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# Group To Build Giant Feedlot

**BIGGEST YET**

## Future Capacity Given At 50,000

Hi-Plains Feed Yards, Inc., with a future capacity of 50,000 head of cattle, became a reality this week with the hiring of a manager and awarding of its construction contract.

Located four and one-half miles northwest of Friona on land purchased from Bill Baxter, plans call for complete facilities for feeding, including mill, ensilage pits, feeding equipment and pens properly engineered for drainage and anti-pollution.

The new cattle-feeding operation has the potential of being one of the largest, if not the largest, in the state.

Construction is slated to begin within two weeks, and the feed yard is scheduled to be in operation by the middle of September.

The mill will be built and erected by Brown-McKee, Inc., Contractors and Engineers of Lubbock and will represent the latest in modern feeding plants. Engineers plan mill completion in 140 days.

Paul Morgan, currently manager of Lubbock Feed Lots, will arrive in Friona May 1 to take over management of Hi-Plains Feed Yards, Inc.

Operating at peak capacity, the lots could turn out approximately 125,000 head of finished fat cattle a year, based on an annual turnover of 2 1/2 times at full-scale operation.

About 20 persons will be employed at the big feed yards. Payroll will be in excess of \$100,000.

Feed rations will be prepared automatically from an electronic control console. Steam processing and flaking of grain are planned to help feed conversion ratios and lower cost of grain.

The lots will use rations built around milo and ensilage and will be a significant factor in the areas grain trade.

Morgan, a native of Iowa, has been in cattle feeding business all his life. He managed feed yards for Western Beef Factory at Denver for ten years before taking over as head of the Lubbock firm which was formerly Lewter Feed Lots.

"We're commercial feeders and will feed for anyone," explained Morgan. Cattle will be fed on a custom basis for High Plains ranchers, farmers and businessmen.

Under custom operation, the lots will locate and buy feeder cattle for customers or will fatten cattle they already own. The lots charge a flat rate per ton of feed fed in a given ration.

"Since Parmer County is the largest milo growing area in the state, Friona is the logical area for feeding cattle," Morgan noted. "Scientific farm methods in this area and the climate make conditions ideal," he added.

According to Morgan, ensilage is now being contracted for delivery in the fall.

Directors for Hi-Plains Feed Yards, Inc. are Clarence Martin, Joe Osborn, Hollis Horton, W.S. Ingram, Sloan Osborn, Paul Morgan, Lawrence Martin, Wesley Barnett, Charles Osborn and Ralph Shelton.

Morgan will move to Friona in May. His family will follow as soon as the youngest of his five sons is graduated from high school in Lubbock.

## Pause And Reflect

It happens every spring. Flowers bloom, birds sing, and school lets out. Conflicting emotions exist among students at the end of a school year. A fifth grade pupil, his eyes shining, exclaims, "Oh Boy". A high school girl says, "Sure, I want to graduate, but I hate to leave this school."

Lincoln once said, "The schoolhouse is the bulwark of civilization." The bulwark or fortress, is no stronger than the soldiers that man its guns or guard its gates. The majority of these warriors fall into one general category, that of the hard-working, conscientious, unsung hero, the classroom teacher.

Any attempt to discuss each teacher's activities, in and out of school, would result in a column too long for any single edition of this paper. Permit me to disagree just once from this policy and then return to the necessary generalities. If you did not see Mrs. June Rhodes' third grade rock and mineral show you missed a treat. Having visited every major museum from Washington D.C. to Santa Fe, New Mexico, I am not afraid to say that it compared favorably with anything I have ever seen. It is an annual affair; don't miss it next year.

Your child's classroom teacher is a professional in every sense of the word. Years of intensive training admit a person to the profession, but mere knowledge of a subject does not make a teacher. There is a secret ingredient -- dedication.

Inspiration -- Application -- Dedication.

Mothers, you have had them for six years, now you send them to someone else for the greater part of the day. Can they handle zippers and buttons? Can they go to the rest rooms alone? Have they been taught correct table manners and politeness? The teacher now becomes a second mother.

The teacher has one period a day set aside for conferences with parents. If no parents show up the teacher will spend that time helping some child with a problem. After the last bell has rung many teachers will be found in their rooms coaching one or more pupils.

The majority of teachers are married. To all of the problems that you as parents have, the teacher must add lesson plans, make out tests, and correct papers. Magazines must be

saved and collected from neighbors; the illustrations will be cut out and used to heighten a child's interest in a subject. One teacher salvages every scrap of paper and cloth from shops and stores, these appear later as beautiful flowers on a corridor wall.

The war on poverty is not new to the average teacher. Clothing and shoes appear after all the charity drives are over, and some of them are brand new. A doctor makes a house call, a mother is admitted to a hospital, a family's worry is lessened, all due to the efforts of a few teachers.

What do teachers talk about when they get together for an evening? The answer may surprise you -- they discuss the problems of individual students. There are a very few "nine to three" teachers. Their profession is more than just a job. To the really dedicated it becomes a way of life. Regardless of age, sex, or financial condition; once a teacher, always a teacher.

Be thankful for the men and women in the teaching profession and resolve to help them in any way possible. You think your hands are full with two or three children -- suppose you had a hundred and fifty?

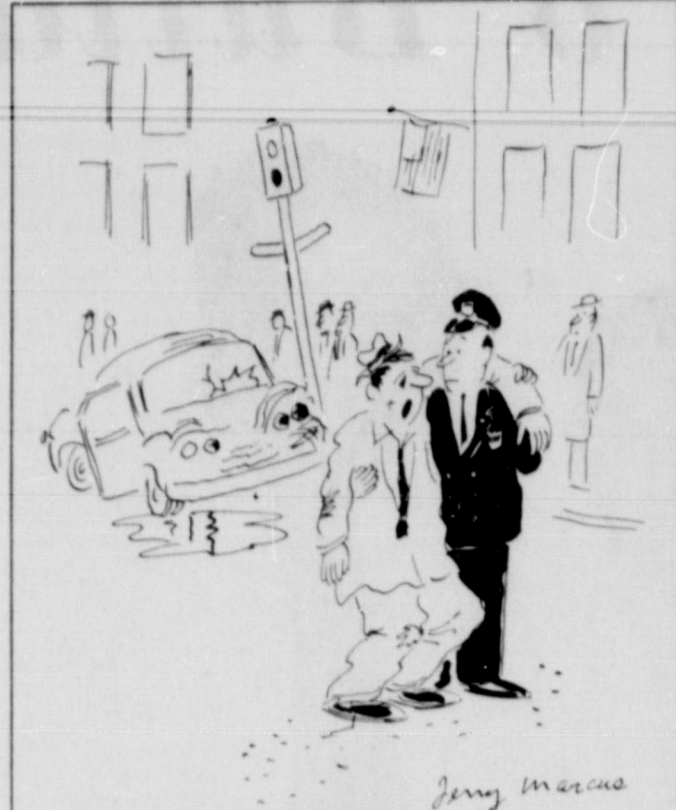

Accompanying the two Friona youth to the conference will be Mr. and Mrs. Jake Outland.

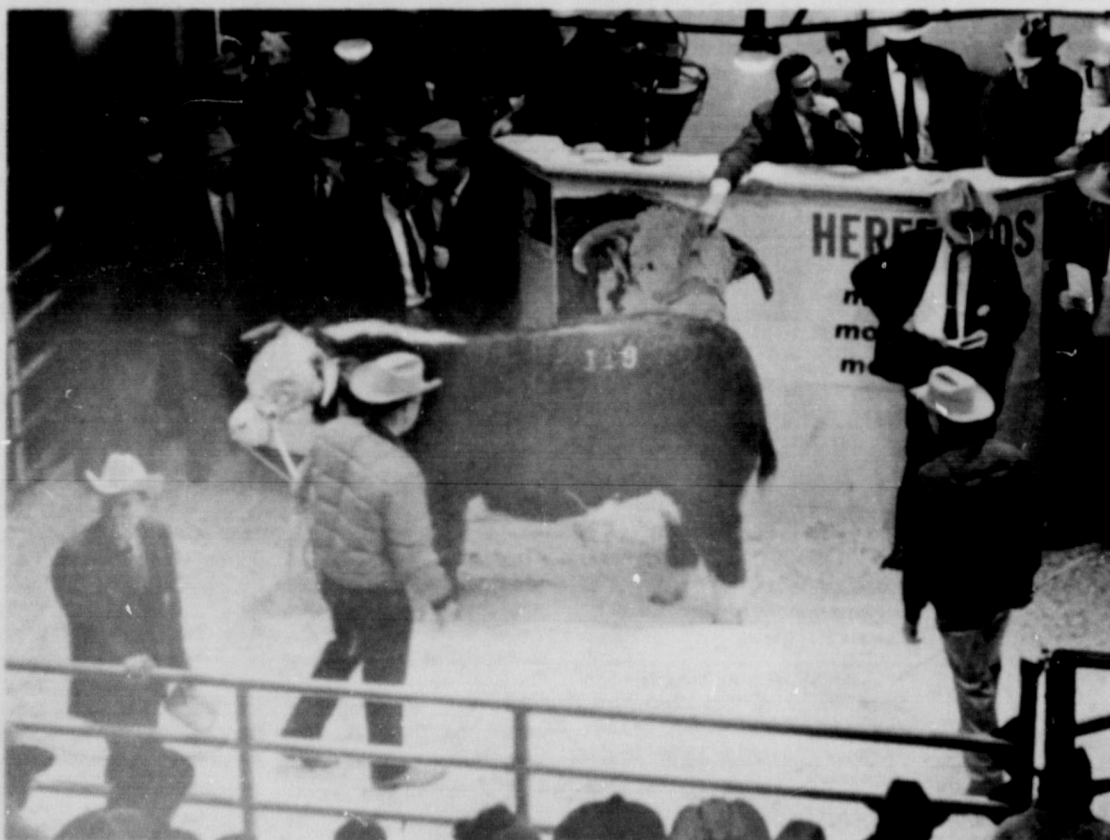

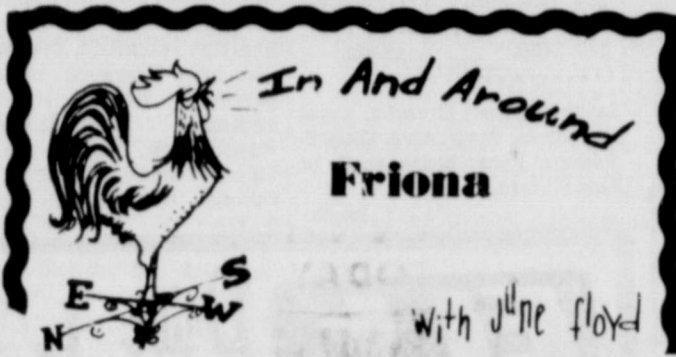

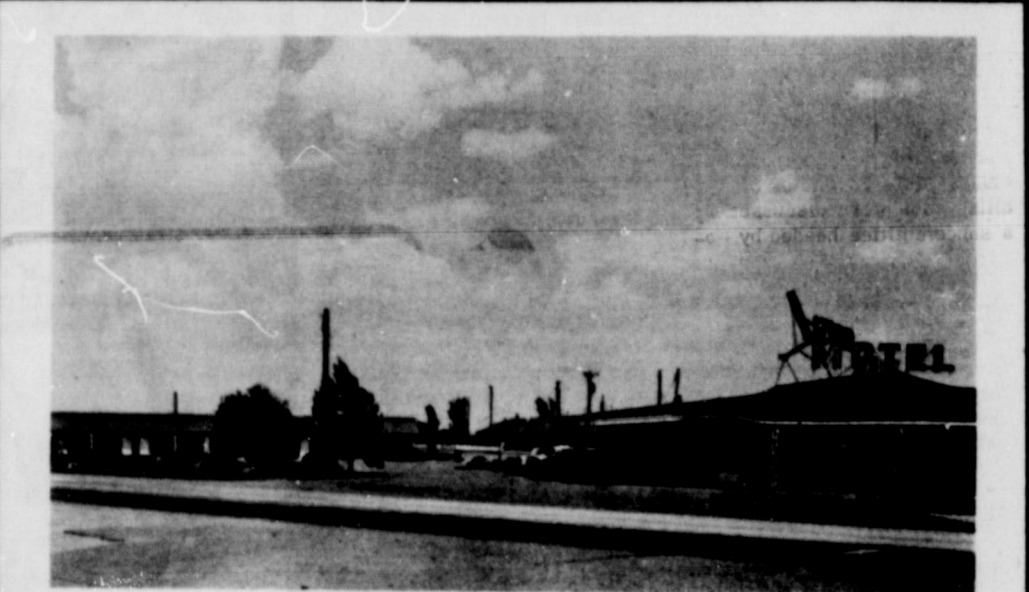

### Washington Report

From Congressman

Following the Easter recess, the House Agriculture Committee on which I serve, resumed hearings on legislation dealing with supplemental financing for Rural Electric and Rural Telephone co-op borrowers.

The REA program as set up by Congress in 1936, has helped to bring electricity to over 98 per cent of the farms of the nation.

This phenomenal success story is the result of the combined efforts and resources of the rural electric cooperatives which serve about 51 per cent of the farms, the investor-owned electric utilities, which serve 43 per cent of the farms and the municipal and other governmental systems which serve 6 per cent of the farms of America.

Now that almost all of rural America has electricity, the problem is to meet the ever-growing demand for more and more electricity. Statistics show that for the last several decades, demand for electricity has doubled every ten years. There is nothing to indicate that this growth rate will not continue.

It has become evident to most people interested in this matter that the rural electric cooperatives are going to need funds for capital investment to meet future needs. Some of the cooperatives assisted by Federal programs have grown strong. They are capable of securing all their needed capital at the fair market rate through normal channels. They, therefore, no longer require Federal subsidies.

Other cooperatives, unfortunately, still need help from the Federal government. How this assistance should be provided is where the controversy begins.

A bill, H.R. 1400, introduced early in this session by Congressman Bob Poage, who is chairman of the committee, includes the provisions of two bills which were discussed by a subcommittee headed by Poage last year.

The full committee held extensive hearings on these bills and then referred them back to Mr. Poage's subcommittee for further study. The subcommittee, however, failed to approve a modified version of the two bills by a tie vote of 5 to 5 and following that vote was unsuccessful in making changes that would be acceptable to a majority of the committee.

As you may imagine, the proposal now under consideration by the full committee, is both a complex and important place of legislation.

Because of the disagreement expressed by many who have testified during the hearings, I would like to point out some of the major areas of controversy and some of the vital policy questions that must be asked and answered one way or another as the hearings progress.

The first question that arises is one of jurisdiction. It involves the question whether the rural electric borrowers should be permitted to expand and acquire customers in non-rural areas. If the answer to this question is yes, then the next question is to what degree and to what limit should this acquisition and expansion be permitted.

The second question arises as to the availability of capital for generation and transmis-

sion operations by REA borrowers. Private power companies appear worried that REA is embarked upon a program of displacing their traditional domination of the generation and transmission industry. Any bill that we deal with will have to settle this question.

The third question arises on the types of loans which the bank may make and the interest rates at which these loans will be available to borrowers. If the bank is to be structured on a business-like basis, the question arises immediately as to whether the bank can borrow money on the open market at six per cent and relend it to eligible borrowers at four per cent, the intermediate loan interest rate provided for in H.R. 1400. The committee must decide as a matter of policy whether the bank is to be set up on a subscribed basis or whether it will be completely structured to be a self-supporting operation.

A fourth question arises as to the public's stake in the capital that has been advanced to the bank by the government. Under the terms of the bill, some \$750 million will be appropriated to the bank over the next 15 years. The question then is how that \$750 million to be repaid and when and at what interest, if any. As you can see, the existence of an intermediate loan program at four per cent will have a direct bearing on whether the bank will be able to repay the government seed capital on a regularly scheduled basis and at some interest.

The fifth question arises in regard to the public's obligation to back up the debentures and other securities that are issued by the bank to raise additional debentures; that is, if the debentures could not be paid by the bank, the U.S. Treasury would stand behind them and re-

pay the amounts invested by the investing public together with the accumulated interest.

There are of course, a number of other issues involved in the bill; it is indeed a very complex and technical place of legislation, but it seems to me that these are the central issues that the committee will have to meet as we go along, and I hope you will all feel free to contact me and let me know your feelings on this bill.

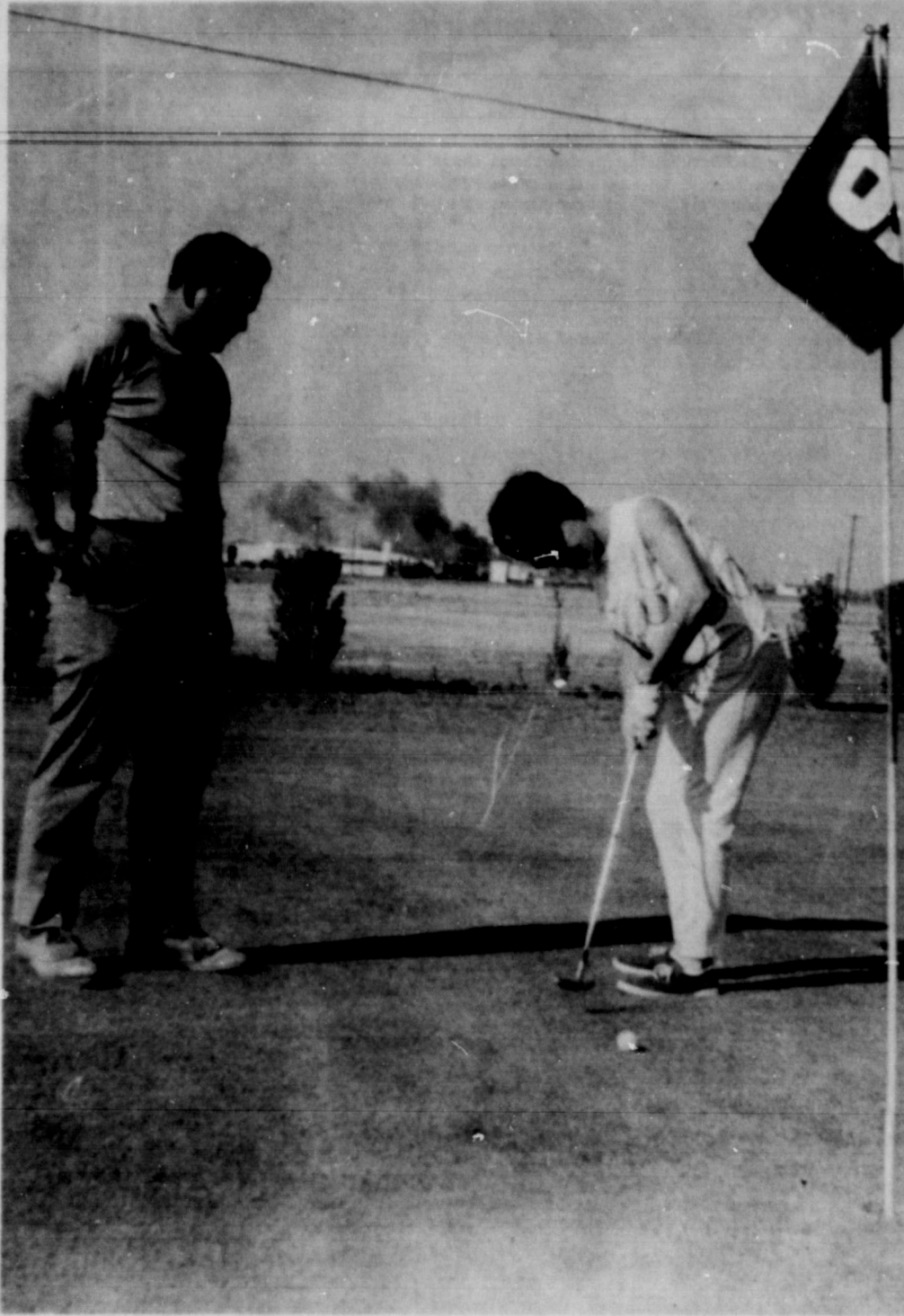
