre in cultivation," he said.

Every little town in Spain has its castle, and it is located on top of a hill. This was for defense purposes in the early days, the travellers stated. Venice, Italy, which is built on water, also had a defense as a motive when it was first built. "Their enemy didn't have boats Spring explained.

A sidelight to Venice is the fact that there are traffic lights for the boats or gondolas.

An oddity of sorts brought out by the Springs about their trip is the fact that they were required to pay a "deportation tax" (amounting to about \$1.50) whenever they left most of the countries.

Finding good food was no problem to the Friona travellers. "We never were disappointed by the food," said Spring, who explained that the couple often went off the beaten track to find restaurants where the food would be more "native."

Once in Italy, they were served a 15-course dinner. The Springs explained that the evening meal is never served before 9 or 10 p.m. "And if it is anything special, it may be midnight," they said. Countries visited by the Springs include Spain, Portugal, Italy, Austria, Switzerland, Germany, West Germany, Holland, France, Belgium and England.

Some of the places they visited included Lisbon, Madrid, Rome, Florence, Venice, Milan, Zurich, Amsterdam, Paris and London.

"Everyone who talked to us about going to Europe said we'd never regret it, and they are sure right," said the Springs, of their first such trip.

ELEMENTARY

Names Added To School Buildings

Names have recently been placed on buildings of the elementary school campus. The building on the east side of the campus is known as the Primary School. This building was constructed in 1954 while Dalton Caffey was superintendent and Roy Clements was president of the school board. At this time the building housed the first, second and third grades. Now the primary building takes care of first and second grades except one section of second graders go across the street. The building on the south side of the campus is known as the Grade School Building. It was constructed in 1956. Dillie Kelley was superintendent and D.

C. Herring was president of the school board. This building takes care of the third and fourth grade pupils. It was originally built for seventh and eighth grades.

The Old Red building housed the fourth, fifth and sixth grades but when it became necessary to expand, the new high school building was constructed in the west part of town and the Old Red building was demolished and a new wing was added to the building originally constructed for the seventh and eighth grades.

Upon completion of the new high school building grades nine through twelve were moved out and grades five, six, sev-

en and eight were moved to the old high school building, which is known as the Junior High School. Grades three and four were placed in the building on the extreme south side of the campus and it is now designated Grade School.

The old cafeteria building, directly in front of and across the street from the Primary Building is now known as the Grade School Cafeteria and takes care of all students in grades one through eight. After school hours this cafeteria is also available for community activities.

Services Held For R.L. Bates

Funeral services were held last Saturday for R.L. Bates, who first put Friona "on the map" as far as girls basketball is concerned.

Bates took girls teams to the state tournament three times back during "McCamie League" playoffs, where 16 teams made up the state meet, all battling for one trophy.

He had been connected with the teaching profession 20 years before being felled by stroke and a heart attack in 1958 which left him unconscious for six weeks. He survived all of this, overcoming paralysis and blindness.

The 1946-47 basketball team coached by Bates compiled the longest winning streak in FHS-winning 43 straight games enroute to a 44-1 season record.

He had been teaching at Rhea when the school consolidated with Friona, and began his coaching career here. In his second year as girls' coach, he took the team to the state tournament.

The Squaws were state runners-up in 1945-46, with a 30-

3 mark, and were third the year they posted a 44-1 record. Their two-year record of 74-4 has not been equaled since.

Former coach Baker Duggins tied Bates in 1963-64 by taking his third Squaw team to the state meet.

Bates interrupted his career for three years in the Coast Guard during World War II. Bates left Friona after the 1947 school year, and was superintendent of schools at Channing, Estelline and Sunray. The Bates family returned to Friona in 1959.

Funeral services were conducted from Sixth Street Church of Christ at 2:30 p.m., Saturday, May 27. C.J. Horton, local preacher and Pat Powell, Church of Christ preacher from Panhandle, officiated.

Pallbearers were the six surviving brothers of the deceased Coy Bates, J.R. Bates, Leon Bates, Wayne Bates and Frank Bates.

Brothers-in-law served as honorary pallbearers. They were David Sides, Nelson Welch, Eugene Boggess, Harold Lillard, Dalton Teague and Don Hunt.

AN EDITORIAL

What Ever Happened To Grade Averages?

For some years now we've published honor rolls for the Friona schools, without paying a lot of attention to them. We did note that the method of listing the students was quite different from the honor roll lists when we were still in school, but just this week we've taken a good look at the local system. Friona schools list students on the honor roll as to the number of A's and B's made -- and the grade average is not taken into consideration.

If a student makes all A's except in one subject, where he might make a high C -- he doesn't make the list. He has to make all A's and B's. He may make A's all year and then make a high B on one subject, this knocks him off the all A list.

To take a hypothetical case, a student might have a 98 average in four subjects, but fall to 79 in a fifth. This would still leave him with a 94 average for the semester, but he would not be on any part of the honor roll, due to the C.

Another student, however, might make an 80 average in four subjects, and a 90 in a fifth, for a semester average of 82, and he would make the honor roll, due to making all B's and A's.

What ever happened to the old grade-average system? Our schools are built around the grade average. When you determine a student's grade, it's not how many A's, B's, etc., he made -- it's the average that goes down in the grade book.

Why isn't grade average used on the honor roll? It seems to us to be a more fair gauge of the student's ability. Surely the compilation of grade averages isn't too much of a chore, or beyond the ability of those compiling the grades.

Pause And Reflect

Being a Virginian this writer is well aware of the importance of historical shrines. Jamestown, Yorktown and Williamsburg, and countless other places have not only been a boon to education and a source of pride to the native population, but have also been responsible for bringing thousands of tourists and millions of dollars into the various communities.

In a very few years any article pertaining to the old ranches, especially the XIT, will be priceless heirlooms. There are those who will scoff of the idea of an old oil lamp or a piece of barbed wire being of interest to future Frionans, but in Kansas some types of barbed wire costs ten dollars a foot! The old XIT headquarters north of town should be restored and advertised as a tourist attraction.

Markers should be placed at the sites of the first public buildings, churches, Post Offices, homes. An old adobe building or a dugout, an old trail, an old cemetery all these should be photographed and their histories written. Grandpa's blacksmith tools and his farm implements are already antiques.

How many people know that in 1542 Coronado passed near Friona?

About one hundred years ago the English writer Lord Macaulay said that people who were not proud of the deeds of their forefathers would seldom do anything of which their descendants would be proud.

Why not make a start now on a small museum, maybe it could be combined with the library.

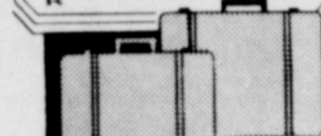

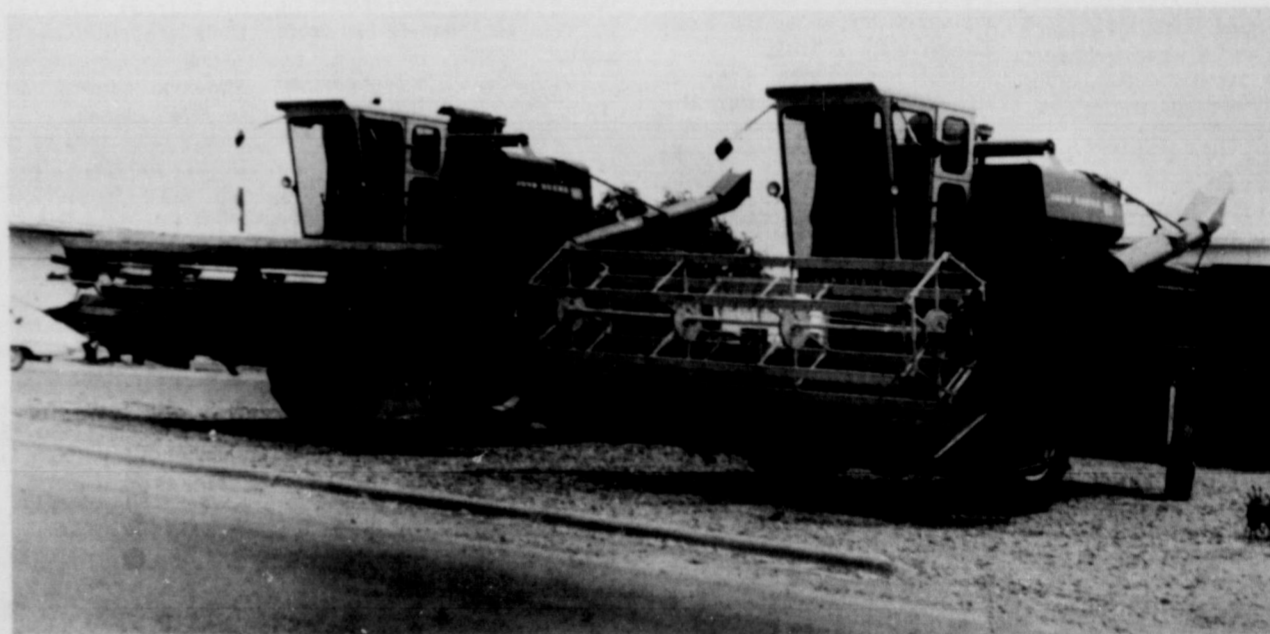
Texas Technological College before enlisting in the armed forces.

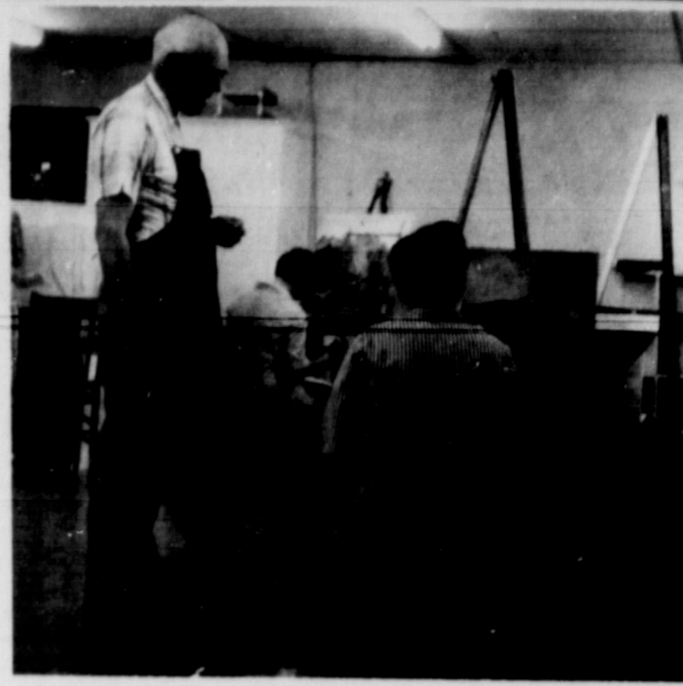

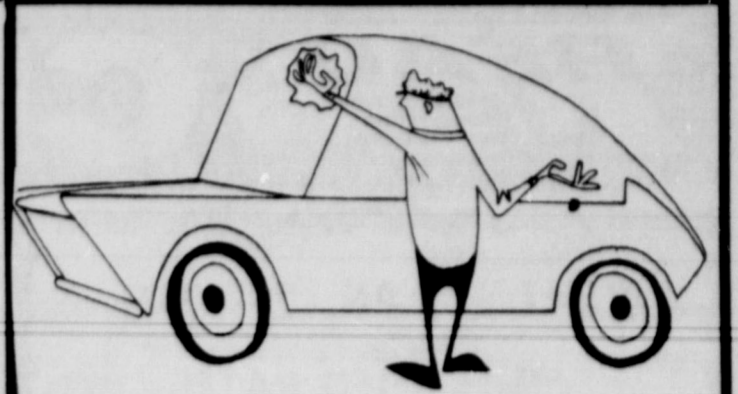
ART CLASS . . . Dr. Dean F. Merritt is shown instructing his Friona art class, whose work will be on display Sunday in Clovis.

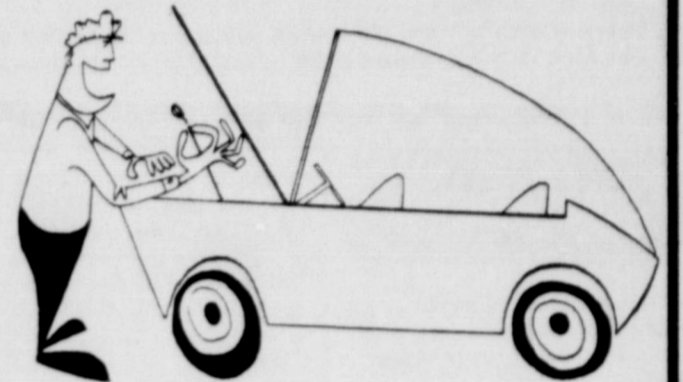

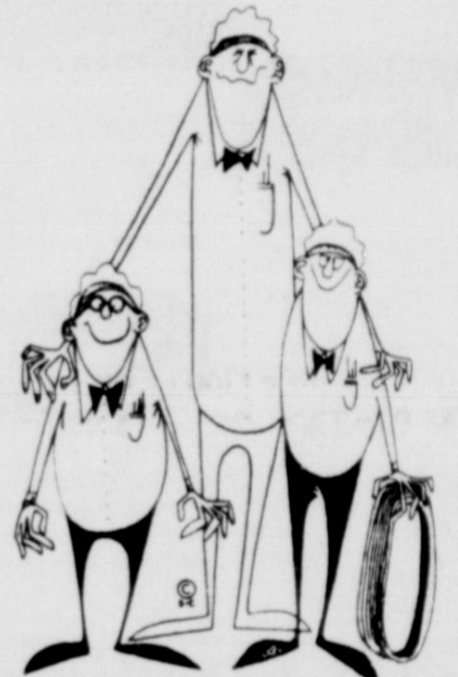



On The Farm In Parmer County

This has been a hectic year to get a crop established and going according to many farmers visited over the county. Pre-plant irrigation moisture ran out in places before planting time. Sugar beets are looking real good over the county and making good growth. Growers should be on the lookout for the beet leafhopper. This insect causes little damage, however it is the vector for Curly Top Virus. The identification of the beet leafhopper is hard to make. It resembles several other leafhoppers. Identification has to be made by professional entomologist.

Leaf spot is a disease often

attacking beets. It seems to be worse in rainy seasons. A fungicide should be applied at first symptoms.

Some cotton fields are up to fairly good stands and others are still coming up.

Early season insects that first attack cotton are thrips and fleahoppers. Thrips cause the most damage from emergence until early squaring. Thrip damage is characterized by wilted wrinkled, blackened leaves and terminal growth. Shedding of small squares is another thrip damage symptom.

Fleahoppers damage small squares causing them to shed from the plant. During early fruiting period 15-20 fleahoppers per 100 plants is generally considered an economic infestation.

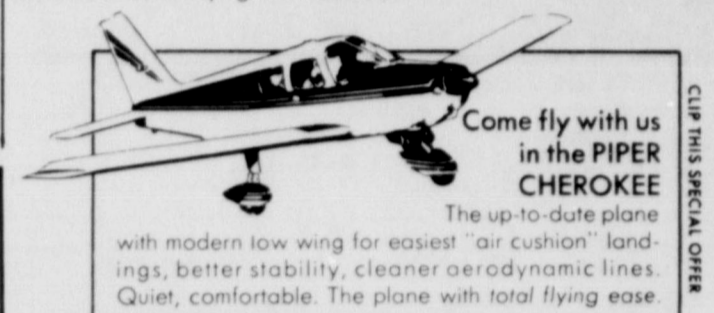
