Added incentive for the Chieftains is the memory of the last meeting in Friona between the two teams. That was the game which christened the new Chieftain Field. Farwell overcame a 7-0 Friona lead with a touchdown and a two-point conversion for an 8-7 victory.

In spite of daylight savings time, the busy season and all, we expect a good crowd to be on hand Friday to see if Friona can snap a two-year losing streak which Farwell has pinned on them.

Judging from the scrimmage session we saw we'd say that the 1967 Chieftains should prove to be an interesting team -- one that can be explosive at times on offense.

If the team can gird up its defensive weaknesses, then it might become more of a threat than the previously mentioned fifth-place prediction in District 3-AA,

Enrollment in Friona schools as of the first day of school on Tuesday stood at 1285 pupils, an increase of 16 over the first day's total last year, but still down slightly from the record enrollment of 1320 in 1965.

Largest increase was in high school, where 332 students enrolled. This is a record for high school, surpassing the 320 which was an all-time high last



## Pause And Reflect

Sometimes we history hobbyists are teased about living in the past. One very dear friend expressed it thusly, "the reason old Nelson is so interested in rocks is because he is still living in the Stone Age!"

We know it's all in fun and are not offended," Every man to his own taste" said the old fellow as he kissed a pig. In trying to explain his interest in history, one fellow we know, put this way, "How can one tell where one is going, unless he knows where he has been?"

Historically speaking, where have we been? Partof the answer was found over Labor Day weekend in Santa Fe, New Mexico. The occasion was the 255th consecutive celebration of what the natives call "our fiesta".

Francisco Vasquez Coronado traversed the area in 1540-42 and established a headquarters fust south of Santa Fe where the town of Bernalillo is now located.

Santa Fe was founded in 1609 and all went reasonably well until 1680 when the Indians revolted and drove the Spanish out. In 1692 the Spanish king, Charles, second, decided that once again Spain should rule that part of the kingdom of New Spain that we know as New Mexico. On Sept. 14 of that year Don Diego De Vargas appeared at Santa Fe to reconquer the terri-

"Our fiesta" is based on incidents relative to the return of the Spanish army.

At this point some will ask, what does all this history have to do with modern American thoughts and actions? A good question and if one will bother to look beneath the surface glitters of the pagentry, a valuable lesson can be learned. De Vargas was more than an ordinary soldier, he was a diplomat as well. After holding a pow-wow with the Indian Chief he removed his armour and, accompanied by a priest,

walked into the pueblo to prove that he came in peace. There is fairy story ending, the did not live happily ever after, but the fact remains that men of good will can meet and settle their differences without bloodshed, arson, and pil-
