

Pause And Reflect By Nelson Lewis

The summer of the year 1623 had been extremely hot and dry. Undaunted by adversities the little band of Pilgrims met to give thanks to God for their meager crops and to pray for rain. Before the end of the service a gentle rain began to fall, gladdening the hearts and strengthening the faith of the worshippers. Several more years of privation and hardship were to pass before these early Pilgrims would see their dream of an independent colony fulfilled.

It is usually of this Plymouth Rock colony that we think when referring to the "first Thanksgiving."

However another group of colonists had experienced similar suffering at Jamestown Virginia about 16 years earlier. Here again friendly Indians played a major role in the well being of the settlers. Not until strife arose between redmen and white did the Jamestown colony suffer dispair and almost complete starvation.

The arrival of a ship from England, laden with supplies, was met with prayers of Thanksgiving.

Important as these two incidents were in the formation of our national history, neither was the real first Thanksgiving in what later became the United States.

In the late spring of 1540, Francisco Vasquez de Coronado led a hungry army into the pueblo country of present day

He found the natives anything but friendly. In fact it was not until after many hours of "peace talks" followed by six hours of hard fighting that the starving Spaniards were able to feast upon the captured food supplies.

Whereupon Father Juan de Padilla held a mass thanking God for delivering the army from the perils of desert travel. Less than two years later this brave young Franciscan priest was murdered by warlike Indians -- the people he was attempting to convert!

So it has been for 428 years. ('hristian adventurers have fought, starved, suffered and died so that today we may enjoy this Thanksgiving season in the midst of plenty. Can we do less than preserve it?



Perea rushed for 1761 yards a mile, in breaking Doug Dodd's former record of 1184 yards by ball considerably more than Dodd did in 1964, 274 to 183, and had a similar average per arry. Dodd averaged 6.5 yards per carry, and Perea 6.2.

Perea scored 110 points the past season, getting three TDs in his final game, but finished 114, also in 1964. Perea scored more touchdowns (17-13) than did Dodd, but the former Chieftain Star booted 22 extra points and four field goals in 1964 to amass his total.

As a team, the 1968 Chieftains scored 26.4 points per game, which made them the highest scoring team at FHS since 1951, when the 7-2 Chiefs that year scored at a 30.3

The Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service will be conducting an extensive livestock survey in the State during the last half of November.

Pasture grasses are rapidly becoming of major importance in both the High Plains and Rolling Plains.

#### Pheasant Season Set December 14


Pheasant season in Parmer County will be later this year than usual, according to Jack Patterson, president of the Parmer County Game Management Association.



Food additives have been used since primitive man preserved his meat with salt.

Today additives are used in carefully controlled amounts of foods to change the food in some way, according to Extension Nutritionist Sally Springer. They are chemicals-but consumers should not be alarmed by the long complex names of the additives.

All food additives must be safe. Before a food additive is approved for use, it is studied for years. The 1958 Food Additives Amendment was enacted to protect the public by requiring pre-testing of additives. Federal law required truthful labeling of food addi-





Previously, although some washing instructions advise consumers to hand wash glass fiber fabrics separately and rinse the container thoroughly afterwards, consumers have not been warned of the consequences when care instructions are not observed.



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


