The girls outnumbered the boys in 1967, according to records at Parmer County Community Hospital.

Hospital officials recorded 73 boys born during the year, as compared to 79 girls. The total number of babies for the year was 152. In 1966, 132 babies were born.

Friona's first baby of the new year was Alan Dean Faulkner, son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Faulkner. Alan was born Tuesday at 9:28 a.m., and weighed seven pounds, six ounces.

The largest baby recorded in 1967 was born to Mr. and Mrs. Manuel Ramirez of Hereford. It weighed 10 lbs. 2 ozs.

place in district against Dimmitt here next Tuesday. Dimmitt, also unbeaten in district play, has beaten the Squaws three times in tournament action.

Hazel Fallwell scorched the nets with 43 points in Tuesday's game.

Tony Perea scored 19 points to lead the Chieftains to a 59-37 win over Floydada in the boys' game. The win evened the Chiefs' district record to 2-2.

Outstanding Events Made Headlines During 1967

Several outstanding news events were recorded in Friona during 1967, in a review of Friona Star headlines for the past year's issues.

Probably the outstanding event was the location of Missouri Beef Packers near Friona. However, there were other major events, such as the building of a huge cattle feeding facility by Hi-Plains Feed Yard.

Other top stories included the announcement of two feeding supplement plants, one in Friona and another at Hub, a proposed "bottle club" which caused some heated feelings; two doctors and the hospital administrator leaving at Parmer County Community Hospital, a driver's license office opening in Friona and County Judge Loyde Brewer dying.

A thumbnail sketch of the newsmakers for 1967, in order of their occurrence, follows:

JANUARY

Kenneth Moore, owner of Moore's Super Market, moved to Friona to assume managerial duties at the local store. Former manager, Leon Noack, moved to Olton, where he purchased Moore's store there.

Ben Robert Neelley, born to Mr. and Mrs. Robert Neelley on January 10, was Friona's first baby for 1967.

The Friona Squaws, aided by the Abernathy girls, won the first half of their district, with a 6-1 record.

A drive was kicked off late in January to raise money for a community recreation center to include eight bowling lanes, following the closing of Friona Lanes in late 1966.

FEBRUARY

Richard Collard was named president of the Friona Chamber of Commerce. The Brooks Sisters entertained at the annual chamber banquet, held the night of February 9.

W.L. (Preach) Edelman was chosen "man of the year," Mrs. Frank Spring "Woman of the year," Mal Manchee, "teacher of the year" and Lola Nelson, "most courteous employee" at the annual Chamber of Commerce banquet.

Rev. Bill Burton, pastor of the First Baptist Church since 1960, resigned to accept a position with a Lubbock church. Rev. Donnie Carrasco became pastor of the Mexican Baptist Mission.

The Friona Squaws lost a playoff game with Floydada's Whirlwinds for the district title. Floydada downed the Squaws four times during the season, the only team to achieve this mark over a Friona team in 10 seasons.

A Lazbuddie entrant, Rickie Seaton, won the Parmer County Junior Livestock Show for Lazbuddie showmen for the seventh year in a row, and Jacquelyn Langford of Farwell stopped Friona's domination of the show's steer division, after a like number of years by taking grand champion honors.

MARCH

Three Friona coaches were given new two-year contracts, but the contract of girls coach Mel Williams was not renewed. Mr. and Mrs. Pat Busby, longtime Friona residents, were killed in a head-on collision near Summerfield.

Friona's Public Library received official sanction as a department of the city government at the March city council meeting.

Announcement was made of plans for a new Girl Scout headquarters building in Friona at the annual father-daughter banquet.

A Bovina group announced plans to build a feedlot west of that city with an eventual capacity of 30,000 head of cattle.

APRIL

E.G. Phipps and John Blackburn were elected as new members to the Friona School Board and Mrs. V.J. (Mary Kate) Zeman was re-elected to the board in the school election on April 1.

Plans were announced by a Friona group to build Hi-Plains Feed Yard west of Friona, to have an eventual capacity of 50,000 head of cattle.

No one was injured when a farm house exploded nine miles southeast of Friona on April 11. The house was totally demolished.

A special edition of the Friona Star on April 28 announced the decision of Missouri Beef Packers of Rock Port, Mo., to build a \$3 million beef packing facility three and one-half miles southwest of Friona. The beef processing plant is to have the largest slaughter capacity of any in the United States.

MAY

Benger Air Park held open house for its new office on May 7. David Smith was named valedictorian of the FHS graduating class of 1967, and Terri Lynn Wilson was named salutatorian. Larry Truitt placed second in the state Interscholastic League English competition finals, in the ready writing division. Plains Publishers, pioneers of the offset printing industry in the Southwest, announced that it was closing its Friona plant, and that the 12-page capacity press would be moved to Lubbock.

The fund drive for \$100,000 to buy land on which to build Missouri Beef Packers went over the top, according to a story in the May 25 issue of the Star.

R.L. Bates, the man who first put Friona on the map as far as girls basketball is concerned, passed away the latter part of May.

JUNE

A feed manufacturing, Hi-Pro Feeds, was announced in the June 8 edition of the Friona Star, the third major agricultural based addition to the community during the year. Ron Davenport was hired as manager.

Missouri Beef Packers officials moved onto the construction site of their proposed gigantic packing industry the first part of June, when a trailer house was moved in to serve as building headquarters office.

H.E. (Barney) Barnett, administrator of Parmer County Community Hospital since 1958, resigned to accept a similar position with a new hospital in Floydada.

Up to two and one-half inches of rain was received in the Friona area the latter part of June, helping to break a nine-month drought, bringing the month's moisture to 3.43 inches.

JULY

Pioneer Natural Gas asked the Friona City Council for an 11.5 per cent increase in gas rates at the council's regular meeting July 10.

Doctors John Humphrey and Lee Cranfill announced their plans to leave Friona at a meeting of the board of directors of Parmer County Community Hospital early in July.

Anni Jensen, Friona's first exchange student in 1961-62, came back for a visit with her American "parents," Mr. and Mrs. W.M. Massie and was honored with a coffee in August. The First Baptist Church called Rev. Bill Foll as its pastor on July 23. The church was without a pastor since Rev. Burton resigned in February.

AUGUST

A possible private bottle club on the outskirts of Friona drew fire early in August, especially from the corner of County Sheriff Charles Lovelace. After many people signed petitions against the club, nothing was heard about the club for the remainder of the year.

Mary Kaye Everitt, Chamber of Commerce manager since Oct. 1 of 1966, was dismissed by the chamber's board of directors in their August meeting. The chamber remained without a manager at the end of the year.

A cattle feed manufacturing plant which is to make use of cotton burs was announced for south of Hub.

Five Friona boys were injured, two critically, when they were involved in a head-on collision near Silverton August 13.

SEPTEMBER

Wilson & Co. announced plans to build a multi-million dollar beef processing plant near Hereford early in September. Supposed to employ 200 persons and have a slaughter capacity of around 300,000 head annually, construction had not begun

on the plant at the end of the year, but was anticipated early in 1968.

Paula Fortenberry was crowned Maize Queen of 1967 over 29 other contestants at the Maize Queen Contest September 14. Miss Fortenberry reigned over the city's 11th annual Maize Days Celebration.

Mrs. Howard Mayfield was killed in a head-on collision 5.4 miles southwest of Bovina on U.S. Highway 60.

OCTOBER

Dean and John Bingham announced the dissolution of their real estate business partnership on October 5, as Dean and his wife moved to Amarillo. John continued to operate the business.

Deaf Smith County Electric Cooperative made headlines when they announced a rate REDUCTION on October 5, which will become effective as of the first of the year.

The other electrical company in the area, Southwestern Public Service Company, followed Pioneer Gas' example and asked city fathers for a rate increase, which request was granted October 9.

Maize harvest shattered yield marks throughout the Friona area, as fantastic yields were reported in almost every section. Only areas hit by hail failed to make good yields.

NOVEMBER

Hi-Plains Feed Yard held its open house on November 5, and was host to hundreds of guests who came to see the new and modern cattle-feeding facility.

The Friona Chieftains finished their 1967 season with a 7-3 record, third best in the school's history, behind only two 8-2 seasons which Coach Don Light had previously posted in 1963 and 1964.

John Wilson won the Friona Star's Cotton Bowl football contest, edging season-long leader Raymond Milner in the final week. Milner took second and Joyce Veazey third.

DECEMBER

A new restaurant, to be built by R.L. Fleming, was announced for West Friona. Construction began early in December. The new eating facility is slated to open by March 1, 1968.

A driver's license office was announced for Friona, along with the necessity of coming into the Friona office have their licenses renewed as they expire.

County Judge Loyde A. Brewer, a county official 17 years, died December 12. Brewer had been in bad health for some time.

Archie Tarter, Lazbuddie and Farwell area farmer, was appointed as interim judge to fill Judge Brewer's office until the 1968 general election.

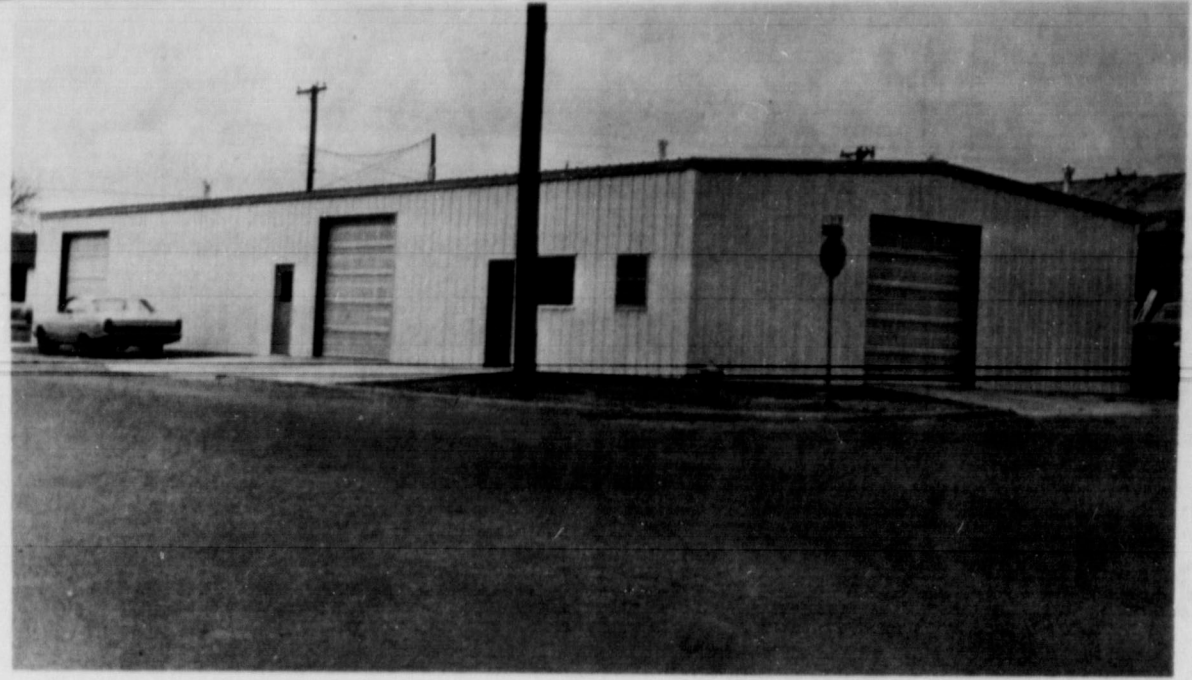
very much since it was first started. New listeners are always welcome.

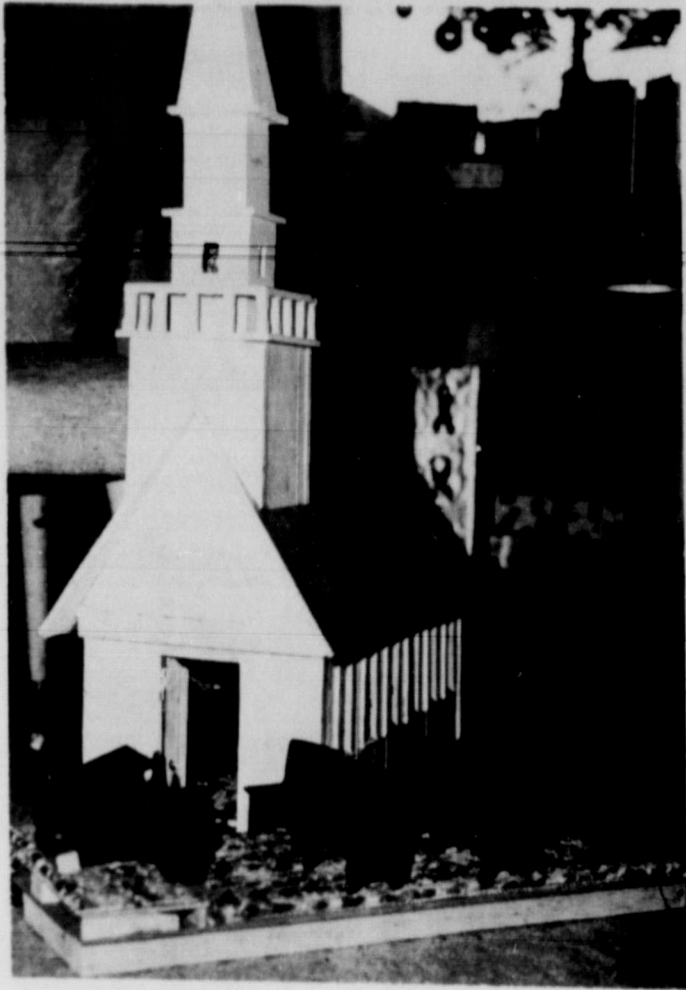

Retired Carpenter Finds New Job In 'Miniature'

E. D. Matlock, retired carpenter and farmer is still building things at age 85, but his carpentry has turned to miniature churches, which he builds in his garage-shop behind his residence at 907 Woodland.

Matlock has made five of the miniature churches, which measure about 12x30 inches, complete with lights and pews inside, a miniature preacher, altar and chair.

Matlock, who began carpentering in 1942, has a son, Frank, and a grandson, Delton Lewellen, in the building business in Friona, as well as another son at Lubbock. He says it takes him about a month to build the churches.

On the floor of the inside of the church will be found real carpet. The windows are actual stained glass.

One is impressed with the intricate design of the small chairs, pews and other portions of the churches. Pointing out the small altar chair, Matlock says "It took me two hours to carve out that chair."

Prior to Christmas, Matlock had sold three of the small churches, and was about to finish two more.

A native of Plainview, Matlock also has a collection of miniature horses. He has a scale model of a 12-horse team pulling four freight wagons, similar to a rig he operated from 1902 until 1906, hauling freight and lumber from Amarillo to Plainview and Lubbock.

There were four wagons and a camp (covered) wagon hitched in line behind the 12-horse team. He explained that he had three or four men employed to make the trips with him, and

that they hauled mainly lumber, but also coal and groceries to grocery stores on the South Plains.

Hauling of freight in the old days by team was quite an experience, Matlock recalls. He recalls one winter when the wagon train was caught in a big snow coming from Amarillo. "It just doesn't snow like that anymore," he says.

Included in his miniature animal collection are some mules. He used to farm with mule teams, stating that he owned 38 mules at one time.

Why does a man of his age keep at it? "It gives me something to do -- and I'd go crazy if I didn't have something to do," Matlock states. His hobby is practically a full-time job, as Mrs. Matlock verifies that her husband spends the biggest part of the day in his shop.

Bonus Taxable

Many employers give their workers Christmas bonuses. Some have not been sure whether or not Social Security tax should be withheld on this additional payment. Almost without exception a bonus represents covered earnings, reports John Troop, Social Security representative for this area.

Employees who are receiving monthly social security benefits (even though they are still doing some work) are also reminded that any bonus they receive must be included in total earnings when they complete their annual reports to the Social Security Administration. These annual reports are due between January 1 and April 15.

False Economy Move

FEEDING TO HEAVIER WEIGHTS . . . Feeding to heavy weights usually is a false economy for cattlemen, and creates price problems as well. Costs of gain go up sharply as livestock are fed to heavier weights. Data published by the National Research Council's Committee on Animal Nutrition show a substantial drop in feed conversion efficiency for a yearling steer in a feedlot as the weight increases past 1,000 pounds. Iowa State University tests show that the cost of putting weight on a 1,200-pound animal costs 66 percent more than to put the same weight on a 1,000-pound animal.

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Over Privileged Problem Seen

As we focus our attention on problems of Today's Families, in a fast changing society, here are some "thought provoking ideas that might help solve some teenage problems that plague the nation, according to Crickler B. Taylor, Parmer County Home Demonstration Agent.

Outstanding educators in the field of Family Life Education are becoming very concerned about our "overprivileged children," as well as the underprivileged.

There has been much concern for underprivileged children whose families lack sufficient resources and education to keep up with American life.

But what about the other side of the coin: the children who are growing up in a midst of plenty -- the overprivileged children? According to good authoritative sources, these are children who are:

Overindulged -- with money and things money can buy (but not necessarily with love and human values)

Overprotected -- but not taught self-discipline, and the ability to make their own decisions.

Overmothered -- but maybe missing the needed attention from a too-busy dad.

Overpressured -- to grow up fast, to become educated, to get good grades, sophisticated, socially adept, but not necessarily to think for themselves, be creative, or become mature persons.

Overstimulated sexually -- by the mass media but not given the necessary knowledge of how to handle these impulses in acceptable ways.

According to reports of some studies made, these educators are seeing some alarming changes in the "new" generation, Mrs. Taylor says.

Self-centered young adults who believe the world owes them a living --

Yet each individual family can have a profound influence over the way the future generation develops.

Youth who want to "drop out" from a society that places things ahead of human values (by running away to hippieland, for example)

Teenagers who try to escape from pressures of life through use of narcotics, hallucinatory drugs and even suicide.

A generation which views premarital promiscuous sexual behavior as the "in" thing to do. One out of 15 babies is born out of wedlock in the U.S. -- according to U.S. News.

Youth who look upon marriage as only a temporary arrangement, easily dissolved if unsatisfactory. Marriages between teen-agers have twice the

Educational Meeting

The livestock sub-committee of Parmer County is sponsoring a beef cattle educational meeting on January 11th beginning at 1:30 p.m. The meeting will be held in the Bovina Bank Building.

Backgrounding or preconditioning cattle will be the first subject discussed. Dr. Lowell Schake, area extension Livestock Specialist from Lubbock, will discuss this topic. Dr. Schake is a native of Missouri and has also been in the livestock business.

The term backgrounding or preconditioning is used and now recognized by cattlemen throughout the industry. It has been estimated that the loss from shrinkage, feedutilization and efficiency, plus a 1 to 2 per cent death loss due to prevailing management practices and disease manifestations will amount to approximately \$10 to \$20 per animal.

Dr. Schake will also discuss cross-breeding. One authority has said "No longer is there any doubt regarding the benefits of crossbreeding in beef cattle production. The only question is how long the industry can afford to by-pass a solid 25 per cent potential advantage." Come and hear Dr. Schake discuss the reasons for cross-breeding.

Cattle Futures Trading will be discussed by John Womack. Mr. Womack is account executive for Merrill Lynch, Pierce, Fenner & Smith Inc. of Amarillo.

Futures Trading is a very handy and worthwhile tool that can and is being used by the livestock industry, especially the cattle feeder. Mr. Womack will discuss how this cattle futures market functions.

Mail Rates Increase Effective Jan. 7

Increased rates for all classes of mail except parcel post and international mail will go into effect Jan. 7, Postmaster Wright Williams reminded postal customers this week.

"Even with the new rates of six cents for first-class mail and 10 cents for air mail, postal service is still a real bargain," he declared. "For six cents you can send a letter to any of the 50 States, to any United States territory or possession, to Canada or Mexico, or to an American serviceman stationed anywhere in the world."

Williams said that the new rate for post cards will be five cents and for air mail post cards eight cents.

He said the added cent in the letter rate is a 20 per cent increase compared to a 24 per cent boost in the rates for mailing newspapers and magazines and a 34 per cent hike for advertising circulars, "occupant" mail, and other material in the third-class category.

The new rate of six cents per ounce for first-class mail applies up to 13 ounces and the new rate of 10 cents per ounce for air mail applies up to 7 ounces. Under the new rate structure all first-class mail over 13 ounces and all air mail over 7 ounces will be merged into a single category.

These heavier pieces of first class and air mail subject to the single rate schedule will be delivered by the fastest available means of transportation.

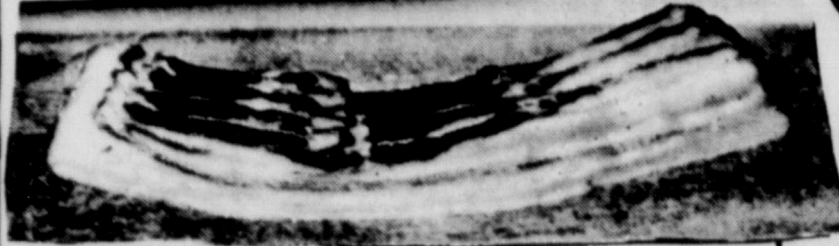
