FIRST STATE BANK MAKES ANOTHER BIG GAIN IN THE RANKS OF THE NATION'S 4,800 BANKS

The First State Bank of Morton continues an almost phenomenal growth it has maintained since its founding in Morton in 1941, by W. W. Williamson, former president.

Only two years ago, coinciding with the opening of the new bank building, congratulations were received for a climb of 547 places in the list of the nation's banks. This week, W. W. Williamson received another telegram from Upton Liptrott, vice-president of the American Banker, a publication edited for and about those in the banking business.

"The American Banker's Annual roll call edition, next Wednesday," the telegram read in part, "will show your bank made a tremendous gain of 294 places in rank in 1959. Heartiest Congratulations."

The total of 841 positions climbed in the two announcements made by the banking publication, represents a climb over nearly 20 percent of the nation's 4,800 banks in the short period.

The local bank attributes much of its success to its outgoing president, though he modestly attributes it in turn to the fact that the economy of the area is just "in a lot better shape."

(ED. NOTE: A planned feature story in connection with the change in the presidency of the bank, tracing the career of W. W. Williamson, is being held over until next week in order to be able to present it in its entirety, in one issue.)

The First State Bank of Morton entered a new phase of its steady growth late last week with the assumption of the duties as president by T. K. (Tye) Williamson, son of W. W. Williamson

The operational policies of the bank will undergo little, if any change according to the new president, who has been reared in the banking business by his father. T. K. is one of the younger bank presidents in the state, at 37 years old, but his father has had 42 years of banking experience, starting in 1917, at the First State Bank at Kirkland.

W. W. will remain as Chairman of the Board of Directors and Executive Advisor. He expects to carry out.

PRODUCING QUALITY COTTON

In looking over the Plains Cotton Grower January - February issue these interesting and educational comments on producing quality cotton on the High Plains were made by President W. O. Fortenberry. Here is quote, "Quality wise, the 1959 Texas High Plains Cotton crop continued in its improvement, even though it was not as high as the 1958 crop. Weather conditions throughout the growing year in 1959 were not as good as in 1958."

above and more than 1,380,000 bales miked 3.0 or above. Some \$50,000 bales tested 75,000 pounds or above in fiber strength."

"These are facts that we should study to begin work on a continuous improvement of our cotton marketing quality. In most cases it is considered that cotton miking less than 3.5 is immature. If so, then over 50 percent of the High Plains cotton in 1959 was immature. Now to analyze what is causing this immaturity. Let's take a look - we know that early frost and short season produce immaturity in cotton. This, we can do something about, that is plant early maturing varieties, plant those that are tolerant of diseases, treat seed before planting, use a balanced fertilizer, use chemicals to treat the covering soil, use of early season insect control measures - and late season control when necessary, do not over irrigate or irrigate too late in the season (cut off date about Aug. 25), plant for a good stand - or about 18 to 25 pounds of seed per acre, do not defoliate too early or when 50 to 80 percent of the bolls are mature, harvest when cotton is ready, never pull or strip cotton before 9 a. m. in the morning, when there is a light dew on the cotton, and do not tramp cotton in trailer. These are a few of the requirements to produce a better quality of cotton and these are approved by your local cotton sub-committee."

Mr. Fortenberry, President of the Plains Cotton Growers goes on to state, "The old idea that yield is all important is slowly giving way to a new idea that reasonable yield with higher quality cotton is the better money maker as well as easier to sell in the market. The Texas High Plains has made great stride in producing the type of cotton that the textile industry can use and wants." (end quote)

Cotton is our bread and butter crop, so let's all strive to produce the quality cotton which we are capable of doing and following these practices that we know will work, advises the County Agent.

NEW HANDBOOK ON FERTILIZER RESULTS

We have a new handbook on fertilizer result information in the Extension Office. This is published by the Experiment Station and Extension Service. It covers the results on cotton and grain sorghums on the South Plains. This book was not published in quantity but you are welcome to come to the office and look it over.

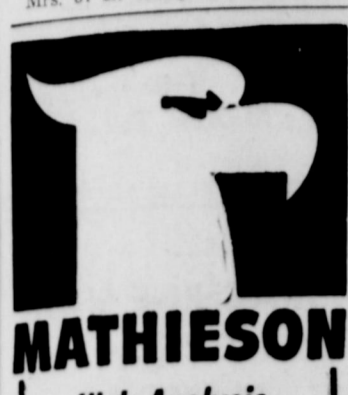

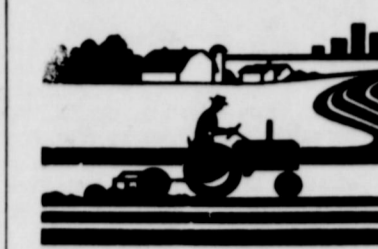

SOIL CONSERVATION DISTRICT NEWS



O. L. Castle, Chairman of the Cochran Soil Conservation District Board of Supervisors, reports that 21 Great Plains Conservation Program Contracts have been written during the 1960 Fiscal Year.

Producers, with the assistance of the personnel of the Soil Conservation Service assisting the District, have planned a complete Soil and Water Conservation Program on their operating units. Total combined cost share funds, that the 21 producers will receive when all practices have been completed, is approximately \$76,000. These cost-share funds will buy lasting conservation on the land while helping stabilize agriculture in the Great Plains area.

District cooperators who have signed Great Plains Contracts recently are: C. B. Evans of the Famuliner Community; Alton Al-

nsworth of Bledsoe; J. L. Schooler whose ranch is 12 miles south of Lehman; LeRoy Johnson, who farms 11 miles west of Morton; the farm of Leonard Coleman near Lehman and the farms of Curtis Sealy and Merlin Roberts of Morton.

Only a few more Great Plains Contracts can be prepared prior to July 1 due to lack of cost-share funds. Contracts written after July 1 are used up, will not become effective until after July 1 when the 1961 Fiscal Year starts.

Charles Palmer is the new custodian for the District equipment. He replaces Mr. Earl Cadenhead. We wish to thank Earl for his cooperation and the good job performed. You can obtain District equipment of conservation job by contacting Mr. or Mrs. Palmer at the Cochran County Farm Bureau Office.

Safflower to be High Plains Test
— O —
Safflower will be tested at the High Plains Research Foundation this year in cooperation with the U. S. Department of Agriculture, as a part of the Foundation's program to develop new crops for the area.

Five varieties were used in the 1959 tests at Halfway. Heavy hail on June 22, 1959, damaged the crop so severely that the tests had to be abandoned. There is still a possibility that a variety can be found that will be adapted to the area. Dr. Earl Collier, Chief Agronomist, said in announcing the acceptance of the request of the U. S. D. A. and farmers in the area for further research on the crop.

The Foundation has been selected by the U. S. D. A. to conduct the regional test. This will be the only safflower test of its kind to be made in the area. The varieties to be tested are being supplied by Dr. Lester N. Leininger, Research Agronomist, of the Agricultural Research Service at Utah State University.

The eight varieties to be included in the test are U. S. 10, N-6, N-10, N-4051, N-4054, N-4055, Gila, and A5371. Three of these varieties were included in the 1959 test program at Halfway.

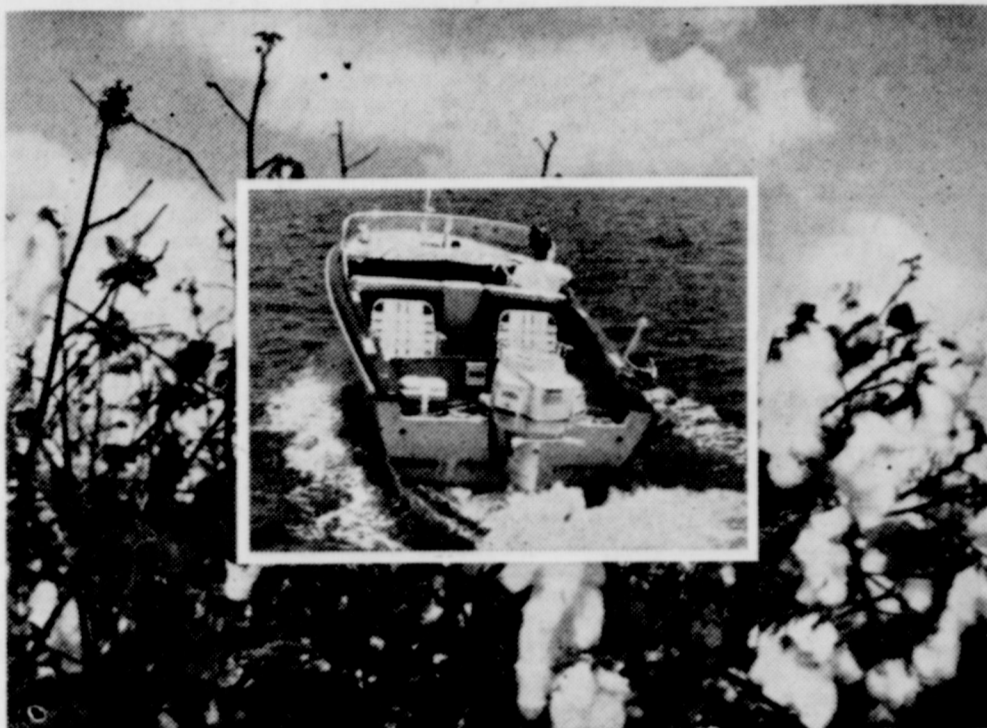

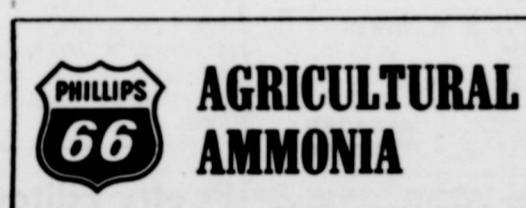

Two Accidents Investigated by Highway Patrol

The Highway Patrol Service of the Texas Department of Public Safety investigated 2 rural traffic accidents in Cochran County during the month of February according to Sergeant D. S. Lawson.

In making this announcement the Sergeant reported one property damage of \$650.00 with 2 persons injured and none killed.

The Highway Patrol Supervisor reminded motorists that Texas law requires all registered motor vehicles to have valid inspection stickers displayed by midnight, April 15. "In addition, all trailers registered in Texas which exceed 4,000 pounds gross weight must be inspected," the Sergeant said.

The Motor Vehicle Inspection Program, since its inception in 1951, has reduced the state's traffic accidents by almost 10 percent, the Sergeant explained. Before the Inspection Program was started, mechanical defects in vehicles was a causative factor in 13 percent of the state's accidents. However, only four percent of the traffic accidents are caused by mechanical defects now.

The Patrol Supervisor stated that only 39 percent of the vehicles in this county have been inspected and that patrolmen will be stopping all vehicles not displaying a valid sticker after the April 15 deadline. The best way to avoid the long lines expected in the last minute rush is to have your vehicle inspected now.

peets to spend much of his time managing a farm which he and T.K. jointly own, and will, with much of the detail banking work lifted from his shoulders, have more leisure time to spend in the area.

Along with the promotion of T. K., who purchased a large block of stock in the bank from his father, came promotions to vice president S. M. Monroe, who was placed on the Board of Directors; to James St. Clair, who has been a director since the foundation of the bank in 1941, and now becomes a vice president; and to B. H. (Burge) Tucker who joins the Board of Directors. Others on the Board are Syl Greener, Elmer Gardner, and of course W. W., and T. K.

August 2, 1941 Bill Williamson opened the doors to the Morton bank. By Sept. 24, when the first call statement was issued, deposits were \$96,059.30. That first statement showed no overdrafts; \$46,960.07 in loans and discounts; \$2,396.10 in furniture and fixtures; \$25,000 in capital stock.

On the statement released as of December 31, 1959, a little more than two years after their move into the new building erected in 1957, showed \$1,187,916.20 in loans and discounts; \$82,755.27 in furniture and fixtures; and deposits totaling \$5,302,771.98. A few days later the total jumped over the \$6 million mark.

The modern, \$135,000 building comprising 7,000 square feet into which the bank moved its headquarters two years ago, features a drive-in window; a night de-

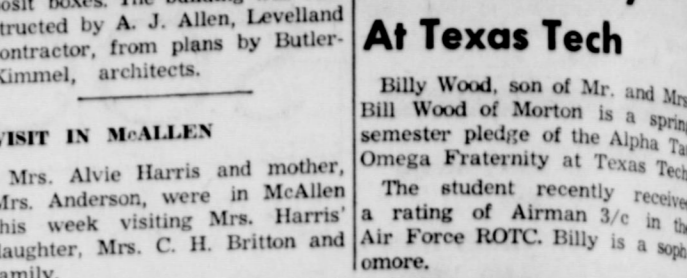

Eleven Three Way Students Took Merit Scholarship Test

Eleven students at the Three Way High School planned to take the National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test (NMQST) Charles R. Bowen, principal, announced last week. The test was administered at the High school at 9:00 a. m. Tuesday, March 8th, 1960. All students who wish to be considered for Merit Scholarships to be awarded in 1961 had to take the test at that time.

The number of scholarships awarded in any year depends upon the extent of sponsor participation. The basic continuing program is for \$1,000,000 a year (for ten annual programs). It is estimated that sponsor participation this year will add over \$2 million in sponsored Merit Scholarships. It is also expected that various outside - the - program sources will increase the present amount offered to high scoring students by several million dollars.

For students taking the test on March 8, results will be reported to all participating schools before the end of the spring semester in time for use by class advisors. The scores may also be used in many high schools to help students make decisions about college and the most appropriate courses to major in. Many students throughout the country who do not expect to win have registered for the test in order to learn more about their individual strengths and weaknesses.

Some 10,000 Semifinalists, the highest scorers in each state, will be named early next fall. Names of Semifinalists are published in a booklet which is widely distributed among colleges and other scholarship agencies. Each Semifinalist will be asked to take a second examination. Those who repeat their high performance in the second examination will become Finalists in the Merit Program. Winners of Merit Scholarships will be selected from this group of Finalists on the basis of school records and recommendations, test scores, extracurricular and outside-of-school interests and accomplishments, and other indications indicating future promise.

Four year scholarships are awarded to the winners with stipends depending on financial need. Minimum award in 1961 will be \$100, the maximum will be \$1,500. The average stipend in 1959 was \$743. Supplementary cost of education grants are usually made to the colleges and universities which the Scholars attend. An additional 25,000 students selected without regard to state quotas are awarded letters commending them for their superior performance on the National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test. These students are asked to complete brief personal data cards, and are considered for special awards made through the facilities of NMSC. Names along with test scores of both Semi-finalists and the students in the commended group will be sent without charge to the colleges indicated as either a first or second choice by the participant.
