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





When it comes to overtaking and passing moving vehicles, exercise of ordinary common sense will generally keep a driver within he law. For instance, when pass ing a car it is only common sense ance before cutting back to the ight side of the highway. Also any driver would realize the danger of increasing his speed while nother is attempting to pass him. In the same category is the proabition against passing on the right side under most ordinary conditions. Of course, you may egally pass on the right in a few specific instances, such as when the vehicle overtaken is making

However, our traffic laws stte that even when passing on he right is allowed, it shall be done only under conditions permitting such movement in safety. And, in no event should such passing be accomplished by driving off the pavement or main trav-

Familiar to all are the no passing zones designated by dash ines placed to one side of the center stripe on our highways. Not so well known are the restrictions against crossing the center line when approaching within 100 feet of or when traversing any intersection or railroad grade

A driver should never cross the center line of a highway when the left side of the road is not clearly visible and free of oncoming traffic. Generally speaking, when not engaged in passing another vehicle, one should not drive to the left of the roadway.


