## HIGHWAY WORK FOR 1960 ANNOUNCED

### HIGHWAY IMPROVEMENT SET FOR COUNTY

The Texas Highway Department will spend \$6,800.00 for US and State Highway betterment in Cochran County during 1960, D. C. Greer, State Highway Engineer, has announced.

At the December meeting of the Texas Highway Commission, funds were appropriated for im-

provements on US and State Highways over the State. Not only surface and base strengthening but also shoulder improvement is included in the work which specific US and State Highways are scheduled to receive, Greer stated. This is in addition to the regular construction and maintenance program already programmed for the counties concerned, the State Highway Engineer said.

Work scheduled for Cochran County is State Highway 214 from the Bailey County line to Morton. The estimate cost for 6.2 miles of Seal Coat is \$6,800.

### EARLIER STATEMENT CORRECTED

#### Bula Girls Team Is On Probation

#### But Retains Right to Compete for Title

Bula coaches hastened to correct the Tribune last week for a misunderstanding concerning the status of the Bula girls' basketball team.

The team was placed on probation for violation of a Texas Interscholastic League rule on how many games a girl can participate in during a week. With that probation went their chances of competing in the State Tournament last year.

But Coach Melvin Howard called the team to assure the Tribune that the Bula girls are eligible for conference play and for state tournament play this year. They are on probation, but it does not carry with it any forfeiture of rights to compete this season.

The action against the school was taken last spring during the basketball playoffs. Bula, with a very strong team, had played a lot of B string girls in A games, giving them more chance to see varsity action, and helping hold down some of the scores. This practice, of substituting reserves is generally understood to be good practice. However, the B string girls, who competed in both A string and B string games, thus played in too many games

### "POLITIKING" MAY WARM UP — February 1, Deadline for Candidates To File For A Place on the Ballot

Rolling in with the New Year will be political "politicking". And, before any person may take part in such science Webster defines a "politician" as one versed or experienced in the science of Government, one must have a poll tax receipt or an exemption certificate.

Poll taxes are for eligible voters between the ages of 21 and 63.

Poll taxes may be secured, prior to the end of January, 1960, at the office of Mrs. Olin Denny, Cochran County tax assessor-collector, on the main floor of the Cochran County Courthouse.

Office hours are from 8 a. m. until 5 p. m., Mondays through Fridays and until noon on Saturdays.

Persons who are now 21 and will vote in the primaries for the first time in their lives, may vote free, but must have exemption certificates. (These persons must be 21 thirty days prior to any election.)

Persons 60 years or older, who have previously been and now are exempt from paying a poll tax, must have exemption certificates. (These persons must be 61 years old by Jan. 31, 1960, to secure the exemption.)

Now on the poll tax receipt and exemption certificate for this voting year is a party affiliation blank.

And, according to the latest Texas law, this space must be left blank. Neither the tax assessor-collector nor the voter fills in this space.

The law authorizes only the presiding judge at the primary to stamp in the word authorized. That is "Democrat", "Republican", or whatever the name of the primary in which the voter is voting.

Jan. 31 is also the last day for obtaining exemption certificates in most cases.

### L. A. Williams Rites Today at First Baptist

Mr. Williams, a brother to Mrs. E. R. Luckey and Donald Williams, also of Morton, was killed Tuesday, December 22, in an oil field accident on a rig at Cochabamba, Bolivia, South America. He was killed by a blow on the back of the head from the drillstem.

A resident of Odessa, when in the United States, he had been a driller in South American oil fields for some time and had come to Bolivia on January 5, of this year.

After the accident, a flying service in Peru was contacted to fly the body back to Florida. There, in flight to Dallas, the plane was grounded in Georgia by bad weather. The plane arrived in Dallas Wednesday, where a Singleton Funeral Home ambulance waited to transfer the body overland to Morton.

Rev. W. E. Higginbotham of Lubbock, pastor of the Apostolic Christian Church will conduct the rites assisted by Rev. Fred Thomas, pastor of the First Baptist Church. Burial will be in Morton Memorial Cemetery.

Born April 29, 1914, Mr. Williams had been a member of the Baptist Church since his youth. He had worked in oilfields many years in Eastland County. Married to Miss Thelma Coon in Muleshoe, Nov. 22, 1940, he is survived by the wife and eight children; one daughter, Anita; and seven sons; Bobby, Clifford, Rickie, Troy Glenn, Larry, Leo and Eddie Dale, all of the home. # Highlights and Sidelights FROM Your State CAPITOL

**ACCENTUATE POSITIVE** — Texas, safe drivers will be rewarded to the tune of a \$29,000,000 saving in auto insurance rates next year, says the State Board of Insurance.

As expected, there have been some protests about penalty features of the plan.

Insurance Board statistics show a majority of drivers will benefit from lower rates. Additionally, the Board feels the insurance rewards will be an incentive to reducing the accident toll.

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nts against the driver for a period of three years.

Usual fine for stop sign running could be upped as much as 600 per cent by the time extra insurance costs were added on. People caught on inadvertent or relatively minor traffic errors are expected to kick up the dust when faced with the pay through the nose penalties of the new insurance rates.

Insurance company officials, however, back up the board in saying the plan is statistically sound. One company executive called it a timely reminder that "the majority has been paying the costs for the recklessness and negligence of only a handful of motorists."

**HAPPY HOSPITAL CHRISTMAS** — A state hospital for the mentally ill must have been a pretty grim place on Christmas Day back in the days when people called them "insane asylums".

Few would know, because not many went around an "insane asylum" if they could help it.

Today, happily, it is different. This year every one of the more than 25,000 patients in the state hospital system will receive a Christmas present, and many special parties and festivities will be held.

Volunteer Services Council for the Hospital System spearheads this monumental work performed by more than 32,000 persons at no cost to the state.

Change began some 10 years ago when church, civic and social club members began collecting items the patients needed visiting them, and holding parties and classes. Many church circles and clubs "adopt" a ward

each year, give a party a month, and get each patient what he especially wants for Christmas. As the volunteers became more at ease in their work, their revised attitudes and terminology became more general. "Asylum" was replaced by "hospital" or "school" and "inmate" by "patient" and "sanitarium" "friend". Some Austin churches, usually number in their membership, patients who have recovered and resumed normal community life.

# EDITORIALS . . .

Have you made your New Year's resolutions yet? With world affairs in their usual troubled state, it might be well to consider a few resolutions about being a good citizen during 1960.

We have recently observed "Bill of Rights Day", and most of us are generally familiar with the unique rights and privileges which we enjoy as citizens of the U. S. Here is a "Bill of Responsibilities" prepared by the American Citizenship Committee of the State Bar of Texas, which might serve as a background for our citizenship resolutions for the coming year:

1. It shall be the duty of every citizen to render undivided allegiance to the Constitution of the United States, to work for its betterment and perpetuation, to respect the sovereignty of the people's government, and to defend the nation against all its enemies whomsoever.

2. It shall be the duty of every citizen to be familiar with the Constitution of the United States, and to be informed as to what rights and liberties are his, and to use these rights in such manner as is consistent with his own welfare and the welfare of his fellow citizens.

3. It shall be the duty of every citizen to defend with his life the rights and liberties granted to him and to his fellow citizens by the Constitution, to obey the laws of the land and aid in their enforcement, and to oppose vigorously any persons whose intention is to transgress the law or to oppress the rights of others.

4. It shall be the duty of every citizen to make honest, wise and courageous use of the free and secret ballot at every election; to exercise freedom of thought, speech, and worship; to protect the freedom of the press; to safeguard the right of trial by jury and to render willing jury service when called upon; and to perform all other acts conducive to the perpetuation of the rights set forth in the Constitution.

5. It shall be the duty of every citizen to protect and sustain the unwritten liberties and rights vested in him by custom and usage and to perpetuate the ideals of the equality and dignity of the individual, upon which the Constitution is founded.

6. It shall be the duty of every citizen to be active in the political party of his choice, and to be vigilant of the public officers, to render all possible aid to them, and to serve in public office by appointment or election when qualified and when called upon to do so. It shall be his duty to strive for the selection of public officers of ability and upright character; and when holding pu-

ble office, to serve in such manner as will subordinate private or minority interests to those of the people at large.

7. It shall be the duty of every citizen to achieve the highest practicable level of education, and to work for the advancement of education by supporting and improving the public schools and by fostering the desire for education among his fellow citizens.

8. It shall be the duty of every citizen to defend the right to buy and sell, to own land and other property, to engage in commerce, and to work and earn a living wage, as a fundamental guarantee of the freedom and welfare of the nation.

9. It shall be the duty of every citizen to instruct his children in the principles of freedom and to spread the ideals of democratic government at home and abroad.

10. It shall be the duty of every citizen to preserve an attitude of self-reliance, and to use all legitimate means to achieve financial independence and security; to practice thrift and economy in his own affairs and to require the same of local, state and federal government.

**ROAST WILD DUCK**  
Rub inside of cleaned duck with salt and pepper and place a large onion or peeled apple in the cavity. Place 2 or 3 strips of bacon across the breast of each bird. Bake uncovered in a moderate oven (325 - 350 F.) until done. Young ducks will roast in approximately 1½ hours while old ones will require 30 to 45 minutes longer. Baste frequently, and remove from oven as soon as tender. The apple and onion are not served, but are included to absorb some of the wild "gamey" taste.

All game birds and animals should be allowed to cool thoroughly before being cooked. The secret of cooking any wild meat is to conserve moisture. Therefore, do not overcook.

For those who do not care for a wild "gamey" flavor, soak the duck overnight in a large china or enamel bowl in the following solution: 1 cup vinegar, 1 cup water, 1 teaspoon salt, 1 teaspoon sugar, ½ teaspoon pepper. Rinse and dry duck thoroughly. Dust celery salt and garlic salt over duck before roasting.

Wild rice makes an excellent stuffing for duck. Wash 1 cup of wild rice and cook in salted water until done. Drain and return to a covered kettle. Melt 3 tablespoons of butter in frying pan, add 2 tablespoons of chopped onion, 1 tablespoon of chopped green pepper, and the giblets, chopped, which have been cooked in salted water. Cook for 5 minutes, stirring constantly. Add the hot rice and season with salt and pepper. Stuff duck and roast as usual.

## QUICK HOMEMADE SAUSAGE

With pork so plentiful, there's no reason why you can't make your own sausage, seasoned to your family's taste.

You can make up a pound, for example, on Saturday for Sunday breakfast. All the equipment needed is a sharp trimming knife, and a food chopper.

Start with a small amount, so you can see how the seasoning pleases the family. If it isn't exactly right the first time, you can adjust the seasoning next time.

To make the sausage: Buy a rib end pork loin roast - a cut that has about the right proportion of lean and fat for good sausage. (Generally, this is about a third fat and two thirds lean.) Trim the meat from the bone except for the leanest portion which may be saved for pork chops if desired. Cut the meat in pieces small enough to go into the food chopper conveniently and then weigh it.

If you like high seasoning, here is a mixture for one pound of the meat: Mix thoroughly 2½ teaspoons salt, ¼ teaspoon black pepper; 2½ teaspoons rubbed sage; ½ teaspoon sugar. For milder seasoning, use half this mixture. Some people like to add a little clove, nutmeg or mace and cayenne pepper. Mix meat and seasonings well. Put through the food chopper, using the medium blade. Cover and let stand in the refrigerator overnight so the seasonings and meat will "blend". Form into patties.

To cook, place patties in a cold pan with no added fat and cook over low heat until thoroughly done. Meat should have no trace of pinkish color.

'INDIVIDUAL FREEDOM' LISTED AS MOST IMPORTANT IDEAL OF TEXANS

What are the most important "values and ideals"?

The overwhelming first choice among Texans, is "individual freedom."

Questionnaires and opinion polls on this subject were distributed and tabulated by the Governor's Committee for the 1950 White House Conference on Children and Youth.

The findings were announced by Dr. Guy D. Newman, President of Howard Payne College, Brownwood, who is chairman of the Governor's 154-member committee.

Dr. Newman pointed out that the questionnaires, widely distributed throughout the State among the local-level White House Committees, organizations and clubs, sought to determine what values and ideals hold the greatest meaning for the most people in Texas.

Each person was asked to name his choices from a list of 16 possibilities. From sixth to tenth choices were religion, humanitarianism, equal opportunity, success and status, material wealth and comfort.

Receiving the lowest number of votes was "group conformity". The tabulations indicated that Texans generally feel this is an undesirable trait and that there should be less of it.

As a part of the Committee's studies, in preparation for the White House Conference, views obtained on how these values and ideals can be best transmitted to children and youth.

Participants were also asked: "Who should be responsible for teaching them to our children?"

The responsibility, according to the tabulations, was clearly established in the home, the Church and the school, in that order; and the suggested ways to teach values and ideals were, in the order of importance as follows:

1. Parents setting good examples of behavior and regular attendance of the family at Church.

2. Sunday School attendance and adults other than parents setting good examples.

3. Setting more stringent rules and tighter control on children's behavior at home.

4. Character building courses in school.

SMALL BUSINESS

At times it is possible to get comparatively quick action from government.

An example of this is the passage of the legislation that protects small business from multiple taxation in states in which business is done. Without this action, it is estimated hundreds of thousands of small business firms would have had to close their doors.

Early this year, in one of the strange decisions that sometimes come out of the Supreme Court, it was held that a state could levy income tax against an out of state business selling in the state on a pro rata of the income derived on its sales in that state.

Thus, a firm which only had traveling salesmen going through the states selling orders to be shipped from the headquarters, was liable to pay income tax.

Actually, while the amount of additional taxes that would be paid were in themselves no small item, these amounts were far overshadowed by the sheer cost of preparing audits in any state and tax returns.

It is quite interesting to note the procedure, followed in this matter. Businessmen all over the nation wrote to the National Federation of Independent Business asking that something be done to offset the damage created to the economy by this Supreme Court decision.

The matter was laid before Rep. Wilbur Mills as he serves National Federation of Independent Business.

There was quite a hassle in Congress before a bill was passed.

The bill that was finally passed does not solve the problem completely, but probably serves as a stop gap. Under its provisions, no state can levy income tax on an out of state firm which solicits orders in the state and ships them from a point outside the state.

But in addition, the bill requires the Senate Finance and the House Judiciary committees to make a further study of the situation and to make recommendations.

It is interesting to note that independent business in the nation had adequate machinery and organization to meet this threat promptly.

At one time, before the Congress delegated a lot of its powers, as Congress went, so went business. But in recent years, the Supreme Court, as well as many government bureaus, have taken upon themselves many law making powers. Thus business today must have quick access to Congress.

## With Your ... COUNTY AGENT

### DECISIONS ON COTTON MARKETING

Marketing quotas have been voted by farmers on the 1960 cotton crop. The next decision they must make is whether to take Choice A or Choice B for planting according to Tom J. Prater, Farm Management Specialist, Extension Service.

Choice A provides for regular farm allotments and price support at not less than 75 per cent of parity to growers who comply with these allotments.

Choice B provides for farm allotments which are 40 per cent larger than the regular farm allotments and price support at not less than 60 per cent of parity to cooperators.

The level of price support for the crop will be determined not later than January 31, 1960.

Under the quota program, cotton produced under Choice A is eligible for the price support through a commodity credit corporation purchase program; cotton produced in compliance with Choice B farm allotment will be eligible for price support through loans, purchases, or other operations.

What choice will Texas farmers make?

In 1959, according to Mr. Jack Bradshaw, Program Specialist, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation, United States Dept. of Agriculture, Texas farmers elected to place 80 per cent of allowable acreage under Plan A and 20 per cent under Plan B.

But, 1960 is a new story, new prices, new weather conditions and added decisions to make. Which way should cotton farmers go? They need to figure cost of production under both plans, price support for Plan A, price support for Plan B cotton, world prices, alternate crops and estimate total farm returns and make decisions as which route is best for their overall operation.

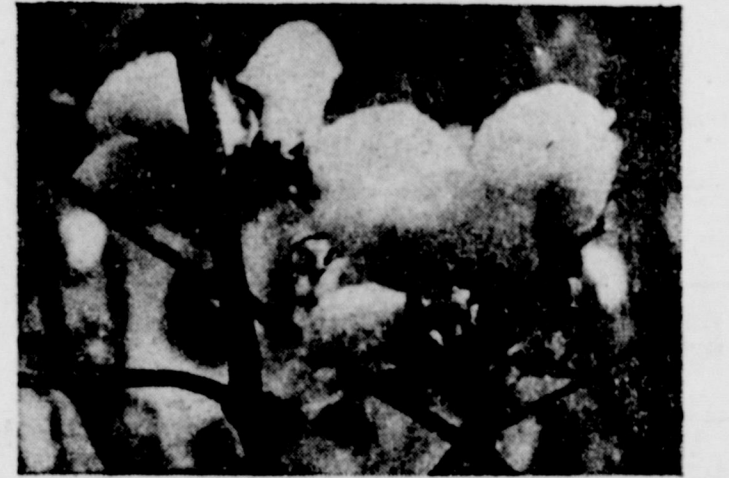

### BULA ROPER, JAKE BOGARD, DOES 'RIGHT WELL' IN NATIONAL RODEO FINALS AT DALLAS

Jake Bogard, well known Bula Roper, was making a fine accounting for himself in the gruelling 30 go round, year end final rodeo event, at the Fair Park Coliseum, in Dallas, this week.

Top rodeo performers from throughout the United States were invited to the National Rodeo Finals, a 5 day rodeo in which ten go rounds are featured in bareback riding, steer wrestling, bull riding, calf roping and saddle bronc riding. The cowboys, as they perform in RCA approved events during the year, add their total money. At the end of the year, in the finals, the top winners from all year are invited to make a fast stand, a chance to gain points and go ahead in the race for top yearly honors.

There are 60 men entered in the Dallas show and the winners will divide a million of \$37,500, which includes \$3,000 bonus to the champion in each of the events, at the end of the year.

Though Bogard's yearly total is not among the top five, he has won at least two of the ten go rounds at Dallas. Information obtained at the Tribune office shows he posted a 15.2 time on Saturday to win the afternoon event and a 13.8 time for calf roping also was the lowest time in the Sunday matinee event.

Just how much money he won at the Dallas show, which closed

last night, was not known here. Other area men were also doing right well, two of them ranked among the top five money winners in calf roping, nationally. They were Olin Young of Lovi-

ngton, with \$10,953 and Sonny Davis, Kenna, N. M., with \$14,463. Davis won the Sunday night calf roping and was third Monday afternoon. Young placed second Monday.

### SMALL AIRCRAFT FOREWARNED — Cannon AFB Fighter Planes Will Be "Buzzing" Morton in Future Flights

Cochran Cadets were given advance information this week to expect low level flying of F-100 tactical fighter aircraft, directly over Morton, as part of a new plan of flight training, at Cannon Air Force Base, New Mexico.

The planes will fly at altitudes of from 500 to 1,000 feet terrain clearance and their airspeeds will be from 380 to 540 knots true airspeed.

The advance information was disseminated to give local pilots and airport users an alert so they can operate with the greatest possible maximum safety. These flights will be during daylight hours only.

The text of the letter sent to the local airport users is as follows:

"We at Cannon Air Force Base, Clovis, New Mexico, are flying F-100 tactical fighter aircraft as a part of the total defense effort of the free world. Though our part is small, a tremendous amount of flying training is required to insure that our effort is effective should we be needed. We have, for example, deployed combat units from Cannon to the Far East and Europe ten times in the last two years; most notably to Formosa during the crisis of the Fall of 1958. Unfortunately, in order to maintain the high level of combat proficiency required for this immediate alert mission, some of our activities are irritating to other aviation agencies and the public at large. Yet, they comprise an essential part of our training program. One of these irritants is the sonic boom, with which I am sure you are familiar; another is the high speed low level navigation. This letter concerns the latter — how, when, where and why we are con-

ducting low level navigation missions and how they may affect you. This letter is written to enlist your aid in making these missions as safe as possible.

The low level, high speed attack has two primary advantages in combat. First, it is difficult, if not impossible, for radar to acquire low flying, high speed targets in sufficient time to prevent attack. Second, it insures a method of precisely navigating to a given target under minimum weather ceilings with a limited all-weather capable aircraft. Precision low level techniques at 500 knots allow no margin for error. These techniques must be practiced on a continuing basis if the required level of proficiency is to be maintained.

In an effort to provide the best possible margin of safety, avoid heavily populated areas and provide definite information to all airspace users as to our low level activities, four routes have been selected.

To the end of air safety, I hope that you will give this information the widest possible dissemination among your pilots and airport users. If more information is desired concerning our low level operations, please write or wire: Commander, 832d Air Division, Attention: AD/DO, Cannon Air Force Base, New Mexico, or phone: Clovis, New Mexico, SL-4311, extension 275 or 822.

Our goal is maximum combat readiness with maximum safety and I wish to thank you in advance for your assistance toward this goal.

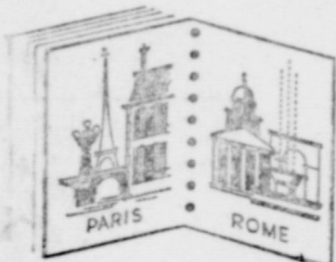
