IN FINAL GAME

Memphis Passing Helps Cyclones To 14-0 Win

To say that the Memphis Cyclones were "Long" on passing in their finale against Friona last Friday at Memphis might be considered a bad pun.

But the truth of the matter is that the pass-catching of end Roy Long proved too much for Friona, who held Memphis scoreless for three quarters only to see the Cyclones rally for two fourth-quarter TDs and a 14-0 win.

The loss left Friona's season record at 7-3, the thirdbest in the school's history.
