### GUEST SPEAKER TELLS LIONS: Vocational Guidance for Our Young People Is Key to Tapping Our Human Resources

Dr. Morris Thompson urged an audience of Morton Lions and guests, Wednesday noon, to help develop our human resources through vocational guidance work with the young people of our communities.

Dr. Thompson, guest speaker at the Lions regular luncheon meeting, called human resources our most important weapon in the war this country is now waging with at least half of the world to remain free.

Dr. Thompson, president of Kirksville College of Osteopathy, Kirksville, Missouri, in Morton to speak at a night meeting in the County Auditorium, was introduced by Dr.

Phil Russell, Ft. Worth.

The speaker, a member of a 21-man consultant group to the Surgeon General of the United States, is touring the country on behalf of a better public health program. But he saved his health talk for the evening session. Instead, Wednesday noon, he discussed what he called his "pet hobby horse," the need for vocational guidance help for our young people.

The Kirksville, Missouri, Rotarian, spicing his talk with an occasional humorous anecdote, warned that the United States is engaged in a war, more truly and completely than ever before, a war with at least half the world, in which the issue is will we maintain our freedom or will we one day live as slaves. He cautioned the war may last 100 years and may be lost without a shot fired, but he expressed his optimism that we will win this war and one day the whole world will be free.

anything in which he shows a sincere interest," the speaker summed up. "Be interested, and support those who are helping in this field of endeavor," he urged.

Other guests at the luncheon were Bill Glassford and Robert George, both of Morton.

### Turkey Shoot Underway at Frontier Lanes

High scores in the men's Class A division of Frontier Lanes Turkey shoot, now in progress, skyrocketed over the 500 mark through Thursday of this week, assuring that no turkey will be won in that class with "light" scores.

John Barnes fired a 551 to take the early lead. Roy Horn of Lubbock had two series, a 540 and a 513, to take second and third spot. Jack Molar had a 512 and Sam Kelly a 470.

In the men's class B group, Luther Hankins' 436 was tops followed by Tom McAlister with games of 445 and 419, Hankins with a 398 and Bill Hargis, 391.

No women have competed in the Class A division but in Class B, Blackey Reynolds' 436 was still high followed by Ethel Harris with a 402 and Pat Mullinax 356.

The turkey shoot closes on December 23. Until that time anyone can enter by paying the \$2.00 entry fee (includes cost of bowling); bowl the three games, turn in the total score. Top five in each class will win turkeys.

Men's A division is for 140 bowlers and up; Class B is for 139 bowlers and down. Average must be established by bowling three games, if no league average is posted. Women's Class A is for 110 bowlers and up, Class B is for 109 and down.

Turkey shoot scores cannot be rolled in league play.

The way in which we use our resources may be the most important deciding factor in this war, Dr. Thompson opined. He described vocational guidance as the matter of identifying, respecting, developing, and deploying interests and aptitudes toward the needs of the nation and the individual. He pointed out we must aid our young people to develop their aptitudes by influence in this country, rather than the method of force used by our enemies, because that is the basic thing in which we believe, reasoning rather than force, freedom of choice rather than dictatorship.

He expressed the worry over lack of concern by people for the needs to develop in our youngsters a feeling of citizenship responsibilities.

Pointing out that businessmen, friends, neighbors and relatives of our young people have a far greater opportunity to offer vocational guidance than our school teachers, he urged everyone to be interested and helpful to the youth who poses questions about his future, about the way in which he should fit into society.

"Don't aim them at your star," Dr. Thompson said. "Help them find their own star." He reasoned that the basic needs for youth to be a success in any chosen field of endeavor are nearly always the same, regardless of the field.

### "OPEN STAFF" MOVE PRAISED... Mortonites Urged to Move Carefully In Efforts to Secure More Doctors

To be a "good doctor" a man "must be a man, and the right kind of a man," Dr. Morris Thompson, president of Kirksville College of Osteopathy and Surgery, told approximately 50 persons Wednesday night in the Cochran County Auditorium.

Dr. Thompson, who addressed the Morton Lions at noon Wednesday, and later the Morton High School seniors, was a guest of the Memorial Hospital Board of Managers.

His appearance here Wednesday night was necessary due to his time table.

On his current tour into Texas in the interest of motivating students to enter the field of medicine, Dr. Thompson spoke to students at Texas Tech, and Texas A&M College.

He praised the move which made the local hospital an open staff hospital, and he praised Dr. G. P. Flanagan as a man and as a doctor.

(Dr. Flanagan was unable to hear Dr. Thompson at noon or again on Wednesday night because of emergency cases arriving at the hospital.)

Dr. Thompson advised the community to be slow in "inviting another doctor here." He advised careful consideration before action.

Regarding the relationship between doctors and the community, he advised "thoughtful consideration."

"Today," he said, "there are not enough good young men and women interested in the field of health to fill needed requirements."

While serving on an advisory staff to the Surgeon General of the United States, Dr. Thompson said figures studied by the group showed that in 1958 there were 141 practicing physicians, MD's and DO's, for each 100,000 population, and Texas fell below that percentage.

The situation is even more critical today, he said.

He urged citizens of the community to interest themselves in seeing that local students are brought into the field of medicine.

Dr. Thompson presented a short film showing and explaining the education of DO's.

He was introduced by Dr. Phil R. Russell, D. O., and executive secretary and treasurer of the Texas Association of Osteopathic Physicians and Surgeons.

Dr. Russell was introduced by County Judge Glenn Thompson, ex-officio member of the Memorial Hospital Board of Managers.

### County Cotton Allotment Increased By 6,970 Acres

Cochran County has received a cotton allotment acreage increase of 6,970 acres over the 1960 total program and a boost of 10,132 acres over the 1960 base.

The Texas Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Office at College Station, released Thursday the figures for Texas Counties under the 1961 cotton program.

Cochran County farmers will be allotted 82,653 acres as compared to 75,683, the 1960 total allotment for this county.

Thus Cochran County's farmers continued a slight climb in total acreage under the allotment program which has shown a small increase every year since 1957. However, in two of those years, 1957 and 1958, it was disaster and hardship acres awarded to the county that enabled the figure to increase slightly over the previous year. The base allotment in each of these years was less than the year before.

In 1959 we received a slight increase of 324 acres over 1958, and in 1960 the increase was only another 141 acres.

The increase for Cochran County was 9.7 per cent over last year's base and 8.2 per cent over last year's total. Other area counties also received increases and a comparison of increases by percentage of our neighboring counties shows Hockley County received a 10 per cent increase over last year's total; Lamb County received a 4.4 per cent increase; and Bailey County increase was less than one per cent.

cent.  
The two choice A and B allotment system ends this year and all producers for next crop year will be in the same category. The increase is the greatest since allotments went into effect in 1954. Cochran County's average increase is slightly under the national total increase average of 11.3 over the 1960 base; and even more under the Texas average increase of 15.1 per cent over the 1960 base.

But area-wise, the percentage of increase was larger than the state or national figures.

Individual farm allotments are being mailed out by the County ASC offices as soon as they can be computed, which will probably be early next week.

All growers in 1961 will receive the full available price support, the level of which will be announced early next year. Cotton growers vote December 13 in the national referendum to determine whether or not marketing quotas will be in effect on the 1961 crop. Regardless of the outcome of the vote, allotments will remain in effect as the determining factor of the eligibility of a farmer to receive the available price support.

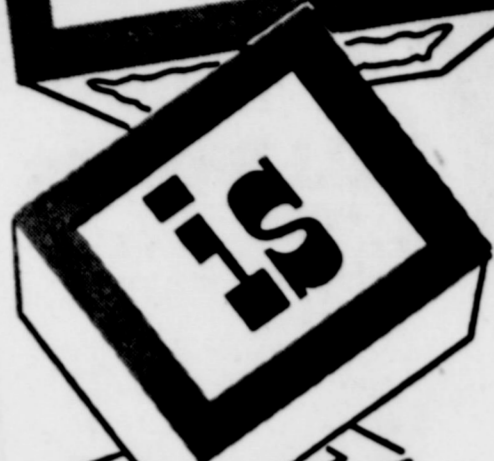

### CHRISTMAS GIFTS FROM THE KITCHEN

Gifts from the kitchen or those made with one's own hands are most welcome but often overlooked in Christmas buying sprees. Some suggestions for gifts from the kitchen are:

1. Jelly
2. Relishes

4. Dressed chicken or turkey
5. Quick breads, such as Date Bread, Banana Bread, Cranberry Bread, Orange-nut Bread
6. Homemade Candy
7. Fruit Cakes

Fruit cakes should be made now. They need time to mellow and you will be ahead of the Christmas rush.

If you do not have a favorite fruit cake recipe try a **White Fruit Cake**:

- 1 cup butter or margarine
- 3 cups sugar
- 4 cups flour
- 3 t. baking powder
- 1 cup milk
- 8 egg whites, well beaten
- 1/2 lb. candied pineapple
- 1 lb. citron or drained watermelon rind preserves
- 1 lb. candied cherries
- 4 cups pecans
- 1 lb. almonds (blanched)
- 1 medium coconut (grated)

Leave cherries and pecans whole. Chop almonds. Cut candied fruit into inch cubes. Grate fresh coconut. Combine fruits and nuts and sprinkle with flour. Cream butter or margarine, add sugar gradually and beat until well blended and light. Sift flour, measure and combine with baking powder. Add flour and milk alternately to the mixture, beginning and ending with flour. Add fruit and nuts. Fold in stiffly beaten egg

white. Grease two one-pound bread pans. Line with brown paper cut to fit pans and extend one inch above

into pans with hands. Cover top with waxed paper and place pan of cake during last 15 minutes of baking. Grease paper. Pack batter 250 degrees F. oven for about 2 hours. Remove cover from top of water in oven under cake. Bake in
